We headed to Valley MX on Saturday October 24th to finish out our season. Mother Nature was not kind the night before. However, the crew did a great job to give the racers a really good track to race on. It was a little sloppy in practice and in the first few moto's, but with the large turnout, it turned into a great track. With over 500 entries for the day it made for some short races but great race action with our 43 total entries. In the end it was a great day to end the season and crown some Champions. Thanks to everyone at Valley MX for making it such a fun and enjoyable day.

The first classes that were out on track were Transition and Historic. Chad Morehouse took the early lead but fell on lap one and could only make his way back to fifth. Colin Cook took over the lead a few turns and checked out. Nik Michael slotted into second with Tom Claerhout moving into third. There was a second turn pile up that collected Chris Young, Simon Farmer and Jeff Doneth. They would all get back up but Jeff pulled off with some bike damage. Eli Hovorka barley made it around the

carnage and was into fourth as Chris and Simon were almost a lap down in sixth and seventh. The gate for moto two fell and it was Tom and Chad wheel to wheel for the holeshot with Tom taking it. He would cruise on to the moto win and take the overall. Chad redeemed himself and was on the gas to hold onto second to earn third overall. There was another second turn crash and this time it took Colin Cook and Nik Michael. They took a while to get going but Colin was on the gas to catch the pack in the short race. He was able to get onto the rear wheel of Eli in third but it was the last lap and couldn't make the pass. Eli took third for fourth overall as Colin took fourth for second overall. Nik took a little longer to get his 500 restarted and was way back and only managed fifth dropping him to fifth overall. Chris and Simon both decoded not to race the second moto putting them back in sixth and seventh respectively. The Historic class had some battles with William Hawkins and Mike Mason splitting holeshots. William led for the first few laps until a fall dropped him out of the top three. Jim Jobson was quick to strike and took the race win. Mike Mason was then

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a close second as Shaun Nestor also made the pass for third. William came across in fourth as Blake Argue rounded out the top five. Stephen Phillips had a lonely race as his rival Jeff was out after the second turn crash. He took an easy sixth with Michael Sangster and Alexis Argue in seventh and eighth. Mike took the second holeshot but William was looking for revenge from moto one and took the lead by the end of lap one. He motored away from the pack and left the battle for second between Mike, Jim and Shaun. The three of them were close all race long with Mike having a slight edge. He would cross in second to take the overall with his 2-2. Jim made a few bobbles but was able to just stay ahead of Shaun for third and second overall. William did round out the podium with his 4-1 as Shaun just missed out in fourth after a great second moto. Blake was consistent for fifth as Stephen and Jeff were able to battle in moto two. Stephen earned the bragging rights and held him off for sixth. Jeff took seventh but his first moto dnf dropped him to ninth. Michael rode better as the track

was coming around and kept Jeff in sight and finished eighth for seventh overall as Alexis took ninth for eighth.

The Innovation class was next and was one of the classes that the Championship was still up for grabs. Lance Shelton grabbed the first holeshot but Nik Michael was quickly into the lead. He led every lap as Tom Claerhout took over second after another slow start. Lance Slipped back to third as a great battle was happening for fourth between Ray Brooks, Connor Goulet and Gene Huntoon. Connor made some great passes and made his way into fourth followed closely by Gene and then Ray. Kan Argue went back and forth with Dallas Martineau and was just ahead of Blake Argue. Dallas made a last lap error and that allowed Ken and Blake both to get by as they finished seventh and eighth. Dallas took ninth as Steve Adema had a hard time holding off Derek Michael as he rounded out the top ten. Joe Hovorka only made it a lap but it was a little longer than Rick Murphy. Rick stalled just out of the gate and then didn't make it a half a lap before a pretty hard crash. He was able to get up and ride off the track but he decided to sit out the rest

of the day and watch. So as they were lined up for moto two, the title was between Tom and Nik and it was however won the last moto of the season would be the Champion. The gate dropped and it was Ray with the holeshot by less than half a wheel over Gene. Nik and Tom started right with each other and Nik came through to lead at the start of lap two. Tom was right on his rear wheel and made the pass a few turns later. Tom put his head down and slowly pulled a gap to take the race win,

the overall and the Championship. Nik rode hard and fast but took second on the day and in the season. Lance had another good start and slid into third and rounded out the podium. Ray, Gene and Connor were once again wheel to wheel all moto long. Ray had the edge in the moto to take fourth but as Connor made a last lap pass on Gene for fifth, that was enough to give him fourth overall. Ray kept it in the top five with his 6-4 as Gene ended in sixth with his 5-6. Dallas, Ken and Blake also continued

Dallas split the father son duo as he took eighth overall with Blake in ninth and top 125cc. Steve was Mr. consistent taking another tenth for tenth overall once again just ahead of Derek. Joe made it around a lot better to take twelfth for twelfth overall.

The Evolution and Schoolboy classes were out last with Dean Howard launching out of the gate of moto one for a monster holeshot. His lead wouldn't last long as he crashed down the back straight and picked it up in last. Ross Kershner was back out and took over the lead and motored away. Dean remounted and rode well but only made it up to third just behind Ray Brooks. Shawn Nestor almost held off the charge from Berlanga hounded Shaun for most of the race and had to settle for a top five. Mark Havalda had a decent start and rode really well to take sixth. Keir Krassa and Jay Ottenwess had a great battle all moto long with Keir having the slight lead. Ron Delaney had a rough start as he stalled it out of the gate and was about a lap down before getting restarted. He rode well and looked good but could only manage a ninth. Todd Lane was on the gas early after top five start and running near the front. He had some bike issues and bare-Iv made it off the track but was scored down in tenth. Ross was dialed for moto two as he ripped the holeshot and put in some fast laps. He had to stay on the gas because Dean was not making it easv. He hounded Ross the entire race and at the finish Ross only won by about three

Dean but he was on a mission. Santos

seconds. But it was a 1-1 and overall for Ross. Dean ended the day in second overall with his 3-2 with a very good ride. Ray was also on the gas for the entire race as he rounded out the podium with his 2-3. Todd Lane was back out to have some fun and made two passes on the final lap to get into fourth. But his first moto woes dropped him to seventh overall. The big battle was between Shaun and Santos as they were wheel to wheel from start to finish. Shaun edged him out for fifth and fourth overall as Santos went 5-6 to

round out the top five. Mark once again had a great start and rode very well on his way to seventh for sixth overall. Keir and Jay dueled again and Keir had the lead for the first two laps. Then as they started lap three it was Jay ahead and he would hold on for eighth and eighth overall. Keir finished out in ninth for ninth as Ron decided to sit out moto two with bike starting issues to finish in tenth. Alexis Argue was once again our lone SB racer as she put in some good laps with

His father was riding the family enduro series and was doing well. He did ask some questions about the bike requirements for the event and asked if I could help him surprise his dad in New Paris, IN. I told him the event was on Halloween and he should wear a costume.

He called me at least five other times and sent me a couple of text messages. The day before the event I let him know when we arrived at the hotel. We checked in, walk to our room and run into his dad in the hallway. The secret was still safe. We get to the staging area and start with the registration process. Dad stops by the scoring trailer and my phone rings....yep, it is Junior and I cannot answer the call. He was not wearing a costume, but we had arranged for him to be on the same row as his dad. I am told there was not a dry eye at the surprise family reunion.

If you read President Dunn's article last week you saw a picture from the starting line. There were only four riders per row and Jaysson decided to ride "sweep" on row 67.

Xander (aka X) and Issac (aka Ice) grew up riding the family enduro series and perfecting their timekeeping skills. NOW I am looking forward to riding and allowing the boys to keep time for me. Jenny (aka mom) was also available to carry supplies for us. Thank you!

Sunday morning was warm and the sun was out – no jackets required. The boys raced off from the start, but the first couple of miles are on the road. We drop into the woods, but the first check was a few miles away. Xander was gone, Ice and I followed each other and then he missed a turn. I took a glance at the watch and we were within our minute. A few turns down the trail and there is the first check. We zeroed it! We ride to the first reset and there is Xander. He was two minutes early and we had a 7 point lead. It was the only timekeeping mistake he made all day – lesson learned. I knew when I caught him later in the day that I was back on time again. He zeroed the final check and I was three seconds late – in the next minute. I had a smile on my face at the beginning of the day and I was still smiling as we packed up to head back to Michigan. DECEMBER 2020 – by Steven Beane

- It's all over but the unpacking of boxes ... PlusOnePerformance now calls the woods outside of Milford home, and while the house is still getting the finishing touches, the suspension shop and bike prep bays are up and running.
- What's not running is JGRMX ... after more than a dozen years and likely 52 riders (I kid, I kid) the North Carolina-based team packed up their tent for the last time. Increased support from American Suzuki never materialized, and after running without a title sponsor for a couple years after AutoTrader bailed, the storied team closed the doors.
- Alex Martin landed on his feet at Manluk/Rock River Yamaha, Joey Savatgy was able to secure a ride at Rocky Mountain ATV/MC KTM, and Shane McElrath will be racing a 2020 Honda CRF450R for the unconventional Bullfrog Spas/MCR team.
- Satvatgy's appearance on the factory supported RMATV team is somewhat of a shock, as it left Blake Baggett out in the cold.
- Speaking of cold, it was the exact same temperature for both the Last Ride Before Deer Season (LRBDS) on November 11th as it was on the First Ride After Deer Season (FRADS) on December 11th ... 37 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Harley-Davidson has determined the best way to support flattrack racing is through support of dealership led efforts, leaving Indian as the sole (and very dominant) factory team in flattrack. The Harley XGA was built off of the company's Street 750 engine, but that was a knife in a gin-fight against Indian's purpose-built FTR V-Twin.
- Kawasaki surprised more than a few riders when they introduced a Supermoto-themed 300 street bike.
- Speaking of Super-motos, by the time you've decided what you're going to return after Christmas, we should have one of the first TM450 SMX bikes in the country being prepped at our new shop.
- It's official the tear that Stew Baylor went on on the Yamaha YZ450FX landed him a full-boat ride with the AmPro Yamaha team. Baylor will contest both the GNCC and National Enduro series in 2021.

- And, speaking of National Enduro and 2021, the Sumter, South Carolina opening round is less than two months away!
- Sherco showed that they have a solid hold on the extreme enduro field when Mario Roman, Cody Webb, Nick Faringer, and Cody Wentzall went 1-2-4-5 at the recent Red Bull Override Hard Enduro held in northern Texas.
- 2021 will be the first year in a long time that James Dabill hasn't competed at the World Championship level in TrialGP.
- There's still plenty of time to ride your dirt bike in Michigan the ORV and Trail tags don't expire until March of next year.
- For the first time in a very long time the opening round of Supercross will take place somewhere other than Anaheim CA. In fact, Houston hosts the first three rounds, while California will have no rounds during the 2021 season. Fewer cities will host more rounds, as uncertainty surrounding the governmental response to covid-19 meant that some states, such as California and Michigan, would likely not allow the events to be run.
- Have you checked out the 2021 race schedule yet? I won't spill all the news, but know the 101 year-old Lansing Motorcycle Club has 2 weekends on the new calendar. Look for it at ama-d14.org site.
- Italian racing powerhouse Boano Racing stunned the off-road world, and likely Beta, when they announced they would assume control of TM's racing effort. Boano has cultivated world championship winning talent such as Steve Holcombe and Brad Freeman, among others.
- KTM continues their quest for complete dominance of the off-road world buy fielding GasGas-branded teams in most off-road race categories. The Troy Lee Designs team, headed in 2021 by Justin Barcia, will be riding red bikes when the gate drops in Houston January 16th.
- Merry Christmas everyone, and I hope to see you back on two wheels in 2021!

2021 AMA Racing Rulebook Update

The following rule change was created through the AMA Competition Commissions process. The change has been approved by the AMA Board of Directors and will go into effect January 1, 2021. New rules for the 2021 season are shown and printed in bold italic type.

Update to be included in all amateur AMA Racing disciplines:

All helmets must be intact and no modification may be made to their construction that alters the helmet from the condition it was tested and approved. The helmet is made to provide protection and is not a platform to attach foreign objects. For example, cameras or other accessories are NOT permitted to be attached to the rider's helmet.

CHRISTMAS COMES EARLY

FRADS and Gifts from Presaro

If you've been reading the D14 News for a year or more, you know that we like to commemorate the likely end of the off-road riding season with one last ride before deer season (LRBDS). This year that ride took place near Luzerne on November 11. Similarly, we like to celebrate the continuation of the riding season post rifle-season with a first ride after deer season – FRADS – if the weather allows. It did, so this years' FRADS took place December 11 up near Moorestown, and the day couldn't have been better.

The day before FRADS was one marked with indecision — what to ride? I took a look around the shop, and tried to decide between a trio of red and blue bikes. The TM144 is a fantastic tight-course race bike, but the Beta 250 would likely be a better choice given the fast company the ride would take place with. There was one other choice, another Italian bike. A fresh can of non-ethanol fuel was purchased, but still no decision was reached.

With less than two months until the 2021 season-opening National Enduro in Sumter, SC, FRADS was possibly the last chance there would be to ride in Michigan before heading south, and possibly the last chance to determine what bike to race in South Carolina as well. Finally, it came to me.

My mount for FRADS would be an early Christmas present from the TM factory in Presaro, Italy – a brand-new 2021 TM300fi 4T twin-piper! Not only would FRADS serve as the bike's break-in ride, it would act as an audition for a mount for Sumter and start to answer the question that everyone has about the bike – how does it run?

I've been racing TM's for several seasons - 144s, 250s, and 300 two strokes - but it's been a couple years since I've spent significant time on a thumper, and that bike was a Beta 350. Still, throughout the ride, the over-arching feeling was that I'd never been so confident on an unfamiliar bike, and I knew that I was riding something very special.

Even though the company is more than 40 years old, TM only makes 1250 bikes a year, and of that number only about 50 are this model. By definition, the TM300EN 4T is an unconventional bike.


The displacement puts it between the usual small (250cc) and mid-sized (350cc) thumpers. The fuel tank is located under the seat where an airbox is usually found. The airbox is between the rider's legs, with a down-draft intake feeding the intake tract which is at the back of the head. And speaking of the head, it's incredibly small by four-stroke standards. Twin counter-rotating cams are gear-driven from shaft mounted low in the head, which is itself chain-driven from the bottom end. Each exhaust port feeds its own pipe, with twin silencers tucked behind the side plates.

A TM-built shock is paired with KYB forks, and they are mated to an aluminum frame also made by the Presaro firm. The frame showcases some the finest welds found in the motorcycle realm.


So back to the question – how does it run?

Without hesitation I can declare that TM's latest mid-sized thumper is a fantastic machine. The power is linear and robust, while the low and centrally-located fuel tank, counter-rotating cams, and tucked in silencers contribute to a very flickable feel more reminiscent of a 200cc 2T than a mid-sized four stroke. The unconventional airbox and fuel tank forms tuck in as well as the more usual parts do on a TM 2T, leading to a very slim and natural feel. The stiff frame and top-shelf suspension allow the rider to pick any line in a corner while still attacking high-speed whoops without drama. To top it all off, the top-mounted airbox and twin-pipes treat the rider to a symphony of sound unlike anything I've heard from a dirtbike.

It may sound like I'm gushing here — I am, but not without reason. Not every bike fulfills the promise of its spec-sheet, but like every great bike, the TM300 4T is very much more than a sum of its parts. With very limited production, it's obvious that this is not the bike for every off-road racer, but maybe it should be.



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
