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THE GREATS OF ZORRA – CHARLES GORDON

Storytelling brings history alive. Zorra Heritage Committee collects and shares stories, as storytelling has always been a vital part of Zorra's sense of itself. Zorra's most acclaimed storyteller, Charles W. Gordon (1860-1937), moved to the Harrington manse at age ten, as his father was appointed Presbyterian minister. Charles eventually earned his own manse in Winnipeg, but only after attending school in Harrington and high school in St. Marys before and after becoming a man of the cloth himself. Charles was chaplain to Canadian soldiers in the "Great War" and offered advice to presidents and prime ministers. He supplemented sermons with novels published under the pen name, "Ralph Connor". They were "fast paced, sentimental melodramas, with stereotyped characters dramatizing the conflict between good & evil in frontier settings presided over by exemplary churchmen". His novels went viral – the first 3 sold over five million copies. His fame & prestige culminated in appointment as Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Canada from 1922 to 1925, during the period of church unification. Still, he continued to care for the community that nourished him in his youth. He regretted being unable to attend the Harrington Boys and Girls Reunion in 1925 but sent the community a long letter, including, "I have seen many lovely parts of Canada, but for quiet sweet, restful beauty, I know of nothing more exquisite and more satisfying than the view from Pitt's Hill on the one side of the village, or from Sullivan Ross' front door on the other".

CLUTTER AND CORTISOL

We live in a consumer driven society. Everywhere we turn we are met with sales, new styles, and increasingly convenient ways of acquiring stuff. Overwhelm & increased cortisol happens quickly. Minimizing the clutter in our lives is a tangible way to reduce stress. Research states that reducing the amount of "stuff" you have can decrease stress, depression & fatigue. Organizing almost immediately provides gratification. You go through a cupboard, fill a bag, and immediately see (and hopefully feel) the physical benefits.

To get started:

- When you receive a new item, use that box or bag to fill with things to go. Or think of swaps: buying two new sweaters, then two have to go.
- Set a timer and organize a spot and make a pile to go.
- Pick a theme: kitchen items, clothes, kid's toys.

Getting rid of "clutter" can feel difficult. We hold onto items for many reasons: grief, guilt, security & more. Try passing items along to a specific cause or person. Have compassion & start slow. Once we get started, organizing is just one of the ways our mental health may be reflected in our surroundings. Jaclyn Turpin is a Social Worker at Rural Refresh Counselling. She supports adults experiencing grief and farmers & their families.

Pet Responsibility Reminder

As we spend more time outdoors this season, please remember Township By-law No. 76-2017:

Do not allow your dog to run at large
Always clean up after your dog

Prevent excessive barking or howling that may disturb your neighbours
Ensure your pet has proper identification (tag or microchip)

No owner shall tether a dog on a chain, rope, or other similar restraining device of less than 3.5 m(11.5 ft) in length and only in the owner's rear or side yard.

Failure to comply with Township By-law No. 76-2017 may result in enforcement action and fines as provided for under the by-law. The Township will continue to enforce these provisions to support public safety, responsible pet ownership, and respect for neighbouring properties.

With summer activities in full swing, July is a great time to enjoy the outdoors while keeping safety & emergency preparedness top of mind:

Outdoor Fire Safety:

Whether enjoying a backyard fire, camping, or spending time outdoors, always make fire safety a priority:

- Keep fires small, controlled, and attended at all times
- Keep water or a hose nearby
- Keep children and pets at a safe distance
- Fully extinguish fires before leaving the area

Severe Weather & Emergency Preparedness:

Summer storms can develop quickly. Strong winds, heavy rain, and lightning can cause property damage, road hazards, and power outages.

Be prepared by:

- Securing outdoor items that could become hazards during high winds
- Keeping flashlights, batteries, and emergency supplies available
- Charging mobile devices before severe weather arrives
- Staying informed through local weather alerts and updates

Power Outages:

If the power goes out:

- Avoid using generators, BBQs, or outdoor fuel-burning equipment indoors or in enclosed areas
- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed to maintain temperatures
- Check on neighbours, especially those who may need additional support

For emergencies, always call 9-1-1.

Did you know that Ontario has an Environmental Bill of Rights which entitles you currently to comment on plans that may affect your community or your personal health? It's interesting reading. For instance, search out ERO # 026-0595 which claims to be about renewable energy from waste. Sounds like a good idea, except the document is short enough to be on the back of a napkin, vague enough to be a government-sponsored feel-good ad (paid with tax money), and foolish enough to make you snort with laughter. It proposes taking biological waste (and that's a large possible list) and mixing it with plastics & other junk to burn to create energy. The problem as anyone who has fed wet wood into a backyard or campground fire knows is that wet materials like organic waste, clay-based kitty litter, food scraps, etc. take a lot of work to light, and send off dense clouds of smoke. In industrial incineration, suggests Bryan Smith, those clouds of smoke heading to your family's lungs would contain dioxins & furans from plastics included in the waste. It gets worse: Someone at the Ministry of the Environment thinks that we should burn metal. Please do not try the experiment in burning metals at home. It will fail, for sure. Risks are high. What to do? Look up the ERO 026-0595, find the comment button, and tell them how badly their plan stinks.
