A COMMUNITY WHERE SIGNIFICANT CHANGE WILL BE POSSIBLE

It has been 7 weeks since I began my tenure as Headteacher of Maiden Erlegh Chiltern Edge and I have been delighted at the changes that been enacted in the school. A school is a multi-faceted place and there are many moving parts to the machine but I feel like I am getting my head around most things!

What has stood out for me is what a lovely, warm, family school MECE is and how it is definitely a community. The conduct of students at lunch is a great example of this, wherein a large proportion of students keep busy playing sport or sitting in the canteen in nice, sociable groups. As a result, behaviour in these times is excellent and so much better than my last school. Of course, there are many aspects I want to improve and move forward but it is clear that with such nice students, significant change will be possible.

Since I began I have worked hard to enact a more settled learning environment and all the feedback tells me there has been a marked difference. Alongside this, I have

been working hard with teachers to increase the level of challenge in lessons to ensure that every student is provided for and can progress, however that pastoral support is also provided wherever is necessary.

In addition, I have been working hard to source a wider range of activities for the students beyond the classroom. The school has always prospered in the performing arts with great plays, dance and musical talent but I have tried hard to broaden our offer beyond the classroom. On 13 March we are taking 12 students to St Hugh's College, Oxford to work with a PhD student on a research project as part of the Brilliant Club initiative. We have also introduced the Maths Challenge for our most gifted mathematical students with the first one taking place in May. On a sporting front we will working with Radley College in June on an introduction to rowing course and with Reading Rockets basketball team delivering extra coaching. Finally, we will be taking all of Year 7s to the Trust outdoor centre, Tyr Abad, in the Brecon Beacons from next

year. Outdoor education is a wonderful way of ensuring students take managed risks, work cohesively in teams, get physically active and build the relationships with their peers and staff that will serve them well for vears to come.

Finally, it has been a pleasure to make links with so many members of the local community. I have met members of the Memorial Hall Field committee, some representatives with regard to traffic calming, alongside visiting all of the local primary schools. It is clear what a lovely place Sonning Common and its environs are.

I look forward to developing close working relationships and strong partnerships with many of you.

CORONAVIRUS

Latest guidance, dated 17th March 2020:

If you live alone and have symptoms of coronavirus illness however mild, stay at home for 7 days from when your symptoms started. If you live with others and you or one of them has symptoms of coronavirus, then all household members must stay at home and not leave the house for 14 days. The 14 day period starts from the day when the first person in the house became ill.

If you have coronavirus symptoms: A high temperature, a cough and shortness of breath.

- do not go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital.
- you do not need to contact NHS 111 to tell them you're staying at home.
- testing for coronavirus is not needed if you're staying at home.

Germs can live on some surfaces for hours. To protect yourself and others:

- Always carry tissues with you and use them to catch your cough or sneeze.
- Bin the tissue, and to kill the germs, wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use a sanitiser gel.





WILD CATS

Rotherfield United FC is your local boys and girls football club. It's based at their own ground (Bishopswood Sports Ground) on the Horsepond Road and runs teams from the under 5's up to under 18's. This season it has over 240 youth players plus a senior mens team and a walking football team.

The committee told us 'we are a friendly, family based club which is completely run by volunteers. All the age groups are managed by volunteers who are FA qualified, 1st aid trained and DBS (police) checked, and assisted by other volunteers. The main committee of chair, treasurer, membership, welfare and development roles are all also volunteers. The aim of the club is to include all children who want to play football, have fun and exercise. We play teams in leagues throughout Berkshire and Oxfordshire, and have had great success this season within all the age groups.

There is always a need to keep growing a healthy football club, and to that end

Rotherfield have just been accepted as a venue for the Football Association's new initiative to encourage girls into football - WILDCATS!

WILDCATS football centres offer girls aged 5-11 a chance to try the game and play regularly. The sessions will be run every Sunday morning at Bishopswood with a fully trained FA coach, and the first 3 are FREE.

To assist with this new venture Rotherfield have also recently partnered with local company Active Leaders to invest in girls' football, running taster sessions in the primary schools, and then feeding into Rotherfield. Active Leaders train both primary and secondaryaged students in programmes to develop confidence, leadership skills, physical activity and to run/plan events themselves. Older students who train as Active Leaders are also offered the opportunity to support the holiday and community activity programmes which Active Leaders are developing with Sonning Common Parish Council.

One of the trained Active Leaders, Dan Clokey, will be helping with the new girls' football club at Rotherfield.

Amanda Watkins Cooke of Active Leaders is running the girls' football sessions in schools and said `Active Leaders, along with RUFC, are running sessions within schools for year groups 1/2 and 3/4 during February and March. The aim of the sessions is to enthuse the girls about 'the beautiful game' in the hope they would be inspired to play more regularly and join the local Wildcats club. The response so far has been fantastic and there is certainly some talent out there. Who knows, we might have even found the next Fran Kirby!'



We are obliged by the Government to keep it up-to-date and to ask local landowners if they have sites they want to be considered for housing. Many residents have been involved in assessing 11 new sites across the village and each one had at least six landscape surveys completed. In consultation with the residents. A Public Exhibition was held on Saturday 29 February in the village Hall. Feedback will be taken into consideration about which ones are suitable.

The strength of the existing plan came from asking residents what they wanted and doing it and 95% of those who voted, supported the plan in the referendum.

That model is being followed again - this is YOUR plan. Around 100 new homes are to be provided in Sonning Common in addition to the 195 in the existing plan. The level of provision is set out by South Oxfordshire District Council in their local plan. The aims for the new homes are to be

- Built on the most suitable sites
- The type the village needs mostly smaller houses, and accommodation for the elderly
- As sustainable as possible which means not too far from the village centre facilities
- Sonning Common to retain its current shape and to remain separate from Reading and neighbouring villages
- Sonning Common to retain its wonderful rural character and to defend the AONB

SODC's Core Strategy + 15% (based on 2011 Census) = 377 extra homes for Sonning Common

EYE HEALTH

A talk about eye health organised by the Patients Participation Group held recently at Sonning Common Health Centre was attended by about 30 people. The first class talk was given by Neil Frost and Catalina Borneo of Frost Borneo opticians from Henley on a range of conditions including glaucoma, macular degeneration, cataracts, blepharitis and dry eyes. This was followed by questions from the attendees. The aim of the talk was to discuss the conditions that affect the health of our eyes especially as we get older and the importance of regular eye checks which can show up possible eye defects before they become more serious.



Feedback from the attendees was very positive who found it very interesting and informative. Keep a 'healthy' eye out for more health promotion talks being organised by the Patient Participation Group.

TREE POLLEN ALLERGY

Approximately a quarter of all hay fever sufferers in the UK are allergic to tree pollen. Tree pollen allergies are seasonal, mainly occurring between February and June. As some shrubs and trees start releasing pollen as early as January, hay fever can be triggered very early on into the New Year, with people often confusing the symptoms for those of a common cold. Some varieties of tree including willow, elm, birch, ash and alder are at their peak of releasing pollen in March and April, so

be sure you know what to look out for this springtime.

Symptoms

- Runny nose and mucus production
- Sneezing
- Itchy nose, eyes, ears and mouth
- Stuffy nose (nasal congestion)
- Red and watery eyes
- Swelling around the eyes

VE DAY CELEBRATION

It must be a sign of old age when you well remember an event that happened 75 years ago, but I am not yet an old crock. Our mother took me and my sister from home, in Streatham, to Trafalgar Square, by bus, to join the million revellers celebrating Victory in Europe, following the suicide of Adolf Hitler and the surrender of German forces.

I didn't have a good view, but I remember being lifted onto the shoulders of an American serviceman to enjoy the fireworks, the music and singing (and, apparently, Princess Margaret joining the party in the fountains). Even for a child, it was an evening to treasure. I also remember that the homeward bus stopped at the Streatham Hill bus garage at 3 am, so we had a long walk home.

I was born in January 1938, my sister Anne in an air raid shelter on Hallow'een, October 1940, at the height of the blitz. I was in the garden shelter of family friends at Crystal Palace, which was bombed flat. They dug us out in the morning, but I was crying for the

dog, which had been left "to guard the house". That made me popular.

I had a healthy dislike of everything German, and became an avid reader of the morning newspaper to see how the war was going. My sister and I attended a kindergarten school in West Norwood and were taught to read with Lexicon cards, often in the shelter.


We quickly picked up on two, three, four and five letter words, and were fluent readers by the age of six. After D-day in June 1944 I was first down in the morning to read the Daily Mail, to see how Monty was getting on in northern France, while father was occupied in REME servicing and repairing tanks in Italy. We were en route for the doodlebugs, jet propelled V1 bombs that sometimes rumbled over our house, making doors and windows rattle. Alright, so long as the engine didn't stop!

Everyone was so happy that the war in Europe had ended, and three months later it finished too in Japan. We no longer had to listen for air raid sirens,

day and night, and dads came home to head the household. Food was rationed (who remembers powdered egg, and snoek?) but we never went hungry.

My interest in newspapers continued through my teens, and at the age of 17 I was accepted by The Croydon Advertiser to train as a journalist. This became the happiest time of my working life, and I am still proud to call myself a journalist (so much better than 'retired') into my eighties. I specialised in motor racing, travelled the world, and today I have many German acquaintances who are friends. It's best to forget the bad bits of 20th century!

TOO COOL FOR SCHOOL...



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REVISITED

(With thanks to the Parish Council for allowing me to use the Parish Page for this article)

As residents may recall the 2019 October/November issue of the magazine last year featured an obituary for Mike Brennan, the Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator for Sonning Common who died last May.

Several months before his death Mike had made contact to ask if I would consider taking over the role of Area Coordinator for Neighbourhood Watch in the village, a position he had held for many years.

Mike was looking for a successor having reached his ninetieth year and now spending most of the winter months each year visiting his family in Florida he thought it time for someone else to take over the reins.

I had been a street coordinator for some 30 houses in Kennylands Road for some years and had several contacts with Mike during that time. I agreed to a preliminary discussion with Mike and we met together in October 2018. We talked about the responsibilities of the role and the tasks involved also a little about the development of Neighbourhood Watch in Sonning Common. As some may remember it all began in 1992 and at one time covered some 70% of residential homes in the Village.

Soon after that meeting Mike was to journey to Florida for his annual family

visit returning in the spring. We agreed to meet and continue the discussion on his return by which time I would have decided whether I could follow in his footsteps.

Alas, that second meeting never took place and an email to Mike in early June asking if he was back in the UK was replied to by one of his daughter's telling me that Mike had died the previous month whilst still in Florida. At that time both daughters were back in Sonning Common sorting his affairs and were able to let me have all the paperwork they could locate relating to Neighbourhood Watch.

Although not having formally taken on Mike's role I do feel some 'acquired' responsibility to carry on, or at least make a start on continuing his good work for our community.

So, I think my first task is to get an overview of the current situation regarding active Street Coordinators (a Street Coordinator for Neighbourhood Watch has oversight of between 10 and 50 homes in a residential road or area).

So, can I ask any reader of this article who still considers themselves a Neighbourhood Watch 'contact' to please respond to the few questions on the reply slip below. I would be most grateful for any details to update the 2013 register, the most recent one I hold. I will acknowledge all responses received and will also provide a more general update on the Neighbourhood Watch 'coverage' across the Village in a future issue of the Magazine.

COOK'S CORNER

Spring has arrived, try these recipes to have out in the garden enjoying the lighter (& warmer?) evenings.


PITTA BREAD - serves 12

- 450 g strong white flour
- 1 tsp salt
- ½ tsp caster sugar
- 1 sachet yeast
- 300 ml tepid water, or as needed

Sift the flour and salt into a bowl, stir in the sugar and yeast. Mix in enough water to make a soft dough.

Turn out onto a lightly floured surface and knead for about 10 minutes or until it is smooth and elastic.

Place in a lightly greased bowl, cover and leave to rise in a warm place for 1hour or until doubled in size.



Preheat the oven to 230c/Gas 8.Place 3 non-stick baking sheets (or 3 floured baking sheets) in the oven to heat for about 5 minutes. Place the pitta breads on the hot baking sheets and bake for 8–10 minutes or until firm and golden brown.

Place on rack to cool. Serve warm or reheat under the grill. Pitta breads will keep, wrapped in foil, for 1-2 days.

SUPER EASY AVOCADO DIP - serves 12

- 2 Avocados
- 1/2 lemon, juiced
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

Cut the avocados into halves. Remove the stones, and scoop out the pulp into a small bowl. Use a fork to mash the avocado. Stir in lemon juice, onion, salt and olive oil. Cover the bowl, and refrigerate for up to 1 hour before serving.


