Trailbuilding Professional


The Trailbuilding Professional certification integrates field-based training using hand tools and heavy machinery with first responder training, geospatial information science and technology (GIST), natural resource management, and professional skills competencies from American Trails and the Professional TrailBuilders Association (PTBA). The experiential learning format allows the student to develop practical skills for a career designing and building natural surface trail systems ranging from remote wilderness to modern bike parks. Our faculty are experienced trail builders who provide students with both classroom and hands-on trail design and construction. In addition to mastery of standard hand tools, each student spends time learning to operate mini-excavators, Canycom tracked wheelbarrows, and plate compactors as well as snow grooming equipment for skiing and fat-biking.
