J.J. comes from a long line of racers that participated in drag racing and all forms of sidecar racing on dirt and ice, and a winning resume including many local and national titles; the Sams family has no lack of talent and that coupled with the extensive mechanical talent of all the family members, this makes for an almost unbeatable combination that many racers envy and opponents fear.

J.J. has participated in many different forms of motorcycle and ATV racing. If it has wheels and goes fast, most likely he will swing his leg over the beast and tame it like the horse breaking cowboys of the Wild West. Sams is most definitely a steel horse cowboy, fearless and committed to his craft.

J.J. has competed at the amateur and professional level, riding for Iowa's Dick Weirbach and for local bike owners including Dan Hodder, Tin Shack Cycles Shawn McSparin, Barnes Racing Garage, GG&R, Nile Hanchette and others. Sams is more than willing to put in the work to race and maintain the machines he rides if they are his or not; he is also not one to ask for charity, if you ask him to ride, he'll do it; he will also make sure that bike is clean, has new rubber and is in better shape than when he rode it. You don't find men like this often anymore.

In June, Sams was seriously injured in a ATV wreck while participating in a local Dirt Drag event. As of this writing, J.J. is recovering after a handful of surgeries that we pray will have him back on the track and living life on the edge providing us with on and off track entertainment. God Bless you J.J. and we pray for a speedy recovery.

THE LITTLE THINGS ADD UP TO BIG THINGS

2020/21 BETA DETAIL REVIEW

▲ Radically different, but can you judge a book by its cover?

Not very long ago, it seemed like GasGas was the only alternative to KTM (and its Husaberg brand) and a smattering of dated Japanese offerings when it came to legitimate offroad bikes. However, when Beta arrived back on the scene in 2013 with it's award-winning 2Ts, it signaled a change about to occur in the dirt bike landscape.

Since that time, GasGas died, was revived, and looks to have died again (tooling and design of the Phoenix project bikes has been bought by Spanish maker Rieju). Sherco entered the field with its own crop of 2Ts and updated 4Ts, and after an importer change in 2019 looks to have established a foothold in the market. Husqvarna was consumed by KTM, and sells a similar line-up to the orange bikes. Italian maker TM has also stepped up its game, debuting a new line of 250 and 300s in 2019, then building on that success with the introduction of available TPI fuel-injected engines across its range in 2020.

Beta continued to refine the bikes it brought out in 2013, introducing new cylinders, clutches, oil-injection, suspension, body work, and frames along the way, but the bikes themselves were very clearly iterative in design ... refinements to an already solid platform. That all changed in 2020.

Beta's new bikes ride on brand new frames with new construction techniques, serve up all-new body work with a very flat profile across the top

of the bike, and offer KYB forks for the serious racer for the very first time. The wheels and brakes are familiar, the Keihin PWK carb is retained, and the switchgear has been used before, but almost everything else is new.



ENGINE AND COOLING SYSTEM

Beta's 250 and 300 2Ts are equipped with counterbalancers in 2020, joining KTM/Husky and TM in offering the technology.



A lot of attention has also been paid to providing oil flow through the clutch system. The basket is highly skeletonized, and even the pressure plate has scoops on the front edge to aid in circulation.

Most will notice the odd trials-style radiator cap, but only the observant will recognize that the radiators themselves have been dropped in the frame, eliminating the need to a bleed screw in the right radiator, and utilizing a through-the-frame T hose. The thermostat is retained, but many will utilize the available Samco hose kit to eliminate it.

SUBFRAME, AIRBOX, AND BODYWORK

A great deal of attention was also paid to cleaning up the airbox region of the bikes, and on RRs the oil injection bottle is now contained completely inside the subframe. A new air filter design is utilized to ensure better sealing, and while the mechanism has changed, the push-button seat release and no-tool airbox cover removal functions remain. Sadly, the hallmark handgrabs on the previous bikes have been eliminated, but on the plus side the rear fender and inner fender where they now reside is much cleaner than in years past.

The seat is flat, really flat, across the top, but it blends well with the new body work. Longtime Beta riders will notice the increased width of the fuel



tank when seated, but the benefit of the new shape is less trapped gas (making for increased range), and a larger capacity (more range again). Moving front to back on the bike is very easy ... did I mention how flat the top of the bike is?

FRAME DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION

The new frame is said to retain the geometry of the older frame but with newer construction techniques. Most noticeable are the change in design of the top tube, now very curved with much cleaner construction, and the upper shock mount, which is more free-standing. Access to the carb and engine has been improved. Whether through suspension attachment point

or subframe design, the new bikes sit higher – a boon for taller rider, a detriment for the vertically challenged.

The new frame also uses a cast member to tie in the footpegs and forward shock dog-bone attachment, which Beta claims improves stiffness and manufacturability of that part of the frame.

It's hard to know exactly what happened in Italy during the recent global covid-19 lockdown, but we do know that the Beta factory came back full speed ahead in late May when restrictions were lifted. Months earlier than expected Beta released the 2021 2T RRs and 4T RRs for Europe and the rest of the world.



Purpose built for the small-bore lover

Numerous detail changes were made to further refine the technologies introduced in 2020, including updates to the airbox and sidepanel attachment, and increased gusseting on the steering head, and vivid RED bodywork. Not a little red, not the odd orangey-red from previous Race Editions, but RED!

After the addition of KYB forks in 2020, it will be interesting to see what the new model year brings for the Race Edition models. More interesting perhaps will be the Beta RX, a cross-country race bike being teased by Beta on social media. From what I've seen, the new bikes are purpose built hare scramblers, with no speedo pickup on the front end, a 19-inch rear tire, and blue anodized rims.

I've said it before and I'll say it again – what a great time to be in the market for a new off-road dirt bike, as evidenced by the new models offered by Italian marque Beta.

Racing Begins in District 14

I am pretty sure everyone knows that the District 1 Season has finally begun. Matt and Mark at Big Air, in Newaygo, Michigan took a chance during the Governor's "stay at home order," and worked with the community, the county health department and county Sheriff Departments to obtain permission to open their track for racing.

To say that it was a major success would be an understatement, with two days of great D14 Motocross Racing! This Major Event opened the way for ourclubs and promoters to open up for racing.

This opening does still come with risks as the Governor's Orders still do not allow for us to gather with over 100 people for events, and this may be a liability issue with our insurances. (Checking with my lawyers we would probably win in the long run if prosecution was brought against us). But in light of recent events in the State we doubt that we will be looked at if we continue to work with our counties and follow "Safe to Race" protocol at our events.

MX division racing will have continued with Grattan June 7, and Red Bud on June 13.

Lucky Thumbs Motorcycle Club Opens Flat Track on June 1-13 weekend.

Valley Trail Rider's will open the Hare Scrambles season in Bentley, Michigan on June 21.

Enduro and Family Enduro will begin in July with Muddobber's Motorcycle Club FES July 11th.

And VTR Enduro, July 26. Michigan

Sprint Enduros hopefully will start on June 28 at Dutch Sport Park.

Vintage MX possibly on June 6 at Polka Dots or if not June 28 at Log Road.

Muskegon Motorcycle Club (celebrating their 100-year anniversary) will open the Hillclimb Season June 19-21.

Riding during Covid –19

Legislation

There are some things on the horizon to be concerned about. There is a push by the MISORVA and DNR/Parks and Recreation Staff in the Upper Peninsula to close ORV Trails that share snowmobile trails during December 1 thru May 1 (seasonal closing) with a caveat that any trail could be closed if they deem it having possible damage if ridden. We will stay on top of this as we at District 14 will always stay vigilant to protect our members rights to ride!

1. The rules are a supplement to the AMA Amateur, Semi-Pro & Youth Competition Rulebook/Online Copy. Please pay attention to these rules they will be strongly enforced for our 2020 D14 Dirt Track Series. Online copy will be correct copy to follow. Any changes to rules after rule books are printed will always be posted online.

2. Classes recognized by AMA/D14 Dirt track & for which points may be earned are as follows:

0-51cc- Pee Wee Shaft Drive/Multi-1. Speed 4-8 yrs.

(Multi-Speed Shifters must be removed)

- 2. 0-51cc Senior - Chain 7-8 yrs
- 3. 52-65cc 7-11 yrs
- 4. 66-85cc 7-15 yrs
- 5. 86-250cc Open
- 6. 251cc+ Open Single
- 7. 251-505cc Amateur
- 8. 251cc + Open Twin 17+ yrs
- 9. Veteran 35+ yrs
- 10. Senior 60+ yrs

11. Vintage 0-400cc (Air Cooled 1988 and older)

12. 401 Open Vintage 1988 or older (17+ yrs on 400CC+ Twin)

13. Wildcat 80-200cc (Air Cooled 4 Stroke, 12yrs older and up)

3. A promoter or club, at their discretion, may run classes in addition to those listed, but the riders will not earn points in these "additional" or "optional" classes Combo and Buddy. If promotor chooses to run a Buddy class it must be separated as Youth (ages 7-15) and Adult (age 16+). AMA/D14

points will be earned in those classes as listed above 1-13 only.

4. Six (6) bikes constitute a class. If less than six bikes sign up for a class, that class need not be run and bikes may be moved up to the next higher class and/or class equivalent. In classes which cannot be combined, the promoter or club may elect not to run any class with three (3) bikes or less. With classes with four (4) bikes but less than six (6), the club or promoter may elect to run only a final race and no heat race.

5. Points will be figured out as follows: 1st-20pts, 2nd-15pts, 3rd-10pts, 4th-8pts, 5th-6pts, 6th-5pts, 7th-4pts, 8th-3pts, 9th-2pts, 10th-1pt. DNS 0pts

DNF 0-1pt-please see rule 22.

6. 0-65cc classes will not be allowed to start a final race after 10pm. The promoter / club to plan accordingly to schedule these races earlier in the program. In the event that no finals start prior to 10 pm, at the referee's discretion, he/she may ask for a unanimous vote amongst guardians to continue to race the final or use the results of the heat/qualifier races for scoring.

7. To receive Amateur AMA/D14 points a rider must:

A. Use the last two digits of their D14 or AMA number with the first letter of their last name (letter optional. Example: John Doe's D14 or AMA number is 1234; John Doe will run the number 34D.). If both riders in the same class are using the same number (one using the last 2 digits of his AMA and the other D14), the rider having had their number the longest shall use that number.

The other rider will add the first letter of their last name to their number.

B. Use the number they earned in AMA/ D14 competition.

C. Use the number they earned in AMA National Competition with an "N" after it.

D. All machines must be equipped with three number plates: white in color with black numbers and letters (optional colors for licensed professionals.)

8. Riding numbers 1 through 10 will be assigned to the top 10 riders in AMA/D14 Dirt Track Competition according to overall points earned the previous year. NO RIDER IS ALLOWED TO USE #1 UNLESS THEY EARNED IT THE PREVIOUS YEAR. 9. Number Plates:

A. Bike must be equipped with 3 plates of uniform size shape and must be black numbers on white background (except for licensed professionals.)

B. Numbers must be at least 5-inch high standard block letters; numbers must NOT be shaded or outlined.

1. Lettering must have a professional appearance.

2. AMA national numbers will take precedence in all events, and will be designated by a 3-inch letter N (such as 1N)

3. 50cc classes may use 3 inch high numbers to maintain a neat appearance.

C. Four Wheeler's must be equipped with vertical number plates on rear grab bar of quad.

10. A referee cannot referee a class that an underage family member is participating in.

Interview with Mark Powers of Big Air MX on the first event of 2020

Q: The off-road racing community has been immensely frustrated this spring, with the stay at home orders and restrictions on activities and gatherings. Big Air was the first to push the envelope and hold an event. How did you come to the decision that the time was right, and how did you work with your community/county?

Mark: We were chomping at the bit to get going knowing all the racers were more than ready! Seeing that racing was starting in other states we thought it was time to open things up.

We had already had a handful of open practices with record turnouts without any issues. Opening the track wouldn't have been possible without help from our local sheriff deputy Tim Bailey. He was instrumental in working with the sheriff to give us the green light on opening the track.

Q: The May 30 and 31 racing weekend was extremely well attended with over 400 entries. Parking can sometimes be an issue for some tracks, how did Big Air handle so many? And how did the rest of the days events go, I imagine they were for some pretty full classes?

Mark: We were packed! We were anticipating a big turnout so we parked people when they came in so we could maximize our parking. The day's events went smoothly, we have an awesome team that runs the track from office crew to the flag crew. We could have never done it without them and they are greatly appreciated!

Q: Did you or any of the attendees experience any difficulty with law-enforcement or community members because of the event? Thoughts on why or why not?

Mark: We didn't have any issues with local authorities. I didn't think we would as our local authorities don't want to infringe on people's constitutional rights. Everyone there was in attendance at their own free will.

Q: Be honest, were you shaken' in your shoes a little bit?

Mark: Honestly yes! Ha Ha! We were nervous all week and weekend even though I thought we would be fine. You just never know how things will go during these crazy times.

Q: Any racing highlights from the weekend that you'd like to share?

Mark: It was a great weekend of races for sure! We had countless people thanking us for being open and having races. That meant a ton to us. It felt like the first normal weekend in months.

Q: What advice would you give to other promoters and clubs about going forward with racing for the remainder of 2020?

Mark: I hope this will help open things up in the racing community. We have some of the best tracks in the country here in Michigan!

An assistant referee will be appointed for that class. A club member / promoter cannot set the heat / qualifying race line-ups (when more than one is required) of a class in which a family member is participating. The referee or a District 14 representative must be present when the heat/ qualifier race line-ups are set.

11. Only one event in each type of competition, short track, half mile or TT will be designated the District 14 State Championship event of the year. It is not necessary to have a State Championship in each event.

12. An event that is designated the District 14 State Championship event of the year, must run all of the AMA/D14 designated classes. 13. A promoter or club who is awarded a D14 Championship event must advertise it in order to inform every D14 rider and to get maximum spectator attendance. All advertisements are subject to D14 rules.

14. D14 RACE POINTS WILL BE AWARDED FOR D14 EVENTS ONLY. The only exception is if the Flat Track & TT Scramble Amateur Grand National Championship and/or Regional National races are run on the same date as a District 14 race of same type of event, then and only then, will the National/ Regional event count for District 14 points. It will be counted from the actual finishing spot. However, it is up to the rider to keep track of the position he finished, then it must be submitted within 3 weeks after the event. The chairperson will have it certified from the hosting club/or promoter that it is accurate.

15. At State Championship races the minimum places that will receive awards will be up to 6th place unless otherwise stated.

16. Each club and promoter will pay the sum of three dollars (\$3.00) per rider signed up in each class at each of any D14 points paying event and all half mile, short track, and TT will be qualifiers and the sum of three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) per rider signed up in each class at the State Championships. These should be collected and sent to the D14 Flat Track Chairperson, with their D14 referees report and race results report no later than 2 weeks after each event. Race results must be legible, identify the D14 recognized classes, include the rider name per D14 membership and include at least the last 4 digits of D14 membership number; results must be sent to the D14 Points Keeper and AMA within 7 days of the race event.

17. State Championship Races – The top 6 riders in points in each class will be locked into the front row starting position. The 7th-12th riders will have to qualify for a back row position if there are more than 12 riders. Points will still determine line pick for your semi.

18. Any entrant removing a race track banner without authorization of track officials, shall be penalized a minimum of 20 District points and up to complete removal of all D14 points for the entire season, penalty determined by the D-14 board. 19. Unless otherwise advertised, practice will start two hours before race time and go through two complete sessions. It then stops and a riders meeting conducted, and time permitting, late practices will be given. In case of lost time or delay by some unforeseen reason, the referee may shorten

20. Any rider abusing the practice system by taking more than two practice sessions per bike/quad (not class), unless approved by the referee, shall start from the penalty line in all races for that day.

practice.

21. A rider who makes the final and crashes or does not finish the race will receive one point as a DNF. However in the event where there are more than 10 riders zero points will be awarded if a riders crashed or does not finish the race.

22. Any rider holding a current professional racing license shall not be permitted to enter an age class (Vet 35+ and 60+) at amateur competition. Licensed riders may not enter the 251-505 Open Single class.

23. At a D14 race, the head starter/referee/ club-promoter, before practice/riders meeting, will go over what every flag and what its colors mean. The head starter/referee/clubpromoter shall have schooling or instructions for corner flagmen. This is to make flagmen familiar with all the flags and their meaning and to be supplied with appropriate flags and means of communicating with the head starter and/or referee. In addition, they shall coordinate with emergency personnel, at the appropriate times, for emergency vehicles to enter the racetrack.

24. The District 14 State Championships will

be at least 10 laps with no more than 15 laps, unless other circumstances come about such as darkness, accidents, weather, etc. and then laps will be determined by rider rep, referee, and club/promoter. 25. NOTE: Combo Class (non-points paying) 250cc+. MINIMUM OF 15 YEARS +, and must be an A rider, Prosport, Pro-Expert or GNC rider. A minimum pay out of 75% of sign-up and pay 50% of the riders in the Main Event (non-points paying money class) shall be given.

26. 401 Open Vintage 1988 or older, 401-600CC Air Cooled Single Cylinder 2 or 4 valve,

401-750CC Air Cooled Twin Cylinder 2 or 4 valve. Air Cooled 2 stroke. Must be period correct, twin shock frame, or period correct single shock frame. (Note: See 2019/2020 AMA Rule Book for 1980's Vintage 750 CC for proper single shock frame type.) Must be a minimum of 17 years old to ride a 400+cc twin.

27. Tie-Break: In the event of a tie for the Points Championship, the winner will be determined based on the number of main event wins in the series. Should it still be a tie, finishes of second, third, etc. will be tallied until the tie is broken. If a tie remains. the best finish in the last race will determine the champion.

28. A number 1 plate will be given to each high point rider in each class of each division (Short Track, Half Mile and TT) at the end of the season. An overall number 1 plate will be given to a rider who has earned the most points in that class that include all divisions (Short Track, Half Mile, TT). A rider must compete in a minimum of 50% of the races to be eligible for overall year-end awards only. In order for awards to be given more than 2 races for the season must be ran.

29. The Overall Champion in each class will be the ONLY rider allowed to use the #1 on the bike in the same class for the next year. 30. In the case of a rider falling during practice or a race, ONLY TRACK OFFICIALS AND EMERGENCY PERSONNEL ARE ALLOWED ON THE TRACK. When it is determined safe to enter the track, a track official can give authorization for entry. Any person not adhering to this rule may be removed from the premises and that rider may be disgualified

for the day. Repeated non-compliance to this rule may lead to expulsion for the year pending decision by District 14 and AMA.

31. It is mandatory that all promoters/ clubs verify District 14 and AMA cards are present and in current standing, prior to allowing signing up for any class. Any rider not in possession of a current District 14 card or proof of membership will be required to sign-up again. No points will be earned for any race that the rider competed in where the membership was not current, NO EX-CEPTIONS.

32. If running a bike in the buddy class, kickstands must be removed.

33. Number of bikes on track for race is at track discretion.

34. Any open weekend from May til Oct maybe ran as a rain date.

35. A CRF150 will be placed in the 86-250 Open class and the rider must be a minimum of 12 years old.

36. Mini Electric motorcycles may be run as an exhibition class. If the referee chooses, they can combine with the O-51cc Chain class, but must be scored separately.

37. No racer under the age of 16 will be allowed to race or passenger any sidecar. All age to displacement rules will still apply.

38. Quad classes may be run as exhibition classes only.

39. O-51cc class may consist of shaft or multi-speed bikes. In the event of a multispeed shifters must be removed. In both 0-51cc classes, modifications may be made, but must be kept to a 50cc displacement.

• Who would have thought in December at the D14 Sanctioning Meeting that the year would be almost half over before we got back to racing? Crazy, I know.

• Speaking of getting back to racing, the Monster Energy Supercross series head-faked us all by deciding to hold seven rounds in Utah instead of Arizona. At the time of this writing two of the remaining seven rounds of the season have been run, with the rest coming in short order. Races are held on a Sunday-Wednesday-Sunday cadence.

• So far the elevation of Salt Lake City favors Eli Tomac, who lives and trains in the mountains of Colorado. On the other extreme is Ken Roczen, whose Florida home is about 300ft above sea level. Tomac looks strong in his attempt to earn his first 450 supercross title, but Roczen looks gassed.

• The rumblings about re-organization of the operation of Sherco USA don't seem to have affected Grant Baylor. A month of so after brother Steward gave Sherco its first GNCC podium with a 2nd place finish, Grant soldiered through the pack to land on the 3rd step at the Camp Coker Bullet GNCC.

• The motorcycle business has been on fire in the last couple months. Who knew that a pandemic would have the effect of driving everyone into their garages and onto the trails? Anecdotally we have sold through all of our inventory in the last month (some has been restocked, more on the way), and even Yamaha doesn't have any YZ250FXs for sale ... anywhere in the country.

• Beta followed up their release of the 2021 XTrainer with the release of the 2021 2T and 4T RRs, and boy are they red. In years past the so-called 'red' on Beta frames and plastic and graphics has tended more to the fluorescent orange, but for 2021 the 'red' is RED.

• Besides the new colors, most of the changes on the new Betas focus on improving fit, finish, and durability, but in true Beta fashion the suspension settings are revised. We'll have to be patient to see what happens with the RR-s

dual sport, the RE race editions, and the much anticipated RX.

• Michigan's highly restrictive re-opening in response to Covid-19 means that the first race of the Lucas Oil Motocross Nationals will be held at Crawfordsville, Indiana on July 18th. Sexton will get no help from his Honda-mounted teammate Jeremy Martin, because like McElrath last year, Martin has decided to sit out the final rounds of the 250 East Supercross series in order to preserve his eligibility to ride the little bikes again next year.

• Ooooof! Adam Cianciarulo came into Salt Lake City fresh, having healed up from an early season injury. Things quickly went downhill when the likeable but fragile 450 rookie crashed in the whoops at the first Salt Lake City round. It wasn't disclosed if the four fractures in his back were the result of the crash or the effect of Cooper Webb running him over in the aftermath.

• The long-awaited Yamaha Tenere 700 has hit American shores, but not before the on-line ordering frenzy crashed Yamaha's website. Supposedly the first batch is oversubscribed, but more of the light adventure bikes are expected before fall.
