



even if Mercury never sees the light of day Students Union facts and info. will eventually get to members by the S.U.N. in any guise.


It just seems a great pity that complete apathy towards something which has a lot of potential is going to ensure the death of it.

trate. They usually do so in such a rythmic fashion, that the event occurs irrespective.



With renewed vigour I


began to pamper myself with the delights that these parties have to offer. Drink, sausages rolls and the odd sandwhich and the even odder Tequila to wash it all down.
