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# EUROPE: IN OR OUT, WHAT IT'S ALL ABOUT?

### From Sicily to Sonning Common!

He's a familiar sight around the village with his rubbish cart and high visibility jacket and if you've ever stopped to talk to him you might have wondered where he was from.

Our street cleaner Antonino Parisi, known as Tony, is Sicilian born and bred but moved to England in 1975 when he was in his late 20s.

In 1977 he married Mauritian-born Rosemary, whom he met when he stopped to help her with her shopping. She was living in England at the time while training to become a nurse. The pair decided to make England their home and brought up their two daughters Florence and Melissa here.

Tony has been employed by the parish council since 2009 and spends up to 20 hours a week patrolling the village centre, residential roads, skatepark and play areas on the lookout for rubbish.

Now aged 71 Tony has no plans to retire. He loves being outdoors in the fresh air. To him keeping fit means keeping going. And the work certainly seems to agree with him for he is always cheerful.

"If you sit at home you get pains in your legs and in your shoulders but if you keep moving and keep working you forget all about the aches and pains," says Tony.

Tony spends up to five weeks a year in Mauritius where he and his wife keep a second home. Rosemary is over there for up to six months a year and when Tony rolls up for his annual holiday he finds that she has a list of jobs for him to do. But that's how he likes it - always busy, never bored.





Every 24 hours this world of ours presents us with two remarkable solar displays, sunrise and sunset. I must confess to seeing far more of the latter from a distressing tendency to late rising, but have photographed sunsets worldwide, from a lake and from the summit of a pagoda in Burma, deep in the bush in Tanzania and Botswana, and from the roof of the temple at Dendera in the deserts of Egypt. All fascinating, but usually in cloudless skies and being in the tropics, passing very swiftly without the benefit of twilight.

Which brings me to the reason for this photo: some of the most beautiful I have ever seen have occurred here at Sonning Common. From my house in Kennylands or from the Millennium field one gets the occasional fantastic display of colours fringing the scattered cloud layer, across Kidmore End. One of my cynical friends claims this is partly due to the pollution levels and if so it is one unexpected advantage. I suppose they occur across most of England but the topography here seems to help, and render them one more benefit to living in the district. **Peter Dayton**

## Chiltern Edge School Amnesty Group win the 2016 Marsh Award for Human Rights Activism

#### (article by Chiltern Edge School)

This Award is run with Amnesty International UK to support activist groups in funding a proposal that will grow activism and awareness of human rights in their communities. Projects are judged according to how well they reach new and diverse audiences; how they positively impact people's understanding of human rights; and a demonstration of creativity and innovation. This is the first year that the Awards have been run in this format, having previously recognised one of the organisation's groups for their outstanding work in campaigning, awareness-raising, fundraising or education.

Amnesty International UK has over 280 local groups in the UK which devote their time, energy and skills to campaigns, raising funds and representing Amnesty in their local communities. This Award is a way of paying tribute to these efforts. Amnesty International UK works to protect men, women and children wherever justice, freedom, truth and dignity are denied.

Chiltern Edge School won the Youth section of this Award for their proposal to expand the school's existing Amnesty Ambassadors Scheme, which is unique to this age group. This is a programme whereby young 'ambassadors' are trained in human rights education so that they can then deliver information sessions to their peers. With funding, the group would like to extend the project to other schools in the area, by training up more young ambassadors and teachers on human rights and giving them the resources to run the workshops. It is hoped that the expansion will have a positive impact on primary school teachers, as well as their students, and encourage them to draw inspiration on teaching human rights from the methods that the ambassadors use.

Qamar Ayoubi, who left Chiltern Edge last summer, collected the Award on behalf the school at the recent Amnesty International AGM and spoke very highly of her experiences of being involved in Amnesty International through the school. Congratulations to everyone involved in this fantastic achievement.



## Mental Health and young people

With the proportion of 15-16 year olds reporting that they frequently feel anxious or depressed having doubled in the past 30 years, there is an enormous need for quality assured mental health information and advice for young people. Co-created with a panel of young people who themselves have a mental health issue, the new Reading Well for Young People scheme uses book-based therapy to help them understand and manage their condition. The library has a collection of books from this scheme available for teenagers and/or their parents to borrow.

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

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
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
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## THIRD READING BRIDGE LATEST NEWS AND MAP

I promised at the Annual Parish Meeting a couple of years ago that I would keep residents up to date with the unfolding saga of the proposed 'Third Reading Bridge'. Recently there have been some developments, which I would like to share with you now. Of particular interest is the detailed map I have obtained of the proposed route, and this is shown below.

To recap, for many years various Berkshire councils and enterprise groups have been campaigning vigorously for a new Thames crossing known as the 'Third Reading Bridge'. The bridge would link the end of the A329(M) in Berkshire to the junction where Caversham Park Road meets the A4155 (the main road between Henley and Reading). Some of the scheme's supporters claim the fourlane super-bridge would take 55,000 cars a day out of the centre of Reading (but to where?). Understandably, the enthusiasm of the scheme promoters is viewed with caution by many Oxfordshire residents who are concerned about the large amount of extra traffic that would be deposited on to rural roads. Looking at the map, you will see that once cars and lorries come across the bridge they will have two choices when travelling north: either via the A4155 through the

already heavily congested streets of Henley, or up Caversham Park Road to the B481 where they would travel through Sonning Common, Rotherfield Peppard and Highmoor on their way to the M40 or Oxford. Remember, HGVs are not allowed over Sonning Bridge, but no such restriction is likely to apply to the new bridge.

Historically, both Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) and South Oxfordshire District Council have shared residents' concerns, but both councils last year agreed to contribute funds to what was initially publicised as a traffic modelling study. It was only recently I learned that this study was to be just a part of what is known as a 'Strategic Outline Business Case' (SOBC) proposal. This led me to raise questions about the matter with the OCC Cabinet and in Full Council. OCC has now made it clear to the other partners in the SOBC that the council, by helping to fund this work, is not inherently supporting the scheme and will await the results before taking a position on whether to support a full business case submission for funding. This decision process will also involve further consultation with the communities the scheme could impact upon. An initial report is due this autumn – again, I will keep you updated.

Residents should consider the probability that the bridge would not only bring extra traffic to the village, but might also put pressure on Oxfordshire's land between Emmer Green and Sonning Common to help fulfil Reading's housing needs.

The final version of our Neighbourhood Development Plan has been with the Examiner since the middle of March and we were hoping to summarise the report for residents and publicise it in this edition of the magazine. It was not to be!

In the meantime, the Parish Council, the NDP Working Party and residents have been given an unpleasant surprise by the SODC Planning Officer's recommendation of approval for Bewley Homes most recent application (P15/S4257/FUL) for 65 homes on Lea Meadow (SON 9). Until recently SODC's Core Strategy policies and the availability of a 5-year minimum of land supply was preventing large housing developments being agreed before 2017.

#### So what has changed?

- SODC's 2012 Core Strategy divided the district into 2 housing areas -'Didcot' and 'the Rest of the District' (RoD)
- The Oxfordshire SHMA (a collective study on housing need by all the district councils in Oxfordshire) was still an emerging piece of evidence.

Currently in SODC there is enough land for development with imminent planning permission in RoD and around 8 - 9 years of supply exists. In Didcot, however, there exists less than 4 years supply.

### What is the consequence of the above?

- A number of planning appeal inspectors have rejected the policy of dividing the district into two housing areas. As so many more houses were planned for Didcot than RoD, the maths means - when combined together - there exists less than 5 years supply of available land for building.
- Those planning inspectors also said SODC should be using the SHMA housing numbers as our target not the numbers in our 2012 Core Strategy. This might mean a much larger number of homes for Sonning Common.

### Implications for Sonning Comon and Lea Meadow

The dilemma is that the Bewley homes application does not accord with the policies in our Neighbourhood Plan. The fear of the NDPWP is that if they are allowed to build, ignoring many of the policies then other developers could argue that they do not need to comply. The Parish Council have set out a number of objections to the Bewley application and on the 18 May, together with the NDP these representatives will speak against the granting of planning permission for Lea Meadow, at the SODC Planning Committee meeting!

#### What next?

We have always believed, and said many times to our residents at various consultations, that the Core Strategy and available 5-year land supply will protect us against unwanted development until 2017. It now looks as if our belief and trust has been misplaced.

It may be that the Examiner's recommendations will require us to change some of our policies and allocations. Any changes we have to make will be publicised on our website.

Despite the difficulties caused by the delay to the approval of the Plan and the SON 9 application we will still be in a good position when it is agreed by residents at referendum. Our Neighbourhood Plan will give us protection and a clear set of policies for Developers to follow and to build on the sites that have been allocated.

## NR AND NRS TIGGYWINKLE are thriving in Sonning Common

Just after our last article appeared, one of our neighbours brought in to us a small Hedgehog who had become entangled in some plastic garden netting. After it was untangled we put it in a covered cardboard box with some food and water and left it to recover from its ordeal. When it got dark it was put into a hedgehog house and he then continued to feed each evening.

#### 

As it neared Autumn expecting the Hedgehogs would soon hibernate, we purchased another hedgehog house hoping that one or more would use it during the winter months. However, in the middle of October a very tiny Hoglet came with the much larger ones, which we were afraid would not survive the winter. We sought advice from Tiggywinkles who advised us to weigh it, and if it weighed less than 500 grams it would not survive. They suggested that we try to find someone locally (e-mail addresses provided) who would take it in and keep it fed, watered and awake during the winter months, in an environment where the temperature remained at a steady 65 degrees.

Later that evening the larger Hedgehogs were accompanied by not one but three little ones. They were each weighed and their weight ranged between 200-230 grams. We made a decision to try to keep them ourselves making a rather splendid living/sleeping winter quarters with insulated board, and space to accommodate it in the garden shed. We continued to feed, water and clean their home each day, where they gained weight. However, the smallest one became sick and started to lose weight, was brought indoors but sadly died after three days.

The other two continued to thrive and when they reached 600 grams in weight (mid-January) they were each put into a Hedgehog house and took up residence outside in a safe place behind the garage from where they could not escape.

By the end of January, they had both hibernated in the same house together, surrounded with copious amounts of dried leaves and straw. As I write this in April, they have both woken from their hibernation and gained a little more weight (they lost quite a bit during hibernation). They will be released into the back garden to fend for themselves, with a little help from us of course.

You may wonder what has become of the larger Hedgehogs? On the 8th February, yes it was still very frosty, a single Hedgehog appeared on our back patio to be fed and watered. Each evening since, often accompanied by one or two others, they each have their fill of food and water and return several times during the evening/night until the dishes are clean. We have a camera which records their movements. The pictures taken are viewed by friends and family alike (although we're sure they think we are a little crazy to go to so much trouble).

Hedgehogs are very much in decline, and a T.V. programme suggested that if more people made a few small alterations to their garden fences like putting a few holes at the base, the Hedgehog population could wander at will and maybe not get killed on the roads as so often happens. It would be such a shame if they died out completely. Hedgehogs are an asset to the garden as they eat garden pests such as slugs and snails, if you are lucky enough to have them visit they are such a delight and in our case give us a lot of entertainment. We hope some of you will consider making the garden more Hedgehog friendly and get as much enjoyment as we clearly do.



## HEALTH WALKS A 20 YEAR CELEBRATION




On Sunday 24 April over one hundred people assembled at Sonning Common Village Hall to take part in two walks followed by afternoon tea, cake and Prosseco. It was a great occasion and the enthusiasm and sense of fun was tangible.

At 2.15 two walks began. One walk of just over 3 miles followed the path of the first walk ever taken by health walkers and the other was a shorter walk of just over a mile. Walkers were enthusiasts of all ages and there was even a baby carried along on someone's back. Many people had been walkers from the beginning of the scheme and there was much discussion about the changes that had happened in twenty years. This ranged from the health and social benefits involved as well as the importance of the dedicated leaders that enable the scheme to function so effectively. As well as benefitting from exercise, it was obvious that many friendships had been forged and the activities were fun as well as purposeful.

After the walks all the participants assembled at the Village Hall for afternoon tea and Doctor William Bird, an ex GP from the Sonning Common Health Centre and founder of the walks, gave a speech that recalled how the walk began as a means of improving the health of diabetic patients and gradually developed into an organisation that that has grown nationwide and beyond. He acknowledged the great debt he owed to Val Lunn who helped organise the walks and also to the group of leaders who have been such a wonderful support. Val Lunn then spoke about the pleasures and difficulties she encountered at the beginning of setting up the programme including dealing with foot and mouth disease and the importance of including warm up activities at the beginning of each walk and stretching at the end. There are now ten walks happening every week and they are free as well as being friendly and accessible to all.

Dr Tess Harris, a GP from the Sonning Common Practice, then followed up with a speech describing her work with PACE and also about how fortunate she felt to be able to carry on her research with such a supportive community and practice. This was followed by Dr Bird and Val Lunn cutting a magnificent celebratory cake that had been made and decorated by Susan Russman. There was also a very successful raffle. Huge thanks must be given to the organisers of this event. Their hard work and dedication was evident in the planning and care that made this such a joyous and happy occasion, as well as a reminder to everyone that 'every step counts' in the search for good health and well-being.



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## Parish news

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### **GROVE ROAD TRAFFIC PLAN**

Plans are being drawn up to improve traffic flows in Grove Road at school drop-off and pick-up times.

The move follows consultation between Mark Bell, the local Police Community Support Officer, Sonning Common Primary School and the parish council.

Three sections of 20m single yellow lines - to prevent cars from parking and waiting - are due to be installed along the side of the road, opposite the school, and double yellow lines at the Grove Road/Lea Road junction.

Traffic restrictions will be in place during peak school-related hours only.

The new traffic plan, being drawn up by the Oxfordshire County Council's Highways department, will be circulated to Grove Road residents prior to its introduction. The parish council has agreed to contribute £4,500 towards the project.



### PLAY AREA IMPROVEMENTS

### Three new picnic benches have been installed at the play areas in Lea Road, Baskerville Road and Churchill Crescent.

"The parish council wanted to improve the play areas by providing somewhere comfortable for parents and children to sit to have picnics and socialise," explained deputy parish clerk Ros Varnes.

The flat swings in the Baskerville Road play area have been replaced recently and two new metal bins ordered for the Lea Road play area. Monthly inspections of all three play areas are arranged by the parish council and a professional play equipment inspector will be conducting an annual inspection of the play areas shortly.

### LANDSCAPING GRANT FOR THE SKATEPARK

The parish council has successfully applied for a grant towards the landscaping of Sonning Common Skatepark and providing new bins for the skatepark and village centre.

It is planned to build up the earth banks around the edge of the skatepark, where some sinkage has occurred, and fit grass matting next to the concrete edge to protect and reinforce the ground.

A 45m long by 1m high chain link fence is due to be installed next to the public footpath and two new footpaths will be constructed across the site. Two new metal bins have been ordered.

In addition, the parish council is planning to replace the plastic bins in the village centre with larger capacity metal bins and fit new bins next to the Wood Lane bus stops. South Oxfordshire District Council has agreed to fund half of the projects' costs.

### **ALLOTMENTS FOR RENT**

If you are a keen gardener the parish council has one or two allotments available for renting for just £30 a year and a £30 refundable deposit.

The council leases a total of 44 allotments, including some half and quarter plots, off the Horsepond Road near Gallowstree Common.

A full allotment measures 18m by 9m; a water supply is provided; and the fences and grassed areas outside the allotments are maintained by the parish council.

The fraudsters, via email, will purport to be a tradesman who has recently completed work at the property and use a similar email address to that of the genuine tradesman. They will ask for funds to be transferred via bank transfer and once payment is made the victims of the fraud soon realise they have been deceived when the genuine tradesman requests payment for their services.

#### **PROTECT YOURSELF:**

- Always check the email address is exactly the same as previous correspondence with the genuine contact.
- For any request of payment via email verify the validity of the request with a phone call to the person who carried out the work.
- Check the email for spelling and grammar as these signs can indicate that the email is not genuine.
- Payments via bank transfer offer no financial protection; consider using alternative methods such as a credit card or PayPal which offer some protection and avenue for recompense.

#### **GARLIC BREAD KNOTS (makes 24)**

300g pizza dough 6 tblspns chopped garlic 3 tblspns chopped parsley 1 tspn salt 80 ml olive oil 4 tblspns grated parmesan 1 tspn crushed chilli flakes



Preheat oven to 200/Gas 6. Lightly grease a baking tray. Roll out pizza dough to a 10"x16" rectangle. Cut the sheet

into <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" parallel strips and then cut these strips in half. Tie each strip into a knot and place close together on prepared tray. Bake until golden (approx. 20 minutes). Remove from oven and whilst still warm drizzle with olive oil and sprinkle with all the other ingredients. Serve immediately

#### **ROASTED TOMATO PASTA SAUCE (serves 8**

2kg tomatoes, halved125ml olive oil1 tblspns salt1 tblspns crack1 clove garlic1 handful chillibalsamic vinegar, to tastesugar, to taste

125ml olive oil 1 tblspns cracked black pepper 1 handful chillies (whole) sugar, to taste

Preheat oven to 200/Gas 6. Mix the oil, salt, pepper, garlic, chillies and vinegar in a large baking dish. Add the tomatoes

coat in the mixture and then arrange with the cut side up. Sprinkle with the sugar and bake for 1 hour. Puree into a sauce, re-heat and use as required.

#### **ITALIAN BRUSCHETTA (serves 4)**

4 baguette/crusty bread slices 2 tomatoes, chopped 8 fresh basil leaves (chopped)

2 cloves garlic, peeled Salt 2 tblspns olive oil

Place bread on a tray and toast under the grill on both sides. While still warm rub one side of each slice with the clove of garlic, add chopped tomatoes, sprinkle of salt and the basil. Drizzle with olive oil and serve.



#### **HOMEMADE PASTA (serves 8)**

300g plain flour 2 eggs, beaten 1 tblspn butter

#### pinch of salt 100 ml semi skimmed milk

Stir together the flour and salt, add the beaten egg, milk and butter. Knead until smooth (5 minutes) cover bowl and let rest for 10 mins. Roll out thinly on a floured



surface and cut into chosen shapes/lengths. Air dry before cooking. Use a large pot of boiling & salted water, pasta is ready when it floats back to the top.

### **NEW RECRUITS WANTED.** CAN YOU HELP SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL COMMUNITY?

The Chiltern Edge Community Association (CECA), a charitable trust formed in 1979, is operated by a management committee drawn from local organisations and individuals. In 1980 the officers secured a loan from a local benefactor to build two squash courts on the school site.

The CECA's principal sources of income are from the Chiltern Edge Squash Club, which still operates as an independent organisation, and Johnson Matthey who have generously supported the CECA since its inception. Since 1995, when outstanding debts and loans were repaid, donations/ bursaries have been made to a variety of local organisations and individuals. Recipients have included Club SC, the Skatepark, Nottakwire, scouts, guides, playgroups, SCAMPS, village halls, and, not least, young people wishing to carry out sporting activities or travel (for social development). Clearly, this list is extensive but not exclusive.

Current representatives of CECA include the Parish Council, Johnson Matthey, FISH and Club SC. Only one founder member is remaining today. The management committee needs to recruit new faces with innovative ideas, so if you are interested in the local community as a representative of a village organisation or as an individual and would like to help support it, then CECA would like to welcome you. There is much scope for new areas to focus on, not least, the possible opportunity to interact closely with the proposed leisure and recreational facilities, as part of the Sonning Common Neighbourhood Plan. The committee meets two or three times a year to consider grant applications. Come and join, and share in giving this neighbourhood an exciting future.
