HEAD'S REPORT



Schools are social places and educating our students in how to behave towards each other is such an important part of our 'mission'. Therefore, as a part of this pursuit, I was delighted to sign our agreement recently to become a Duke of Edinburgh Award school. Students who embark on this programme will volunteer, learn new skills, perform physical activities and complete an expedition. We can't wait to get going after Christmas!

Our social side has also been seen in some of our recent events. In the last few weeks we have attempted to restore the school to a near normal way of working. It has been so much better for our sense of community for all the students to mingle together. to queue with each other and work together. The contented noise of the quad at the centre of the school, with Year 7s playing table tennis through to Year 11s sitting or standing in groups discussing the day's events, is so much better than the 'bubbles' and partitions we had before the summer.

It has also meant that we have been able to host visitors back on site for the first time since early March 2020. In recent weeks we held six open mornings and an open evening. During these events we welcomed over 300 families of prospective students from Year 5 and 6 in the local area and this bodes well for the school and its future. We will have to wait a few months to get an idea of our numbers for next September, but the levels of interest suggest a much fuller Year 7 come the autumn of 2022. One thing that stood out in all these events was the feedback our student guides received as they were complimented for their eloquence, appearance and enthusiasm. I am so pleased that so many of our students share the pride we have in our school and its rapid progression.

I was also fortunate enough to hold a meeting with our local MP, John Howell when he came to visit us. During the appointment I was able to discuss a number of topics with Mr Howell including some issues

we are having working pro-actively with Thames Valley Police and also how the government could support schools to operate in a greener and more sustainable manner. John also met some Year 7 students who held a Q&A session asking him about his varied career. his work as a Member of Parliament and how the government makes laws and how it functions. John finished his visit with a tour of the school,



and I was so pleased that he reported that the school had been 'transformed' from his previous visit four years earlier.

In addition, I invited our local primary headteachers for a coffee and tour just before half term. We were delighted to welcome representatives from six local schools. I thought it would be a great idea to get their thoughts on how our school is being viewed by local parents and teachers so that we can understand how to move forwards and satisfy the demands of our catchment area parents.

Who knows what the next few months will bring but it has been so much better to run the school in more normal circumstances since September and I know that our students and staff have shared these feelings of positivity and opportunity.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN



SC Village - SETTLEMENT BOUNDARY within NDP Neighbourhood Area

Many people have asked: what is the point of showing an interest in Sonning Common's Neighbourhood Plan and bothering to take part in the official consultation on the revised plan which has been open for the past few weeks? The Neighbourhood Plan was powerless to stop the infamous Little Sparrows development of 133 apartments in the AONB off Blounts Court Road, so why go on with it? As chairman of the working party that has been trying to produce a revision of the plan for the past three years, and the organiser of the campaign against the 'retirement village', I have been asking myself these questions – and I am still asking them now. But at the same time, I do feel that is right to do everything possible to get a new plan in place, and to urge the long-suffering residents of the village to support it.

There were several reasons why the

campaign against Little Sparrows failed, and I don't want to go over old ground again. South Oxfordshire District Council fought hard and honourably, but they did themselves no favours with their inadequate efforts to demonstrate that they had the five-year supply of land for building as required by the government. Our neighbourhood plan was not as strong as it would have been if we had been able to complete our work and get it approved – we couldn't because the Little Sparrows application and subsequent appeal paralysed the process.

Most important of all, the decision in the inquiry was in the hands of an inspector with a long record of favouring developers over local authorities, who showed no real interest in our neighbourhood plan and our desire to get more houses for young families in the village, and no respect for the need to preserve the AONB.

The Little Sparrows decision meant that the developer obtained planning permission for 133 apartments. Despite the fact, that SODC has been trying to challenge it in the High Court, that permission still stands. Because our overall housing requirement was under 100, it means that our revised plan does not have to make any new housing allocations. As a result, it is a very minimalist document – we have simply not been able to do in terms of housing what the village asked us to do. Not our fault, but intensely frustrating.

We have included an uplift from 37 homes to 50 on that part of the playing fields of Maiden Erlegh Chiltern Edge that was allocated for housing in the original Neighbourhood Plan, reflecting the willingness of the school and its agents to build smaller homes than

originally envisaged. And we have included as a reserve site the current Johnson Matthey staff car park at the junction of Widmore Lane and Blounts Court Road – to flag our belief that it will make a suitable location for smaller homes in the future. We have retained as a reserve site Kennylands Gymnastics and its surrounding area, as it was allocated in the original plan.

We have also taken a significant step in drawing up a settlement boundary for Sonning Common, to establish what we regard as the preferred shape of the village. In principle development within the boundary would be supported in the future; development outside it would be opposed.

I share to the full, the disappointment and anger of so many people in Sonning Common that we were not able to stop the Little Sparrows development going ahead. But we must look to the future now and assess what is the best way to try and keep the village as we know and love it, protected from a similar assault. Believe me when I say that developers far and wide are looking at the fields around us with greedy eyes, weighing up the profits to be made from covering them in bricks and concrete and tarmac.

We need to do everything we can to stop that happening. I believe that participating in the consultation (it ends on 1st December so if you read this before then you can still have your say), and supporting the revised plan is one way in which we can hope to achieve that end.

IN FOCUS

THE JEWEL IN THE VILLAGE old copse, sonning common, oxfordshire

Did you know that the wood at the end of Woodlands Road is an ancient woodland?

Most of Old Copse is managed by the Woodland Trust. However, the Parish Council acquired part of the southern and western part of the woodland when the Woodland Trust declined to purchase it, to protect it for the future.

The woods are made up mainly of beech trees. These are well suited to furniture making, the business for which the Chilterns was famous. The local industry was characterised by wood turners (who became known as 'bodgers') making chair legs in the local woodlands, together with large numbers of small factories where other chair parts were made, and the finished chairs assembled.

Part of Old Copse was used for **Celebrity Antiques Road Trip. BBC 2 Series 8 Episode 13**. BBC presenter Tom Heap and antiques expert Phil Serrell used it to demonstrate **"bodging"** which is a traditional form of woodwork. They turned a length of timber into a chair leg using equipment belonging to woodturner Alistair Phillips, from Peppard.

You can tell the woods were used for furniture making as you can see

saw pits where they used to cut trees. "A **saw pit** or **sawpit** is a pit over which lumber is positioned to be sawed with a long two-handled saw by two people, one standing above the timber and the other below. It was used for producing sawn planks from tree trunks, which could then be cut down into boards, pales, posts, etc. Many towns, villages and country estates had their own saw pits". These saw pits are where the phrases "top dog" and "underdog" originate. Can you find a saw pit when you next visit Old Copse? The woods are full of history, if you have ever walked through the wood to the north you will have seen the well along Horsepond Road. From work on the history of wells in the area Ken Stevens found it is a wooden well 274 ft deep and sunk in 1888.

On the same northern edge of the woods are the remains of **Bishopwood Camp**², used by Polish refugees during the Second World War. This area forms a key link between the New Copse and Old Copse.

The woods are important to Sonning Common as they provide a habitat for a wide variety of mammals, plants and insects and even mushrooms (fungi).

Bats like beech trees, particularly older

trees like the ones you can find in Old Copse as they have cavities, woodpecker holes, loose bark, cracks, splits and covering of ivy. Old buildings and trees and hedgerows that they use to navigate and find food have been lost. Bats are likely to be out just before dark, have you seen any? If you want to do more to encourage bats https://www. woodlandtrust.org.uk/blog/2020/05/ bats-in-gardens/

The woods, need maintenance to keep them in check, and the litter left can harm the mammals that live in the woods as well as holly taking over and growing across footpaths.

CITIZENS ADVICE ON COPING WITH UNIVERSAL CREDIT SHORTFALL

The recent Government reduction to Universal Credit payments by £20 a week could put many struggling people in a critical situation.

- Take charge of your situation. Start by making a list of what you owe and add up what you need to pay out each month. Next, prioritise your debts.
 There is advice on the Citizens Advice website to help you do this: https://www. citizensadvice.org.uk/debt-and-money.
- Some bills are more urgent than others. Rent or mortgage arrears, gas and electricity bills and Council Tax count as

priority debts as there could be serious consequences if you don't pay them.

 Get in touch with the companies to whom you owe money. Organisations expect such calls and they might be able to help by letting you pay smaller amounts over a longer period or take a temporary payment break.

The government-backed Breathing Space scheme could also give you extra time to pay. See our website for details or **www.gov.uk** If you are eligible, you could get 60 days during which your creditors can't contact you, take any action against you or add interest and charges to your debt. A Citizens Advice adviser can check your debts to see if they are covered by the scheme.

Chris demonstrated the inflatable lifting cushion which is used to safely get a patient, who is lying on the floor, to a sitting position.

We are most grateful to the Chiltern Edge Community Association which gave generous funding for the event and to Sonning Common Coop which provided us with £50 worth of food and drink. Due to this generosity, we had both food and money left over which has been donated to our local food bank run by Springwater Church, Peppard Common and operated from a room at Christ the King Church.

The event was organised primarily to give local people the opportunity to show their appreciation of the NHS and enjoy themselves. Due to the generosity of the people who came and the funding by local organisations £297.88 has gone to our local First Responders and £175 plus food to the food bank.

COVID-19 Vaccination Programme soon to end at Sonning Common

HenleySonNet PCN which consists of The Bell Surgery, The Hart Surgery, Nettlebed Surgery and Sonning Common Health Centre has officially given notice to withdraw from the COVID-19 Vaccination Programme and this will be effective from the end of November. By that time as a PCN, we would have delivered more than 45,000 vaccinations and our own patient group at Sonning Common Health Centre makes up close to 14,000 of that total.

It has been a challenging year for all to deliver the COVID-19 Vaccination Programme in tandem with the operations of the Practice but this could not have been achieved without the brilliant effort of all our staff and a long list of volunteers and supporters of all four Practices. We now feel that after a year of being a part of the Vaccination Programme, delivering the Booster Vaccine to Stage 1 (Cohorts 1-4 which includes the most at risk), is the right time to step back and provide a stronger focus on our patients as we enter into the winter period.

From December, those patients aged 40 and over, aged 16 and over with a health condition that puts them at high risk from COVID-19 as well as frontline health and social workers can continue to book a Booster vaccine via the National Booking Service.

COVID Booster Vaccination Programme

Sonning Common Health Centre has been running **Booster Vaccination clinics** during October and November. All patients aged 16-17 years old are eligible to receive their first Covid-19 vaccination from Sonning Common Health Centre. This will be with the Pfizer vaccine. Please phone our Reception team to make an appointment.

In line with government recommendations we have brought forward second vaccinations for those in Cohort 10 (40 – 49 years), Cohort 11 (30 – 39 years) and Cohort 12 (18 – 29 years) to 8 weeks rather than 11 to 12 weeks, where possible. We have sent out reminders to all those still due their second Covid vaccination with the option to book into an available clinic using our new online booking system. Alternatively, please phone our reception team to make an appointment for your second vaccination.

Vaccination figures

15253 patients from Sonning Common Health Centre have had a Covid-19 vaccination either directly from the practice or at a mass vaccination site.

WINTER HEALTH ADVICE



General Tips

- You can help prevent illness by washing your hands regularly. This destroys bugs that you may have picked up from touching surfaces used by other people, such as light switches and door handles.
- During the autumn and winter, you need to get vitamin D from your diet because the sun is not strong enough for the body to make vitamin D. It is difficult for people to get enough vitamin D from food alone, so consider taking a daily supplement.

From late March/early April to the end of September, most people can make all the vitamin D they need through sunlight on their skin and from a balanced diet. You may choose not to take a vitamin D supplement during these months.

• Keep hydrated, even if you don't wish to eat.

Vaccinations

Get your flu vaccine

If you're 65 or over, you are also eligible for the Pneumococcal vaccine, which will help protect you from pneumonia.

Flu

Flu can be a major killer of vulnerable people. People aged 65 and over, pregnant women and people with long-term health conditions, including diabetes, kidney disease and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD),

are particularly at risk.

Could it be coronavirus (COVID-19)?

If you have a high temperature, a new, continuous cough or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste, it could be COVID-19. Get a test, lateral flow tests are free from pharmacies or order from the NHS website or phone 119.

Get advice about symptoms of COVID-19 and what to do from www.nhs.uk or If you want to speak to someone about a test result, or have a question about test and trace, call 119.

Keep warm

Follow these tips to keep you and your family warm and well at home:

- If you're not very mobile, are 65 or over, or have a health condition, such as heart or lung disease, heat your home to at least 18C.
- Keep your bedroom at 18C all night if you can – and keep bedroom windows closed. Draw curtains and keep doors closed to block draughts.
- Use a hot water bottle or electric blanket to keep warm in bed - but do not use both at the same time.
- Have hot drinks regularly and at least 1 hot meal a day – eating regularly helps keep you warm.
- Reduce the risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), babies should sleep in rooms heated to between 16C and 20C.

Help with heating costs

Get your heating system checked regularly by a qualified professional.

You may be able to claim financial and practical help with heating your home. Grants available include the Winter Fuel Payment and the Cold Weather Payment.

You can find out about heating and housing benefits on GOV.UK.

It's worth claiming all the benefits you're entitled to as soon as winter begins.

Look in on vulnerable neighbours and relatives

Check on older neighbours and relatives, to make sure they are safe and well and. that they are warm enough, especially at night and they have readily available food and any medication.

If you're concerned the person may have hypothermia, contact NHS 111. •

NORA CATHERINE BOYLE KNOWN TO ALL AS 'KATIE BOYLE'

Katy Boyle, who has died at the age of 94, was a well-known and much-loved figure in Sonning Common where she worked as a nurse for many years. She was a frequent and very welcome sight driving around in her bright orange



er bright orange 'Beetle' car. Born on a farm south of Galway, Ireland one of nine children, she qualified as a registered nurse in 1949 and became a midwife in 1953. In 1955 she married and went off to Africa for the next eight years where she worked as a nurse

setting up basic medical clinics, helped by the medical missionaries of Mary (an international missionary congregation of Catholic women founded by Marie Martin in Nigeria in 1937). She was instrumental in improving the life of many Africans and was particularly involved in helping in birthing and the aftercare of children. During this busy time she also managed to give birth to three sons. Katie settled down in Sonning Common in 1965 where she remained for the rest of her life. She was one of the first to become a district nurse and worked alongside Dr Hemphill in Kennylands Road and then at Sonning Common Health Centre. She set up a day care centre at old TB hospital Peppard and this gave the elderly in the community a valuable meeting place for others with similar needs.

Katy was an elegant energetic lady with many interests. A regular member of St Michael's Church, she played golf and bowls at Peppard Bowls Club. She sang alto in Nottakwire and was a strong and active member of our community. Two of her sons survive her and she will be remembered not only for her great competence as a nurse but also for the warmth, good humour and humanity she showed to all.

She will be sorely missed.
