New children's centre for the village

It was a bright day for the youngsters of Sonning Common when the new Rainbow Children's Centre opened its doors this spring.

The purpose-built centre, at Chiltern Edge School, offers a wide range of activities and family support programmes for children underfive and their parents/carers.

Current sessions include stay and play, a music group, baby clinic and Family Links, a 10-week parent nurturing programme. Facilities on-site include a family room, baby area and kitchen as well as an exciting, all-weather outdoor play area. The front of Chiltern Edge School was remodelled to accommodate the new children's centre.

As part of the £500,000 project, a new, joint reception area was created and the school converted two unused classrooms into a brand new science laboratory and a computer suite to support vocational BTEC courses in science and sport.

Rainbow Children's Centre manager Fran Bunkall said: "We are so pleased that the building has gone ahead in Sonning Common and think that, alongside the new pre-school and other facilities for under-fives in the village, we will be providing good quality support for many young children and their families."

As well as its regular sessions, the centre offers information and advice on a range of topics including early years' learning and development, healthy eating, job vacancies, benefits' information and domestic abuse.

*An earlier application to build the children's centre in Grove Road was withdrawn after a rare, protected species of newts was found on the proposed site.



Have your say on housing plans

Public consultation has begun on a new outline planning application to build 50 new houses in the village.

South Oxfordshire District Council (SODC) is currently considering an outline plan, submitted on 10 May, to build 50 new houses on pasture land behind homes on Kennylands Road.

Residents have until 10 June to write to the district council about the Kennylands Road proposal, during this initial phase of the planning process.

Kennylands Road Opposition Group has been formed by some residents who are against the plans.

Henry Pott, from the opposition group, said: "There is no natural boundary to this site - it backs on to an area of outstanding natural beauty stretching towards Kidmore End. The worry is that it might be difficult to contain housing development in this area in future, if current plans are approved.

"Anyone interested in commenting on the proposals should write individual letters to the district council outlining all the different issues they have.

"We do expect there to be new houses in Sonning Common and there will always be an element of, 'not in my back garden'. All we ask for is a fair fight in determining which is the least worst option for the village."

The application to develop the land behind numbers 34 to 56 Kennylands Road is being

made by local house builder T A Fisher. Acting on his behalf, agent lain Stevenson, from Carter Jonas, said: "We think this is the best site for development because it is well-related to the rest of the village. It is a short walk or cycle to the shops, services and facilities."

Last month a public exhibition took place in the village hall on a revised proposal to build 50 to 80 houses on Lea Meadow, next to the Herb Farm, off the Peppard Road.

Agents for the landowner, Richard Scott, will take into account residents' feedback from the exhibition before submitting a second, more detailed outline plan to the district council.

Planning consultant Ken Dijksman, speaking on behalf of Mr Scott, said: "One of the major benefits of our site is that it is entirely contained. It can't get any bigger because it is surrounded by protected trees."

He went on to claim that if all went well with the proposal, "new houses could be coming out of the ground in Lea Meadow in six months time".

But Michael Moore, major applications officer for SODC, denied this was possible. "A lot of public involvement has to take place before we will even begin to consider whether to approve any application for development of the scale proposed."

At the end of 2010 the district council published its new core strategy, which is currently being examined by an independent planning inspector. If approved, the council can adopt the core strategy which sets out

sites for strategic housing development in the towns of Didcot, Thame and Wallingford.

Later the council will be looking for sites for 740 homes to be split between 12 large villages in the district, including Sonning Common.

"In due course Sonning Common may be expected to take a modicum of development," said Mr Moore. "How many homes and where they go are decisions in which the public will be involved."

The district council would manage this public process, he said, which would include public exhibitions and detailed discussions with Sonning Common Parish Council.

What's happening to our library?



The strong public reaction to the threatened closure of 20 libraries across Oxfordshire has been recognised by the county council.

In March Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) decided that the proposal to close nearly half of its libraries should be reviewed and that it would look at all options with an open mind.

The council is expected to hold a public consultation on the future of the library service in Oxfordshire, due to run from now until the end of September.

John Jackson, director of social and community services for the county council, said: "As part of the four-month consultation all the available data used to support our proposal will be made publicly available. We will be providing a profile for each individual library which will include high level financial information.

"We want to work with local communities and with friends of libraries groups to determine the future plans for each library. We anticipate holding face-to-face public meetings for each library wherever this is requested by the local community."

In a public statement made earlier this year, council leader Keith Mitchell said the local authority would work hand-in-hand with communities to find a way to keep libraries

open. However, he made it quite clear that this could only happen if, in some places, volunteers stepped forward "to help run them".

The Friends of Sonning Common Library say they are determined to continue to campaign for professional library staff to be based in the village. Erica Coulehan, from the Friends group, said: "We believe village-based professional library staff are essential to the delivery of a comprehensive and efficient library service in Sonning Common.

"We will be making it clear to the county council that community volunteers may have a valuable part to play in supporting library staff, not in being responsible for running and funding the library themselves

"We urge people to consider now whether they would be prepared to help at the library in future. Please check at the library for details of how to volunteer."

While awaiting the public consultation period, the Friends of Sonning Common Library have continued to meet and plan and to liaise with the Save Oxfordshire Libraries group - an alliance of the threatened libraries.

When full details of the public consultation become available they will be posted on the Save Our Library website (www.saveourlibrary.org) and on village notice boards. Please also check OCC's website for information.



Library use continues to rise

The total number of children's books being issued by Sonning Common Library has gone up by 23 per cent, according to the latest figures.

All issues of books, DVDs, CDs and audiobooks have gone up by 16 per cent and the total number of visits by users was up by eight per cent, from 25,571 to 27,564.

The figures, released by Oxfordshire County Council, cover the period April 2010 to March 2011.

Or perhaps organise a fund-raising event such as opening your garden or holding a table-top sale?

Library volunteers are battle-weary from raising funds

Shortly after the village hall meeting in January about the possible withdrawal of funding for our library we paid a visit to the communityrun library at West Wycombe in Buckinghamshire.

West Wycombe's library is in a 1940s smithy/wheelwright's building. The first impression, with its open fire and sofas, is of a comfortable, cramped and slightly dishevelled reading room.

The shelving space is limited. The books are all donated and this shows, I'm afraid, in the quality of the books on offer. The non-fiction section was very small and reference books appeared to be out-of-date.

There was very little large print and no audio books or DVDs. The children's section was tiny compared to our wonderful selection of books in Sonning Common. West Wycombe has hundreds more books in store but no space to display them.

There are a couple of computers and any spare space is taken up with items for sale, made by supporters to raise funds.

The abiding impression, from talking to the volunteer on duty, was one of battle weariness from the constant need to raise funds.

It is very difficult to give a dispassionate view of our experience and it seems churlish to say anything that could be taken as criticism. It is clear that a huge amount of effort goes into keeping a library in West Wycombe open.

Sonning Common Library is in a very good, well-appointed building and needs to remain there. The Friends of Sonning Common Library are working hard to maintain funding, but they and prospective volunteers should be under no illusion about how much effort would be involved with maintaining the library without county council funding.

George May, the treasurer of Little Chalfont Community Library, has been quoted as saying, "There is no doubt the correct method of running libraries is for the county council to do it". And he is a man in a position to know.



All of Sonning Common's parish councillors had to stand down in May for the local elections.

This year the number of candidates wishing to join Sonning Common Parish Council exceeded the places available.

This led to an election for the first time in more than 25 years, estimated to have cost the taxpayer up to *£5,000.

A total of 16 candidates stood for the 12 seats on the parish council, including three of the four people who resigned as parish councillors last December.

Although parish councillors are required to stand down every four years, in previous years 12 or fewer people had applied to become parish councillors. So, they were automatically elected. Any vacancies were filled by co-opting new members on to the council.

Alan Rooke, who was re-elected to the parish council, said: "Competition produces vigorous, democratic councils that are the product of having enthusiastic, informed local residents who are prepared to stand for office and/or to vote.

"All the members of the new parish council are there in their own right. They can go forward knowing they were elected by the people of Sonning Common."

Councillor Rooke, also a Conservative member of South Oxfordshire District Council, said voter turnout in the district had been more than 48 per cent.*



She said it was time I made more of a contribution to village life.




"Why", I asked? "Because it is", she answered. Confronted with such irrefutable logic I gave in.

REARRANGING THE WORLD

Magazine is self-financing

I feel I must clarify some points with regard to the organisation of Sonning Common Magazine, following recent claims made in an electioneering leaflet circulated to the village.

The magazine is a not for profit organisation. It is run by a committee of volunteers and distributed by a further 70 volunteers, all of whom wish to serve the community and contribute to the life of the village.

The magazine is self-financing and is paid for almost solely by advertisements.

At the start of the financial crisis a few years ago, the then committee took the considered decision to hold down advertising rates as a way of helping hard-pressed village businesses.

Reserves were deemed to be sufficient to support this course of action in the short term.

Small but manageable losses were incurred for a couple of years as a result.

At the start of this year, the new committee reviewed the magazine's finances. A five-year business plan was produced and advertising rates were increased.

At the same time the magazine's production costs were re-assessed and new quotes obtained for printing. The re-designed publication now costs less to print than previously even though a higher grade of paper is used.

The magazine is grateful to Sonning Common Parish Council for a £500 grant this year.

The Oxfordshire Community Council suggests that parish councils have a responsibility to ensure their communities are kept informed of activities that relate to them and to support social cohesion.

As the magazine contributes to both of these areas, the committee felt it was right and proper to approach the parish council for some financial support. The parish council not only approved the grant but agreed to look kindly on further annual requests.

As a result of all the funding measures taken, the magazine had a small surplus this year and anticipates being able to fully cover its costs next year.

The reply received by Mr Thomas is exactly the same wording as the one we received when we wrote to The Co-operative Head Office, complaining about the music. It is a standard response with no reference whatsoever to the branch in Sonning Common.

It is very hard to imagine that numbers of local shoppers have gone out of their way to say how much they enjoy the music.

There is a disturbing belief in many quarters today that shopping becomes pleasant only when it is accompanied by someone else's choice of music.

It would be very helpful, we suggest, if other customers who object would write to the branch manager, for forwarding to head office.

In response to a query I received I began to look at changes to the shops in the village over time. Below is a survey of village shops, as remembered by several residents. Another important source of information was Fred Richens' invaluable account, The Village That Never Was.

Not surprisingly there have been numerous changes during this period, reflecting the changing lifestyles of Sonning Common residents. Dates are hard to pin down. Confirmation of dates is welcomed along with pointing out names I have forgotten or inaccuracies I have made.

WOOD LANE - FROM THE PEPPARD ROAD JUNCTION

Brinds Corner was named after the butcher's business established beside the road junction in 1905 which was sold to Len Gash in 1968. The shop was later divided into the current two parts, the front becoming an off-licence and the back remaining a butcher's shop, now Carl Wood's.

The chemist's shop was opened in 1958 by Mr Hibbert, sold on to Mr Carson and then to the present owners in about 1999. It has recently changed hands again.

Next door was Brewer's, the butcher's, featuring an interesting old mahogany cash booth; this shop became the Tandoori Connoisseur.

The next three shops along were Amazing Yarns which became Yeungs Chinese Takeway. The middle shop was a hairdresser's run by Ann Devlin, a corporate logo business and a pond supplier before again becoming a hairdresser's – Shannens then Serenity. Finally came Davies' greengrocer's and off-licence, which is now Occasions.

Where JDP Engineering was (empty at present) is the site of the first shop in the village - a general store founded by Fred Stannard in 1903. Later, his son-in-law Mr Nickless took it over.

When Mr Stannard died in 1936 his shop was run by Mr Fry before becoming West's minisupermarket and later offices.

Heath & Watkins was built in the 1960s and is the oldest business in the village. Next door was Crescent Stores, later Martins, the newsagent, then an upholstery business and now Pressed For Time. The Pet Stores hasn't changed since it was set up.

CROSS OVER THE ROAD

The commercial block at the top of Green Lane was built in the 1960s. It housed a branch of Barclays bank until about 1966, then a corn merchant and now the CCA charity shop. An estate agent has always operated next door - first Scotchbrooks, then Nicholas and now Davis Tate.

Round the corner are the fish and chip shop, the vet and the hairdresser – currently Forresters - which haven't changed since being first opened.

The Post Office was built by Eddie Nickless in 1937. He sold it to John Goodwin in 1965 who sold it on to the One-stop group. Daisy's next door has always been a bread shop under various names.

On the corner with Woodlands Road, Rogers opened a grocery store in 1908 as competition to Stannards. This became Plumbs in 1913 which aspired to being 'high class', taking deliveries from Harrods!

The shop was taken over by Kilby's, a subsidiary of International stores in 1933, later by Gateway in the 1980s, followed by Somerfield and now The Co-operative.

THE PEPPARD ROAD

What is now Beville Estate Agency was originally Josey's, the coal merchant's office. This was a prosperous and very important business in the days before gas

heating. Hazel Gardens was once Josey's coal yard.

The paper shop was originally run by Fred Pointin, later by Dents and by Edward Fulford, from the 1940s for 10 years. It has always been a newsagent's. But a succession of betting and hairdresser's shops have operated next door, along with Village Yarns and now the Village Barbers.

The electrical shop was originally a draper's shop, opened in 1906 by the Howes family. This was a successful business, drawing in custom from around the area. It was sold in 1966 after 60 years and later became a launderette.

At various times there were other general stores in the village: one in Baskerville Road, one in Grove Road and one at the top of Wood Lane – Newells then Stuarts - a very popular store which sold fresh vegetables direct from Covent Garden.

Although businesses have come and gone, this village has managed to retain a diverse selection of shops serving most of our everyday needs. We need to support them if Sonning Common is to retain the successful community spirit that makes it such a popular place to live in.
