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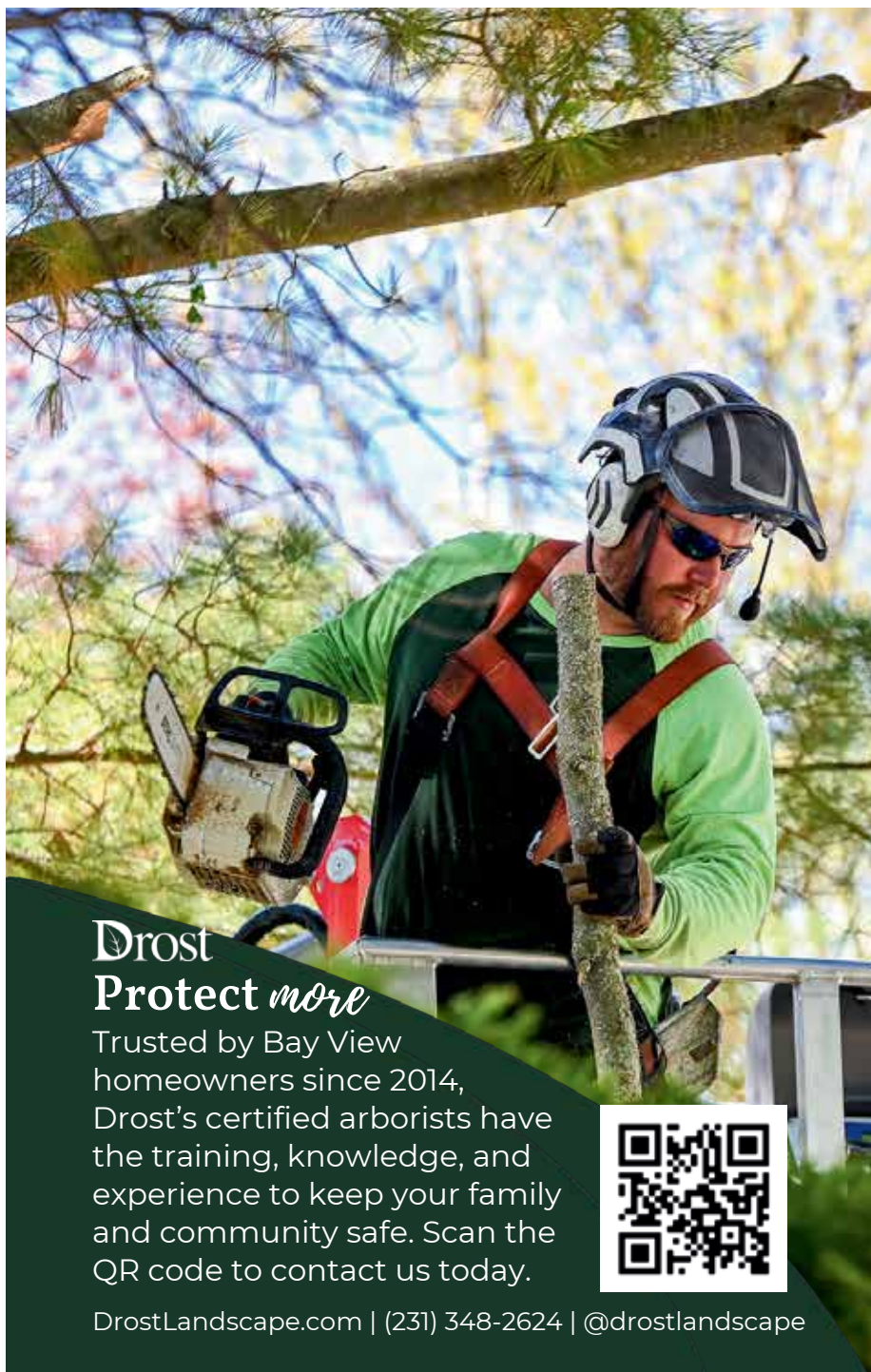
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About Bay View and the United Methodist Church

Bay View was founded in 1875 by Michigan Methodists as a camp meeting “for intellectual and scientific culture and the promotion of the cause of religion and morality.” At its organizational meeting, members elected officers and adopted Articles of Association under a general law of the State of Michigan. The pastor of the Methodist Church in Petoskey served as the first liaison agent for the committee. Although conceived by Methodist clergy and laity, promoted by the joint Michigan Methodist conferences, and often sustained at critical moments by Methodist congregations, Bay View has been ecumenical in management and life. From its beginning, Bay View welcomed persons of any denominational affiliation who have a desire to assist in perpetuating the Association’s principles and purpose.

Begun as a retreat for revival meetings and spiritual refreshment, within the first decade Bay View expressed its “Methodist concern” for intellectual enlightenment and cultural growth. As a result, by the late 1880s the Bay View Assembly became a pioneering institution in public education with an ambitious summer university, a home study program enrolling men and women across the nation, and a Chautauqua series attracting tens of thousands of visitors. During the same period, the territory of the early “tent city” developed into a seasonal community of such Victorian charm that it has been designated as a National Historic Landmark. Throughout its history, Bay View consistently retained and continued to follow closely the principles of spiritual growth and cultural advancement initiated and steadfastly practiced by its Methodist founders. The resident bishop of the Michigan Area of The United Methodist Church is a non-voting ex-officio member of the Bay View Board of Trustees.

Founded in 1875 with roots in the Methodist camp meeting and Chautauqua movements², the Bay View Association is a summer community on the shores of Lake Michigan. Its founders sought a place to pursue truth, knowledge, beauty, faith and vitality in all their forms for the enhancement of the human experience. Designated as a National Historic Landmark, Bay View is recognized for its members’ stewardship of Victorian architecture, natural setting and robust summer assembly program.

The Bay View mission lives on through its four program areas: Education, Performing Arts, Recreation, and Worship & Religious Life. Bay View promotes values and principles that strengthen its multi-generational community, such as open communication, volunteerism, faith, love, respect, and hospitality.

The Bay View Assembly Program Today

Today, Bay View's Assembly program consists of four program areas: Education, Performing Arts, Recreation, and Worship and Religious Life.

- The Education program inspires lifelong learners through a variety of classes and special guest lecturers in such fields as culinary arts, fine arts and crafts, health and wellness, expanding knowledge, and kids' classes. Scheduled to be sensitive to a busy lifestyle, some of the courses meet only once for a couple of hours, while others may meet for three or four sessions.
- With one of the oldest continuously operating chamber music festivals in the United States, the Performing Arts program offers exhilarating musical productions including multiple weekly concerts, choir, an opera, and a musical.
- The Recreation Program provides outdoor fun for all ages including boat rentals, tennis, and pickleball lessons, and Boys' and Girls' Club where mornings are filled with games and crafts and afternoons with swim lessons and an option to add sailing and tennis lessons.
- The Worship and Religious Life program broadens and deepens spirituality through outstanding preachers from different denominations, weekly Communion, Sunday School classes for all ages, and Friday Evensong services.

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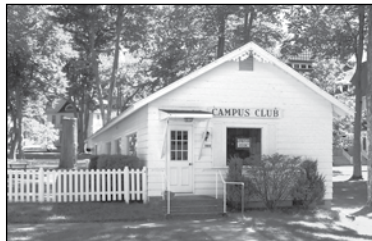

Museums, Library, and Archives

Bay View Historical Museum

The Museum's exhibit for the 2025 Sesquicentennial Celebration will feature "The Early Years" focusing on each of the four Chautauqua programs displaying acquisitions of historical significance. The exhibits can be visited in the two oldest buildings on campus, formerly known as the Speaker's Stand (1876) and the Bookstore (1881), that were designated as Historical Museums in 1964. The Museum's mission is to collect, display and preserve acquisitions reflecting Bay View's rich heritage.

The Museum Cottage, once known as the Superintendent and Security Residences, now serves as the permanent home of the Bay View Historical Museum. The Rev. Dr. Hilary J. Barrett is an ordained minister of the United Church of Christ. Raised in Berkeley, California, she received an undergraduate degree in World and Comparative Literature from San Francisco State University and holds graduate degrees from United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities (M. Div.) and Pacific School of Religion (D. Min). Her Doctor of Ministry thesis was entitled, "Telling Stories: Narrative Approaches to Congregational Studies." Dr. Barrett served in settled pastorates and interim settings in southeastern Pennsylvania for 33 years. She and her husband, Rob Scarrow, reside in suburban Philadelphia in the off-season. They have one adult son named Sam (and a black Lab named Sophie).



Anthony Patterson; Minister of Music

Anthony Patterson enjoys a multi-faceted career as a solo and collaborative pianist, composer/arranger, and educator. In April 2022, he premiered his Gloria with the National Chorale at the DiMenna center in NYC. Patterson was Artist-in-Residence at Alma College from 1995-2020, Choir director at The First Presbyterian church in Alma from 1998-2020, and has been on the faculty of the Bay View Music Festival since 1989. Anthony began classical piano lessons at age three with his father, Richard Patterson, a jazz pianist and bandleader. He made his solo debut at age eight, playing Mozart's Concerto no. 28 with the Lima Symphony, and four years later joined the LSO in the premiere of "The Anthony Concerto," composed for him by his teacher, Don Hurless. Patterson later studied with Richard Syracuse, Jerome Rose, and Earl Wild.



Dr. Hee-Kyung Juhn; Organist

Hee-Kyung was born and raised in South Korea as a Methodist pastor's kid; her father's ministry took the family to Paraguay, South America, where she spent her teenage years. Hee-Kyung was later trained in U.S. as a pianist at Juilliard School (MM), University of Michigan, and Indiana University (DM). As an academic, Dr. Juhn has taught full-time at the University of California in Santa Barbara, Henderson State University, and adjunct faculty at University of Central Arkansas.

Jefferson Cowie is James G. Stahlman Professor of History at Vanderbilt University. His scholarship has focused on the intersection of social, cultural and economic forces in shaping different eras of American history. His Bay View lectures will draw on several of these past projects, including two lectures based on his most recent book, *Freedom's Dominion* (2022). This Pulitzer-Prize winning

volume focuses on one county in Alabama, using 150 years of history to illustrate in compelling detail how the language of individual freedom was used across multiple decades to justify violent opposition to federal laws, and to justify attacks on other people's economic and political rights. Another lecture will focus on the New Deal era, which was the topic of Professor Cowie's *The Great Exception: The New Deal and the Limits of American Politics* (2016). His final two lectures will draw on projects he has worked on during his 2024-25 Guggenheim Fellowship in Berlin, which include a biography of the legendary pop/country singer Johnny Cash.



Week 5 - July 13 - 17: Marilyn McEntyre

Marilyn McEntyre is a steward of words. She has taught courses on English and medical humanities and has written or edited over twenty books. Since leaving undergraduate teaching at Westmont College, Marilyn McEntyre taught writing at the UCB-UCSF Medical School and now coaches writers and teaches in programs at New College Berkeley, Western Seminary, and the Oblate School of

Theology and offers writing workshops and retreats around the country. Her books include *Caring for Words in a Culture of Lies*; *Speaking Peace in a Climate of Conflict*; *Word by Word: A Daily Spiritual Practice*; *When Poets Pray*; *Dear Doctor*; *Where the Eye Alights*; and *The Mindful Grandparent* (with co-author Shirley Showalter) as well as several volumes of poetry. In all her work she seeks ways to connect writing, spirituality, and healing, and to offer a wide embrace to the seeking and the curious.

For twenty years prior to the episcopacy, he was Dean of the Chapel and Professor of Christian Ministry at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina.

Dr. Willmon is the author of roughly one hundred books. His *Worship as Pastoral Care* was selected as one of the ten most useful books for pastors in 1979 by the Academy of Parish Clergy. Over a million copies of his books have been sold. In 1996, an international survey conducted by Baylor University named him one of the Twelve Most Effective Preachers in the English-speaking world.

Willmon’s articles have appeared in many publications including *The Christian Ministry*, *Quarterly Review*, *Plough*, *Liturgy*, *Worship* and *Christianity Today*. For many years he was Editor-at-Large for *The Christian Century*. He has written church curriculum materials and video for youth, young adults, and adults. His *Pulpit Resource* is used each week by thousands of pastors in the USA, Canada, and Australia. A 2005 study by the Pulpit and Pew Research Center found that Bishop Willmon is the second most widely read author by mainline Protestant pastors.

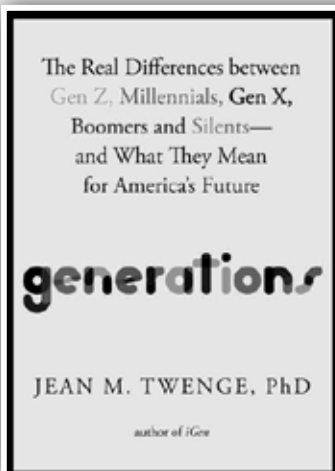

His Bay View lectures will draw on several of these past projects, including two lectures based on his most recent book, *Freedom's Dominion* (2022). This Pulitzer-Prize winning volume focuses on one county in Alabama, using over 150 years of its history to illustrate how the language of individual freedom was used to justify violent opposition to federal laws.



Monday & Tuesday Lectures - FREEDOM'S DOMINION

American freedom is typically associated with the fight of the oppressed for a better world. But for centuries, some Americans have also used that language to justify their freedom to dominate others. These talks consider American freedom, federal power, states' rights, and their inter-relationships from the early Republic through Reconstruction to the present day.

Wednesday Lecture - THE NEW DEAL ERA: THE PROMISE AND LIMITS OF AMERICAN REFORM

Where does the New Deal fit in the big picture of American history? In the period between the Great Depression and the 1970s, the United States government used its considerable resources on behalf of working Americans to achieve a unique level of equality. What happened to the economic equality it once engendered, and what does this tell us about our era?

Thursday Lecture - KEY WORDS IN AMERICAN POLITICAL HISTORY

American politics often hinges on the partisan ownership of key words, such as freedom, democracy, faith, and patriotism. In this lecture, Professor Cowie will take these terms as his jumping off point to share insights from his new project on the idea of narrative, how historians think, and the connections between interspersed events in American history.

Friday Lecture - JOHNNY CASH: THE MANY REDEMPTIONS OF AN AMERICAN SOUL

This talk, based on Professor Cowie's forthcoming biography of Johnny Cash, considers how this existential pop loner was really a product of several key collaborations that redeemed his art throughout his life.

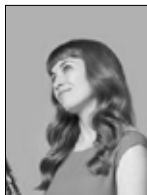


Music Festival – Akropolis

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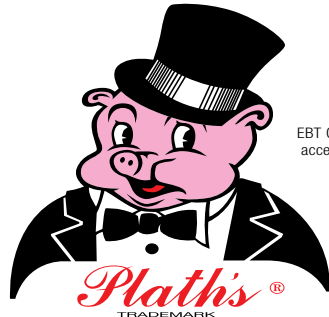
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
