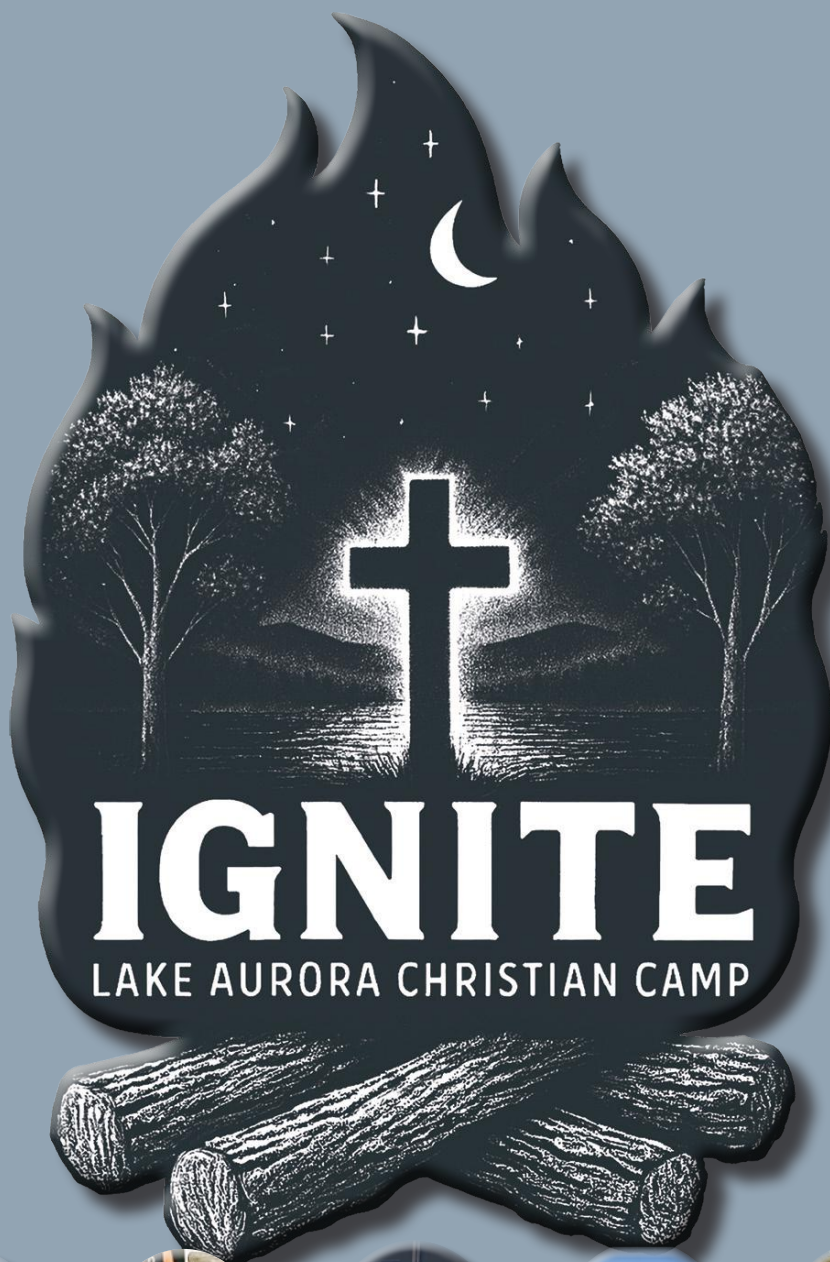




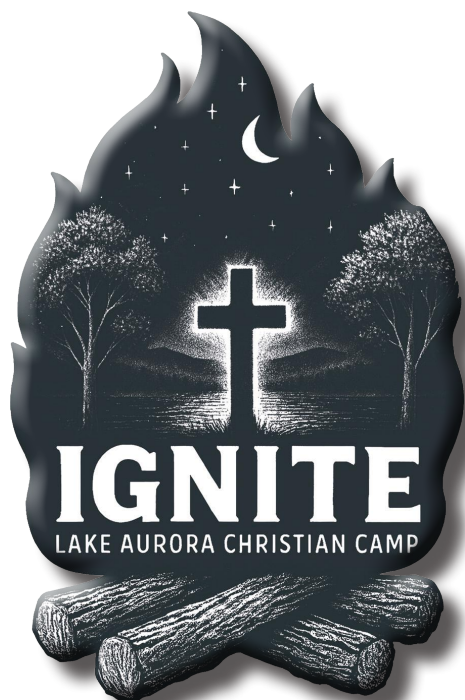

LAKE-SIDE CAMPUS

Located on the south side of campus accommodating up to 144 campers per session with counselor group size of 7-8 campers. Housing is in lake-view, dorm-style cabins with bunk beds, A/C and adjacent bathroom. Meals are served in the dining hall in the center of campus.

HILL-SIDE CAMPUS

Located on the north side of our campus and housed in four cabins that include bunk beds, A/C and adjacent bathroom. This program can accommodate up to 64 campers per session with counselor groups of 7-8 campers. Meals are served in the dining hall in the center of campus.

This is a larger version of the regular camp programs utilizing both campuses for housing the same age group and using the Oak Hammock as their worship space. Accommodate 215 campers per session while using the 7-8 campers per counselor group.

Servant Leadership! Developed for those who want to put their faith in action. These programs take Jesus' servant leader concepts and apply them to life, preparing true servant-leaders for Christ in His church. Big M.A.C. (Maturing As Christians), WHOLE camp, Aquatics Training, and Alpha programs challenge campers to discover the gifts God has given them to serve others. They focus on personal management and service skills which should help give the participant an edge in future life. Everyone in these programs learns to function as a team through a series of work, study, and play activities.

There is an **application process for Big MAC WHOLE, and Alpha** to help determine if a camper is ready for each program. Applications will be sent after the registration is received in the camp office with payment. Space is limited and the programs fill quickly. The Aquatics program has physical and age prerequisites from the Red Cross that campers need to meet at the start of the camp.

Should a camper not be accepted into a program, the fees can be applied to another program or refunded. Start the process with a download paper form or online "Alpha Application Request,"

Red Cross Lifeguard \$470

You will be trained for leadership at the waterfront through Red Cross lifeguard training. Encounter Christ-like staff, specific waterfront training and inspiring small groups. Specifically for those considering earning lifeguard certification.

Requirements: Participants must be 15 years old by 5/31/26 and successfully complete a pre-course session of: a). Swim 500 yds continuously using breast stroke, crawl, & sidestroke. b). Tread water for 2 min. using legs only. c). Submerge to a depth of 7 ft, retrieve a 10 lb brick & return to surface. d). Swim 25 yds from shallow to deep, retrieve 10 lb brick, return to shallow end. RED CROSS online classes and tests must be completed prior to arrival on campus. Two year certification as Lifeguarding + Waterfront including First-Aid & CPR.

ALPHA PROGRAM

Intern in vital support positions (kitchen help, dishwasher, assistants, grounds work) for summer camp in two week sessions. Limited to 12 campers per session. These are intense leadership development programs designed to instill in the participants the servant leader principles taught by Jesus. They will focus on time management and service skills which should help to give the participant an edge in future life. Everyone in these programs learns to function as a team through a series of work, study, and play activities.

To start the application process, select "Alpha Application Request" online or download paper registration. Each session is for two weeks and earns the participant a camp scholarship for one week of camp. Highly recommended for campers to experience a Big MAC session prior to Alpha. Indicate a 1st and 2nd choice of sessions. Programs fill quickly.

A: June 7-19

B: June 21-July 1*

C: July 5-17

D: July 19-31

*Alpha B is a shortened session and earned scholarship is reduced.



Dear Parents,

Thank you for considering sending your child to a Christian camp, and particularly to Lake Aurora. Since you are taking into account our programs, we want to help you understand who we are and how we operate.

Lake Aurora is owned and operated by non-denominational Christian churches in central Florida. These churches furnish over 400 volunteers each summer to staff our programs. Lake Aurora also has a year-round professional staff who trains and orchestrates these volunteer workers. Our counselors and staff use a variety of methods to communicate spiritual truths including devotions, skits, teachable moments, interactive Bible studies, exploration of age appropriate social issues and campfires.

The health and safety of your child is important to us and we work hard to make our campus and programs safe. We make every effort to meet or exceed state and industry standards. Obviously there is always the chance for injury or illness to occur, so we do our best to be prepared for emergencies. Since camp is a community setting, we ask that you monitor your camper's health prior to attending to reduce the spread of any contagious variant.

We are a camp who specializes in teaching Christian values and concepts. Thus, it is not unusual for campers to become motivated to make life decisions while at camp — often it is the decision to embrace Christianity. We do not promote any denomination, but counsel straight from the Bible.

Being a Christian camp does not mean that only Christians can attend. It does mean that Christian values are taught here, and that we are connected strongly with church programming. Lake Aurora attempts to blend the goals of the church, the parents, and the child into a unified program. We provide Bible based study and worship, we help the child discover appropriate responses to many social and family issues, and we provide an atmosphere of controlled fun.

Our fees are based on our actual costs — we are a not-for-profit ministry. Available through our supporting churches are “Aurora Bucks” (discounts) on select camp programs. The camp office can direct you to the church nearest you. Other scholarship programs may also be available from most churches. We do not want any camper to miss camp for financial reasons, so if you have need of financial assistance please call for a Lake Aurora Campership Application.

Most children have wonderful experiences at camp. That is our goal for your child. Thanks for giving us the chance to partner with you to provide your child with a fun, safe, and experiential learning adventure.

To create the most rewarding

ATMOSPHERE

for everyone at camp, the following criteria listed below, will be expected from each camper...

Attitude ~ Christian conduct and character is expected at all times.

Time ~ You will be expected to follow the schedule.

Missing ~ You will not be permitted to leave the grounds except for scheduled excursions.

On & Off ~ Your clothing should be of a modest nature. The standards of the world are not the standards of Lake Aurora. This especially includes swimsuits. If clothing is inappropriate or immodest, you may be asked to change.

Sickness ~ All sickness and accidents must be reported to your counselor or infirmary promptly. Lake Aurora has a modest accident insurance policy covering each camper.

Promotion ~ Shirts and clothing promoting alcohol/tobacco products, suggestive statements, grotesque scenes, or graphics not consistent with a Christian environment may not be worn or displayed. This includes vehicles.

Healthy ~ Tobacco, alcoholic beverages, and illegal items & other such products are not permitted.

Education & Electronics ~ To maximize the camper experience -- DO NOT BRING cell phones, handheld gaming devices, WiFi enabled devices including, smart watches, ipods, tablets, etc. Prank related items are not allowed.

Rights ~ While at camp your rights will be determined by The Golden Rule of Christ. Christianity is and always has been a religion that was based on one "denying ones self". This principle will affect what you say, what you do, what is expected of you, & what you can expect from others.

Emergency ~ For the benefit of the camper, telephone usage will be for emergency use only. Campers should plan to communicate with their parents & friends by writing.

Do not bring cell phones. If brought, they will be stored in the Director's possession for the duration of the program.



WHAT TO BRING...

Registrations will be confirmed by email from the camp.

Helpful links on our website:

Click on Summer Camp and select from the top menu bar for these options:

- **What to bring link** will have packing list and **Check in brochures** to guide you through check in day and check out procedures.
- **The Prepared Parent link** will answer a lot of questions about camp life.
- **Healthy Camp** to help prepare healthwise.

Items coming to camp that are not permissible may be "held" by the camp staff until the end of the program for safe keeping. *Cell phones are NOT permitted for campers.*

Values from the perspective of a Christian are taught and practiced here. Therefore, in swimming, *if* modesty is questioned, a dark colored t-shirt should be worn over the swimsuit. At all other times, clothing of both males and females should remain modest and decent. If clothing is inappropriate, the camper may be asked to change. Remember, the standards of the world are not the standards at Lake Aurora. Review the "criteria" for camp atmosphere to the left.

WATER SAFETY...

Whenever swimming and boating activities are open, certified lifeguards are on duty. Boaters must wear U.S. Coast Guard approved life jackets (provided). Personal safety and the proper use of the equipment is emphasized at all times. Power boat water sports adhere to industry wide safety standards.

As a progression of activities available to campers, the "Blob"& "Banana" are options for 4th grade and up. The youngest camp programs experiencing these water sports begin where 4th graders are the youngest campers in the program.



REGISTRATION TIPS

Camps are for the grade ENTERING in the fall of 2026. Correct grade group is required.

Fast and Easy Online Registration:

- **Previous Camper parents:** If you forgot your username and password, follow online instructions or contact info@lakeaurora.org.
- Have all necessary payment and medical information readily accessible before starting.
- Deposit is required to reserve a space. You may log in and continue to make payments prior to camp.
- **2026** - Church group reservation available for most Lakeside programs. A church pays a deposit on the number of spaces needed. A link is sent to families to complete information. Church responsible for tuition. ***Anonymous group registrations are canceled on May 1*** with forfeit of deposit on each canceled registration.

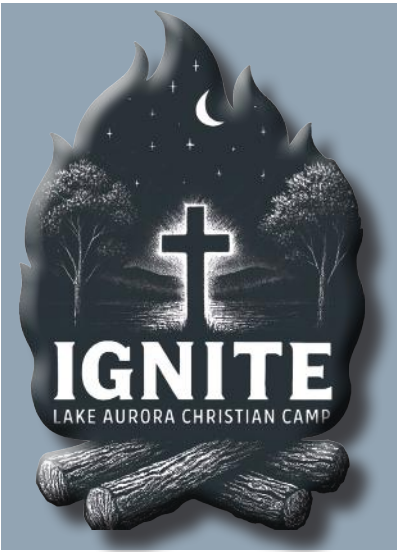


Express Check-in... Camp fee paid in full **3 days prior to check in**. Express Check-in campers go straight to housing assignment area. Campers with any "balance due" must check-in at the Ministry Center Office prior to getting in line for housing assignment.

Please register camper for grade entering in the Fall.

Camp Codes: letter stands for the campus and numbers indicate grade entering. (L123 - Lakeside 1st, 2nd, 3rd grade)

A deposit (portion of total fee) must accompany registration. "Aurora Buck" discount coupon may not be used as a deposit. Outstanding balance is due at check-in. **Deposits are not transferable or refundable unless a waitlist.** All but the deposit is refundable if requested two weeks in advance. Exceptions include illness or symptoms that develop up to three days prior to camp program. Please, no sick campers at check in.



OUR GOAL...

To make the camper aware that their whole life is lived before God, giving them biblical principles and a chance to practice them in a safe environment.

OPEN ADMISSION...

Acceptance and participation in the Lake Aurora programs are the same for everyone without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, or handicap.

IMPORTANT POINTS...

Register Early!

Many camps fill quickly. We encourage you to register early and online. Registrations cannot be taken over the phone and a deposit is needed to reserve a "spot".

If finances are an issue, please initially contact your local church for available assistance through an 'Aurora Buck' and/or camper scholarship. "Aurora Bucks" are not limited to church members but are encouraged for free distribution to community. Lake Aurora has limited assistance available through Campership applications "Scholarship Fund". Contact our Campership Coordinator at 863.696.1102 or info@lakeaurora.org.

Pre-Ordered T-shirts...

Purchase the 2026 camp shirt for \$15 with your registration until June 1. Available in the camp store as supplies last. Pick up ordered camp shirt on check-in day. Please label shirts immediately upon pick up. We can not replace lost shirts..

Group Photos...

Purchase an 8x10 photo of the entire group program your camper attends. Includes campers and counselors for their program. \$6 a photo.

Prepayment of optional items are for your convenience. They are also available for purchase at check in and check out while supplies last. **Camp shirt is available for pre-sale until June 1.** Color is Heather Blue Lagoon.

Hillside and Lakeside fees include a \$5 'Store Card' EXCEPT when using Group Registration.. See "Prepared Parent" online for more details.

⇒ Waiting lists are based on the date that registrations are received in the CAMP office whether by mail or online.

⇒ "Walk-ons" may not be accepted due to full programs! **PLEASE -- Do not bring a "walk-on" camper to check-in.**

⇒ Confirmations by email.. Check in day information available online. Special at home health pre-screening requested.

⇒ **CHECK OUT TIMES vary. See program time frames.**

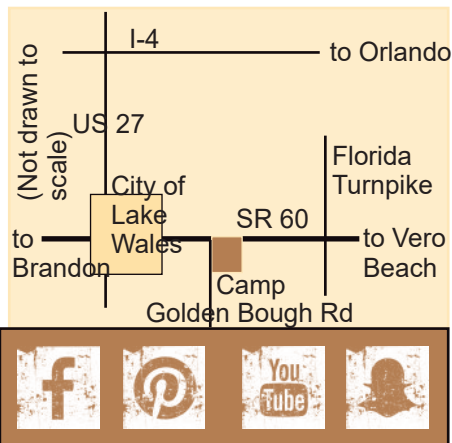
