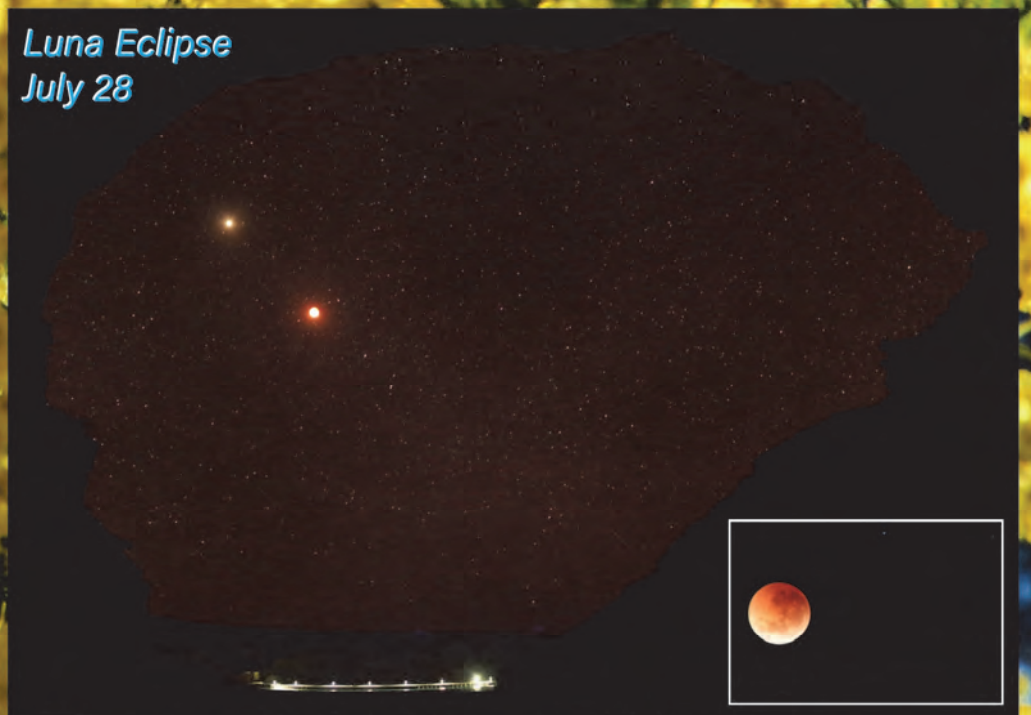

Major, Ryan Fisher, David Barnes, Kate Hooper & Luke Bartlett.

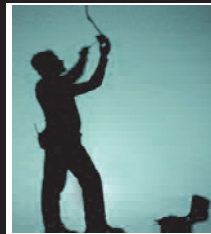

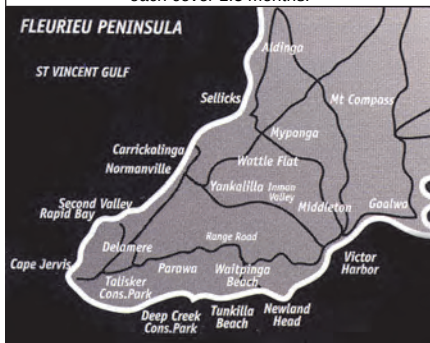

Mr Gordon must have been impressed with the town on the other side of the range – perhaps he went there for a break! No tune was indicated, so we have created our own tune. Here is the first verse to give you some idea about it:

*Port Elliot's waves may fret and roar or gently lave
their rocky shore;
and Victor's Island may rise fair from bluest seas in
sunlit air
what care I to another shore, enchanted, where no
billows roar!
'Tis Normanville 'tis Normanville; we'll hie awa' to
Normanville!*

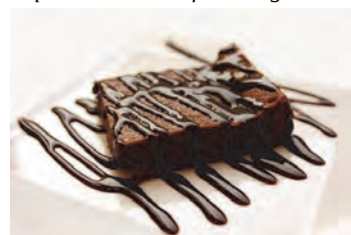

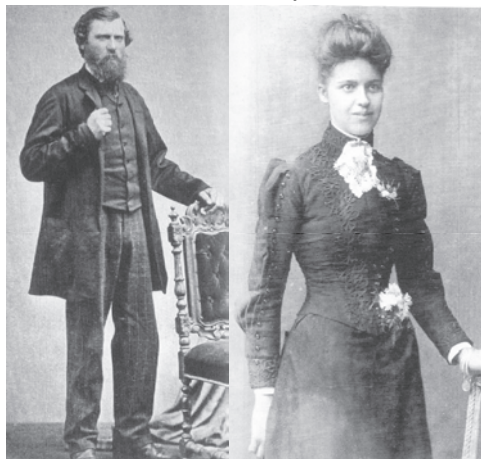

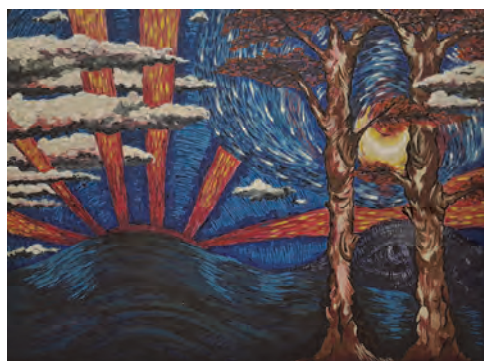

Sharkie on by-election win

Rebekha Sharkie, the Member-Elect for Mayo, has released the following statement regarding the result in the Mayo by-election.

"Being the Member for Mayo has been the most rewarding and humbling role I have ever held and I am so honoured to have been given the opportunity to represent my community once again.

Cardiac Rehabilitation Program Saving Lives

A cardiac rehabilitation program being delivered to patients in rural and regional South Australia is being credited with saving lives.

Country Health SA's Integrated Cardiovascular Clinical Network (iCCnet) delivers the Country Access to Cardiac Health (CATCH) telephone program to patients across rural and regional SA who have survived a significant heart event, like a heart attack.

Network Operations and Research Manager at iCCnet, Rosy Tirimacco, said the CATCH telephone program is focused on improving the heart health of as many country patients as possible. "The mortality rate for patients within six months of completing the CATCH telephone program is significantly lower than the rate for patients who didn't complete a cardiac rehabilitation program in the same time frame," Ms Tirimacco said.

"The mortality rate for 727 patients six months after completing the CATCH telephone program was under one per cent. Compare that to a 2.1 per cent mortality rate for the 288 patients who didn't participate in a cardiac rehab program, and it's clear that CATCH is keeping people alive longer."

The CATCH telephone program is a seven-week program available to country patients of all ages who have had a heart attack, undergone open heart surgery or had a significant heart event.

Unlike most group-based cardiac rehabilitation programs, the CATCH telephone program involves seven weekly phone calls, followed by two phone follow-up consultations six and 12 months after the heart attack or surgery.

The weekly phone calls monitor patients' recovery by discussing risk factors and ways to implement lifestyle changes, while the six and 12 month follow-up calls examine patients' progress.

"The CATCH telephone team – which consists of clinical nurses, a pharmacist, a dietician and an exercise physiologist – provide highly individualised patient-centred care," Ms Tirimacco said.

"Patients are able to participate in cardiac rehabilitation on their own terms – they can have telephone conversations in the comfort of their own home, on the harvester or at the beach, saving them travel

inconvenience and costs."

The CATCH telephone cardiac rehabilitation program has been made possible by funding and support from Country SA Primary Health Network (PHN).

Country SA PHN CEO Kim Hosking said the program enables those living in country South Australia who have had a cardiac event to access the same level of follow-up support as people in metropolitan areas.

"There's very strong research which shows that if people don't access a health professional following a cardiac event they have a much higher chance of experiencing another attack or even dying," Mr Hosking said.

"We knew there would be value in making this service a reality for regional and rural South Australians and the fact that it's being credited with saving lives certainly demonstrates its importance."

Country Health SA Chief Executive Officer Maree Geraghty said the success of the CATCH telephone program was a credit to all involved.

"This program is making a huge difference to country people on a day to day basis, enabling them to reach the same health outcomes as people in metropolitan areas," Ms Geraghty said.

"Providing this kind of service close to home benefits patients and their loved ones, and our analysis shows the completion rate for people who begin the CATCH telephone program is more than 90 per cent – significantly higher than other states where the completion rate for group-based cardiac rehabilitation is much lower."

Upcoming water change to improve quality and taste of tap water

MYPONGA: A change to disinfection methods at SA Water's Myponga Water Treatment Plant will improve both the quality and taste of the township's tap water.

From Monday 8 October 2018, SA Water will change the disinfection process applied to safe, clean drinking water supplied to Myponga township residents from the adjacent reservoir from chlorine to chloramine. This will overcome source water quality challenges as well as make the water taste better.

The same change will roll out to all customers along the Fleurieu Peninsula and Southern Vales who receive drinking water from the Myponga Water Treatment Plant in the coming 22 months.

SA Water's Senior Manager Water Expertise Dr Daniel Hoefel says the change to chloramine will ensure the water remains clean and safe to drink, albeit with a slightly different – and much improved – flavour profile.

"Although it's a matter of individual preference, many of our

customers tell us that water disinfected by chlorine, which is used to kill any pathogens, can have a particular smell and taste," Daniel said.

"Chloraminated water does not have this effect. Chloramine is widely used in many regions, including Swan Reach, Morgan, Keith and Bordertown, and is currently enjoyed by more than 220,000 South Australians.

"In fact, chloraminated drinking water from our Morgan Water Treatment Plant has twice won the annual 'best tasting tap water in South Australia' award, and is a perennial favourite during blind water taste tests."

Residents are invited to find out more, ask questions and try a sample of new chloraminated water before the changeover at a community meeting:

CEO CORNER

Cape Jervis Port

The Cape Jervis Port is owned by State and Federal Government Departments. Council has an existing licence from the State Government for the care and control over the sealed timed carparking area near the Sealink Terminal and over the public access ramp and landing (finger) pictured below.



The concrete landing (nearest to the camera) has recently had two independent condition reports performed that have determined that the landing has such severe damage that unfortunately the existing structure needs to be immediately closed and completely removed. The actual ramp would stay open.

Council understands the importance of this landing to the community, especially during the busy season where multiple boats attempt to launch and be retrieved in quick succession, and a replacement needs to be constructed. From extensive feedback from the community and witnessed firsthand, Council also understands that the configuration of the public access ramp and the greater Cape Jervis Port area can be enhanced to achieve a much more workable result.

The Mayor and I met with the Minister for Transport, Stephan Knoll at the Cape Jervis Port on Tuesday 21 August 2018 to discuss the current licence arrangements and funding for the ramp and landing and the need for a Masterplan for the whole area. We expressed the desire for a Masterplan to cover carparking configuration, ferry access for all providers, traffic flow in and out of the Port, beautification of the area and of course the public boat launching access.

It is acknowledged that any design of a Masterplan of the area would include a full public consultation process to get the views and desires of the community that use and know the area and would know what works and what doesn't work.

With a possible outcome of the Masterplan resulting in a reconfiguration of the public boat ramp and landing, and with the current licence agreement for the Council to have care and control over the Boat Ramp and Landing being in a position that the agreement can be terminated by either party with one calendar month notice, it is important that the immediate solution for the landing replacement be cost effective and non-permanent.

At the Council meeting on Tuesday 21 August 2018, Council resolved to get costings for a recommended temporary solution of floating pontoons for the replacement of the boat landing. The floating pontoons were selected as they could be moved and reused in a permanent solution following the consultation process and adoption of a Masterplan for the area. Council also agreed to continue discussions with the State Government on licence agreements and funding arrangements and that an update be provided to Council to determine next steps with the project.

September Council Meeting to be held Tuesday 11 September 2018

When nominations for the Local Government Elections close at 12pm on Tuesday 18 September 2018, Council enters into what is known as a Caretaker Period. During the Election Period the Council and Council Administration will assume a "Caretaker Mode", avoiding actions and decisions which could be perceived as influencing voters or having a significant impact on the incoming Council. Council's Caretaker Policy is available on Council's website www.yankalilla.sa.gov.au/policies

The Council meeting in September has been scheduled a week earlier than the normal 3rd Tuesday of the month and will now be held on Tuesday 11 September 2018, prior to the commencement of the Caretaker Period. This meeting is likely to consider the transfer of Sewerage and Water Assets to SA Water.

New permanent Dogs off Leash areas on our beaches

At the meeting held Tuesday 21 August 2018, Council resolved to provide a permanent Dogs off Leash area and a permanent Dogs on Leash area at Normanville/Carrickalinga beaches. Council also introduced a permanent Dogs off Leash area at "Shelly Beach" (South of the Hobart Memorial Lookout).

Council also agreed to shorten the Dog on Leash control period where it was currently in place between 10am-6pm Daylight Savings (October-April) to now be 10am-6pm from 1 December to the end of February and Good Friday to Easter Monday (inclusive). The changes were made to the beach areas at Carrickalinga Beach (between Carrickalinga River estuary and Carrickalinga Head), Lady Bay (from south of Bungala River estuary to Little Gorge Outlet), Myponga Beach and Morgan's Beach.

ADVANCE NOTICE TO OWNERS OF VACANT LAND

Now is the time to consider preparing your block/land for the fire danger season. All vegetation* (grass, pest plants and undergrowth) is to be reduced to a maximum height of 100mm with the following considerations:

- Within 20 metres of any building.
- Vacant blocks under half a hectare in area over the whole block.
- Vacant blocks over half a hectare in area, require at least a 5 metre wide strip fire break around the whole area's perimeter.

ALL fire prevention measures are to be completed by the commencement of the fire danger season (dates determined by

the CFS) and Council will be regularly patrolling to assess properties.

For blocks/land posing a fire risk, Council's Fire Prevention Officer may issue a hazard reduction notice against the owner and, if necessary, undertake the required maintenance at the owner's expense.

* Native vegetation is protected under the Native Vegetation Act 1991 which provides certain exemptions for fire prevention.

HERITAGE HERO AWARD 2018: ROBERT FAIRCHILD

In May, the State History Festival coincided with the inaugural local Heritage Fleurieu Coast celebrations. Community groups participated with a wide range of heritage events while Council sponsored the regional launch of the History Trust's state wide History Festival at the Yankalilla Visitor Information Centre.

In all, around 30 heritage events held in the Yankalilla District was rivalled only by the City of Adelaide in the number of events offered. Council's three main events – the Heritage Youth Art Competition, a day bus trip from Adelaide including history tours of Normanville and Yankalilla and the Heritage Hero Award were highly successful.

Council's Heritage Hero resulted in 16 nominations for the inaugural Heritage Hero. Consequently, Council, at its meeting held 17 July, resolved to award Robert Fairchild as Heritage Hero 2018

for his outstanding contributions to public understanding of the unique history of the Yankalilla District and the Fleurieu Peninsula.

Mr Fairchild has been closely associated with the Yankalilla Museum since 1985 when he was instrumental in establishing the Museum located at the rear of the Yankalilla Visitor Information Centre on Main South Road. Over the years he has meticulously researched and provided interpretation of the many historic skills and industries and provided leadership in preserving the stories of the past.

The 2018 award will be presented to Mr Fairchild at the next Australia Day ceremony, when new citizens are welcomed into the community. Council is considering reviewing the process of a Heritage Hero Award in order to present the person selected at a final gala event held at the end of future bi-annual Heritage Fleurieu Coast festivals.

If It Grows In It Goes

All types of food scraps, including meat and bone and kitchen plate scrapings can be disposed of in the green organics bin. Food scraps should be contained in a compostable bag available from the Council office or lightly wrapped in newspaper.

Green organics are processed into mulch ready to return to the earth, best of all it is diverted away from landfill.

Sorting your waste where it is produced (in the kitchen, study and bathrooms for most households) is the key to making most use of the extra volume of recycling (yellow lid bin) and green organics (light green lid bin).

Holiday Rental Properties

It is important that holiday rental businesses support guests to use the kerbside waste and recycling bin collection services correctly. Most holiday rental guests will be familiar with kerbside recycling from their own homes. Providing guests with a copy of: 2018-2019 Kerbside Bin Collection Calendar; Recycling and Disposal Guide for Households; and Small Business SKMA to Z of Kerbside Recycling will assist them to Recycle Right and Recycle More. Copies of these documents are available for download at www.frwa.com.au or printed copies can be collected at the Council office. FRWA's kerbside bin collection service is designed to meet the needs of residential ratepayers and based on an average household size of 2.2 persons (ABS Yankalilla (DC) (LGA) (48750) 2011. All small businesses, including holiday rental accommodation can purchase Annual Additional Collection Services from FRWA. Holiday homes which accommodate larger numbers of people, will need to purchase additional kerbside collection services.

All kerbside collections in District Council of Yankalilla are now fortnightly (from 1 July 2018), collections of general waste will revert to weekly during the peak summer school holiday period from Monday 17 December 2018 through until Friday 25 January 2019.

Heading West For Hockey

Vanessa's interest in hockey started at the age of 10 playing for her local club, Carey Park, in Western Australia. Her team of Juniors became so strong it was decreed that they needed to be in the Senior competition, despite their age.

During her time playing there have been many changes and developments in the game and the rules.

One of her highlights was winning 'Best on Ground' during the 2005 Grand Final when the Yankalilla Women's team became Premiers.

Not only is Vanessa a valued team member, she has also been the Clubs Treasurer for 3 years. Her Saturdays are devoted to Hockey, if she's not on the

field umpiring she will still be there starting bright and early to support the Minkies (U10's) right through to the end of the days' play.

She has played in the Masters National Championships 21 times. It started as Veteran Championships with A and B teams and now has age divisions for Over 35, 40, 45, 50, 60 and recently Over 65's. This year South Australia has players in the Over 35, 40, 50 and 60 with some help of players from other states to make up the numbers, as they can never find enough SA people to go.

Hockey SA recently announced the teams for 2018, which will be held in Bunbury and Bussleton in Western Australia from 27th September - 6th October. Vanessa, once again has secured her place on the SA Masters Women's team for Over 60's making this her 22nd time in the competition. Her original aim was to be able to play in every state which she has achieved and is now doing repeats.

Vanessa says "I still get a tremendous amount of enjoyment from playing, and still can, so I will be on the field a bit longer."

Congratulations Vanessa! The YHC are proud to have her as part of the club as she shows so much passion and dedication not only to the Club but also the SCHA. We wish her all the very best doing what she loves best. Good Luck in the Masters.

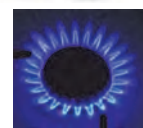

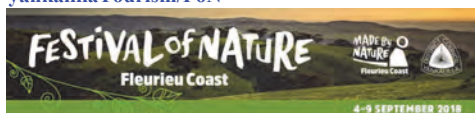

Bungala River Community Meeting

Most of the 40 people who attended this community meeting, stayed on after the presentations to provide us with feedback and ideas on the benefits of restoring the river and its environs.

In terms of the Environment, priorities such as improving environmental flows, water quality opening up the estuary to flows and improving the numbers and diversity of water animals were identified. The potential to link the river to other areas of biodiversity and improving and creating habitat as well as restoring damaged areas were also discussed.

There were a number of suggestions in relation to Engagement and Education that could flow from the project. Establishing links to the schools, farmers, the wider community and Aboriginal groups were identified. Strategies for engaging the local landowners along the river need to be developed and the establishment of interpretive signage along the river to help explain the initiative.

Revegetation and the control of weeds along the river is an important part of the project. Also mentioned was the use of locally collected seeds, together with propagation and use of stormwater filtering plants within new planting areas. Plant, Plant, Plant was the message! Perhaps a local Botanic Garden could be established.

The Recreation and Access aspects of the project were reinforced with a variety of suggestions. A long list of activities that could use the Linear Park along the Bungala River included - walking trails, exercise areas, nature play, bike tracks, swimming, canoeing, fishing, access for older members of the community. These are linked to the need for parking at critical points along the river, creating some areas of visible water and providing a safe way for students to get to school.

Planning a Vision for the Linear Park was identified as an essential action. Parts of this would include a staging plan for key sites (don't try to do too much at once), doing a photo-essay history for the project (use drone footage as well) and obtain the necessary easements to protect property owner's rights.

It was a successful night and the NNRC planning committee has a lot of work to do from here! Our thanks go to Graham Brookman for an inspirational talk on the night and also to Graham and Annemarie for their insight and visit along parts of the Bungala River beforehand.

Weed Of The Month from Cape Jervis Coastal Community Group
Soft Crane's-Bill or Dove's-Foot
(Geranium molle)

We were confused by this one when we first saw it; for a little while we thought it was a non-weedy native geranium, called *Geranium solanderi* (Australian crane's-bill). What gave it away though was a good look at the leaf and flower shapes...and the fact that it did, quite literally, grow like a weed!! The soft crane's-bill has leaves with a circular outline and lots of lobes not deeply divided (incisions go only a short way towards the leaf stem). The leaves of the Australian crane's-bill, in contrast, have 5-7 lobes, deeply divided, with each lobe having 3 smaller lobes. How else will you know the weedy one? Stems have long, soft white hairs growing along them ('molle' is from the latin for 'softly hairy'). Also, check out the flowers in spring-summer. They occur in pairs. As you can see in the photo above, flowers have five deeply notched pink-mauve petals around a cluster of dark stamens. The second photo above illustrates how small the flowers are in relation to the leaves... the flowers are only about 8-10mm in diameter. Flowers are followed by fruits with a long beak, the crane's bill.

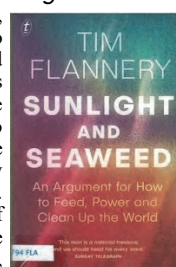

Helpers Needed For Wildlife Survey

Spring brings the next biodiversity survey in the “Minnawarra” scrub near Myponga. The project is run by the Scientific Expedition Group (SEG) and monitors the long-term effect of fencing cattle and sheep out of the scrub. The eight survey sites established in the bush have been monitored for the past 18 years.

Traps will be opened on Thursday 27th September 2018 and visited and emptied twice daily until Monday 1st October 2018. It is an interesting time, particularly for young people, as it is during the school holidays. Could you help set up traps on Thursday, and/or help process the animals on other days?

Nearly 200 traps are used for mammals and reptiles in each survey. There are three different types. Pitfall traps are sunk into the ground with a fence running across them. Small animals and skinks run along the fence and fall in. Elliott traps are metal boxes with a bait of rolled oats and peanut paste inside to trap small animals such as bush rats. Larger animals are trapped in cage traps at each end of the pitfall line. The traps are inspected each morning and evening, trapped animals identified, weighed, marked and released. In the evenings unidentified animals and plants are studied and identified.

At the same time there will be surveys of vegetation, birds, reptiles and frogs at the eight sites. A bat-meter records different bat species by identifying their calls, and some will be trapped in nets. Trapping of bush rats, swamp rats, antechinus (marsupial mice), as well as a variety of frogs and skinks is expected, usually between 100 and 200 specimens are trapped during each survey. Other interesting captures have been

pygmy possums, antechinus with young in the pouch and echidnas. Results go into the SA Biological Database.

SEG is a volunteer, non-profit organization aiming to encourage an awareness of the natural environment. Young people and adults are welcome to help with these surveys. Come for one or several days. Camping is near a large shed with heater, electricity, barbecue, cooking gear and toilet. Bring your own food and camping gear. Registration is essential to be covered by our insurance. A small donation (\$10 adult, \$5 students) to the Scientific Expedition Foundation would be welcome.

Influence of the Irish immigrants

Following the devastating potato famine in Ireland between 1845 and 1849, the worst famine of the 19th century, combined with the economic plight generally in Britain and Europe, many Irish families, as well as young single men and women, found themselves in Australia. Although only a small proportion of the Irish immigrants made it to Port Adelaide, they left a lasting influence.

Chairman of the first Council of Yankalilla, Charles Hewett, according to Septimane Herbert, arranged for 30 Irish families to come to Yankalilla in 1855:

'... Although strongly opposed, it turned out to be one of the best things ever done for the district. We have Mr Hewett to thank for that. He saw the Governor in Adelaide, and on his own initiative without consulting the Council, had the families sent down. Although Mr Hewett overstepped the strict line of duty in that instance, I maintain a chairman is obliged at times and in certain emergencies to use his own initiative.

'His action turned out a benefit to us as well as the migrants themselves. This is confirmed by the appearance of some of them whom I see tonight looking very prosperous and healthy, as if the air agreed with them.'

Many of those early Irish migrant refugees had arrived on the sailing ship *South Sea* which landed them in Port Adelaide on 30 July 1855. These early settlers included families with the names Dahill, Donohue, Heffernan and Sheehan from County Cork, Shanahan from Tipperary, and Kearney. There were also three young single men – Patrick Murphy, John Pearce and James Smith; and 12 young single women, all servants, with the surnames of Callaghan, Chenoweth, Dahill, Heffernan and Kearney. Many of the girls were brought out to relieve the overcrowded orphanages and workhouses in the aftermath of the Irish famine; many worked as domestics or on farms.

Other Irish immigrants to the district were the Aherns who arrived on the *Admiral Boxer* in 1855, the Kellys on the *Omega* in 1857, Thomas John O'Callaghan on the *Burlington* in 1857 and John Comerford on the *Frenchman* in 1858.

It wasn't long before the early Irish settlers sought their own church in their new community.

In 1856 the Bishop of Adelaide, Bishop Murphy and the other trustee priests, Fathers Ryan, Smyth and Fallon, purchased from Richard Connor, 'two acres more or less', being part of Section 1007, for five pounds. However, according to Williams (TFTW p.59) the site was donated by Patrick O'Connor. The builder was Mr Cook. Irishman John Clarke, believed to be the first white resident of Wattle Flat, who had arrived in the colony from Killarney on 27 November 1836 on the *Tam-o'-Shanter*, was a large landholder and donated stone and other materials, and also loaned his bullock wagon for the cartage.

The Foundation Stone was laid and blessed on 4

June 1856 by Father Peter Hughes, Parish Priest of Willunga, assisted by Father J Snell CP of Morphett Vale. It was another 18 months before St Peter's Catholic Church was opened. Father Peter Hughes conducted the opening ceremony and consecration on 1 January 1858 in the absence of Bishop Murphy who at the time was gravely ill, and died not long afterwards.

Before the church was built at Normanville, Mass was held at the home of John Clarke, as well as in the homes of his sons Thomas, Matthew and George, and also in the home of Mrs Pyne.

Many of the congregation walked to church from beyond Second Valley and Wattle Flat, some carrying small children on their back each way. Many could be seen early on Sunday mornings making their way on foot across the paddocks and over the hills for Mass.

The annual St Patrick's Day sports meeting was a grand event to which the whole town was invited. There were foot races and horse races and, according to Williams (p. 61), a large marquee was put up just north of Fergusson's Mill, from where buckets of hot mashed potatoes, vegetables, meats and salads would be served, and 'there was always a copper full of hot plum puddings.' In the evening there was the St Patrick's Ball where everyone would be wearing green, singing old Irish songs, and dancing continued throughout the night.

Many early Irish settlers resided in the eastern end of Yankalilla. Mary MacKillop, co-founder with Father Julian Tenison Woods, of the order, the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, having established two schools in Adelaide, opened the first Catholic country school at Yankalilla in 1867 with 40 children attending. They rented a cottage, initially believed to be No. 56 Main Street, from Patrick Dahill, before they moved to No. 48 Main Street, rented from Thomas John O'Callaghan who, at the time, was working on the roads in the Mount Compass District. In 1870 Sister Laurence and Sister Martina were running the school for which

the rental paid was four shillings a week. The Sisters stayed there until 1974, when Thomas O'Callaghan and his wife Mary returned there to live.

John Clarke's four daughters were accomplished pianists and spent many hours doing fine embroidery, both skills taught to them by the Sisters.

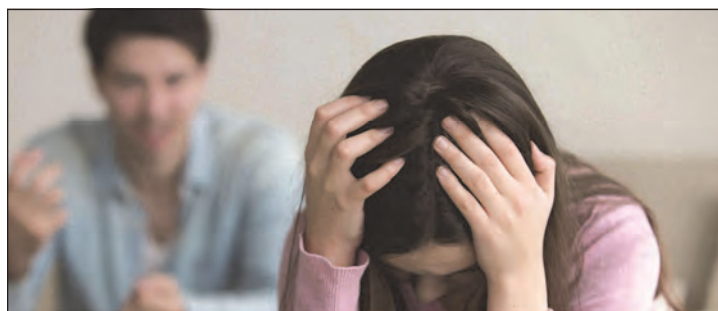

National Asthma Month

What is Asthma?

Asthma is a disease of the airways – which are the breathing tubes that carry air into our lungs. Sometimes it is harder for a person with asthma to breathe in and out, but at other times their breathing is normal. It is important to understand that asthma is a long-term (chronic) disease and although there is currently no cure, with the right knowledge and good management, most people with asthma can lead full and active lives.

Who develops Asthma?

Over 2.5 million Australians have asthma – about 1 in 10 adults and about 1 in 9 or 10 children. Asthma and allergies are closely linked. Asthma is more common in families with allergies or asthma, but not everyone with asthma has allergies. Adults of any age can develop asthma, even if they did not have asthma as a child. Some people have asthma during childhood, but later have very few or no symptoms as adults.

What are the symptoms? The most common symptoms of asthma are:

- wheezing – a continuous, high-pitched sound coming from the chest while breathing
- shortness of breath – a feeling of not being able to get enough air
- a feeling of tightness in the chest
- coughing – alongside other symptoms.

You do not need to have all of these symptoms to be diagnosed with asthma. Noisy breathing, such as a rattling sound, is common in healthy babies and pre-schoolers. This is not the same as wheezing and does not mean the child has asthma. If you are experiencing any of the symptoms above or have any questions or concerns regarding Asthma, book an appointment with your doctor today on 8558 0111.

The sun shone as we gathered in the supper room on 9th August for another great day of painting and sharing ideas. Our workshop leader was Leanne Austin who provided a very different yet exciting approach to painting. Using her experience of teaching Leanne has discovered new ways to use materials which can make the process easier.

Our first project for the morning was to paint our canvas boards black. We then returned to the group to watch Leanne create a forest scene in shades of white, grey and black upon a black background. Using soft paper towel Leanne dabbed white paint on the black board to create a light source. Grey paint was dabbed on next leaving some areas of black in the foreground. Using the tip of a foam brush she drew several tree trunks using black gesso and then with white gesso some white trunks. With a fine brush she painted some small branches reaching out from the trunks of the trees. In the foreground which was still mainly black Leanne dabbed grey and white paint to create lush foliage which was very effective. In the centre focal point she added a suggestion of a small pine tree using a wider bristle brush. The painting had quite a mystical feel and was very effective.

The next part of the morning was spent creating our own painting of a forest using similar techniques. We all had canvas boards of various sizes and we set to work finding the methods Leanne had demonstrated not as difficult as we imagined. Everyone worked hard, concentrating on their own work. By noon most of us had completed a forest painting. As I walked around and looked at all the works they were very impressive, some with real atmosphere and all slightly different.

After lunch we started a new project which was to draw a few coloured fish on a blank canvas using oil pastels. Then with very watery blue paint and a thick brush cover the whole surface. WD-40 sprayed lightly onto the canvas created an effect of bubbles in the water. The end result was an underwater scene which we had all completed by 2.30pm and by 3pm the room was all tidied up and no one would have guessed that such fun had been had that day! Our thanks to Leanne for such an interesting day.

Our next workshop is on September 13th when our guest artist will be Karen Hammat and we will learn how to paint portraits. See you then!

Councils "War on Waste"

Rates

Dear Yankalilla Councillors - your published 2.2% av. rate increase is a half truth!

Under the consumer law that governs businesses lack of truth in advertising has always been an actionable offence while lack of truth in local government advertising has, it seems, always been rewarded. In the current environment of local government's resistance to rate capping our Yankalilla councillors made a bald claim in their booklet entitled "Adopted 2018/19 Annual Business Plan and Budget Summary" at page 5, "Average rates increase for existing ratepayers - 2.2%".

But on the previous page it declares Rates Revenue for this next year increases to \$10,606,174. That's up 4.17% from last year's Business Plan's \$10,181,470. A "reasonable person", the legal test applied to false

and/or misleading advertising, would wonder how a rise of 4.17% can equate to only 2.2%. That's about a 50% falsehood.

Then, of course, there are lies, damn lies and statistics. The increase the "Differential General Rate-Residential" that appears on our rates notices is now 0.529950 cents in each dollar of capital value. Last year it was 0.51658 cents. It's an irrefutable fact that is an increase of 2.6% not 2.2%. It's also a fact that "Capital Values" have increased. In our own case, in real dollar terms, our rates climbed 5.7% this year alone and 10.3% in just these last two years. I bet your increase is similar. I doubt we could find anyone who had the "average" increase of just 2.2%.

To place Yankalilla in better, or worse perspective, the "Differential General Rate-Residential" in neighbouring Victor Harbor is 0.4349 cents in the capital dollar. In a mixed area council like Mitcham it is just 0.281395 cents. That's 18% and 47% less than Yankalilla. Are we so stupid as to not ask why? Why so much more for so much less.

Be of no doubt the increase we all bear on average this year alone is at least that 4.17% and likely well over 5%. It cannot be 2.2%.

So let's not delude ourselves even if our current elected representatives do. We need officials who have the gumption to stand for the truth and transparency and to refuse to endorse the publication, at our expense, of misleading statements.

Let's also not delude ourselves that this rate of increase in either dollar or percentage terms cannot continue. If it continues amalgamation is imperative, urgent and imminent.

Scholarships Available For Country Students

Students studying a range of health courses in rural and regional South Australia are encouraged to apply for scholarships worth up to \$20,000 as part of the Country Health SA Undergraduate Scholarship Program.

Country Health SA (CHSA) Acting Chief Executive Officer, Rebecca Graham, urged Year 12 students and new and continuing university students who reside in regional areas to apply.

"Students who demonstrate a strong commitment to continue their future professional practice in regional areas have the opportunity to be awarded \$5,000 per year for up to four years of study," Ms Graham said.

"Once they've graduated, students will be required to work in a country health

service for a length of time equivalent to the number of years they received funding, providing job security for graduates.

"The great news for rural communities is that once graduates have spent several years working in rural health services, they usually choose to remain working in the country, which is fantastic."

CHSA Executive Director of People and Culture, Patrick Smith, said Health Advisory Councils would provide the selection panel with valuable local knowledge to assist with the decision-making process.

"Scholarship recipients will be selected to fill areas of need as determined by representatives from Aboriginal Health, Allied Health, Nursing, Mental Health,

People and Culture, and Health Advisory Councils," Mr Smith said.

"Areas of need in country SA include speech pathology, occupational therapy, physiotherapy, podiatry, and nursing. "Students are the future of our health system and it is essential that we offer the support required to complete their studies while continuing to provide a high level of care to our regional communities."

Applications for the Country Health SA undergraduate scholarships will close on Wednesday, 19 September 2018. Successful applicants will be notified in January 2019.

Free breast cancer screening in Victor Harbor

BreastScreen SA's mobile screening unit is visiting Victor Harbor to provide free breast cancer screening (breast X-rays) for more than 4000 local women.

Screening appointments began in July and will continue until late November 2018, with the mobile screening unit located in the carpark at the South Coast District Hospital, 56 Bay Road Victor Harbor (enter from Malen Avenue).

BreastScreen SA Promotions and Education Manager, Karen Woodcock, said the two biggest risk factors for breast cancer are being a woman and being over 50.

"Further, 9 out of 10 women who get breast cancer have no family history of this disease," Ms Woodcock said.

"While breast cancer cannot be prevented, the best way to detect it early is by having a screening mammogram every two years. Screening mammograms can detect most breast cancers, including some too small to be felt."

The earlier a breast cancer is found, the more chance a woman has of successful treatment.

"At BreastScreen SA, each woman's X-rays are read by two, independent radiologists and the results are posted within 14 days," Ms Woodcock said.

"Most women are then reassured that their mammogram shows no evidence of breast cancer."

"One breast screen is not enough to last a lifetime. It takes just 10 minutes, and it could save your life," said Ms Woodcock.

"If you're a woman aged 50 to 74, have a breast screen every two years on the mobile screening unit while it's visiting Victor Harbor."
