1st Place: (56) The Tessellated Pavement by Gloria Loughman

Sponsor: Stawell Quilters Inc.



Size: 120cm x 180cm

Techniques: Machine Applique, Machine Embroidery, Collage and Bobbin work.

Artist Statement:

In this work, I strived to combine fragments of different views in one setting. I want the viewer to ponder quilt whether some areas are water or sky or perhaps both and wander around the work finding different landscapes that all go to make up this amazing and incredible landform.

Size: 136cm x 145cm

Techniques: Hand Embroidery, machine piecing, eco dyeing, breakdown printing and couching

Artist Statement:

So nice in the bush on a misty morning. The waving grasses. Upwards to a forest of trees, lush foliage, flowering gums, a canopy of leaves and above that the moody sky. But the most entrancing is the wispy and delicately coloured gum blossoms.

Techniques: Hand Applique, Hand Embroidery and Hotfix Crystals

I was missing my last trip to South Korea so much during Covid19 lock down. I kept remembering the image of flowers over the window in my hotel room in Korea every time I missed travelling.

Tried to depict the image in my memory by using traditional Korean silk.

Techniques: Painting

Artist Statement:

I wanted to show how people adapt during drought. They take their cattle to eat the grass on the side of the road- 'The Long Paddock' to save their stock. The borders are cork and it really helped to pull nature together with the main painting.

(51) Reef Turtles by Michael Hammer



Size: 121cm x 161cm

Techniques: Machine applique, Machine piecing

Artist Statement:

The background is intended to give the impression of light shining through the mottled tropical reef waters. Fine detail has been painted using acrylic paint mixed with textile medium and shading on fins of very dilute black dye applied with a brush and ironed dry between applications to give a gradual effect.

Size: 113cm x 84cm

Techniques: Machine Applique and Machine Piecing

Artist Statement:

This quilt depicts a perilous journey of a small boat out in the middle of a storm. Some of its occupants are overboard. What will happen next is the question?

Size: 71cm x 104cm

Techniques: Hand applique, hand piecing.

(58) Chookie by Sue Terpin



Size: 101cm x 121cm

Techniques: Reverse Applique by hand

Artist Statement:

I purchased a line drawing from Depositphotos, adjusted it to make it work and then drew it out on my fabric. Chookie is a reverse appliqué line drawing. Hand stitched turned edge and quilted on a domestic machine - chicken scratch style! Making Chookie has been great therapy in these crazy times.

Techniques: Machine applique. Domestic machine quilting.

Artist Statement:

Mystical Boab trees have featured in many of my quilts over the years. Created from hand painted, and Procion dyed fabrics, this design was built up as a collage, and then heavily stitched. A different view of the Kimberley, but my tribute to its breathtaking beauty and its traditional owners.

Techniques: Hand Applique, Machine Applique. Domestic machine quilting

(62) Still Life by Michael Hammer



Size: 105cm x 142cm


Techniques: Eco Dye fabric, acrylic painting, machine applique. Domestic machine quilting

Artist Statement:

This quilt owes its origins to my experiments in eco dying, this was the first experiment in this direction. The image itself is a relatively conventional still life using a mixture of printed commercial fabrics and hand painted fabric using acrylic paint mixed with textile medium.

Techniques: Giclee print on silk. Domestic machine quilting

Size: 73cm x 90cm


Techniques: Hand Painting. Domestic machine quilting

Size: 84cm x 108cm

Techniques: Acrylic Paint, wool, silk &7 fibre embellishment, rayon threads, fabric painting, 2D needle-felting, trapunto. Domestic machine quilting

Artist Statement:

While on a morning walk along Mandu Mandu Gorge in Cape Range National Park WA, we saw about seven Rock-wallabies resting in the heat of the day in the shade of the cliff-face, which was incredibly special as they are an endangered species.
