

"Cycling gives you a sense of freedom," Henley cyclist, Matt Richardson, told children at Sonning Common Primary School. "You can't beat the feeling of going fast in the open air, particularly on the flat or down hills. It's like flying".

Matt Richardson inspired children to sign up for this year's On Your Bike, which is on Sunday 2nd April, with stories of pedalling his 1975 Raleigh Chopper bike up mountains, often overtaking cyclists who were much better equipped.

Matt also set a World Hour Record on his vintage chopper and his escapades have helped raise thousands of pounds to fight blood cancer.

"If you're worried about the distance," Matt told the children, "Don't ride too

fast at the beginning. Don't worry about how fast everyone else is going. The ride is about what you yourself can achieve."

Claire Burnett, a senior staff nurse in the Emergency Dept at the Royal Berkshire Hospital, is a former pupil at the school and told everyone she'd cycled On Your Bike with her family at least 8 times. She urged the children to wear helmets.

100% of all entry fees and monies raised in 2017 will be shared between Sonning Common Primary School, Sue Ryder and the Emergency Department at the Royal Berks. •

# WHAT MAKES A VILLAGE?


Preparations are in full swing for Sonning Common Magazines' first-ever village talk to be held on Thursday 27 April in the village hall.

Two of the school staff Mrs Rae (IT technician) and Dr Loader (teacher) organised the evening and thanked the audience for turning out, and especially the young panel.

# THOSE WERE THE DAYS

I have been asked to write my memories of the time I ran the Sonning Common Youth Club in the early 1960's.

It started when a group of local people in the village advertised for someone to run a youth club and for better or worse, I volunteered. I was rather apprehensive as to how these young people and I would get on together. But I had no problems, they were a super crowd.

What happened in the early days of the club ie. 55 plus years ago is a bit beyond me, so I shall write what I think is relevant.

We used to meet Mondays and Fridays at Kidmore End Memorial hall and with a membership of close to 100 (I was told it was too many) but we got by.

When the club was established we got involved in endless activities, ranging from various sporting competitions, where we did rather well, to talks, films and demonstrations. Probably the most

prominent speaker was Sir John Hunt the first man to climb Everest. The hall was overflowing that evening.

We had a plentiful supply of Rock N Roll, three groups I remember 'The Trends' (local) 'The Raiders' and 'The Wild Ones'. Does anyone remember them? These dances went well – no trouble. There was a snooker table in the hall in those days which was quite well used.

The Youth group twice entered decorated floats at Gala days in Henley, people dressed up, although we did not win anything but it was fun. One year some of the members went on holiday abroad. Another year a group of young people from Norway stayed with families in the village including some of the club members.

I think that brings an end to my memories, although a little vague. Many thanks to those who helped and supported me in those early years.

The success, really has gone from strength to strength!

Sales tables were later introduced in order to raise funds for local community projects with items available such as costume jewellery, paperback books, craft items, and hand-crafted greetings cards, all at very reasonable prices. Greenshoots (Ways & Means Trust) from Peppard also support us by having their own sales table of produce such as seasonal vegetables, plants, jams etc.

The Village Coffee Mornings are usually held on the first Wednesday of the month from 10.30 – 12.00. The next one will be on Wednesday 5 April. Future dates are publicised on village noticeboards and in this magazine's diary page. We hope to see many of you at our next event, where you will receive a very warm welcome. Thank you all so much for your continued

support, which is very much appreciated by us and the community. •

#### What are your ties to the area?

"I was born in Emmer Green and lived in Caversham my entire life until we moved to Peppard six months ago.

"I went to Chiltern Edge and over the years I've been involved with Rotherfield Peppard and Kidmore End Football clubs.

"My parents, Anne and Frank Morris (now deceased), lived in Sonning Common, near Kennylands Gym for decades. My mother Anne was involved with village

Green Gym and my father Frank was treasurer for the local charity FISH.

"My in-laws also live in Sonning Common. So I definitely consider myself a local."

#### How have you seen the village change over the decades?

"For many years there wasn't really much change in and around Sonning Common, but I think now it's hitting a turning point because the pressure seems to be all on development.

"Village life is what you make of it, and it certainly exists, not just in Sonning Common, but in Kidmore End, Peppard and Gallowstree Common.

"They're lovely little places, but things could change with the pressure to develop. If we're not careful we'll end up like Reading South where villages have

been lost, absorbed into one urban mass."

#### **Favourite spot in Sonning Common?**

"Probably the duck pond. I like that it's not on the main road. And I have fond memories of days spent on Millennium Green where we used to play an annual family game of rounders."

#### What's your view on the recent bid to create a so-called 'super council' that would cover all of Oxfordshire?

"I think it's a double-edged sword. You need to cut costs but if it becomes very Oxford-centric we'll start to come more under the sphere of Reading because Oxford is 20 miles away and Reading is three. I'm happy for them to combine services but local representation will be key."

## 20 RACES, 200 MILES TO SUPPORT DAISY'S DREAM

Over the coming months I have set myself the mammoth task of running over 200 miles in 20 half-marathons and 10k runs to raise money for the charity Daisy's Dream. I live in **Gallowstree Common.** 

For someone who has only ever entered one race before I am aware that this is a huge undertaking - a couple of years ago I could never have imagined myself in this position. I always enjoyed sport when I was younger but I would always dread even running round the pitch to warm up and my exercising certainly dwindled after my school days. This all changed however, when I downloaded a run-tracking app on my phone and went out jogging last summer. Instantly, my competitive spirit was awoken; every

run I was determined to beat the target I had set myself on my previous run. This culminated in October last year when I proudly ran my first race, a halfmarathon in 1hr45mins.

I hope that the challenge I have set myself encourages others to donate to a brilliant charity and helps Daisy's Dream to meet their increasing demand. I am currently training five times a week to ensure I am in good condition to complete the challenge ahead. The headline figure of the 200 miles I am running in races, only scratches the surface once I account for the miles I am running and cycling in training. I am very grateful for all the support I have received so far, and it certainly helps my motivation and makes the difficulty of

my task incredibly rewarding.



# ANDREW BURNETT A VERY SPECIAL DOCTOR WHO WILL BE MISSED!

Modesty is the first striking quality which shines through any conversation held with Dr Burnett. When asked about the changes he has seen in the Health Centre over the years while he has been in charge, he claims there are very few things that he has worked on his own. "It is a team and so I cannot take individual glory." In 1985 he took over the practice from Dr Hemphill which was already very innovative with revolutionary ideas such as working as a team with community nurses and training GPs. So, it was good environment to start in and he thinks it probably took 5 years to really understand the practice to get under its skin and begin to think out of the box in a creative way. He is very proud of the of the young GPs he has trained and who have moved onto practices in Henley, Goring and Nettlebed.

He has taken responsibility for the two major developments of the premises, transforming it from small to a large hulking monolith. The space is needed as it houses other services such as district nurses, counsellors and physio. Medicine is more complex and is no longer a 'one man band'. He reminds me of one bright young doctor William Bird who introduced the Health Walks and Green Gym. The health centre is renowned for its encouragement of healthy activity and Dr Burnett commented that his "little part of that was to Introduce, 17 years ago, a cycling group every Tuesday evening from the time the clocks fall back until they go forward. We live in such a wonderful part of the world. The OYB village cycling day was an initiative I have always supported from its inception." As team doctor on a two-week cycling trip round Vietnam he was at the back mopping up, both physically and verbally. "Cycling is a wonderful way to see a country especially for meeting the people". Since then he

has cycled through Thailand, Laos, Sri Lanka (just after the civil war stopped) and Jordan. Asked if it is also a family activity he said "most of them cycle but I think one of my sons has been turned off by my enthusiasm. Recently my wife and I cycled in the New Forest and along the coast". He is very keen to do more cycling once he has more time. "I just enjoy it, as physically I am not the speediest".

"Recruitment of GPs is a national current concern. Training GPs has helped recruit to the Sonning Common practice. It reaps rewards but it needs space and time. The cost of housing is still a an obstacle to recruitment in this area, even though GPs are well paid. The perception is that it is a hard job and less well informed politicians are highly critical which does not help. The NHS needs good quality care from GPs to stop hospitals being the first port of call. Not being on call makes life easier than in the past but demand during the day is much more intense. Expectations from patients are much



higher and patients want instant success. It is considered that UK has a world class health service. But this is arguable. There will never be enough money. We are living longer and have more productive lives in better health; not so many heart attacks or strokes and survival rates for cancer are improving. Alongside the better health care are the improvements in diet and housing. Maintaining people for longer is the next challenge as is the cost and supply of drugs. But it is what the health service should be doing".

So how does a Health centre become outstanding he replies "Leading an outstanding practice requires many ingredients and there are really good people working here. Additionally, we have a patient group who work with us. In consequence people feel very warm towards us".

Health care reforms and care in the community is much cheaper than in hospitals. But the NHS has put more and more money into hospitals rather than general practice and yet all the time it is expected that more could be done. "Sonning Common Health centre can absorb a lot of that but practices round the country are reaching the limit of what is possible".

So, if it cannot be done in other areas what is the answer? He predicts

"Other parts of the country are making increasing use of other clinicians such as nurse practitioners, pharmacists and paramedics as the first point of contact for urgent problems. Triage can work but many people come with multiple problems and if a doctor is not consulted then this could be missed.". Andrew Lansley's Health Act resulted in funding changes and patient choice. Therefore, GPs commission services and this requires more planning and organisation.

Townlands has been a big success. People's concern was the loss of hospital beds but now that it is fully open it has seen and helped a lot more patients. Research has shown that even one day in hospital leads to a huge loss of muscle and the start of dependency. By contrast in the Rapid Access Clinical Unit (RACU) the patient visits on the day and goes home to their own bed. They can then be cared for as an out-patient backed up by care at home. One of the public's anxieties was the move of resources from hospital and onto care in the community. RACU is much more effective and costs about the same as the hospital beds but the clinical care is much better with there is quick access to specialists. The other part of the resident's anxiety is the lack of social care and there will never be enough. Henley has the lowest need for social care in Oxon. When it is not there

the health service picks up the tab. In Manchester they are running health and social care together but this is difficult because social care is means tested but health care is not. "Lots of people are over 65 in this village but look at the great things that happen here. Many are powered by the older people FISH, Nottakwire, Christmas dinner and lunch clubs".

With a continuing huge enthusiasm for the job why go now? "I am tired. I start at 7.40am and leave at 7.30 or even 9pm. The job demands stamina and I want to stop while I have the physical energy, rather than when I am stressed and disillusioned." His term as Locality Clinical Director of the Clinical Commissioning Group, leading ten practices, is coming to an end but he has been asked to stay on to chair the group looking at the clinical aspect of the local transformation plans for the rest of the year. "I will do some out of hours work to keep up my clinical practice but nowhere could be as good as this".

EASILY-ACCESSED BLUEBELL WOODS IN SONNING COMMON

Both Bur Wood and Rudgings Plantation are beautiful sights in late April/early May when they are covered with masses of bluebells. They can be accessed from the footpath to Bur Wood which starts in Kennylands Road, beside property number 110. This is most safely reached from the Millenium Green, which has an exit through a metal kissing gate almost directly opposite the entrance to the footpath. Walking along Kennylands Road is not advised as there are no pavements along the section where the footpath starts. The footpath itself is flat and wide, with attractive country views on either side of it for most of its length. Access to the field which leads across to the woodland is now by a smart new wooden kissing gate, rather than by the old metal stile. The bluebells in the narrow strip of Rudgings Plantation on the right of the main path will soon be visible; those in Bur Wood on the left are better seen from lower down on the main path.

# DOYOUREMEMBER "TWO WAY FAMILY

After World War 2 many British
Forces remained overseas
separated from their friends and
families. Sundays in those days
was a very quiet day, all the shops
were shut and for some, midday
was the highlight when families
who could not meet up with those
abroad could tune into the BBC's
programme Family Favourites. A
special edition of this programme
called "Two Way Family Favourites"
linked service personnel abroad
with their families at home via
requests.

#### INTRODUCING FORCES BROADCASTING

BFN or "British Forces Network" started way back in the 1940's, during the second World War when the then Military Commanders felt that troops deployed on operations needed entertainment and information. As such, a much needed boost of morale was injected into those who found themselves many miles from home. And so the British Forces Network or BFBS (British Forces Broadcasting Service) as it is known today was born, and where else better to start this journey from, other than a harem in Algiers, where it all began.

Dealing with members of the public, the military, radio and television presenters is a prerequisite for my work, as is a can do attitude towards everything. Engineering and presentation minds sometimes think a little differently and a sense of humour



is an absolute must. I recall on one occasion whilst in the role of the radio station engineer in Gibraltar, receiving a call from a somewhat flustered female presenter during the breakfast show. Somehow the presenter's microphone fader was stuck in the open position and every sound from the studio was going to air! A manic dash to the radio station in order to resolve this situation commenced. There was a ten-minute break in the live broadcast when the news was played out from the UK, I could fix this I told myself. Over patching the studio output, the mixing desk was frantically taken apart to find the problem. A hairgrip had mysteriously found its way in and was jamming the mechanical mechanism. Removing the offending item, the mixing desk was hastily reassembled, the show went back to air with seconds to spare. No

explanation was offered, and remains a mystery to this day. The sign on the studio door was amended to read, NO DRINKS, FOOD, OR HAIRGRIPS TO BE TAKEN INTO THE STUDIO.

My name is Mick Stanyer, a Broadcast Engineer working for the British Forces Broadcasting service, who lives in Sonning Common. Let me tell you what forces broadcasting is all about.

Today BFBS is part of a much larger and more diverse organisation known as The Services Sound and Vision Corporation (SSVC) whose single aim is to serve those who serve. Based out of our headquarters in Buckinghamshire SSVC is a self-supporting registered charity whose financial surpluses are donated as welfare support for the Armed Forces. An annual campaign called the Big Salute is undertaken that raises funds for



armed forces charities. Recently these have included Blesma, The Limbless Veterans, Blind Veterans UK, Combat Stress, FAB (Families Activity Breaks) and Veterans Aid.

The corporation has a board of trustees whose responsibility it is to ensure that we do what we were set up to do, and our Patron is His Royal Highness The Duke of York.

SSVC is contracted by the MOD to deliver television and radio to the UK Armed Forces. But this is just the tip of the iceberg as we will discover.

One of the many things that SSVC does is informing and educating the public about just what it is that the British Armed Forces actually get up to, and what better way to do this than by using the medium of Radio, Television, and social media and online. SSVC employ a small team of engineering staff, the best in the business of broadcasting, who use every conceivable form of technology and communication that is available to them. Some undoubtedly you will have heard of and maybe even used, others you may not have.

Let's take a closer look at how and where these services can be found.

#### **BFBS FORCES RADIO**


FM, AM, DAB, and Online, we broadcast everywhere that there is a British Forces presence, and yes that even includes onboard all Royal Navy and Royal Fleet Auxiliary ships around the globe. You can pick your favourite genre and listen live with BFBS Radio and BFBS Radio 2, listen again to catch up with



programmes that you may have missed, and get in touch with families and friends.

On land BFBS Radio have studios and transmitter sites throughout the world:

In the UK there is a network of UK Bases that also have studios and transmitters, from Edinburgh in the north to Portsmouth in the south with many others in between. These sites are all linked back to the radio headquarters in Buckinghamshire using MPLS, multiprotocol layer switching, and other networking technologies.

BFBS Gurkha Radio is the voice of the Gurkha soldiers whether they are UK based or abroad. We broadcast this service both worldwide and also locally from our studio in Kathmandu. This enables the Gurkhas to keep up to date with what is happening in Nepal and provides them with a vital link back to their families.

During the devastating earthquakes of 2015, the radio station in Kathmandu was kept on air by setting up a temporary facility outside of the building and away from the danger of falling debris.

#### What you'll need:

- 1 paper coffee cup and lid
- Paint
- Paintbrush
- 2 novelty eyes
- 2 pipe cleaners
- Coloured paper
- Scissors
- PVA glue
- Sticky tape

#### **Alternatives:**

- Instead of pipe cleaners use concertinaed paper or string
- Paper cups can be covered in paper if your paint isn't thick enough to cover them
- Why not see what other animals you can make?

Please send in pictures of your creations, we would love to see them.



1) Before you begin, lay an old newspaper or wipe clean cloth on the table



- 3) Using the PVA glue, stick the eyes to the outside of the cup.
- 4) From the coloured paper cut a beak, wings and feet. Glue the beak and wings to the cup.



Remove the lid from the coffee cup and paint the cup with yellow poster paint. Leave to dry, you may need to apply a few coats of paint.



- Using glue or sticky tape, stick one end of each pipe cleaner to the bottom of the cup. Then stick the paper feet to the other end.
- 6) Place your cup on the edge of the table and bend the pipe cleaners so the legs hang over the edge.
- 7) Fill your treat holder with sweets and pop on the lid.

## A TRIUMPH FOR LOCAL DEMOCRACY

The unanimous decision to refuse planning permission for 95 homes to be built on SON 6 – instead of the 26 homes allocated under the Neighbourhood Plan – was a triumph for local democracy.

More than 100 residents attended a meeting of South Oxfordshire District Council's (SODC's) Planning Committee at Didcot Civic Hall on Wednesday 01 March during which the application was discussed.

Most had travelled to the meeting in two coaches laid on by Parish Council; others made their own way there in private cars.

Residents filed into the council chamber - many with homemade placards - to show their opposition to the Gallagher Estates proposal for SON 6, which was supported by SODC planning officers despite it contravening the village's adopted Neighbourhood Plan. After listening to arguments both for and against the proposal, SODC district councillors decided to uphold and respect Sonning Common's Neighbourhood Plan and voted unanimously to refuse the application.

Our Neighbourhood Plan – developed over nearly five years at a cost of £63,000 - allows for 26 new homes to be built on SON 6 along Kennylands Road in a similar format to existing housing, filling in the gap between 56 and 80 Kennylands Road.

Gallagher Estates wanted permission to develop a much larger site, adjacent to SON 6, that would have extended development into the countryside and closer to the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

Parish councillor Tom Fort, who led the SON 6 campaign, said: "We produced a neighbourhood plan, proclaimed under



the Government's Localism Act as a way to strengthen local democracy by encouraging communities like ours to shape their own future. This plan, allocating suitable sites to new housing, was backed by 94 per cent of residents on a turnout of nearly 50 per cent in an official referendum last September.

"Yet despite this overwhelming public support and clear direction from Government to respect neighbourhood plans like ours, planning officers are treating our plan with blatant disregard."

John Pearman, speaking on behalf of residents, said he was "outraged" by the Gallagher Estates' application and the decision by SODC planning officers to support it. Councillor lain Pearson, of Kidmore End Parish Council, said local democracy should be respected and the application refused. District councillor, Paul Harrison, urged colleagues to reject the proposal.

Well over 200 Sonning Common residents wrote to SODC's planning department to object to the proposal.

# SONNING COMMON VILLAGE CRICKET CLUB

Picture this... Blazing sun, a clear blue sky, a slight warm breeze, swallows darting across the sky, a tractor humming in the distance, the sound of leather on willow...

No this is not an advert for the local ramblers or the English Tourist Board, this is Village Cricket. This is Sonning Common Village Cricket Club!

The scene is not always as surreal as it sounds as anyone who has played on the hill at Ipsden (no better place to play when the weather is good!) in April will testify!

We play around a dozen games a season, mostly against other local village sides such as Ipsden, Whitchurch, Nettlebed, Peppard and Kidmore End. There is also the annual game against Highmoor in September where we play for the Roger Choules Memorial Cup (Roger was captain of both clubs). At present, we have no home ground so we play all our matches away.

The highlight of the year is in June when we embark on our annual tour and this year we think it is the 25th visit to the Broadwindsor area of Dorset.

We love our cricket but that is not the main reason we play. It's for the camaraderie, the friendships and the banter that make our club unique. For us, both before the game and 'afterwards' in the pub are as important as the match itself. Some of the games become real 'occasions' with partners, families and friends turning up. We have even been known to take our own barbecue!

The present club started in 1988 as the Red Lion Rabbits playing out of the Red Lion on Peppard Common. The pub was like a clubhouse for us and for the first couple of years, we were known as the club with more social functions than fixtures!

The first recorded game was against The Five Horseshoes (Remenham Hill) and our first victory.

The name Sonning Common was first used in 1990 in the game against Great Haseley.

Since then we have played local teams and some of the players who played at the start are still there now!

We have a number of social events each year including an end of season do and who can forget that misty, drizzly November evening at Greys Village Hall when John Inverdale and now BBC cricket correspondent Jonathan Agnew were our guests.

This is Village Cricket at its rawest but also its best, so why not come and give us a try? Yes, we have made over 200 runs on occasions but we have also been out for 13! So, there is room for everyone.

This could be exciting times for this club, with the possibility of playing in the village again, hopefully in the future.

# COOK'S CORNER

#### HOT CROSS BUNS - makes 12

175ml warm water 50g butter

1 tablespoon dried milk powder

50g caster sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 egg

1 egg white

375g plain flour

1 sachet yeast

100g currants

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1 egg yolk

2 tablespoons water



#### SIMNEL CAKE - serves 12

250g butter (softened) 225g light brown soft sugar

4 eggs

250g self-raising flour 225g sultanas

150g currants

100g glace cherries (quartered)

4 tablespoons mixed fruit peel (chopped)

2 tablespoons lemon zest

2 teaspoons mixed spice 500g marzipan – divided

2 tablespoons apricot jam

1 egg (beaten)

into 3



egg yolk and 2 tablespoons of water, into a Preheat oven to 150/Gas 2. Grease and line a 20cm springform cake tin

In a large bowl cream together the butter and sugar until light and fluffy and slowly add the beaten eggs. Mix in the flour, fruit, zest and spice. Pour half of the mixture into the tin

Roll out 1/3rd of the marzipan to a 20cm circle, place over the mixture and cover with remaining mixture  $\,$ 

Bake for 2 1/2 hours, cool in the tin for 10 minutes then turn out on a wire rack to cool completely

Preheat grill. Brush the cake with warm jam and roll out 1/3 rd marzipan to a 20cm circle place on top of the cake

Divide the remaining 1/3rd into 11 pieces, roll into balls, brush with beaten egg and place around the outside of the cake

Place under the grill for 8 minutes until golden 🔸



Shape into 12 balls, place in a greased tin, cover and let rise in a warm place – approx. 40 minutes – until doubled in size

Mix egg yolk with water and brush on dough to glaze

Bake at 190/Gas 5 for 20 minutes, remove from pan and cool on rack

For the icing cross - 50g icing sugar/ 1/4 teaspoon vanilla/ I tablespoon milk

Mix ingredients together to form a thick paste. Brush a cross on to each bun once cooled  $\buildrel \bullet$
