A Few Tips for Your Christmas Tree Hunt

Before sawing down the first tree that catches your eye, you'll want to take a couple things into consideration. Measure the ceiling height in the room you plan to display your Christmas tree, so you can be sure to select one that fits. Bring a blanket or tarp to cover the top of your car to prevent scratches during transportation. Pack a few pairs of gloves for yourself and children to prevent tree sap from sticking to your hands. Lastly, don't forget to examine all sides of the tree to be sure there are no surprise bare spots.

Twinkling Family Fun


With colder weather on the way, now's the time to start creating your Christmas bucket list! A great place to start is by including some must-see Christmas lights in the Carolinas this holiday season.

Charleston's **Holiday Festival of Lights**



Tips for Snow Tubing in NC

No matter which tubing park you opt to visit, there are a few tips to keep in mind when planning your snowy adventure:

- No one wants wet, cold feet.
 Wear waterproof shoes and warm socks.
- Dress in layers. Weather can be unpredictable, so it's best to prepare to peel off a few layers throughout the day or add on as needed.
- Wear waterproof gloves to keep your hands toasty and dry all day long.
- Check the website of your ideal tubing park before visiting. Hours may vary and often large parties require a reservation.
- Most body heat is lost through the head, so be sure to cover that noggin' with a warm hat.
- Bring sunscreen and sunglasses to protect your skin and eyes from the reflection off the snow.

With over 20 runs, Hawksnest Snow Tubing is a bustling winter wonderland and the largest snow tubing park on the East Coast. The lanes range from 400 to 1,000 feet in length, meaning no matter your family's comfort level with tubing, you're sure to find a lane to love. When it's time for a break, the 1,500-foot viewing deck has tasty beverages to warm you up such as hot chocolate and coffee. Sugar Mountain Snow Tubing




Treat Your Out-of-Town Visitors to Carolina Holiday Traditions

Winter with the Western Company

Statesville, December 11 While people have been celebrating Christmas in the Carolinas for hundreds of years, the way they honor the season has changed significantly. Each year at Fort Dobbs in Statesville visitors get the chance to see what holiday preparation was like during the 1700s. Winter with the Western Company is an annual living history event which explains how soldiers at the fort prepared for winter and the Christmas holidays. Children and adults alike will enjoy watching traditional open fire cooking displays as well as the actors' woodworking skills. Christmas Village Christkindlmarkt

Charlotte, December This newer holiday tradition combines the magic of a German-style Christmas market with the modern vibe of Charlotte. Visitors can shop for Christmas gifts while tasting traditional German cider called "Gluhwein," served in commemorative mugs. Although this market tradition only started a few years ago, it's quickly grown into an elaborate event. You can peruse the market's extensive collection of Scandinavian ornaments, Ukrainian glass ornaments, and Ecuadorian crafts, all a reminder of the city's diverse culture. *Truist Field, 324 S. Visit ChristmasVille

Rock Hill, December 2–24 Many towns have a tradition of decorating for the holidays, but the town of Rockhill goes all out. If you really want to show your visitors a taste of the Southern holiday spirit, visit Rockhill (or ChristmasVille, as it's also known) during their annual multiple-day Christmas event. The town celebrates the season with more than 70 events and lots of art on display. Where did the inspiration for this celebration come from? Vernon Grant, the artist behind the famous Kellogg's Rice Crispies elves, called Rock Hill home for much of his life. His work encouraged many of the town residents to follow suit in terms of creativity, and the rest is history! *Rock Hill, SC 29730*

Yule Log Ceremony

McAdenville, December 16 Frequently people who aren't from the area have heard of McAdenville. This town is famously also referred to as "Christmastown USA." Each year since the 1950s, they've held a popular Yule Log Ceremony. Your children can help pull the log down the streets on a sled while the townspeople follow, ultimately placing the log in McAdenville's outdoor fire pit. The log is then ceremoniously lit. Afterwards, you'll want to stick around for live Christmas music. McAdenville, NC 28101

Whether your children want to take the Polar Express train ride in the majestic North Carolina mountains in honor of their favorite book, or if you've always wanted to ride one of the scenic trains in South Carolina, the whole family will be eager for a ticket aboard a Christmas train!

Great Smoky Mountain Railroad Polar Express Train Ride

Bryson City, NC If you're looking for the quintessential holiday train experience, take the Polar Express through the Great Smoky Mountains. This Bryson City train ride is a must for families with little ones. At just over an hour long, this ride is the perfect length to enjoy a night of holiday fun without staying up past the kids' bedtimes. You'll get to hear a special reading of the famous Polar Express story while sipping on delicious hot cocoa and a tasty snack. Polar Express Train Ride

Spencer, **NC** Another Polar Express-themed train ride, this one is hosted by the NC Transportation Museum. Buy your tickets early since the two trains on-site operate only on select dates in December. Prices range from \$32-\$360, depending on the type of ticket. Tweetsie Christmas

Blowing Rock, NC Looking for a North Carolina scenic railroad to give you those cozy Christmas vibes this year? Experience a Tweetsie Christmas, a popular event in western North Carolina that involves a 20-minute train ride through the picturesque Blue Ridge Mountains. The train departs every half-hour, with the first one of the day leaving at 5:30 pm. Besides the open-air train car ride (you'll want to bundle up), visitors can enjoy amusement park rides, stop by the Gingerbread House to visit with Santa, and make s'mores around the campfire. Santa Train

Winnsboro, SC Each December, the South Carolina Railroad Museum offers rides on their Santa Train. Santa rides the train the whole way and makes a point to stop and visit with each family during their journey. You'll get to take plenty of pictures along the way. If your family is looking for an enchanting evening train ride, consider their similar Twilight Santa Train ride. This train departs later in the day, and passengers are treated to snacks like hot chocolate and cookies. Country Christmas Train

Denton, NC Denton's Country Christmas Train experience has a little bit of everything for visitors to enjoy. There's a candy cane-adorned path to welcome visitors, a gingerbread house that sells baked goods, a live nativity scene, and even a petting zoo. Partners can sign up for a romantic horse-drawn carriage ride, while craft-inclined visitors will want to stop by the candle-making exhibit for demonstrations of this artform. Get the Most Out of Your Train Ride

No matter which train you board, make sure you come prepared. Many of the trains are unheated, which means you'll want to wear very warm clothing. In addition to a thick jacket, be sure to bring hats, mittens, and scarves as even daytime temperatures can be quite chilly in the Carolinas during the winter months. Several of the trains offer snacks, but most of them do not offer full meal options, so plan on eating your lunch or dinner ahead of time. Also, give your family plenty of time to arrive. Trains run on tight schedules, and you don't want to risk the disappointment of missing your ride!
