## REDBUD UN-NATIONAL

With No Lucas Oil Motocross National Championship round (yet), it would have been easy for RedBud MX to pout and throw in the towel. But amateur MX is the grass roots of the Lucas Oil Motocross Championship series, and an honored part of every national event at RedBud. Look in the crowd every July 4th weekend and you'll find amateur riders from every decade since the 70s. So what did they do on this July 4th without the big pro trucks and the best riders on the planet? They raced!

The pits were full of riders and the track was as hot as the temps when well over 1000 amateur contestants made RedBud their home for the holiday weekend. Friday was a full on practice day giving everyone plenty of track time. Saturday's race action was strong on both the KTM mini and main track.

125 B/C is always a fun class to watch. The young guns coming through the ranks, the sweet sound of 125 twostrokes singing and Saturday's racing didn't disappoint. In Moto One, Christopher Schroeder showed the field the way around turn one and across the strip on lap one, but bad luck would end Schroeder's moto just a lap later. Dominic Felty took over the top spot but was under heavy pressure from both Sidney Wagner and Andrew Tobias. Felty dropped his KTM briefly, and that was all Wagner needed to seal the deal and take the win. Tobias was next to cross the line, and the ever-improving Jace Sayban locked up third with Felty and Jacob Struble rounding out the top five. In Moto Two it was all Felty (4-1), who jumped out of the gate with the lead and never looked back. Wagner (1-2) knew a second place finish would nail down the overall and she put her School of Braaap Husky on cruise control. Tobias (2-3), Sayban (3-4), and Struble (5-7) filled out the top five overall.

Blake "Locks of Lighting" Hazen dominated the 250B and Open B classes, capturing four wins in four tries on Saturday and leading every lap start to finish in both classes. Clayton Servaty (2-2) was the runner up in the 250B class with Zennon Shain (3-3), Dylan Duclos (4-4), and Tristan Gelske (5-5) rounding out the top five in the 250B class. With the top five riders coming from five different states, it definitely added to the National feel of the event!

Hazen's (1-1) victims in the Open B class were once again Clayton Servaty (2-2) on his 250 Yamaha, Suzuki mounted Mic Hartuniewicz (3-3), and Yamaha mounted pilots Max Powers (4-4) and Kaden Clark (5-5) in the top five spots.

Sunday's feature race was the Championship Powersports backed Open Pro-Am class where 53 rider lined up at a shot at the \$2000 put up by Championship on top of RedBud's Pro-Am payback. RJ Schroyer, just off an injury but riding well, pulled everyone around the first turn and led the field for two laps of Division 1. Josh Osby was piloting a borrowed Husky and looking strong in spite of an ACL repair. He overtook Schroyer on lap three and led the field to the checkers. Jeff Walker started outside the top five and by the end made his way up to second, with Schroyer, Steve Hooker and Matt Carpenter rounding out the top five. Division Two was controlled from the gate drop to the checkers as Eagle, Michigan rider Jace Kesler laid down 6 fast laps and was never challenged. Michael Hicks, Travis Sewell, Broc Peterson and Jeremy Hand all chased after Kessler to no avail. Hand was the showman of the bunch and uncorked Larocco's Leap to move past Sewell on lap three, one of the only riders on the day to make the famous jump work for him. Hand crossed the finish line in second with Sewell, Hicks and Peterson in tow.

With the line up set for the Open Pro-Am final, a great race for the overall was on. Kessler left little doubt who was the man as the #51 Husky rounded Turn One on the back wheel, throttle to the stops and never looked back leading the moto from start to finish. Osby would match Kessler's lap times and finish a solid second, but never could make a dent in his advantage. Hand was the last man on the podium, about a second off the pace and fighting off advances from Sewell, who finished fourth after a near miss in the fourth lap derailed his charge. Jeff Walker was fifth all moto long, but a miscue on the final lap allowed Hicks to capitalize and round out the top five. Hicks charged through the pack after a start well outside the top 10. Walker was sixth with Matt Carpenter, Jerry Lorenz, Chris Prebula and Denver Rigsby locking in the top ten, respectively.

It was great to see the "Wobbler" class this weekend full of new riders to this sport we love. The Wobbler class was the brain child of Dutch Sport Park

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

• Woo hoo, we're going racing! Congrats to the Big Air crew for breaking through the crust and holding the first D14 MX race, and now we're a couple spring enduros in, the FES series has fired up, the full enduro series will be running by the time you read this ... all good things if you're a racer.

• The GNCC series is actually headed into its summer break, just as the American Flat Track (AFT) series is set to begin its 2020 series at a new venue in Florida, and MotoGP takes to the track in the new future as well. American professional road racing is also up and running.

• What is not certain is when the Lucas Oil Pro Motocross Nationals will actually see a gate drop. The plan had been to start in Indiana in July because of Michigan's Covid-19 craziness, but even the Crawfordsville date, as well as the subsequent Florida dates were pushed. I don't see how the Nationals can hope to have a full season with a hard end date mandated.

• Josh Toth was oh-so-close to taking the first XC1 victory of his 2020 season at the recent High Voltage GNCC race, but inexplicably Kailub Russell was able to pass him on the last lap with a silt-damaged engine that had lost all power and was puking smoke. Strange, I know.

• Many thanks to the four-stroke rider on row 24 or 25 at the season-opening Muddobbers family enduro who was running the scented fuel. I love the smell of cherries (or was that strawberries) and it made the trail easier to read ...

• It's new bike season people! Kawasaki rolled out their revised motocross lineup recently and also dropped an XC line on the unprepared off-road masses. On the MX side, the biggest news is a diaphragm spring clutch on both the 250 and 450 thumpers, and the fact that the smaller bikes join the e-start and hydraulic clutch ranks. The XC bikes get glideplates, 18" rear wheels, Dunlop AT81 tires, and different brake pads, as well as purpose-built suspension and engine calibrations to set themselves apart from the moto bikes.

• Most of Yamaha's 2020 development effort had been focused on the YZ450F, so in 2021 the 250F get's the lion's share of the changes, basically catching it up to the 450. On the off-road side, the 450FX gets the work this year ... you can bet the 250 will next year. The 125X and 250X offroaders are back with no changes. For the first time the alternate color choice is the balck-and-blue with green claw Monster motif.

• The biggest positive news from Sherco is counter-balanced 250 and 300 2T off-roaders.

• The MotoGP season is almost started and the riding future of legend Valentino Rossi is still up in the air. It's expected that he will be Petronas Yamaha mounted, but nothing is set in stone.

• Harley Davidson is gearing up for their strongest attack on the Indian FTR750 juggernaut in the AFT series, and they are not alone. Yamaha-mounted Estenson Racing teammates are also looking to challenge Briar Bauman for the crown.

• Husqvarna has formally terminated its relationship with Bobby Hewitt and his HRH team, although few had seen Hewitt around the SX team following Daytona earlier this year. Apparently, his absence didn't detract from the performance of the guys he had groomed over the years – Zach Osborne, Jason Anderson, and Dean Wilson filled the podium at the last race in Salt Lake City earlier this year.

• Doesn't it seem like months or even years ago that they raced the sevenround Salt Lake City supercross wrap-up? 2020 has been just so bizarre.

• Speaking of bizarre, if you haven't been following the moto scene for at least 40 years, you may think Beta's RX300 motocrosser is completely without precedent – it's not. Nevertheless, the Italian company, or more properly the American arm of Beta, has released a limited-run purpose built moto bike. Some features are shared with the revamped off-road bikes, but the 19" rear wheel, cylinder porting, carburetor, frame, and suspension travel are new. Call us if this even slightly piques your interest.

• Get back out there people, be it on the track, trail, or street – this is what we've all been waiting for!

owner and RedBud gate man Drex Akin. It was a class built for new 50cc riders to get comfortable on their bikes and the tracks before moving into the points classes. Back on the KTM Mini track, 15 Wobblers began their journey on this fine day. Cruz Powers (1-3) got the win in moto one followed closely by Colton Pattengale (2-3) with Corbin Blair (3-1) while Mason Alshouse (4-4) and Haily Phend (5-5) rounded out the top five.

In moto two Blair took the top spot, giving the Niles, Michigan rider the day's biggest trophy and overall win. Eli Aldana (7-2) recovered in moto two and finished a solid second after a couple of first moto, you guessed it, "wobbles"! That landed Aldana in fourth overall for his efforts. Pattengale was third in moto two locking in second overall. Alshouse was once again fourth in moto two with a consistent ride, just like Ms. Phend in fifth. Rounding out the podium overall was Powers, who combined his first moto win with a rough and tumble sixth in moto two. Word in the pits is that the after the races pool party at the Powers / Big Air compound was off the hook on this hot race weekend!

Dozens of racers left the trophy window with loot from 100% and Thor MX, and the top Pro-Ams took home a nice paycheck thanks to Championship Powersports. Thanks to all the riders and families who spent their weekend at RedBud. From the the Wobblers to the huge Sunday Pro-Am classes, the racing was fantastic. Part of the July 4th tradition may have broken, but the grass roots remain strong.

ATVs will overtake RedBud for the ATV National MX Series July 25th and 26th, when the District 14 racers can enter all the classes they can hold on for,

Several other firsts took place, as children of various ages raced in their first competition, families took their first trip to Frederic MI, and riders battled an immense amount of true MI sugar sand for the first time in their racing careers.

The Fredneck Ranch has a lot of long term goals up their sleeves. The facility began so riders would have another option for training, in an industry where we constantly chase around the state for seat time. The property is scoped to become a training facility. One in which riders will be able to stay for lengths of time they desire, train with staff on site, hook to amenities as desired, and optimize their seat time.




