Centenary Celebrations at SC Primary are underway and will continue throughout 2013

On 6 January 1913 Sonning Common Primary, then known as Eye and Dunsden Sonning Common Council School, opened its doors to 67 children. The first child registered in the admissions book was Nellie Grimshaw aged 10 from Shiplake Bottom. 100 years on from then there are now 400 children on the roll. During this year the school will be celebrating the centenary in a variety of ways.

During the autumn a photo was taken from the air of all the children and staff making a `100` shape on the playing fields.

On the 7 and 8 January all the staff and children were invited to dress in the clothes that their ancestors had 100 years ago. The desks were laid out in lines as they would have been then, rather than in groups as they tend to be now. The parents had obviously made a big effort and almost all the children had dressed up and looked fabulous! They were nearly outdone by the efforts of the staff, including all those who cook lunch for them. Headmaster Mr Hirst looked especially impressive in his robes.

Every family at the school was given a lovely book to take home written by Mel White (also known as former teacher Mrs Choules) covering the history of the school since 1913. It has obviously taken a lot of time to put together, so a big THANK YOU to Mel!

Finding Grandma's Family -The Hunt Goes On

In the last edition of the magazine Anouska reported that, following receipt of a letter from Tim Bigalow in Canada, she and her mum had tracked down a relative of his late Grandmother who is living in Orchard Avenue.

It appears that Barbara Kingston's mother-in-law and Tim's Grandmother were cousins and there was some contact by letter whilst they were still both alive. But Barbara says she knows "very little" of the history as her mother-in-law seldom spoke of her family. However, Tim's letter has prompted Barbara to write to him and she has received a personal reply. Happily, that reply has encouraged her to turn out some old photos and documents and in the New Year she plans to contact Barnados in the hope that they will have some information about Grandma.

Barbara now plans to keep in touch with Tim and has promised to let us know how her investigations go. So, watch this space!

Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP)

After an initial briefing meeting in early January 2012 with the consultant appointed by the Parish Council, the NDP Working Party (NDPWP) was finalised and began work in February 2012. Thus started an ongoing process of regular meetings with task related agendas which have produced to date a lot of data including photos, maps, reports, documents, statements and surveys encompassing important elements of the NDP. For example:

- A Vision Statement for Sonning Common 2026
- Character Assessment and Design Statement
- Housing Survey
- Traffic Report
- Business Survey
- And surveys on sites, landscape setting and residential character plus individual site analysis booklets of residents' evidence.

All the information gathered by residents on the sites in and around the village is now being processed and summarised by the NDPWP and will be presented in the form of a spreadsheet. This evidence and many of your photographs are now being prepared for public meetings to be held on 7 February at 7.30 pm and repeated 9 February at 10 am to 12 noon in the Village Hall.

Our intention is for the sites you have identified to us as viable, non-viable or uncertain about to be described in more detail via displays, photos and a visual presentation. Residents who attend will have the opportunity to complete written feedback. These comments along with all the other evidence will then enable the working party to make a final assessment of all the sites.



Neighbourhood Plan Housing Needs Survey

As part of the evidence gathering process the Neighbourhood Planning Working Party commissioned this survey. This is a summary of the findings.

Listed below are the findings considered most significant;

- 25% of respondents have lived in the village for more than 30 years, and 40% for more than 20 years, implying a strong affection for and commitment to, the village.
- 25% put the income of their household at £20,000 to £40,000 p.a., which is comparatively modest. 10% had an income of more than £100,000.
- 79% declared their intention of staying in their current homes. 14% intended to move, 7% said they would like to move, (25 people), but either could not afford it or there was a lack of suitable housing. Of the 14% intending to move, 50 people, (roughly half) said they would stay in the village and half said they would go elsewhere.
- 18 of the 72 people who have left the village in the past 5 years did so because of the lack of affordable or suitable housing, 24 left for employment.
- In answer to the question "What kind of accommodation does SC need?" almost a quarter said affordable housing. The next biggest category at 15% indicated semidetached houses.
- Dealing with "supported housing", 45%, of 160 people, felt the village needed Housing Association and private

warden assisted accommodation. Just over a quarter chose independent accommodation with care support.

- Just under two-thirds opposed back land development, and one third favoured it.
- The three biggest categories in the pie chart illustrating answers to the important question "Why do you need a home in SC?"; are being with family, those wanting a first home, and those wanting a bigger home.
- More than 40%, (39 people), of those seeking a home want either terraced or semi-detached. 15.5% are after either detached house or semi-detached bungalow.
- 24 people responded to the question about "How much rent/mortgage could be afforded?" 8 said £651-750 per month.

We have not attempted to summarise the comments included in the report. The very broad themes are:

- People like living in the village and want to stay.
- b. The village needs more affordable housing.
- c. Traffic is bad at certain times and in some places.
- d. Parking provision is inadequate in the village centre.





Minor County Cricket returns to Gallowstree Common

Kidmore End Cricket Club was founded in 1863 so 2013 will mark the club's sesquicentenary. Berkshire CCC has not played at Gallowstree Common since 1996. The county side will return on Sunday, 26 May 2013 to play Buckinghamshire CCC in a Minor County Trophy match.

In addition to other representative matches which will be played during the summer, the club's 150th anniversary will be celebrated with a Dinner and Ball, held at Shehnai, London Street, Reading on Saturday, 28 September 2013. It is also planned to publish a revised history of the club, first compiled by W. E. Townsend in 1963, with new editions in 1988 and 2003.

Matches begin with a friendly at Datchet on 13 April while Thames Valley League matches begin on Saturday, 11 May. Kidmore End CC is always ready to welcome new members of any age and playing standard to enjoy the pleasures of the delightful ground at Gallowstree Common. 

100 years for a constant of the Oxford Cowley Automotive Plant 1913-2013

It seems amazing that over the years I have crossed paths many times with the historic Morris car company -founded 100 years ago - so it is only right that I take time to record and share these memories.

Firstly my dad had a job at Pressed Steel Fisher, who made chassis and bodies for most of the car manufacturers. William Morris acquired this company, based near Fort Dunlop, Birmingham, in the 1950s.

Way back in 1927 Morris had bought outright the Wolseley Motor Company in Drews Lane, Birmingham. One of my first jobs was as a 16 year old delivery boy for the Co-operative Society and my usual destination, Drews Lane.

The place had a special buzz. Every day, except Sunday, the first delivery of freshlybaked bread was to the café. Many of the cafe customers were workers from the car factory. Those who couldn't leave the works would dangle a basket with a note and the money for daily sandwiches.

My next job was with a car dealership and repair garage and my introduction to the motor trade. I remained in the industry for 40 years.

Initially employed as a parts store man, I asked to take driving lessons so that I could

drive the new Mini van. The link with William Morris resurfaced as my first job was to drive from Birmingham to the Cowley works to collect urgent parts.

I can recall a conversation with an older, more experienced work colleague around 1965. It was his belief that, in future, all cars would be made by just two or three manufacturers with badges for different models. Fifty years down the line and it has happened!!

Some years later I ventured into the Austin Longbridge Birmingham works to visit a contractor within the works. At that time Longbridge produced the Rover 200 and 400 series cars. I was also shown the last virtually hand-made original two-door Mini being produced, which was badged as part of a special series.

The success of the New Mini works, formally Morris Cowley, and now owned by the German BMW group, proves that fortune can come around again. But NOW its production is so much better for people and the environment.

Had Lord Nuffield been with us today I am sure he would have been the first to congratulate BMW for the investment and the systems which produce four times the units compared with the 'glory years' of the 50s and 60s and with a quarter of the original factory site and staff.

To conclude my life-long association with William Morris, early last year I was fortunate to receive a personal invitation to a private visit of Lord Nuffield's former home, Nuffield Place, which is just a few hundred yards from Huntercombe Prison where I have been working these last 10 years.

The National Trust re-opened this visitor attraction. The house is much the same as it was when Lord Nuffield died in 1963 - an Aladdin's cave for the automobile enthusiast coupled with sparse living accommodation, surprising when you consider Lord Nuffield would have been a billionaire by today's standards.

With my working life having revolved around William Morris, I couldn't have envisaged that my last link with the company would be to stand in Lord Nuffield's bedroom looking at the work station where he used to repair watches.

to the masses


"What I have done others can do. If they don't they will regret it when they die. I just want to pass out feeling I've done my best for mankind". William Morris This article gives a glimpse into the lifestyle of one of Britain's greatest philanthropist. As his fortune grew he dispersed £30 million, approximately £700m in today's money. He created the Nuffield Foundation, Nuffield College Oxford and his name lives on in the healthcare charity Nuffield Health. "It is to me an act of love" he said when he donated money to orthopaedics. Hearing that hospitals throughout the Commonwealth were struggling to cope with the polio epidemic he ordered the manufacture of 5,000 iron lungs at his car factory and distributed them free of charge.

William was so much more than a successful industrialist and philanthropist; he was also a very caring person. "He comes to the hospital; he takes an interest in everybody and everything in it ... a very real assistance and encouragement to us all at Guy's. This is what makes him such a friend to us all." (1944 chairman of Guy's hospital).

A man who was not interested in life's luxuries and despite his enormous wealth his lifestyle was very modest. His humble beginnings may have been the reason he was very careful with his money. For example, his bedroom floor was carpeted with cut offs from the Morris car factory and what appears to be a wardrobe in his room, when opened, reveals a treasure trove of tools, including stick-a-soles to repair his shoes rather than buy new ones.

There was no collection of cars on his drive – he drove a Wolseley, a gift from his work force. In 1938 he was the target of an armed kidnap attempt at the Cowley factory. A contemporary news report noted that the unflappable peer "seemed quite composed and made very little of the affair".

William's membership of a cycle club led to his meeting with Elizabeth Maud Anstey (Lizzie), a seamstress at







Debenhams and their later marriage on 9 April 1903. Her diary reveals some of her interests and personality. As a careful manager of the household, she was firm with the servants and kept detailed accounts. She had an active social life visiting friends/relatives and welcomed them to Nuffield Place. Jam making and bottling, gardening walking and cycling (even at 66) were among her hobbies and she enjoyed theatre, shopping and touring Europe. She loved watching tennis, attending Wimbledon and was always seen at Henley Regatta. Lizzie and William did not have children, so their home was left to Nuffield College and it was subsequently purchased by the National Trust. Joanna Gamester House Steward, who has looked after the house since the 1970's said "I was absolutely delighted when this happened because it secured the future of the house".



There will be special celebrations at Nuffield Place this year, so it is just the time to arrange a visit! The house was opened to the public in 2012. The Morris's bought the house in 1933 and had it extensively altered and extended, installing central heating and modernising the bathrooms. It was furnished in the tastes of the time with some furniture made especially for them. The furnishings are little changed, from the cocktail cabinet and gramophone in the drawing room to the dining table laid with china and glass. William was a dedicated smoker and there are fascinating bits of paraphernalia, from a pull match stand, an ashtray full of cigarettes to sheet music entitled 'Songs for Smokers'. The garden was beloved by both, William and Lizzie, and many happy hours were spent 'pottering' in old clothes. One day a passing motorist

asked what sort of a man was Lord Nuffield, to which William replied "Oh, he is not so bad when you get to know him". Lord Nuffield's home and life is summed up by Richard Henderson National Trust general manager "Despite Lord Nuffield's extraordinary philanthropy and achievements, he remains relatively unknown. His home is a wonderful time capsule without any of the 'show' of a multi-millionaire and reveals so much about the man who changed many people's lives for the better".



AN INTERVIEW WITH... Carol Viney

After more than two decades as Sonning Common's "problem solver", councillor Carol Viney is to step down from the county council in May.

Carol has served as a Conservative county councillor for the Sonning Common ward for 12 years. Prior to that, she was a member of Sonning Common Parish Council, from 1991 to 1999, chairing the committee from 1996.

Although she and her husband Michael now live in Stoke Row, they raised their son and two daughters in the village. Three generations of the family were educated at Sonning Common Primary School and Carol also attended Chiltern Edge School.

Carol, 67, was in a reflective mood when we met to discuss her life-long association with the village and her time as a local representative.

She said: "I am a Sonning Common person. I was born and brought up here and have a strong sense of loyalty to the village.

"I am known among my family and friends as a problem solver. I got involved with local politics because I like solving problems and sorting out things for people."

She has certainly risen to the challenge of trying to protect village services on a number of occasions previously.

Carol was chair of the Parish Council when the village library was first threatened with closure and during the second, more recent attempt to close it, Carol campaigned for a fair deal for Sonning Common.

She was a founder member of the original Friends of Sonning Common Library group and was partially behind the move to house the village library within the primary school. It was hoped this would mean a safe and secure future for the library as a joint school/ community facility.

And although she is delighted that after a successful local campaign the library will remain open, she believes Sonning Common should have received a larger slice of the county council's budget for professional staff.

Club SC, the village's youth club based at Chiltern Edge School, is another of Carol's principal causes. As a member of the club's management committee, she has been successful in finding some financial support from within the local community to keep the youth club open, in the face of local government cuts.

During her years as a councillor, Carol has helped to shape the development of the village. One of the projects she is most proud of is Farm Close, at the end of Ashford Avenue, off Reades Lane.

Farm Close was developed around 1998 to provide 10 low-cost homes for rent and

five shared equity homes, in partnership with a housing association. A stipulation in the contract means that these homes will be held `in perpetuity' for local people so that only individuals born in the village or those with strong, local connections can live there.

When speaking with Carol there is a strong sense that she has been motivated, not by self-service and political ambition, but by a simple loyalty to her community.

Now that the electoral boundaries are being redrawn and the Sonning Common ward is to grow, Carol hopes that the new, local representative elected in May will retain their focus on Sonning Common.

"Sonning Common is a unique place which serves lots of villages like Kidmore End, Gallowstree Common, Greys, Peppard and Highmoor," she said. "I hope that whoever becomes county councillor will see that Sonning Common is at the centre of everything."





in a residential home – what is it really like?

Most of us see Abbeycrest Care home from the outside when walking our dogs, going for health walks or driving past. I was given the opportunity to find out what it's like for the residents who live there, by being taken on a tour around the spacious accommodation Abbeycrest provides. I was impressed by the communal dining and lounge areas and that there was even a hairdressers! I went to talk with Pat Lewis, who has recently moved to Abbeycrest from the village.



So Pat, what's your daily routine at Abbeycrest?

Breakfast! Most important meal! Then we have time between then and lunch to do whatever we like, but they do have activities for an hour in the morning, and then an hour in the afternoon.

What kind of activities are there?

Gentle exercise, playing word games, bingo, and skittles... things to keep your mind lively really. They hand out a leaflet that changes every week of the activities for each day. There's a great activity they do called "the memory box" where they bring out a big suitcase full of different things from a certain time and we have the chance to reminisce, talk and share the stories we're reminded of, by the objects we choose from the suitcase.

Does the location of the care home fulfil the need for you and the other residents to be part of the community?

Well at the moment, I don't feel a great part of the community. I've been here just over 3 months and we haven't spent a lot of time in the village, even though I have a house there, apart from Christmas. We went to see the children at the Sonning Common Primary School and then they came here.

What suggestions would you make to encourage people to visit and get involved in Abbycrest?

I'm not sure they would come and take part in all the activities we have at the moment but I suppose they could have bingo sessions, but it would have to be discussed.

Do the residents at Abbeycrest have trips out often?

We went to Woodley just before Christmas to do a bit of Christmas shopping, and some went into Reading to do theirs. I didn't do that because my daughter had done all my shopping for me! I sometimes go for walks up and round the millennium field, which is a nice short walk as most of the residents can't do long walks.

Is there freedom with you and the other residents to do whatever you wish?

Oh yes, as long as we have a carer with us when we go out, just in case. We can go wherever we like, though the weather hasn't been too nice, mostly rain!

Do you feel safe at Abbeycrest and do they look after you well?

I feel safe here; in fact what I tell people these days is that I don't want to go home! I'm happy here. It is home, I went to my daughters' at Christmas and at the end of Christmas day I asked her could you take me home now. It just came out automatically.

How long have you been here?

Since 18 October so I've been here nearly three months and I've decided to stay. They give you a trial period to see if you like the home and I shall be bringing in some of my pictures and furniture in to make it more homely.

Does it feel like a community here at Abbeycrest?

Yes, well it's a family really, we call all the nurses and carers by their first names and I've made some good friends here. All my friends and family say "it's like a 4 star hotel!" and it doesn't feel like a care home. I like my room very much.

How's the food!?

Ha, well that depends on the cook! They have three courses with a choice of starter and main and they do the usual Christmas roast which the residents and their families are invited to.

What do you think peoples perceptions are of this place?

I'm not sure. Personally I was apprehensive myself when I first came, but it's because you don't see what goes on. Everyone is so nice and helpful, I think there should be more interaction with the local community.

Are pets allowed in the building?

Yes, in fact people bring their pets, dogs mostly to the home quite often, I don't think they would be allowed to stay here, but for those residents who might have had to leave a pet behind it's good that they are free to visit and interact with them.

(There's a knock at the door)

....Ah and this is what I really like!

(A staff member enters with a full tray of refreshments, cakes and biscuits! We tuck in for a few minutes, ...yum!)

Do you have Physiotherapists come in?

They can come in if you like, and opticians and other medical help should you need it.

And finally, what words would you use to describe the atmosphere at Abbycrest?

Homely, friendly and relaxing, my friends and family have said they've never seen me as relaxed as I am when I am here, it's done me good.

Planning Committee News from its Chairman Barrie Greenwood.

This committee of the Parish Council has the delegated power to respond to planning applications made to South Oxfordshire District Council. We do not have the power to determine those planning applications.

We meet twice monthly and in 2012 have considered 61 applications. In every case we listen to local views and consider SODC's planning policies before we recommend to them that they should either approve or refuse each application. In a few cases we decide that we hold no strong views either way.






Finance Committee News from its Chairman John Stoves.

We meet in public every month to scrutinise how all Parish Council funds are used and use our delegated powers to approve all payments.

We also consider requests for grants or donations and may approve them up to £250 if we think they will benefit our residents. If a larger grant seems appropriate, such as our annual £4,500 contribution to running the Youth Club, we will recommend it to the full council for consideration.

We review the annual budget and recommend the precept amount to full council. There is a separate insert in this edition on that topic.







A GUIDE TO THE PARISH "SNOW PLAN"

The plan targets the core pavements of the village centre and the primary school area by pre-salting and gritting before snow arrives.

Using three hand pushed gritters a team of eight volunteers can cover the area in about 90 minutes, using 300Kgs of dry salt/grit mix.

Once snow lands the full team uses shovels and brooms to clear the salted areas and re-salts if required. For larger areas they have a mini snowplough to take the strain, but only if cars are not parked on the pavements!

Shop and domestic houses are expected to clear their own access or pavement frontages. Our "YES, WE CAN" motto will make the village safer for all.

Serving ourselves at the library

Sonning Common Library is due to receive two new kiosks for customers to issue and return books on Tuesday 12 February.

The library will be closed on the 12th for the intallation but will re-open as normal on Wednesday 13 February.

At the kiosks customers can issue and return books, pay fines, do renewals and examine their accounts.

After the installation Sonning Common library staff and additional support staff will be on hand to help customers get used to using the kiosks.

Oxfordshire County Council is installing self-service machines across all of its libraries as part of the modernisation of the library service.

This cost is being met solely by contributions from housing developers, as part of the overall improvement of the county's infrastructure.

According to the county council, the self-service kiosks have been well received by customers at other libraries. At Benson Library, which received its machine last September, 90 per cent of its transactions are now being done via self-service.

JUNIOR BOOK REVIEW


I have just read a cool book called "The Brilliant World of Tom Gates" by L Pinchon.




