The ELL Handbook 2021

An addition to the Memorial-Spaulding School Handbook



First, a warm welcome to you and your family here at Memorial-Spaulding Elementary School. It is always wonderful to see new families at the school and we really cherish the diversity all the ELL families bring to the school community.

The ELL families at the school are here for various reasons. Some have lived abroad for a long time and are quite familiar with the school system. Others just moved here from their home country, and everything seems very new and different right now.

To get introduced to the school, we highly recommend that you take a look at the Memorial-Spaulding School Handbook. It can be found on this link: <u>Memorial-Spaulding School Handbook</u>. The School Handbook will give you useful information about the PTO (the parent-teacher organization), the bus services, different types of fundraising (financial contributions are helping the school in many ways), opening hours, the extended day program, parking zones, important phone numbers and lots more.

In supplement to the School Handbook, the ELL Handbook will hopefully answer the rest of the questions you might still have. It is an additional introduction to the school, and you will also be introduced to different organizations and websites that might be helpful to you.

The school

In a normal school year, Memorial-Spaulding School has around 460 students in 22 classrooms, and the classroom sizes are approximately 21 students. During COVID-19 these numbers have been a bit lower. The school is an elementary school meaning the classrooms run from kindergarten to 5th grade.

Every classroom has its own classroom teacher, and kindergarten and some classes also have an assistant teacher(s) in the classroom.

At the end of every school year the students are being mixed with the other students from the same grade level. This means that every time a new school year begins, your child will start in a class consisting of some of the old friends plus some new friends. The children will also get a new classroom teacher every school year.

Every classroom has one or more room parents. Being a room parent is voluntary, but it is important that every classroom has at least one.

The room parents have different tasks. They help organize activities outside the classroom and send out emails to the other parents if donations to the classroom are needed (e.g., paper towels, hand sanitizers, crayons). They also make sure that the classroom teachers receive a group gift from the class around holidays and at the end of the school year. See the rules about gifts in the School Handbook.

You will receive weekly emails with updates from your child's classroom teacher and the principal, Tom Morris. If you have not received anything during the first couple of weeks, please contact the school office to make sure that the school has your correct email address. Preparation for the school start

The first days in school can be very overwhelming, especially if your child(ren) doesn't understand/speak English. Try to be as prepared as possible.

Parents/guardians are not allowed inside the school (for safety reasons) and talking to your child about saying goodbye outside the school can help prepare them, so this doesn't come as a surprise. If you

need to enter the school, you will have to use the front door, sign in (either at the greeter's desk or in the main office), and get a visitor's pass.

Contacting the classroom teacher and/or the ELL teachers might also be a good idea (email is the best way). They will be able to tell you about the classroom schedule and how the first days will look like. You can also ask if there is a possibility of getting a tour around the school together with your child (but this is not guaranteed).

Your child should bring:

- A water bottle with his/her name on (not a glass bottle).
- Healthy snack for the morning break (remember there is no lunch break on Wednesdays so pack enough snacks to keep your child full until dismissal at 1pm).
- Lunch (remember reusable ice packs in the lunch bag since there are no refrigerators in the classrooms. Also warming up lunches is not possible).
- A bag with an extra set of clothes and an extra mask. This will stay in the child's locker during the school year. Remember to write your child's name on the bag.
- Warm clothes for the cold days and maybe an extra sweater/cardigan in the backpack. The windows in the classrooms stay open all the time for ventilation.
- Rain gear and boots for the rainy days.
- Remember to put on sunscreen on sunny days. The school doesn't provide sunscreen for the children.
- Have in mind that the children will be outside as much as possible so remember to check the weather forecast every day.

Masks must be worn at all times at the school property, except outside and during lunchtime. The masks should have a minimum of two layers, and masks without valves are preferred. These rules will change over time so keep an eye out for updates from the school.

You can buy clothes, rain/snow gear and school equipment in many stores. These are just suggestions: Zappos (only online), Amazon (only online), L.L.Bean, Dick's Sporting Goods, Walmart, Target, Old Navy, Gap Kids and Children's Place.

School hours

Your child can enter the school building between 8.20-8.25am. Ask your child's classroom teacher about the morning procedure and which entrance your child should use. The children can either be told to go straight inside or to use the colored 'waiting' spots outside their dedicated entrance. If the children are asked to use the colored spots, they will have to find an available spot and stand there until the teacher tells them they can go inside.

If your child is late, call phone number 617-559-9617. If your child is not feeling well and has to stay at home, or if your child will be out of school for other reasons, you should also call this number.

Dismissal is at 2.15pm on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and at 1pm on Wednesdays. Parents should wait outside the same door the children used for entrance in the morning (unless your child is taking the bus). Please be on time.

Please notice that the school hours will change after the summer break. We will update the handbook before the school year 2021-2022 begins.

Snow days

Days with heavy snow are called 'snow days', and the schools will be closed, delayed or have early dismissals. You will receive information about this from the school department.

Every snow day will be added as an extra school day at the end of the school year. Be aware of this if you have made plans right after the scheduled last school day. There can be a *maximum of five* snow days every school year (even though there actually might be more snow days).

Be aware in the winter it is not allowed to park cars and trucks on any street in Newton for more than one hour between 2am and 6am. This ban takes effect from December 1st through March 31st. Also remember it is required that homeowners clear their sidewalk (if they have any) within 24 hours of a storm's end.

The ELL program

The ELL children are receiving ELL lessons outside the classroom (pull out) and sometimes also some extra ELL help inside the classroom (push in). ELL lesson times vary depending on the English level as well as the grade level.

As students progress, the pull out lessons may decrease and perhaps more push in will occur. It is a fluid model that depends on the needs of the students.

The ELL lessons outside the classroom will be together with other ELL students, and this is a great opportunity for the children to listen to English at a slower pace. Also, in a smaller group it is easier for the children to speak up and practice their English skills.

Memorial-Spaulding has two wonderful and skilled ELL teachers, Ms. Alla Mantsur-Shane and Ms. Jaqueline Mahoney. Normally the children stay with the same ELL teacher through a school year.

Ms. Jaqueline Mahoney:

Speaks English and Russian.

Started working in Newton in 2006 as a 3rd grade classroom teacher. After about 9 years she decided that she really enjoyed working with ELL students and their families, so since 2015 she has been teaching ELL in Newton.

Ms. Alla Mantsur-Shane:

Speaks English and Russian.

Raised two bilingual and biliterate daughters. Has been teaching ELL at Memorial-Spaulding since 1999. She thinks that she has the best profession in the world!

PTO (Parent-Teacher Organization)

The PTO is made up of a group of parents who volunteer to support and help the school in many ways. The organization consists of the PTO board, several committees (working groups), and any parent who volunteers to be a part of the school community.

On the PTO board you find the executive board members, regular board members (usually chairpersons from the various committees), teacher representatives and the principal. There are board meetings every other month throughout the school year, and everybody is welcome to join and get the latest updates from the organization.

The committees work with different assignments depending on their focus (Mystery Dinner, International Festival, Book Fair, ELL, etc.). They arrange wonderful events throughout the year, stand behind different kinds of fundraising and are putting together activities for kids to join after school

(ASCA, After School Creative Arts). Each committee gets together several times a year depending on the assignments and the various time commitments.

At the end of every school year and in the fall, the PTO sends out signup sheets from the committees who are looking for more volunteers. You can always contact the PTO if you missed a signup sheet or have questions about how to get involved. Just send an email to <u>info@memorialspauldingpto.org</u>.

As a parent you can choose to be a part of any of the four levels of PTO:

An executive board member

There are positions as co-presidents, treasurer, secretary, fundraising coordinator, and technology liaisons. These are all two-year voluntary positions. The executive members have voting rights, meaning they decide as a group what events/programs to sponsor and how the monies are raised.

A member of a committee

Keep an eye out for the signup sheets. These are sent out in the PTO newsletters, through the room parents, and as Facebook posts. Being a committee member has no time limit.

Volunteering when the PTO is asking for help.

This can either be one-day assignments (cleaning outside the school, helping at the book fairs, and the list goes on) or one-year assignments (being a room parent).

Visitor/guest

Joining as a visitor/guest when PTO is inviting parents and children to social events and other fun activities.

Any kind of involvement in the PTO is a great opportunity for families to be a part of the school community and it is completely up to you to decide the level of participation. Join when and if you feel ready. Remember that family engagement actually promotes academic, social and emotional well-being of students.

The ELL Committee

The mission of the ELL Committee is to help new ELL families in the transition into a new and unfamiliar school system and making sure the families feel welcome and included in the school community. Improving the communication between ELL families, PTO and the school is one of our main goals. We are also here if ELL families need any help, need translation, would like to talk to another ELL parent, or would like to get a tour around the school (seen from the outside).

At Memorial-Spaulding it is also possible to be connected with a buddy family. A buddy family is a 'support family' with children at the school, and it can either be another ELL family or a non-ELL family. Having a buddy family can often be very helpful, especially in the first months after moving to a new country/community. They will be able to talk about how it is to live here, tell about the school, and they might also be able to answer some of the many questions new ELL families have. Getting to know someone with children at Memorial-Spaulding and maybe arranging a playdate for the kids can furthermore create a sense of belonging for both parents and children.

Please let us know if you are interested, and we will try to match you with a buddy family with children the same age as yours.

The ELL Committee is still very new, but we are trying to create a committee where we have representatives from the top five ELL language groups (Russian, Hebrew, Chinese, Japanese and Korean). Everybody else is of course more than welcome to join!! We are always looking for new

members, so please don't hesitate to send an email if you would like to become a member, be a buddy family, or if you just want to learn more about the committee.

Before you can volunteer

For the safety of the children, all parents who would like to volunteer at the school must complete a CORI form (Criminal Offender Record Information) and a SORI form (Sexual Offender Registry Information). Volunteer positions include library volunteers, room parents, PTO committee members and field trip chaperones. You don't need to fill out a CORI/SORI form to attend a PTO event as a guest, only if you volunteer to help at an event.

Please fill out the forms (see the link below) and bring them to the school office together with your passport or driver's license. It takes about one week for the process to be completed, so have this in mind if you want to volunteer for a specific event. As soon as your CORI/SORI-form is approved it will be valid for three years. It is recommended that parents fill out the forms at the beginning of the school year to ensure that they have an active Newton CORI/SORI on file in case they would like to volunteer or chaperone a field trip during the year. ELPAC (English Learners Parent Advisory Council)

Newton ELPAC consists of a group of volunteer ELL parents who work together with the Directors on the ELL program. It is a parent advisory council, and the mission is to help the integration process of English language learners into the Newton community. ELPAC creates a network of ELL families in Newton and a forum to share information. This is open for all ELL families with children attending Newton Public Schools.

There are ELPAC zoom meetings for ELL parents almost every month and the topics change every time. You can find information about this on <u>www.newtonelpac.org</u>. In the meetings, there's also time for the parents to ask questions, introduce each other and talk to each other. It is always nice to meet other ELL families!

ELPAC offers translators during the meetings - you just need to request this when you register your name before a meeting.

Camps and classes

Summer camps are supervised programs for children or teenagers conducted during the summer months and these camps offer a wide variety of activities. Some camps are dedicated to a certain field (e.g., sports, drama, computer programming, science, or music), while other camps may offer a little bit of everything. The duration of the camps varies from one to seven weeks and can be either half day or full day.

Camps are the perfect way for kids to meet and interact with others their own age during the summer vacation. Also, the kids will learn new skills and get knowledge that will help them grow. And one last thing - if you are working all summer, you won't have to worry about childcare.

Remember to ask your child what they think before you sign them up. Summer camp is only fun if they want to go.

Enrichment classes are after-school or weekend activities designed to give the children the opportunity to try new things and explore and develop interests outside of the classroom. It is often one-hour lessons and typically once or twice a week. When you sign your child up for a class, it will usually be for a couple of months (classes are often seasonal). Classes can be a great opportunity for your child to try out new things before deciding to sign up for a summer camp.

There is a huge selection of possibilities when it comes to camps and classes. The list is long but here are some suggestions to start out with.

- S.P.A.C.E. Camp is a four-week summer enrichment program run by the Newton Public Schools. Students entering kindergarten through 9th grade are eligible to attend. <u>https://www.newton.k12.ma.us/spacecamp</u>
