Think Like a Lamp: Imagine where you'll place furniture and lamps in each room. Ensure outlets are conveniently located to avoid extension cords. Consider USB charging outlets for your tech-driven world.



- Appliance Power: Identify major appliances (fridge, stove) and ensure outlets with appropriate amperage are in place. Don't forget dedicated outlets for powerful devices like garbage disposals.
- Bathroom and Kitchen Safety: GFCI outlets are required near water sources to prevent shock hazards.
- Outdoor Enjoyment: Outlets on your patio or deck allow for festive lighting, power tools, or even a hot tub (with proper installation).

- **Pre-purchase Inspection:** Consider hiring a licensed electrician to inspect the entire electrical system for safety and functionality.

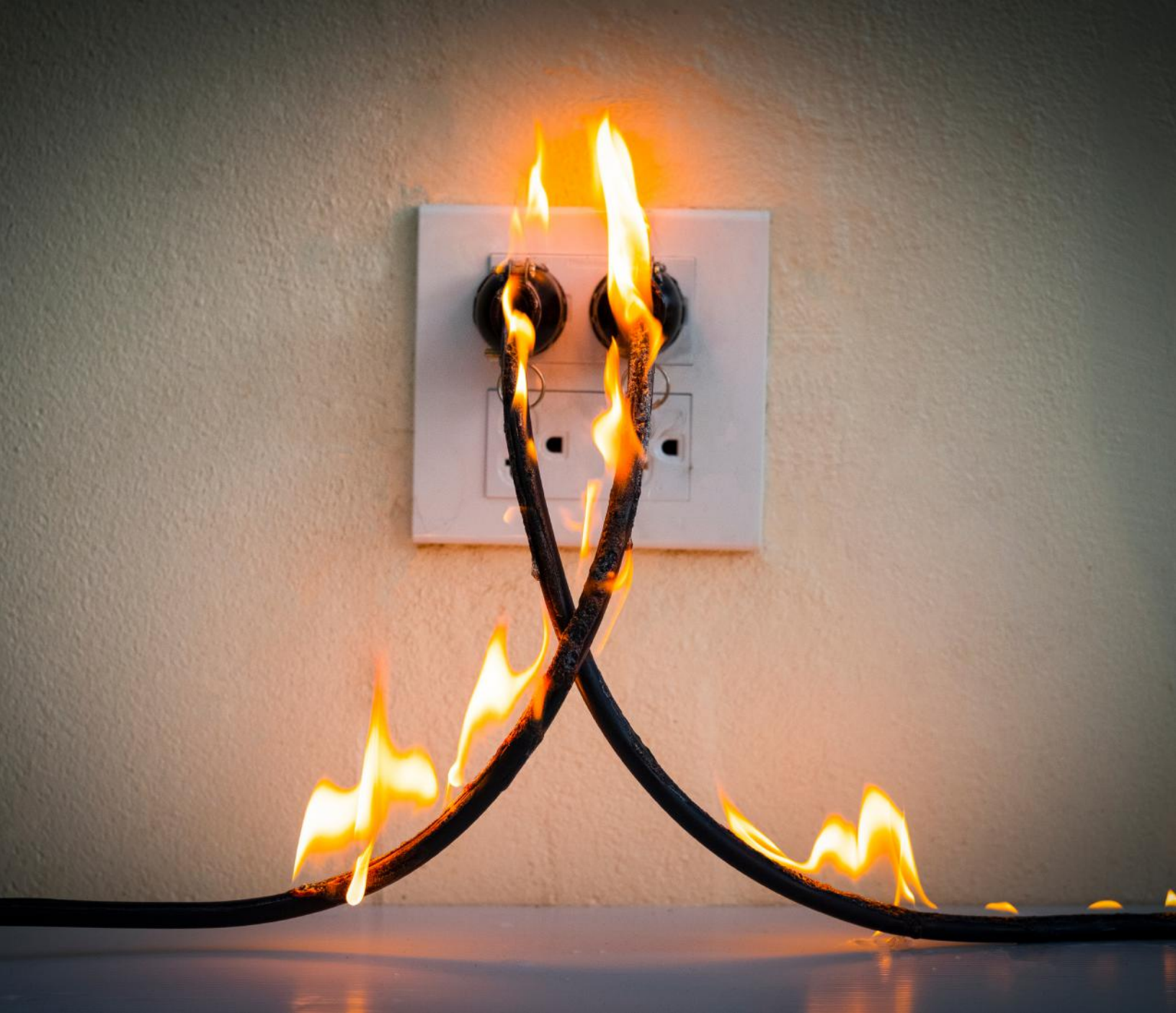




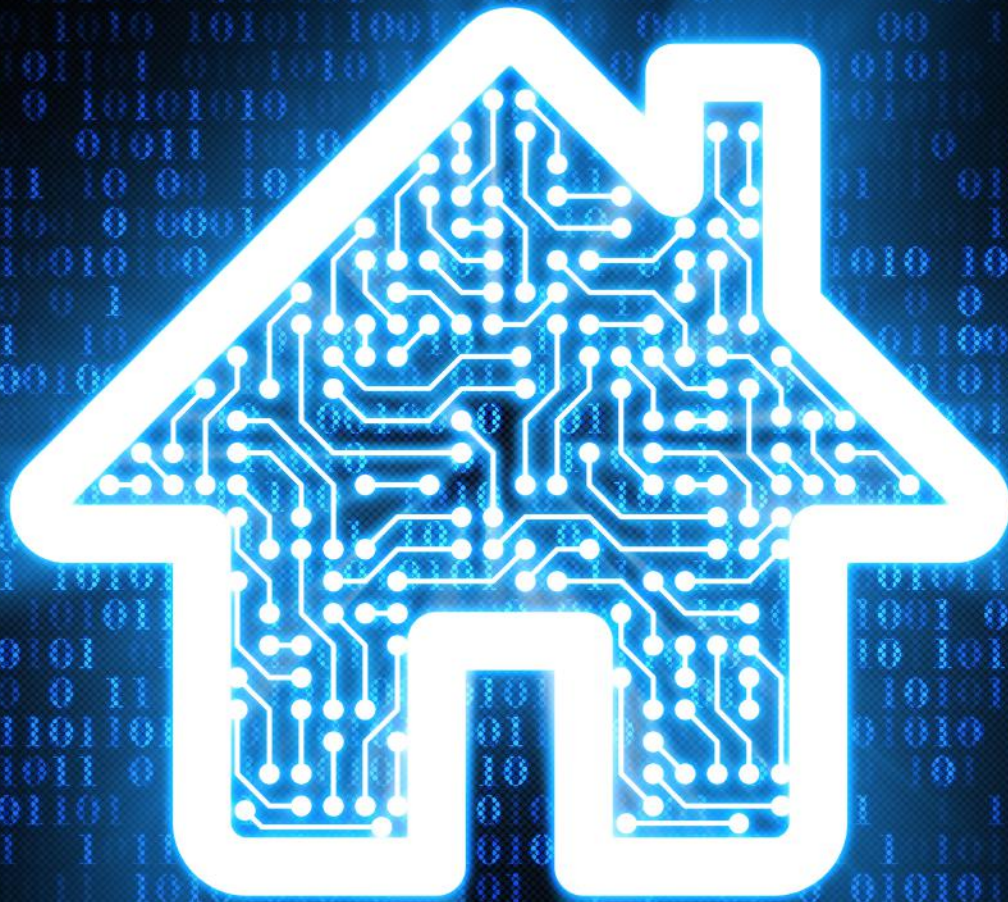
Chapter 5: Bonus Tips for a Smart Home
