A rich history and a bright future Our next chapter begins

Transformation has been a constant for Bethesda and our field

It all started in 1903 – a donation of 40 acres of land nestled along the Rock River in Watertown, Wisconsin. A year later, the organization that came to be known as Bethesda came to be.

What a wonderful journey it has been these past 117 years. From a rural enclave in the Midwest, and then expanding nationally, we have lived our mission, to enhance the lives of people through services that share the good news of Jesus Christ.

And this journey continues. While many may reflect on the Bethesda of the past as constant and unchanging, the truth is we have transformed many times over the years, to better meet the needs of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Many of you will remember the large campus and facility in Watertown, where we cared for hundreds at a time and thousands over the years.



Through the Years: A Timeline from Bethesda to AbleLight

1903 1904 1923 1940s 1960s

40 acres of land along the Rock River in Watertown, Wisconsin, were donated to Bethesda. Bethesda was founded as The Society for the Training and Care of the Feebleminded and Epileptic in Watertown, Wisconsin, by concerned Lutherans, and opened its doors to five people. The school focused on Christ-centered training and Lutheran education while providing people with a loving, supportive home. The school adopted the name Bethesda, taken from John 5:2-9 and meaning "House of Mercy." Bethesda entered a period of expansion, which began with renovations to campus buildings in Watertown, Wisconsin. The first Bethesda thrift store started in Watertown. "We were known across the nation as the place Lutherans would send their loved ones who couldn't care for themselves," said Dave Sneddon, Interim President and CEO. "But over time. expectations of people with disabilities and their families changed, and Bethesda needed to change as well."

Like most providers of services to people with disabilities, we began to accept Medicaid funding as a way to fund the cost of providing quality support.







Over time, we adopted a group home model that created more opportunity for independence and real connection to communities, and we closed the Watertown residential campus when it could no longer be sustained.

Today, we're approaching the future with open arms, and bringing new friends into the mission.

We continue to embrace our Lutheran family, and cherish our role as a Registered Service Organization of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, but are expanding our circle to include even more people.



The potential upside is incredible

We can move from around 2,000 people in homes and traditional services and a small (but fiercely loyal) supporter base to transforming the lives of more than 7 million Americans with disabilities through innovation, embracing all, and a business-minded approach driven by Christian love. What a time of promise for people with disabilities!

Bethesda started occupational therapy, speech therapy and physical therapy departments.

Bethesda began expanding its services across the United States.

Turnaround needed, with the organization losing millions a year, on track to go out of business within 2-3 years.

After careful consideration, decision made to change our name to AbleLight, reflecting a commitment to our mission and urgent need to impact millions of Americans with disabilities.



We listened, learned and created an identity as unique as the people we serve.

The name "Bethesda" has served this organization well for nearly a century. You may recall days gone by in which most Lutheran church congregants would have an instant idea of what Bethesda is and who it serves, by name alone. "Bethesda Sundays" were commonplace.

Yet as we looked at where we are today and where we need to go tomorrow, a few things became clear. Many people outside the Lutheran faithful didn't know what Bethesda was – there are other "Bethesda" organizations out there, including churches, a city in Maryland, and a computer gaming company.

So much confusion! In fact, in the communities where we provide services there are more than 575 organizations that carry the name Bethesda!

To discern our path forward, we needed to consider the views of a variety of important stakeholders, including:

- Present and future people supported, and their families
- Our employees
- Our current and prospective donors



"Over the course of the last year, we connected with hundreds of individuals in these categories and asked what was important to them," said Cindy Moon-Mogush, Chief Marketing and Communications Officer. "For our longtime donors, a connection to faith was paramount. For donors we hope to join us in the future, making progress toward supporting the whole person was at the top."

Balancing these valuable perspectives as our starting point, we undertook a thorough and thoughtful process to determine our new name and how we communicate more effectively.

We considered our history and our plans for the future. From there, we identified and vetted a new name - AbleLight - from more than 1,000 choices. With approval of the Board of Directors, we moved forward with a rebranding process in earnest this past summer.



Our logo: Celebrating past and present

At first glance, the logo AbleLight certainly appears different than the Bethesda logo, yet there is continuity with our past – by design.

In particular, take a close look at the figure of a person surrounded by light.



This works in two ways. First, it represents the services we provide that embrace the "whole person," not just meeting some of their needs, but surrounding them with loving care.

Second, you may also notice that the light surrounding the figure recalls many images of Jesus that have been created for hundreds of years. In this way, we proudly reaffirm our Christian roots and mission.

Not changing quite yet

While we will soon be AbleLight, we are not there yet. The legal name change will take place in January, and there is a lot of work for our team to complete before that happens. Until then you'll begin seeing our name pop up in a few places, including our website and social media channels.



As our name changes, it's important to reflect on what's not changing. We are here to serve the disability community through our Christian mission.



We are the same people serving the same needs. While we will look and feel a bit different going forward, the mission continues, stronger than ever!



Coming full circle: Care that serves the whole person

While we may be changing our name, do you know the names we're really excited about? Emma. Paul. Chris. These are among the people we support in new and exciting ways. With the help of our team and our generous donors, we will be able to do much more for many more in the near future.

As we considered the needs and how we would be able to address them, we landed on five "impact areas" where we felt we could encircle a person with loving care.

Safe and Loving Homes

A great life starts with a great home. We offer a variety of housing options to meet every need, including group homes, supported living and host home arrangements.



Just ask Chris, who has a mild intellectual disability and lives in a host home in Colorado. With the love and support of his host home family, Chris stays on track with his personal care, money management and taking his medications. Because of his safe home, Chris can hold down a job and live more independently, pursuing his love of video games and sports. Most importantly, he is loved.

Our latest innovation in homes is Cornerstone Village, a first-of-its-kind residential community uniting individuals with disabilities with people of all abilities in a loving, welcoming environment. Housing options such as these help people live as independently as possible while maintaining a meaningful connection to their community.

Financial Security

Managing money can be stressful for anyone, but for a person with a disability and their family, it can be daunting. We provide one-on-one consultation and support to help people



navigate the complex world of benefits and achieve their financial goals. This includes rep payee services, Medicaid redeterminations, Social Security reporting and ABLE account support and training. We are working on even more helpful tools and support in this area.

Independence and Wellbeing

We make it possible to achieve joy in daily living. As just one example, through our emerging Behavior Supports area, we provide individualized



treatment plans for people with disabilities and their families to promote positive behavior change. This has made a world of difference in helping people achieve their life goals.

Our one-on-one support guides the transition from school-based services to independent living, and from adult living skills to on-the-job support. Take Emma, who lives at Cornerstone Village in Minnesota. She receives one-on-one support with her job, and is adding on supported living services to help her complete day to day tasks. She is thriving!

>> Expanding our college reach

For young people leaving high school, AbleLight College builds life and work skills in young adults, getting them ready to dream big and accomplish more. Today there is a campus at Concordia University Wisconsin, and we are excited to announce a second campus opening at Concordia University Ann Arbor in Michigan, planned for next fall!



Innovation and Technology

We innovate for good, researching and developing new technology to improve all aspects of life for people with disabilities, and we provide



customized solutions to meet individual needs. Assistive smart home technology is deployed in a growing number of our homes, including Cornerstone Village, promoting safety, security and independence.


>> Our bustling technology hub

Q. Why are you changing Bethesda's name to AbleLight?

A. "Bethesda" has definitely served us well over the years, as we have supported people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and delivered upon our Christian mission. But, in our research, we found it also presented limitations as we've worked to expand our reach and impact the whole nation. More than 7 million Americans with a disability need our help! AbleLight will build upon our treasured history and positions us well for a transformational future.

Q. When will the name change?

A. Our name will legally change in January 2022. However, between now and then we'll begin introducing the name. You'll see it on our website and social media channels, in addition to the pages of the Messenger.

Q. Have you been acquired by another organization?

A. No, we continue to be our own organization, independently charting a brighter future for people with disabilities.

Q. Are you still a Christian organization?

A. Absolutely. We continue to be guided by our Christian mission. We welcome, serve and love every person. We are proud to continue to be a Registered Service Organization of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. We cherish the opportunity to improve lives and humbly accept our responsibility to lead by example iust as Christ would.
