

Follow up from 'Harnessing The Power of Mothers' Session

If you attended the retreat and the session titled 'Harnessing the Power of Mothers: Where do we go from here?' then you likely shared what things you are passionate about getting accomplished in the adoptee/mother rights community. The session allowed for ample time to collaborate with each other and come up with a list of things we could do now to help move our cause along. And it's clear the most important thing to all of you is getting the money out of adoption! See the results of our post-event survey to the right here. Session leaders will be taking the results back to the Catholic Mothers for Truth & Transparency group Connect with the Reproducti.. to see what the potential next steps could be. List of resources cited in the Connecticut advocacy part of the session:

- Written Public Testimony to Connecticut General Assembly with 45 co-signers including 3 actual Connecticut Catholic Charities Agreements.
- <u>Catholic Birthmothers to Legislators: Help Us Heal</u>, article with video that ran in the CT Mirror after a tough House of Reps debate (that ended in passage) in an effort to curb the upcoming Senate debate.
- Keeping identities of birth parents secret doesn't just hurt the adopted, article that ran in the Hartford Courant both print and online—the Sunday before we began receiving assurances from the Senate they were taking up the bill for final passage.
- Catholic Mothers Vimeo Channel, used on social like this tweet.
- 2018 Letter to Connecticut General Assembly from pro-women's organizations endorsing the Adoptee Rights Bill as restorative and in the best interests of women. (This was the first time we started talking openly about what Baby Scoop Era women went through. It was received by supporting legislators in such a way that female legislators began to champion the Adoptee Rights Bill and we secured our House champion, Rep. Cristin McCarthy Vahey (D- Fairfield) who in the end, along with Senator Steve Cassano (D- Manchester), would bring the bill home.
- <u>Birth mothers say a bill granting adoptees access to their original birth records is a key step toward healing</u>, an article featuring Karen Quesnel and the Catholic Mothers group that ran in the Hartford Courant the Monday after the Senate passed the bill.

Follow up from The Vance Twins





Hi CUB Members.

My sister, Jennette, and I really valued the time we had in your presence at the October retreat celebrating 45 years of your work. We think your members are awesome. Thank you for inviting my twin and me to present on the authors' panel. It was a great experience. I wanted to update you on the Adoption Trafficking Awareness Symposium that I had briefly mentioned during my PowerPoint talk.

My sister and I just secured the Washington State History Museum for the event which will take place this coming summer on Saturday, June 18th, 2022. (We originally hoped for the library but they stopped holding events since 2019). However, we are so excited because the auditorium inside the museum is a much more intimate and safe place for participants to share our expertise and stories. (Safety is our number one priority.) I don't know about you, but in years past whenever we shared our adoption experience, we tended to be ripped to shreds because of certain assumptions about who we are (as adopted people), who we should be, and what we should believe when it comes to adoption. The symposium will flip adoption upside down; it will consist of a lecture series given by some of our colleagues, allies, and alliances and we include you in this mix of amazing people. Some of the topics we will cover are the history of adoption, investigational research led by one of our overseas partners who has helped mothers in India and Ethiopia throughout the years to find their children sent overseas to the west. We also plan for panel discussions on the aftermath of adoption which will include grief and suicide —topics that adoption agencies refuse to acknowledge (since it would cut into their profit margins). We would like the audience to be filled with warm receptive friendly faces, such as yours. The auditorium is an intimate space and fits about 200 people. We will end on a happy note and hope you will consider joining us. My sister and I will be celebrating our 50th birthday that evening. We'd love to see you at this event at AgainstChildTraffickingUSA.org so we can make this happen together.

My sister and I truly believe that all of us together will change the dominant face of adoption in the effort to protect local and global families (and unsuspecting mothers) from being traumatized by permanent and unnecessary separations.

ADOPTION TRAFFICKING AWARENESS SYMPOSIUM SUMMER 2022 | WASHINGTON STATE, USA

Follow up from the Session 'The Adoption Closet: The Impact of Secrets on Families'

If you attended this session at the retreat, you learned that according to a recent study at Columbia University, at any given time the average person is keeping up to 13 secrets, 5 of which they've never told anyone. And as we know all too well at CUB, adoption was founded upon secrecy which has had an enormous and devastating impact on each member of the family as well as on our society at large. People keep secrets for a variety of reasons, but the biggest motivators are shame and fear. Keeping secrets, which is different from healthy privacy, negatively affects one's overall mental, emotional, and physical health and relationship to self and others.





Because secrets are so prevalent and potentially so harmful, we all need reminders to unburden ourselves from any that we are holding. We started this process together of healing from our harmful secret keeping at the retreat and in way of follow up, we wanted to remind you to follow the steps outlined here for healing and better health. Don't forget to practice ever important self care, especially during the holiday season when grief may be triggered more frequently. And for more information on the history of secrecy in adoption, read the highly recommended books below. It's time to come out of the Adoption Closet and make harmful secrets a thing of the past!
