CAT NUTRIENT CAT NUTRIENT CAT NUTRIENT

Cats have different nutritional needs than dogs. Find out how best to care for your Kitty with this guide.

ats are finicky eaters which can be very frustrating. Some PAWrents resort to different types of food just so their cat will eat. It is important to note that cats are obligate or true carnivores which means they rely on a diet consisting mostly of meat. The anatomical structure of cats does not allow them to properly digest food products derived from plants unlike dogs. To sum up, cats are not small dogs nor are they vegetarian. An understanding therefore of the nutritional requirements of your cat is necessary in order to maintain their overall health and well-being.

CAT'S UNIQUE NUTRIENT NEEDS

+ Proteins. Proteins are building blocks for cells, tissues, organs, enzymes, hormones and antibodies. They are essential for growth, maintenance, reproduction and body repair.

Proteins can be found either from animal (such as chicken, fish, beef, lamb, etc) or plant (like cereals and soy) sources. Cats, being carnivores, lack the metabolism required for proper digestion of plant-based food sources. They are dependent on protein as their main source of energy which makes them require twice as much protein in their diet compared to dogs.

Dietary protein contains 10 essential amino acids (which can be found in high-quality protein sources) that cats cannot make on their own and deficiencies of which can lead to serious health problems. Examples of these essential amino acids are arginine and taurine. Arginine is critical to the removal of ammonia from the body through urine, thus, an insufficient arginine in the diet may lead to toxic build-up of ammonia in the cat's bloodstream. Taurine deficiency causes metabolic and clinical problems including feline central retinal degeneration and blindness, deafness, heart disease, inadequate immune response, slow growth in kittens, reproductive failure and congenital defects.

+ Fats. Dietary fats supply essential fatty acids (which can't be synthesized in the body and serve as carriers for important fat-soluble vitamins) that play an important role in cell structure and function. They provide the most concentrated energy source (twice as much energy as protein and carbohydrates). It also enhances the taste and texture of cat's food. They are usually derived from animal fats and the seed oils of various plants.

Cats have the ability to use high levels of dietary fat which are necessary in keeping their skin and coat health. They require three essential fatty acids – arachidonic (omega-6), linoleic (omega-6) and linolenic (omega-3).

Listed below is a table of the Daily Recommended Allowances for proteins and fats for cats published by the National Research Council of the National Academies in 2006. Note that pet food labels state guarantees for the minimum percentages of Crude Protein (CP) and Crude Fat (CF), and the maximum percentages of crude fiber and moisture. To convert these percentages to grams, multiply the crude percentages times the weight of vour cat's daily portion. So if an adult cat eats 170gm can of food in a day which contains 8% CP, the grams of protein would be $0.08 \times 170 = 13.6$ gms. fermentable fiber sources like beet pulp, bran (corn, rice and wheat) and wheat middlings.

➡ Water. It is the most critical nutrient for survival as it is the most plentiful substance in the body, comprising from 60% to 70% of body weight – depending on age and muscle mass. Water is used for all body processes: digestion, absorption, nutrient transportation, waste product removal, tissue building and repair and more.

Cats naturally have a low thirst drive which can be a problem to those cats that eat mostly dry food products and treats. Low water intake in cats is a risk factor for feline lower urinary



+ Carbohydrates. These provide an abundant source of energy but cats have limited ability to use large amounts of carbohydrates. Major sources of carbohydrates in commercial cat foods are cereals, legumes and other plant stuff. The short length of cats' large intestines limits their ability to ferment fibers that are found in many carbohydrates. They obtain the most benefit of fibers from moderately tract disease (FLUTD) and aggravates kidney diseases. Therefore, cats must be encouraged to consume as much water as possible by keeping a fresh bowl of drinking water at all times and feeding wet food in addition or rotation to dry food and treats.

Vitamins. They are found in food and some are made within the animal's body. Vitamins are important for meta-

bolism regulation, normal growth and function. Cats' requirement for niacin and pyridoxine (B Vitamins) is four times higher than that of dogs. Additionally, Vitamin A precursors are mostly plant-derived which cats have the inability to convert unlike dogs. Therefore, cats need preformed Vitamin A in their diets.

+ Minerals. They are important in a variety of functions like maintaining acid-base balance, body fluid balance, nutrient utilization, oxygen transport and structural integrity of bones and teeth. Minerals make up less than 0.7% of the pet's body and most of which is comprised of macrominerals – calcium, phosphorus, potassium and sodium. Cats can get varied amounts of minerals from their diet; excessive dietary magnesium can cause formation of stones in their urinary tract.

CAT'S ENERGY NEEDS

Like a car that requires petrol to run, pets burn food in order to meet their energy needs (which is measured in kilocalories). Pets need energy to perform body functions (like digestion, movement, eating, resting), for without it the body would cease to function and death will occur. Therefore, meeting the energy requirement of a pet is first considered when feeding them.

The energy content of a given cat food determines the amount of daily food intake of your cat which in turn affects the amount of nutrients your cat eats. High quality cat foods are able to meet cat's energy requirements with the proper balance of all the other nutrients that your cat needs. Energy requirements of cats vary depending on multiple variables – age, sex, size, activity level, neutered/spayed and presence of diseases that may alter metabolism.

Most PAWrents rely on pet food packaging feeding guidelines to calculate the dosage of food given to pets. This however should only be the starting point, PAWrents should continuously adjust the amount of food given to their pet in order to achieve optimum body condition. This means that cats must appear wellproportioned with moderate waistline behind the ribs and should not have abdominal fat pad visible or felt along the underline. Listed below is a table of Cat's Average Daily Energy Needs published by the National Research Council of the National Academies in 2006.

Meeting the nutrient and energy needs of your cats require monitoring of your cat's body condition and regular assessment of their food intake. Also, always make sure you give only high quality cat food for a well-balanced diet. A regular visit to your cat's veterinarian will help guide you along the way in keeping your cat healthy so s/he can live a longer and higher quality life. *****

The Nightmare of *Nail Trinning* Are you a dog owner who dreads trimming

your dog's nails? If you are, you are not alone. By Yosefin Lingga, DVM

or many dog owners, trimming the dog's nails could be a traumatic experience (and for the dog as well). But this simple habit is necessary to the health and well-being of your pet.

• The Cons of Long Nails

If you leave your pet's nails to grow uncontrollably, they would eventually get long enough to touch the ground and twist your baby's toes. This could lead to muscle and skeletal damage which can cause pain. Your dog might limp and develop difficulty in walking. At this stage, cutting the nails becomes an even more painful experience since the nail quick grows with the nails and when you cut the quick, it will bleed. Long nails can also break and lead to paw infection.

• Some Useful Tips

If your dog is the active type and has high walking mileage, nail cutting is necessary only for the dew claws, which can be found in the inner surface of the paw. The surface of the ground or concrete could naturally trim the nails and keep them short. If not, a trim once every two weeks is necessary to keep the nails short. Be cautious if you hear clicking when your dog walks around the house. It means his/her nails are long enough to touch the floor. If it is really not possible to cut all the nails at once, you can do one nail per day to make it a less traumatic experience. Don't forget to give your baby his/her favorite treat to associate nail trimming as a positive experience.

• The Right Way to Do It

To trim the nails you need to have a good clipper and a bleeding stopper ready at your side. When trimming you have to avoid the quick. This is quite easy to see if your dog has clear nails. With darker nails, cut slivers of nail until you see a grayish color in the middle of the nail. Stop trimming when you see this. If you accidentally cut the quick, the bleeding could be quite profuse and your dog most likely will cry and pull his/her leg away. Calm him/ her down, get the bleeding stopper powder and apply it directly on the bleeding nail.

Going to the vet or groomer for nail trimming is another option. However, you have to realize that there are more stressors for your dog in these places compared to if you do the trimming at home. So brace yourself (give your dog lots of hugs before and after), and make nail trimming a careful, yet regular healthy habit.

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TRAVELING WITH A HAPPY & BALANCED FURKID

Read through this helpful pet travel checklist to ensure you have all the bases covered for you and your furkid before your trip. By Rio E. Ridad, DVM

A s I'm waiting in line for my turn at the check-in-counter at the airport, I hear excited voices of ladies giggling behind me. I'm curious and expect a baby getting all the attention and to my surprise, "It's a cute puppy pug!" The puppy sits in the trolley with a calm demeanor looking very much healthy and delighted to travel with his PAWrent.

Traveling with your lovely pets should not give you too much stress. Here are six great tips on how to prepare them and keep them fit for travel for your next adventure:

1 Visit your favorite veterinarian

It doesn't hurt to visit your veterinarian within 10 days of departure. Quickly make an appointment for a thorough health check-up. The veterinarian will make sure all required vaccinations are up to date and relevant to the country being visited. Discuss with your veterinarian all the necessary health care requirements. Be reminded to contact the foreign office of the country you are traveling to for more information.

2 Check and review SOPs of each country you want to visit

First, check if your pet has a readable microchip so that in case of being lost, your pet can be properly identified. A lot of countries require a satisfactory level of immunity against rabies virus and to obtain this rabies antibody titre, a series of rabies vaccination must be administered prior to travel. Keep all vaccinations up to date. A pet passport will then be issued to you which is signed by a veterinarian. Lastly, a tick/

tapeworm treatment must be given between 24-48 hours before your pet can be checked in at the airport. The health certificate should show that your pet is healthy and free of any parasites.

You and your pet should be mentally prepared

Most cats are not happy when they are taken out of their comfort zone. They would stop eating if you mess with their territory. Dogs on the other hand may also present some separation anxiety issues and they may keep barking or keep clawing the door of their crates. So what can you do?

Train your pets to be alone at home. This may not be a problem in cats as these pets are known to be solitary animals. However, most cats may not like to be put inside a crate. For both cats





and dogs, control their anxiety by training them to be placed in a crate for a few hours everyday. Do not force them to go inside the crate. Instead, make the crate comfortable so that they would go inside on their own accord.

Get the most comfortable carrier

Let them get used to their carrier by training your pet to be put in a crate to reduce the stress months before the travel date. How? You know how some pets associate the carrier to going to a trip to the vet? I suggest you start helping your dog associate his carrier with good things. Make sure he rides in it to only good places for a while like going to his favorite park, visits to the pet shops where he's allowed inside, etc.

When you are at home, leave it open so he can go in and out of the crate at his most convenient time. Try to place a familiar toy or piece of clothing inside which may also help your beloved pets, to settle down. Find the most suitable size for your pet. It should be able to stand, sit and lie down in a natural position and to turn around easily. Get the most simple carrier that should not contain anything which could injure your pet or is designed so that no part of him like its head, paws or tail can protrude or become trapped. Place an absorbent bedding inside the carrier too.

Before you buy a pet crate, check out the International Air Transport Association's list of pet carrier requirements, which most airlines adhere to.

Breathe and be calm

Some vets will advise you to sedate your fractious pets. Please do not allow them to do this as this would be the worst possible thing you can do to your pet before their long flight. Remember that sedative drugs combined with high altitude may prevent them from naturally regulating their body temperature which can help alleviate their own stress. Some PAWrents may pass their anxiety to their pets before the flight. I suggest that you take a chill pill to calm your nerves and let yourself and your pet enjoy the journey ahead.

Pets on sedation during travel may experience slow heart rates and may be too lethargic to even eat and drink during the flight. Some pets may suffer jet lag too. What can you provide that is safe to keep your pet calm?

Do bring your pet's security blanket or his favorite stuffed animal, toy, bone any item which has a familiar scent that will bring comfort and relax him.

Lavender oil or other calming oils can be massaged on pets during feeding times or before walks for positive association. The scent will allow him to remain relaxed. Hours before the journey, try rubbing a little lavender oil between your hands and give your pet a little aromatherapy or deep tissue massage for the best soothing effect.

Provide long walks, play and nutritious food

Before the flight, play or take your pet for a long walk. The more tired your pet is, the more likely it is to rest or sleep during the trip. Feed them a light meal at least 2-4 hours before the trip. A water bottle inside the crate should be available all throughout the trip.

Traveling with your furry pal can be an engaging experience for both you and the people you're with. The key is to be as prepared as possible. Plan well and do your homework when traveling. The more prepared you and your pet are, the fewer surprises there will be. Don't forget to make sure they are fit and healthy and above all, of course, be a calm and assertive PAWrent. Have a safe and enjoyable trip!

There are a number of ways you can ensure your baby love is welltaken care of while you're on vacation. The key is to plan ahead so you can choose the best possible arrangement for your dog or cat, without subjecting them to any undue physical, mental or emotional stress.

R&R with Trusted Family Member/friend

There is no better way to ensure your pet's well-being than by letting him/ her enjoy the very comforts of home while you're away. Our beloved pets, however well-adjusted or well-trained they may be, still prefer the familiarity and routines they have at home. So



With this set-up you can assure that your furry baby will be at his/her most comfortable, plus you can throw all your worries out the window since the person who will be taking care of your





pet is someone you know and who will surely express the same amount of devotion and care to your beloved four-legged pooch. Since your pet already knows who's taking care of him/her, s/he will feel very relaxed and will be subjected to the least amount of stress with your departure. Despite missing you, s/he will also be guaranteed to have lots of fun. Just make sure to share your baby's routine to your relative/friend so they will be able to follow it closely without a hitch.

Date with the Pet Sitter

If you already have a person who takes your dog out for a walk regularly, why not ask him/her to accompany your pet at home? This can be an option if you already trust your dog walker There is no better way to ensure your pet's well-being than by letting him/ her enjoy the very comforts of home while you're away.. and don't mind him/her crashing at your house for some time. A plus point is that your pet already knows him/her.

However, if this isn't a set-up you would be comfortable with, you can opt to ask your dog walker to take your furry baby home with him/her. You can help your pet acclimatize to the new surroundings by bringing him/ her around to your dog walker's house several times before you leave. Don't forget to bring your four-legged friend's beloved bed and toys so s/he would be surrounded by familiar things despite being in a different home. How to use dog treats most effectively

Use treats to reinforce a calm, submissive state. Never use dog treats to reward an excited, over-stimulated state of mind. Always let the dog smell the treat first, but hold it up away from her and wait. Remember dogs can smell from over 25 feet away so you don't have to put the treat under her nose. Once the dog has the scent, she may jump around at first, and will probably jump on you. If so,

indicate your disapproval with your attitude and body language and slowly move yourself back or to one side and then wait. Remember, your moment of patience as an owner will pay off in a well-behaved dog for a lifetime.

One of the reasons treats work so well in training, is because a dog's sense of smell is so unbelievable. Dogs can smell a treat from over 20 yards away and can get a pretty good idea of the main ingredients. Not all treats are created equal though. #cesarmillan

When to give dog treats

In between meals is the ideal time to give treats. Choose a treat that your dog will enjoy. As a rule of thumb I save the best, most delectable treats for last, to reengage a dog if she begins to lose interest in the training session. Make sure

> your treat giving occurs in between meals and not immediately before or after a meal.

When you engage your dog's nose, you are appealing to the most important part of her brain. Lift the treat slowly and easily so that your dog's nose follows it in your hand. If she jumps at your hand, take it away. Next

> time, have the treat hand closer to her head. The moment she begins to follow the treat with her nose and eyes and her butt beings to move to

the floor, say "sit" calmly and easily, and give her the treat. Use a natural voice as you don't want to startle or distract her. Remember, one of my cardinal rules for training is "don't overexcite your dog so that

she loses the lesson in all the commotion."

What ingredients to look for in a dog treat

When choosing a dog treat, make sure it's something your dog will like and something that's appropriate to give a dog. When buying treats (and food) for dogs, look at the ingredients list. If the ingredients include things you don't recognize or can't pronounce, it might not be the best treat for your dog. Also, keep in mind your dog has a different palate than a human and that *human treats are not necessarily* good for dogs. There are many things that we eat that dogs are allergic to or literally can't stomach.

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THE LONG ANDSHORT OF IT

Leashes are accessories that PAWrents cannot do without. Choose one that suits your pet and your specific endeavor. By Maria Zarah Gregorio Viado

A leash is not only useful when you take your dog out for a walk. Leashes can also be used for training, and of course, to protect your furry pal. It is a necessity when you have a pet as it provides you a mode of control especially when you're outdoors. With a leash, you can get the attention of your doggy love and keep him/her in line, while also keeping him/her from approaching other people or dogs in a haphazard or even threatening manner. Now the question is, which type of leash and

what length to choose? Read on below to find the myriad of choices.

WALKING LEASH

The most common type of leash is probably the synthetic or fabric leash. Easy to wash, cheap and lightweight, these are readily available in many stores, including Groovy. Usually measuring four to six feet in length, these are the ideal length for keeping your baby love in line and getting his/her attention and can be used for already trained or obedient dogs. The material might burn your hands and fingers when your dog pulls on it, so best to handle this type with gloves. Likewise, your furry love can easily chew through the plastic or fabric.

If you would like to avoid having a half-chewed through leash, you can opt for a leather one. Though more expensive, this type tends to last longer just like chain leashes. Chain leashes are more suitable for larger, heavier dogs. However, chain leashes may not be ideal for walking as they are



quite heavy and awkward to handle. In addition, they may pose the threat of choking, so every dog owner should be careful when using this type of leash.

TRAINING LEASH

If you are in the process of training your dog, regardless of whether you're working indoors or outdoors, you would require a training leash. Longer in length than walking leashes, this type can be made of synthetic material, fabric or rope.

A round synthetic leash could be ideal when you're working indoors, especially since it would give your furry pal freedom to move, it won't weigh him/her down, while the rounded shape of the leash will prevent it from getting stuck under furniture.

For outdoor training, a longer leash would be advisable (between 20-50 feet long), made of rope or cotton. The added length will help you practice distance commands such as sit or stay or recall. For easier handling, you can tie knots as intervals throughout the length of the rope so it won't get away from you. This type of leash is usually worn high on the dog's neck, where its most sensitive, prompting him/her to react quickly and avoid any discomfort.

RETRACTABLE LEASH

Retractable leashes can also be used for walking but may be more appropriate for trained dogs. The slack in the line may cause untrained dogs to pull or drag you when they see or smell something that piques their interest.

They are good for allowing your baby to explore and feel free however this type of leash is not advisable for crowded areas where you can lose your dog in the chaos of people and other dogs. Furthermore, a retractable leash can wrap around a tree or a post, or worse yet, wrap around other people or fingers and may cause harm or injury to other people. If you are using a retractable leash, it is important to keep your eyes on your four-legged buddy and take him/her to a less crowded area such as a park.

Regardless of the type of leash you are intending to buy, what is important is to choose one that is comfortable for vour pet. Leashes should also be durable and well-made, this will prevent you from going back and forth to the pet shop because your dog's last leash broke or was chewed on. As a PAWrent. you must also ensure that your furry baby does not get away from you therefore opt for a leash that has a secure clip, preferably one that is made of stainless steel. Don't buy a leash with a plastic clip as this would snap off easilv if your dog happens to pull hard. For more leash selections, visit the nearest Groovy Pet Store in your area. 🐇

MEET BILBO, THE ITALIAN WATER DOG, WHO HAS BEEN BITTEN BY THE TRAVEL BUG.

N ot all dogs like to travel. In fact, many dogs just don't have the temperament for it. But not Bilbo. This three-year-old Lagotto Romagnolo (or Italian water dog) from Holland is a breed apart because he loves accompanying his PAWrents on their numerous trips around Europe.

To date, Bilbo, who was named after Bilbo Baggins from I.R.R. Tolkien's "The Hobbit," has travelled to different countries in Europe, including trips to The Netherlands, United Kingdom, Scotland, Switzerland, Italy, Germany, France, and of course, Belgium, which he and his PAWrents – Febi Lubis and Tom Tassignon - call home. A dog who loves the water, Bilbo enjoys sleeping, walking and swimming whether at home or while on one of their family's bonding trips. Considered the best swimmer in their family, Bilbo was trained early on to enjoy car or train rides, "Since he was a puppy, we already took him around in the car, bus and train. I read a book, "Puppyhood (How to raise a perfect dog)" by Cesar Millan, and in it it's stated that whatever you want to teach your dog, you have to teach him/her before s/he is six months old. Whatever habits, manners, tricks that you teach him/her before six months old, it will

stick with him forever. And we have proven this to be true, because whatever we taught Bilbo before he was six months old, has stuck with him until now. We are very proud of Bilbo, we always get compliments from strangers when we are in restaurants, trains and hotels that Bilbo is so cute and wellbehaved," shares Febi, a brand manager at an advertising/management agency in Belgium.

Foresight and good training has allowed Febi and her husband. Tom. to take Bilbo wherever they go, even when they do errands, "Bilbo loves to sit in the car, he is already happy even for a short ride to the supermarket. I think, he thinks 'Take me anywhere with you, I don't care, as long as I am with you," she says. Because Febi and Tom work full-time, they have come to value the quality time they get to spend with Bilbo when they do go on vacation, "He is part of the family. We always take him with us when we travel inside Europe, because without him our travel would not be fun. However, if we have to travel outside Europe, he usually stays with my parents-in-law, because Bilbo has known them since he was a puppy, and my parents-inlaw's dog (terrier) is Bilbo's best friend."

We tried to put him in a traveling carrier/ cage when he was just four months old, but we realized that he didn't enjoy it that much, until we gave him his blanket. But now that he is all grownup, we just let him lie on the blanket without the carrier. Bilbo doesn't have a favorite snack, he eats everything. We usually give him treats in the public transport (bus, train); when the bus/ train is packed and Bilbo is calm and well-behaved, we make sure to reward him with some small treats."

A sensitive dog, Bilbo knows how to treat people well and Febi provides some examples, "The way he treats me is different with the way he treats my husband. With my husband, he always roughhouses like a boy but with me, he acts like a lap dog. Even when he meets strangers, Bilbo is always nicer towards beautiful girls/women and acts aloof and a bit distant towards men/boys. Maybe it's his Italian genes that make him so inclined," Febi concludes with a laugh. &

VET'S CORNER



NOTO **NAUSEA**

You are taking your dog, Rover, for his very first car ride to the dog park. Within minutes the ever active Rover suddenly becomes quiet, listless, and then vomits! Oh, no! What happened? By Yosefin Lingga, DVM

f you have encountered pets with car sickness problems before, then you probably already guessed that Rover is one of those dogs that gets car sick. Car sickness in dogs and cats is quite common especially in puppies and kittens. When you have car sick pets you will see tell-tale signs such as: listlessness, excessive drooling, restlessness, whining/meowing, vomiting, and even diarrhea.

Although motion sickness can be the cause, pet car sickness happens

most likely because of stress. The new sensation and sight of moving so fast could be terrifying for them. When your pet has this, even short car trips can be quite frustrating.

육 What To Do

Make the car as comfortable as pos-

sible. Keep it cool, avoid excessively loud noises, and remove any strong odor that might escalate the nausea. If your pets need to travel in another vehicle without you around, putting them inside a crate is probably a better option. You need to plan ahead and get them used to the crate a few days before. Putting a used t-shirt or their bed inside the crate might also help to calm them down.

Train your pet to get used to the car.

First, just let them stay inside the car without turning the engine on. Then turn the engine on without moving. If they are okay with that, do very short trips near your house to get your pet accustomed to car rides. Do this repeatedly, prolonging the travel each time. Don't forget to praise them and give them treats to make the travel more fun.

Several sprays for dogs and cats contain pheromones, that have a calming effect and helps with stress.

Don't feed your pet a few hours before travel. Having a full stomach during travel can worsen the nausea and increase the chance for your pet to vomit.

Most pets eventually outgrow car sickness. However, if nothing works, your pet might need anti-nausea or anti-stress medications. This is especially important if your pet needs to travel for a long period of time. Many of these medications need to be given over a couple of days before the calming effect works. Consult with your pet's vet and see which medication works best for them.



THE LOWDOWN ON RABIES

Injury and death due to rabies can be prevented if more people are aware of how to protect themselves and their pets from the virus. Be a smart PAWrent and have your pet vaccinated now. By Deasy Anellis Juwana, DVM

abies is one of the most wellknown of all the viruses. Human cases and deaths from rabies are much higher. Around the world. one person dies from rabies every 10 minutes. The disease is widespread but certain countries such as Australia. New Zealand, Japan, Hawaii, Taiwan and all other Pacific Islands, UK, Ireland, Spain, Portugal, Norway, Sweden, and some West Indian and Atlantic islands are completely free of rabies. Dog rabies is quite common in parts of Mexico, Colombia, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, India, Nepal, Peru, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand (high risk) and Vietnam; the disease also occurs in most African, and Asian countries, including Indonesia.

People that work closely with wildlife, veterinarians, and travelers are at the highest risk of exposure. Fortunately, there is a vaccine that is available to protect high-risk people. Animals that come into contact with wildlife and are not vaccinated are at a higher risk of infection.

How the Virus Spreads

The transmission of the disease almost always occurs as a result of an infected animal biting a non-infected animal. Skunks, raccoons, foxes, coyotes and bats are the animals most likely to transmit the virus. Rabies virus does not live very long outside the host and remains viable in the carcass of an infected animal for less than 24 hours. The rabies virus is shed at high levels in saliva. However, being bitten by a rabid animal does not necessarily mean that the bitten animal (or human) will become infected. It has been speculated, that only around 15% of exposed people will contract the disease. Humans, cats, and dogs are only mildly susceptible to the disease.

Know the Symptoms /

After coming in contact with the virus, the bitten animal may go through one or all of several stages. With most animals, the virus will spread through the nerves of the bitten animal towards the brain. The virus is relatively slow moving and the average time of incubation from exposure to brain involvement is between 3 to 8 weeks in dogs. 2 to 6 weeks in cats, and 3 to 6 weeks in people. However, incubation periods as long as 6 months in dogs and 12 months in people have been reported. After the virus reaches the brain, it will then move to the salivary glands where it can be spread through a bite. After the virus reaches the brain. the animal will show obvious clinical signs, such as nervousness, anxiety, solitude, and a fever as well as hyper responsiveness to auditory and visual stimuli. When caged, dogs may bite and attack their enclosures. Animals progress to become disoriented and then have seizures and eventually die.

Nerves affecting the head and throat are the first to be involved and animals may begin to salivate as a result of their inability to swallow. Deep labored breathing and a dropped jaw may result as the diaphragm and facial muscles become increasingly paralyzed. The animal will get weaker and eventually go into respiratory failure and die. The current way to diagnose rabies in animals is to submit the brain for microscopic examination. Some new testing techniques utilizing skin and/ or blood samples are being studied nowadays and used in several research settings and show promise as a way of testing potentially exposed humans and animals.

Any pet who is bitten or scratched by either a wild, carnivorous mammal or a bat that is not available for testing should be considered as having been exposed to rabies. Public health officials recommend that unvaccinated dogs, cats, and ferrets exposed to a rabid animal should be euthanized immediately. If the owner is unwilling to have this done, the animal should be placed in strict isolation for 6 months and vaccinated 1 month before being released. Animals with expired vaccinations need to be evaluated on a caseby-case basis. Dogs and cats that are currently vaccinated are kept under observation for 45 days.

Prevention is the Cure

But if bitten, scratched or licked (on broken skin) by an animal:

- **1. Cleanse the wound** with soap and water and a povidone-iodine solution if available.
- 2. Seek medical help for thorough deep-wound cleansing.
- Injections of rabies immune globulin and vaccines as prescribed.
- Tetanus prophylaxis and antibacterial treatment when required.
- 5. No sutures (stitches) for wound closure, unless unavoidable.
- Follow-up for completion of vaccine program and wound care.
- Notify local health authorities immediately for rabies *post-exposure vaccination*, even if you have had pre-exposure vaccination. (THIS CAN BE LIFE SAVING).

There is no treatment. Once the disease develops in humans, death is almost certain. Only a handful of people have survived rabies after extremely intensive medical care. There have been several reported cases of dogs surviving the infection, but they are very rare.

Vaccination is the best way to prevent infection and properly vaccinated animals stand very little chance of contracting the disease. The standard vaccination protocol is to vaccinate cats and dogs at three or four months and then again at one year of age. A year later, a three-year rabies vaccination is recommended. The three-year vaccine has been tested and shown to be very effective. A few counties, states, or individual veterinarians require yearly or once every two-year vaccination for a variety of reasons. ♣

KEEPING YOUR PET



Healthy and fit pets mean they are physically fit and have a healthy mind and behavior. Every pet has its own specific needs according to their breed, size, age, lifestyle and sexual status (intact or neutered). To keep your pets fit, you need to give them precise nutrition based on their unique requirements.

KEEPING YOUR PETS IN SHAPE

Physical fitness and maintaining a healthy body weight is just as important

for dogs and cats as it is for humans. Unfortunately many pet owners don't realize that their pet is overweight, and many are unaware of how much this impacts their pet's health.

Excess weight leads to a number of health conditions in dogs and cats including diabetes, arthritis, heart disease, lung disorders, high blood pressure, immune dysfunction and some cancers. Pets who maintain a healthy body weight can live longer, healthier, and lead happier lives.

SIZE MATTERS

Bigger animals have lower body metabolism, this means they need lower energy per kilogram food than smaller animals. Give your pet food that is specially formulated according to his/her size, otherwise your dog will gain more weight or lose weight and either of these conditions will definitely not make your pet fit.

HEALTH NUTRITION FOR EVERY LIFE STAGE

As we are all aware, every life stage has its own unique nutrition requirement. We must fulfill these nutritional requirements to make our pets live longer, happy and healthy lives.

→ PUPPY & KITTEN

Puppies and kittens are still growing. They need more proteins and calories to develop their bodies. Special nutrients like essential fatty acid is also needed to ensure maximum brain development. Precise amounts of minerals such as calcium and phosphorus will ensure healthy bone and joint development.

→ ADULT

Dogs and cats age differently according to their adult sizes. Different sizes have different life expectancies. Adult nutrition objectives is to give the pets balanced energy content while maintaining their health by adding nutrients like antioxidants.

→ SENIOR

In their twilight years, the major organ capabilities of senior pets may be reduced. They need more antioxidants to slow down the aging process and low phosphorus content to reduce the risk of kidney problems.

EXERCISE TO STIMULATE, NOT TO ANNIHILATE

Exercise is an important activity to keep your pet healthy and fit. Exercise can be in the form of walking, running, playing fetch, hiking, playing, swimming, sports, tricks and games. For cats, you can use toys to play a hunting game. Generally, dogs and cats should get at least 15- 30 minutes of exercise each day.

Exercise can be shorter but more frequent. For senior pets, exercise can be shorter and/or less frequent.

Get your vet's approval before starting your pets on an exercise program. Remember you should not exercise your dog right before or after a meal. Try different activities and find out what you and your pet enjoy the most. To stimulate curiosity, introduce new toys regularly.

Travel Easy

A vacation is not especially enjoyable when your mind is on your pet back home. Don't spoil your much-deserved break by constantly checking up on your baby. Instead, why not bring your furry pal with you? Gear up for your trip with careful planning and preparation. Head on over to your favorite Groovy Pet Store to acquire the items you will need to be travel-ready.

➢ HAVE A CRATE/CARRIER DATE

If you decide to take your cat/dog with you, the best (and safest way) to do this would be to crate them or bring them in a carrier.

As a rule, crates should be high enough for your dog to stand in and provide enough room for him/her to be able to turn around completely without difficulty. The crate should also have proper air circulation or ventilation as well as a lock or latch to keep your four-legged baby inside. The same goes for carriers for smaller pets. It would be advisable to check airline size requirements for crates/carriers before you buy one.

A crate or carrier serves as a familiar. cozy and comfortable place for your pet while s/he is in transit, whether in the car or aboard the plane, so choose one that is made of light yet durable material. Allow your furry pal to have a positive association with the crate/ carrier by letting him/her enter on his/her own time. Be chirpy and happy when you talk to your dog as s/he enters the crate. Suffice to say, you might need to introduce the crate way before you are set to leave and practice leaving him/her for some time inside, first without closing the door, then eventually closing it. It might also help to take your pet in his crate/carrier on several short drives, this will serve as practice.

REQUIRED FASTING

Do not feed your pet a hearty meal before you depart. This way you can avoid any catastrophe brought on by nausea. However, you can give him/ her a treat during breaks in your travel or as a way to calm him/her down. Remember, do not overdo it on the treats. A little at a time will indeed go a long way.

HYDRATE AS YOU GO

Despite not feeding your pet a lot, you must keep him/her well hydrated. Purchase a portable water bottle to prevent any spills.

POTTY BREAKS

Before you leave, make sure to let your pet relieve his/herself. A diaper can also minimize any accidents. Every time you stop for a travel break, let your dog out with you. This way s/he can stretch and perhaps go to the potty himself/herself. *

COOL and CALM

Travelling doesn't have to be chaotic. Keep your pet calm throughout your trip by being a vigilant PAWrent. By Maria Zarah Gregorio Viado

There's no real secret to having a hassle-free trip with your pet. All you need is a substantial amount of planning, presence of mind and of course, don't hold back on the tender loving care. Your little love will surely be calmer (and happier!) being around you than being left at home.

KEEP CALM YOURSELF

When you're calm, your pet will be calm. Speak softly yet firmly to your furry love when you feel s/he is feeling riled up. You can also stroke him/her gently through the crate/ carrier. Maintaining a positive tone and atmosphere will help your cat/dog feel comfortable and relaxed for the duration of your trip.

SURROUND HIM/HER WITH FAMILIAR THINGS

Be sure to bring your pet baby's favorite blanket, bed or toy and place that with him/her inside his/her crate. Stuffing an old shirt of yours inside his/her crate or carrier could also serve to calm him/her down. Don't forget to also have a portable water dispenser and food bowl for your baby love.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

If you're going on a road trip, it would be advisable to take your doggy baby on several short car trips to condition him for a longer one. Take him to the park in the car or just around the block. Don't forget to reward him with a treat afterwards so he would have a positive memory of the ride.





DISTRACT WITH A TOY

Just like children, pets also need one or two distractions especially for a long-haul trip. ETIQUETTE & COMMUNICATIONS



There is a way for Fido to remain calm and behave while you are away. It just takes some time, perseverance and lots of practice. By Lance Tan f you are thinking you simply cannot leave your dog alone in your home, then you are mistaken. Invest some time in teaching your dog proper behavior and you will certainly reap the benefits.

To begin with, formal retraining should be directed at teaching your dog to remain on its mat, in its bed, or in its crate or den area, for progressively longer periods of time (30 minutes or more).

STEP1 Start by using a favored treat as a prompt. Hold it in front of your dog, have him or her sit or lie

down on command and give the food, praise and pet him/her. At the next few commands, hide the food so that the dog is not certain whether it is there or not. Progress from a 1 second sit, to 2 seconds then 3 seconds, etc., until the dog will sit for at least 60 seconds.

STEP 2 You can practice the "stay" command, saying "sit", ("stay implied") and walk 2 or 3 steps away. Have the dog stay for 60 seconds and then walk back and give the reward with the dog staying in position. Once your dog will stay in place for 1 minute while you go across the room, sit and return, switch to intermittent rewards.



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Patting and praise is given every time, but food is only given every 2nd, 3rd or 4th time. However, for each new step in training, use the food reward the first time or two. If you have trouble proceeding to this step, change to a leash and collar to ensure success.

The balance of the training should proceed in the dog's quiet or resting area, using as many cues as possible to help relax the dog. Mimic the secure environment that the dog feels when the owner is at home. Leave the TV on. Play a favorite video or CD. Leave a favorite blanket or chew tov in the area. These all help to calm the dog. You are teaching the dog to stay in its bed or confinement area for progressively longer periods of time before you return and give the reward. Initially, train the dog to stay for 1 minute while vou cross the room, return, and give either the food or praise and affection. Increase this up to 30 minutes. From this point on, your dog should be encouraged to stay in its bed or crate for extended periods of time rather than sitting at your feet or on your lap.

STEP 3 You begin to leave the room. Give the 'down' (stay implied) command, walk across the room, and go out of sight for a short time before returning to give the reward. Gradually make departures longer until the dog will tolerate leaving for up to 30 minutes.

STEP 4 Practice short "mock" departures. During "mock" or graduated departure training, the dog should be exercised, given a short formal training session, and taken to its bed or mat to relax. Give the 'down' command, a few toys and treats and leave. The first few "mock" departures should be just long enough to leave and return without any signs of anxiety or destructiveness.

This might last from a few seconds to a couple of minutes.

Gradually but randomly increase the time (e.g. 30 seconds, 1 minute, 2 minutes, 1, 2, 3, 2, 5, 7, 4, 7, 10, etc.). As the time of departures approaches 10 or 15 minutes, begin to include other activities associated with departure such as opening and closing the car door and returning, turning on and off the car engine and returning, or pulling the car out of the driveway and returning.

Many dogs that destroy the home when left alone will stay in a car or van without becoming anxious or destructive. This is because the dog has learned to relax and enjoy the car rides without the need for constant physical attention and contact. And when the owner does leave the relaxed dog in the car, the departures are generally quite short. The owner may occasionally leave the dog in the car during longer absences.

This inattention, relaxation and graduated departure technique is worth trying with your own four-legged baby. What is very important is to progress slowly through the series of departures. If when you return, the dog is anxious or extremely excited, then the departure was too long and the next one should be shorter. This is an effective technique, but very slow in the beginning. The goal is to teach your pet to think, "my owner is only going to be gone for a short time; they are coming right back; I can be good."



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POOCH Troubles

Is your four-legged baby acting up or just experiencing anxiety because you left the house? Be an observant PAWrent to find out what is exactly troubling your pooch. By Lance Tan

ost pets express their love for their PAWrents by staying close to them. However, some cannot bear to be apart from their beloved mommy or daddy. When your furry pal becomes whiney or becomes destructive in your home, it could be a sign that s/he is experiencing separation anxiety.

HOW DO I KNOW IF MY PET'S PROBLEM IS DUE TO SEPARATION ANXIETY?

Separation anxiety describes dogs that are overly attached or dependent on family members. They become extremely anxious and show distress behaviors of vocalization. destruction. house-soiling or inactivity when separated from their owners. Most dogs with separation anxiety try to remain close to their owners and become increasingly anxious the greater the separation. They may follow the owners from room to room and begin to display signs of anxiety as soon as the owners prepare to leave. Some of these dogs crave a great deal of physical contact and attention from their owners and can be demanding. During departures or separations, they may begin to salivate or pant profusely, vocalize, eliminate, refuse to eat, become destructive or become guiet and withdrawn. Most often, these behaviors occur within about 20 minutes of the owner's departure. While typically the behavior occurs each and every time the owner leaves, it can happen on selected departures, such as work-day departures, or when the owner leaves again after coming home from work.

ARE THERE OTHER REASONS THAT MY DOG MAY ENGAGE IN THESE BEHAVIORS?

Many dogs, especially puppies that enjoy chewing, engage in the behavior when they have nothing better to keep them occupied. House-soiling may be due to medical problems, leaving the dog alone for longer than it can control its bladder or inadequate housetraining. Vocalization may be due to territorial intrusion by strangers or other animals and can be a rewarded behavior if the dog receives any form of attention when it vocalizes or rewarded by the stimulus leaving. Some dogs will attempt to escape or become extremely anxious when confined, so that destructiveness or house-soiling when a dog is locked up in a crate, basement, or laundry room, may be due to confinement or barrier anxiety and associated attempts at escape. In addition, noise phobias such as a thunderstorm that passes through during the owner's absence, may lead to marked destructiveness, housesoiling, salivation and vocalization.
