Little progress on abandoned wave generator

The 3,000 tonne Oceanlinx Wave Energy Generator which was abandoned about 1.4 kilometres off the coast of Carrickalinga in March 2014 has been a continual cause for concern and frustration for the Carrickalinga Residents Association (CRA) and Yankalilla Council. After five years of talk and inaction, the State Government announced recently it was going to finally tackle this eyesore of epic proportions. Bill Chapman, Kim Baker and others on the CRA Committee have been placing pressure on the government and recently, once again wrote to David Speirs, Minister for Environment & Water and Stephan Knoll Minister for Infrastructure asking them why the government and DPII would not remove the structure completely rather than partially dismantle it to be just one metre below the water surface. "Our letters, whilst acknowledged and replied to, only supplied us with a facsimile of what has appeared in the media," said Kim Baker, President of the Carrickalinga Ratepayers Association. "There is no other long-term outcome from the government, therefore, we

take it, the Carrickalinga Wave Energy Generator is a job the government never expects to complete." Dismantling the structure to just one metre below the water surface is a strategy fraught with danger and creates the need to place permanent navigational beacons around a 100 metre exclusion zone (200metre diameter), making this a future legal liability with ongoing costs. Previously, it was announced anyone caught in the restricted area would be fined 1,250. The CRA have categorised it as a 'job half done' and in the interests of public safety and future liability, the CRA will continue to pressure the government to reconsider these decisions and implement a common-sense, permanent solution. Such was the case recently when David Speirs announced three new artificial reefs along the coast line. The CRA wrote to David and argued, why create 3 new ones when the one at Carrickalinga will go unfinished. The CRA are still awaiting a formal response. Late last year, the CRA aired its views with articles in The Advertiser,

on Adelaide Now and in an interview with Sonya Feldoff on ABCFM. The CRA are continuing to keep the media fully informed of the their views on the matter. Bill Chapman from the CRA contacted Leon Bignell who in turn contacted the navy to see whether they would remove it as a 'training exercise' but the Chief of Australian Navy, Michael Noonan has 'sunk' that idea saying it does not qualify and lies beyond the support normally provided by the Navy.

One more humorous suggestion from a ratepayer has been to turn the Wave Energy Generator into a seal café similar to the one in Port Phillip Bay. Letters were sent again late in February to Stephan Knoll, David Speirs and Leon Bignell advising them of CRA recent meeting and asking for responses, which haven't been provided. A follow up was sent to Premier Steven Marshall at the end of February. The CRA's endeavour is to continue the push to see the Wave Energy Generator permanently disappear.

Something about stones and glass houses.

I'm writing to clarify the authorship of the contentious cartoons (pp 13-14) that were physically removed from the 2020 March issue of *Yankalilla Regional News*. The first point I wish to make is that 'it's not me!' If you want to get the rest of the story, you'll need to be patient; if not, opt out now!

This is a somewhat 'shaggy dog's tail' of story. Again, if you are not one for long walks on the beach or a quiet night in reading Clive James' translation of *The Divine Comedy*, then here is your next invitation to stop reading. Don't say that you weren't warned! As Jerry in Edward Albee's *The Zoo Story* would say: 'What I am going to tell you has something to do with how sometimes it's necessary to go a long distance out of the way to come back a short distance correctly; or, maybe I only think that it has something to do with that.'

In any case, once upon a time in the 1970s, while working with *The New Yorker* cartoonist Victoria Roberts on her first short film, I met the famed Michael Leunig. I reconnected again with him in the early 2000s and always held him in high regard for his whimsical creativity. Imagine my surprise in 2019, when one of his cartoons came under attack for being misogynistic, and younger generations (most particularly but not exclusively) decided to 'give him a serve' for depicting a mother paying more attention to her mobile phone than her baby. The lesson was a salient one about context: who/how/why/when (etc.) matters, for one generation may see things quite differently to another. On this occasion, a great deal of anger erupted and even Leunig's sister Mary, another cartoonist, could not defend the indefensible. One thing that I *never* heard at the time was 'it's just a cartoon'. Everyone seemed to have an opinion, one way or another.

In Denmark in September 2005, 3500 people demonstrated peacefully against the *Jyllands-Posten* Muhammad cartoons. In November 2005, several European newspapers reprinted the cartoons which led to more protests. In December 2005, labour strikes began and several organisations criticised the Danish government; in January 2006, there was a boycott on Danish goods. Comedian Omar Marzouk then ridiculed Muhammad as he defended freedom of speech and protests continued. Embassies were set alight; by March 2006, 139 people had died in riots stemming from the protests. In 2010, a man was shot while attempting to kill Kurt Westergaard, one of the cartoonists. In 2011, French magazine *Char-*

lie Hebdo was bombed on the day that a new edition of the cartoons was set to go to press. In 2012, two men were found guilty of planning a terrorist attack. Indeed, this has been called 'the first transnational humour scandal' because even the United Nations became involved. My point here is that 'neutral' was again *not* a default position for anyone involved: the media or the audience.

Of course, by now you may be asking 'what has any of this got to do with the March YRN cartoons' and/or 'how many people saw them anyway before they were taken offline or physically removed from the paper'? 'And why not blame the editor for letting them through in the first place; doesn't he have a role to play?' Be patient. I said this was a long story. Certainly, I concede here that the issue of proportionality could be cited to argue that there can be no comparison between the Leunig incident, the Danish cartoons and our mysterious cartoonist's various contributions (signed off under the letter 'K').

Alright, what I would say to those who told me that 'it's only a cartoon' – in fact, there were two full page multilayered cartoons on the original pages 13–14 of the March YRN, with other examples of the same cartoonist's work still in evidence on pages 16–17 in the same issue. Given we all live here in a relatively close-knit community, then perhaps proportionality should be measured by the context of 'small town' human relations. Maybe this is the reason, 'K' chose to hide their identity from the community at large – because he/she knew full well that this 'poking the bear' would come back to haunt him/her. I say here that if you are going to sling mud (however 'humorously') at least, have the courage of your convictions, take full responsibility for your work and say who you are – because if you truly believe that you are entitled to do so, then you need to foresee the consequences of your actions, which your disclaimer at the foot of page 14 hints at: 'These comments are not to shame anyone' etc.

OK. I get it. Some consequences maybe be 'unforeseeable' – like the fact that I was dragged in unwittingly into this scenario because the 'K' of the sign off led people to speculate that the cartoonist could be me. The other unforeseeable consequence was that a small business owner in Normanville who was about to take part in the Yankalilla Library's *International Women's Day* event, pulled out because she had been the subject of a section of the offending cartoons. She was distressed and felt that she could not face doing any public speaking not knowing whether the offending cartoonist might be in the audience. Along with council staff organising the event, I

was sympathetic to her need to withdraw. Just before *IWD*, quite by serendipity, I discovered that the local rumour-mill had me down as a candidate for the role of the secret cartoonist. I was horrified. The more people I spoke to, the more friends and acquaintances admitted they knew about the ongoing speculation. Those who know me well reassured me that 'nobody would seriously think that it was you because you would put your name to anything you do' and that my outspokenness weighed in my favour because I'm not one to shy away from owning up to my views (which of course, gets me into all sorts of trouble with my detractors). In this case, however, some of my detractors were happy to affirm my Facebook post that it was *not* me.

Nevertheless, like the small business owner, I was still emotionally distressed. I didn't like being drawn into (LOL) something *not* of my own making! On Day #1 for me, some in the town told me to 'get over it and move on'; others said 'there's more to the story' of why the cartoonist had decided to produce this work. It's fair enough that everyone will have a view, but what I resist then and now is the idea that I am not entitled somehow to have a personal reaction to all of this! Really **empathy** would have sufficed – but I guess with the toilet paper shortages because of Covid-19, empathy is a quality in short supply (LOL)!

Now, let's get back to the notion of proportionality. In my case, I am only one small player in this sorry saga – an extra if you like in this amateur melodrama being played out still as I write. Others have been hurt far more than I have, and yes, some are public figures and your empathy may be in even shorter supply for them, but *all* these people are human beings with real feelings who do not deserve to be the subject of these derogatory depictions. If you want to pick a fight with council, do it in a more apt arena and be a bit more intelligent about it!

Months ago, a premonition of minor doom had overcome me when I saw the letter 'K' in a circle with the previous cartoons. Little did I know then that my anxiety would translate into something tangible. 'What's the big deal?' you say, still displaying your lack of empathy.

The big deal here is that if you are going to participate in public discourse of any variety, then have the courage to own your own shit! Nobody else wants it! And remember – something about stones and glass houses. I shouldn't need to remind you!

It has been drawn to my attention that the first line under motion 1, point d. owing to miscommunication is incorrect. The cartoons were withdrawn by the editor at the request of the cartoonist, in deference to a response from a community member and business owner mentioned therein.

Motion 1

Moved Bill Verwey "That the District Council of Yankalilla supports the principals of freedom of the press and the right for content to be published at the Editor's discretion and, where the identity of the providers of material for publication is hidden that the right for anonymity be protected. This is one of the fundamental and valued cornerstones of Australia's democratic system."

Reason:

Letter sent be CEO to the Editor of Yankalilla Regional News threatening legal action for alleged defamation and also requests the identity of the cartoonists. The letter also infers that the Elected Members are party to this letter.

a). The matter was not discussed by Elected Members at the Council Forum and therefore are not party to the letter (confirmed by CEO response to Paul Jelfs when questioned whether motion was passed by Elected Members).

b). The content of the letter and its request is contrary to international agreements; High Court of Australia interpretation of the Australian Constitution as to the freedom of the press and

freedom of opinion.

c). Response from the Commonwealth Attorney General's department:

"The right to freedom of expression is the right to hold opinions without

interferences, and cannot be subject to any exception or restriction"

"The right to freedom of expression extends to any medium, including written and oral communications, the media, public protest, broadcasting, artistic works and commercial advertising"

"Australia is a party to seven core international human rights treaties. The right of freedom of opinion and expression is contained in articles 19 and 20 of the international Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR)."

d). Paul Jelfs. Editor of YRN had removed the cartoons from the YRN edition out of fear – he certainly had every right to publicise them – political satire (cartoons) have played a major role in Australian society and very often not flattering to the leaders of the day.– Old Parliament House displays a great number of these. The online version was only deleted

after a resident in the District copied them without permission onto Facebook.

Motion 2

Moved Bill Verwey "That the District Council of Yankalilla continues its relationship with the Yankalilla Regional News by contributing "the Loop" to its monthly publication"

Reason:

Supporting local business. Cost effective project to include "the Loop" in the YRN.

Motion 3

Moved Bill Verwey "That should the CEO of the District Council insist of pursuing legal action against the Yankalilla Regional News and/or its editor, Paul Jelfs, he does so as a private citizen at his own expense"

Reason:

The Council should not be a party to an act which could jeopardise the reputation of the District Council of Yankalilla. Considering the sacrifices, not only Australian men and women, but all residents of nations that uphold the values of freedom and democracy have made in the past (and continue to do so), taking any other action then to formally withdraw all support for this regrettable situation is the only course of action.

Pages 13 and 14 missing in the March edition.

What happened?

Cartoonist 'K', moving around the district listening to people, created two pages of cartoons reflecting opinions (pages 13 and 14). A local business person was mentioned by name in one section of the cartoons. The Yankalilla Regional News (YRN) was available online a few days before the printed version was distributed. Someone took the cartoons and posted them on a community Facebook page, a possible breach of copyright. This FB posting drew a range of comments, although no comments were recorded on the YRN Facebook. The business person objected to their name being connected with the content of the cartoons. The cartoonist chose to remove the pages from the printed YRN, in deference to the response of the business person.

Several days after the pages 13 and 14 were removed, the editor of YRN received a letter from Mr Nigel Morris, in his capacity as CEO of the District Council of Yankalilla, claiming that the cartoons contained content which defamed him, the staff, and elected members of the council, and also claiming that 'each of them' found the cartoons 'offensive and malicious'. The elected members of Council were not informed of that letter before it was sent. The letter stated that if certain requirements were not followed by the editor in future editions then legal proceedings could follow.

In the letter, the CEO required the editor to inform him of the identity of 'K', so that 'Council may similarly raise its concerns with that person'. The editor has not complied with that 'requirement' by the CEO. The CEO, in a subsequent communication by email, informed the editor of the YRN that the Council insert *In the Loop* will be withdrawn from inclusion and distribution by the YRN.

At the March 17 meeting of the District Council of Yankalilla, newly elected councillor Bill Verwey tabled three motions in relation to the actions by the CEO in regards to this matter (see page 14). None of these motions received a seconder from the elected members and so lapsed.

Cartoonist 'K', by removing the cartoons, acknowledges that they should have asked permission of the business person before including 'positive' comments about them. This point is supported by the editor. The editor, in publishing the cartoons under the banner of 'opinion', maintains the cartoons contained content and views of the cartoonist of public interest, within the Australian tradition of giving cartoonists freedom of expression in political and social commentary. This position is supported by Australia being

signatory to seven core international human rights treaties regarding freedom of opinion and expression.

In 2012 and 2013 I taught 18 and 19 year-old students in China, at a city an hour west of Shanghai. The College had chosen the South Australian certificate of education SACE as the teaching medium with all subjects taught in English, for their students to matriculate. The college chose the SACE program because its high standing around the world would allow these students to apply for entry in almost any western university.

One student asked me if her cousin, a journalist, who had obtained her degree at Oxford, could interview me. I agreed, she came to the college, and it was a straight-forward interview about what I was doing at the college. When she switched the recorder off, she asked what my hobbies were, and whether it was possible to carry on with them in China. I explained I was interested in the development of industrial hemp in Australia, to replace cotton in the Murray Darling Basin, and that I was making contact with the hemp research experts in China.

The interview was on a Thursday. The following Tuesday I was alone in my apartment. The whole apartment building was barely occupied – typical of the millions of instant high-rise apartments in China. I was the only occupant on my floor. At 7.30pm there was a knock on the door – that had never happened before. I opened the door onto the corridor just over a metre wide – to be confronted with wall-to-wall police. At least twenty people in uniform jammed a metre each side of the door, and in front of me. It was a compelling sight! The only woman was immediately in front of me, and in a belligerent voice with barely passable English, demanded to see my passport. When I asked the reason, the person just behind her stepped forward and demanded that I do as I was told and to not ask questions.

I gave the woman the passport. She flipped through it, obviously unused to finding what she was after, so I took it from her, found the page with my details and handed it back. I kept asking questions; what was this about? They were checking all foreigners – only about fifty in the city of 5 million. I quickly called two other Australian colleagues in adjacent apartments to warn them – but they were never visited.

I had realised for some time that the heater/airconditioner on the wall had been tampered with. I never used it. It started clicking at 7pm every night and stopped at 7am in the morning. Why did the police give me a visit? The word had passed through the system about my interest in hemp – even though that was 'off the record'. I contacted the journalist and told her not to publish anything. I fully expected to be stopped at the

airport in China the next time I returned – but that did not happen.

Why this story? Why now? We are in April, the month of Anzac. The month of continuing to educate ourselves about the stories of sacrifice, in two world wars and more. I imagine young boys in trenches, in awful conditions that went on and on, each wondering, What am I doing here? What is this for? Many of my uncles and aunts were in the second world war, one died and several were severely damaged for the rest of their lives, and their loved ones were too when they returned, damaged in hidden ways.

When I was eighteen, about to go to university in 1966, thinking that just two decades before that the war 'was so long ago !!' I stopped long enough to ask, What was it about? I am still trying to answer that question but one thing became very clear. The responsibility for me, a young person, receiving the benefit from that enormous wound of sacrifice, that wound not only on individuals but on families, on country towns displaying their lost in memorials, on the country of no more than seven million post the second world war. That wound of sacrifice trying to heal itself still.

My responsibility is to keep asking – what went wrong to create the conditions for war? Was it the deranged leaders, or was it also a compliant populace that pulled the blinds down to ignore what was happening on the footpaths outside their homes. Ignoring the 'small' acts of violence with people being thrown out of their homes, thrown into camps, thrown onto trains. Ignoring the 'small' acts, hoping they would go away.

For those boys in the trenches, and the nurses in the thick of it, there is a fragile answer to 'What are we here for?' 'What is going on?' 'Is losing my life worth anything lasting?'

There is a lot of memorial work in the Anzac month of April. What about the constant, current work, the work of maintaining the peace? Now, this year, in Normanville, Yankalilla, in 2020?

What is the answer to 'Was it worth it?' Yes, there is a fragile, slender, answer. The understanding, shared through the community, that the rule of law, the right of free assembly, and the right to freedom of expression, is established. Established by that wound of sacrifice. Now so established that we live it so freely we forget how it came to be.

And then we find, paying attention to the smallest thing, that maybe this freedom is quietly being removed. Quietly being replaced by something else. How quietly? The removal of political cartoons from a monthly magazine. Why? Because they caused offence? Who acted and why did the actions of removal of these cartoons occur?

I want my freedom as a citizen to choose what I read and what I choose to be entertained, educated, or offended by. My choice. Not someone else deciding that for me. To protect my sensitivities. I am often offended by political cartoons, and I respond to the newspaper where they are published, but I embrace the freedom so hard fought for that I would never ask that they be censored or removed. I embrace the long history of larrikin humour in Australia's political cartooning, long envied by almost every other culture in the world. And now I find it, quietly, surreptitiously, being interfered with. Here. Now.

I reflect on the way my freedom while living in China was deliberately and aggressively challenged. My apartment was the only one bugged. My colleagues all said they would have been on the next plane out if it had happened to them. I stayed. My staying in the face of threat was nowhere near the lack of freedom those young boys had to endure in trenches fighting a stupid war, and nurses losing their lives in terrible horror.

Where are you in peacetime? What peace and freedoms are you fighting for, here, in 2020, because you choose to see (or not) the small piece of freedom that is quietly removed, before your very eyes.

I will be saying more. I will publish it and distribute it myself, to protect the independence of the editor of the Yankalilla Regional News. I support the open-acceptance editorial policy of this editor over the past twenty three years I have been reading and contributing to this monthly magazine. The role this magazine plays in sharing the work and pleasure within and across all the community organisations, the ideas and grumbles in the letters and cartoons, where anyone can voice their agreement or dissent in the next edition. We are given the respect, by the editor, of choosing to be persuaded one way or the other. The editor does not censor the range we can engage with. I often disagree. I am mature enough never to require material to be removed. I deeply appreciate the way the Yankalilla Regional News plays an impressive part in holding this community together by making so much information accessible, by reflecting back to us who we are. And we are the makers of this as well, to contribute or not, to agree or not.

I am astonished that we need to closely monitor whether deep democratic principles and freedoms are being challenged. And they are. Something that we believed was enshrined. Sacred by the wounds of sacrifice.

Peacetime. Here. 2020. Who is in the field honoring those who have gone before, in this Anzac month? Declare yourselves by action. Not by pulling the blinds down.

Do They Care? Free Speech - A Fundamental Democratic Right.

I sent the following letter to our elected members. Only two bothered to even acknowledge they had received it. So much for courtesy.

Dear Councillors,

When I received my copy of the March 2020 YRN, it took less than a few minutes to recognise that a page was missing.

Thanks to social media, it took about the same time to track down the missing pages of cartoons. I was delighted and highly amused by the cartoons. They were drawn with artistic flair (we have a real talent in the community that should be nurtured), and they reflect very accurately the feelings and views of many of the people in the community, who are becoming increasingly concerned with some issues where transparency of decision-making does not appear to be paramount.

I have since heard that "someone was offended" and that this was the rationale behind the cartoons' removal. It is irrelevant who. People are entitled to their views: after all, we do live in a democracy - but they are NOT entitled to censor information and forbid freedom of expression.

I find it deeply offensive; indeed deeply worrying, that two pages of cartoons have been removed. In my view, this is the thin end of the wedge, possibly signalling a frightening authoritarian response.

Australian cartooning, and in particular, political cartooning, has a long and proud tradition. You may like to visit the website of the Museum of Australian Democracy in Old Parliament House, Canberra. The opening page states: **"Discover Australia's rich tradition of political cartoons where all politicians and policies may face the brute force of the cartoonist's pen. Australian political cartoons are a gateway to democracy. They represent freedom of expression and freedom of speech"**.

This belief is supported by countless examples of similar, or even stronger, statements. The Institute of Public Affairs states: **"While journalists are bound by their code of conduct to come as close to fairness as possible, the cartoonist goes as far as possible in the other direction."**

In December 2012, James Spigelman, a former Chief Justice of the NSW Supreme Court, delivered a landmark Human Rights Day Oration, in which he declared free speech as **"perhaps the most fundamental human right underpinning**

participation in public life." At the time of this oration, the section 18C of the Racial Discrimination Act 1975 was under controversial review, and he was addressing the complex question of protecting people from being offended. His statement is worth considering: **"Protecting people's feelings against offence is not an appropriate objective for the law.....The freedom to offend is an integral component of freedom of speech. There is no right not to be offended."**

Australia is a party to seven core international human rights treaties. The right to freedom of opinion and expression is contained in articles 19 and 20 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights. Under the conventions, all forms of racial discrimination, the rights of the child and the rights of persons with disabilities are protected.

In the cartoons removed from the March copy of YRN, I can discern no racial discrimination, nor can I see any derogatory references to children or persons with disabilities. What I see is clever depiction of matters of concern that are being discussed openly by people in the local community. There are also references to some of the positive initiatives - in fact, a quite balanced representation.

The administration of this council has been quick, in the past, to pursue legal redress.(eg dogs off leash: resulting in considerable embarrassment I might add). I trust this is not being considered in this instance? If it is, I would regard it as a flagrant misuse of ratepayers' money.

I very much hope that the elected members will recognise the principles of free speech and be prepared to defend the fundamental foundations of democracy that I fear are being threatened.

Public Interest

The last edition of YRN had 2 pages of political cartoons removed prior to distribution. This, however, has not stopped the CEO from threatening legal action on behalf of the Council. While these threats were not the reason for the removal of the cartoons, they should never have happened. The cartoons were simply the observations of the author as they moved within the local community.

People are talking about the DCY executive salaries which have risen disproportionately to any other salary within the Council or virtually any other area for that matter.

Mar 2016 to Jan 2020

CEO: \$168,082 to \$243,214, a 44.7% increase in under 4 years.

Manager Operations: \$114,900 to \$168,530, a 46.67% increase in under 4 years.

The other contracted position, Manager Finance & Community Services, was paid \$105,061pa in 2016 but was split into 2 new roles in August 2016 as follows:

Nov 2016 to Jan 2020

GM Customer & Community Services: \$114,155 to \$157,692, a 38.15% increase in 3 years.

Mgr. Finance, Procurement & Infrastructure: \$103,363 to \$153,827, a 48.82% increase in 3 years.

Further, in an internal memo, the CEO has argued that salary of his 3 subordinates should be increased to \$170,000pa.

Add to this, they have been granted an extra week's holiday each year.

During this time other staff of DCY have received approximately 2% salary increases each year.

2019/20 amended budget shows wages expenses now account for approximately 48.6% of total rates revenue. (compared to 40% at Alexandrina Council)

Victor Harbor's CEO package as at January, 2020 was \$210,125. That is an area with 3 times the population and double the budget.

I believe any argument used to support these increases are flawed.

Is it any wonder that people are talking about these issues?

Current budget projections show employee costs are likely to exceed original forecasts by some \$224,000 and the overall **deficit** increasing from \$386,845 to \$910,422 for the year. Outlandish salaries cannot be justified based on these figures.

Now the CEO has threatened to waste further Ratepayers money on a potentially frivolous defamation case against YRN.

Council has also removed the 'In the Loop' information page from all future editions of YRN, not because they have found a better alternative, but because they want to punish the YRN for publishing opinions of people that question the direction of the Council and, in particular, the CEO. It is nothing more than attempted censorship. People should be allowed to speak their minds without fear of reprisal.

Our Elected Members are failing to control the Administration of this Council, their employees. Their first duty should be to act in the best interest of ratepayers, not the best interest of the CEO and his Administration team.

**Karen Fernald presents
Florence Nightingale: Letters
and Diaries.**

Ever wondered about what Florence Nightingale did before and after her two years nursing in the Crimean War? Karen Fernald will capture Nightingale's life in this presentation and bring the 'Lady with the Lamp' into vivid perspective.

"I could have been a married woman, a hospital sister or a literary woman", said Florence Nightingale. She was both musical and artistic, but spent the rest of her life after the Crimean War writing about the tough issues - the health of the army, sanitation and hospital construction.

Nightingale reformed hospital nursing during the 19th Century. Having trained as a nurse, she was invited to take nurses out to tend the wounded in the Crimean War (1854). She travelled to Scutari, a suburb of Constantinople, where she transformed the appalling conditions at the Barrack Hospital and laid the foundations for lasting reforms in nursing care.

An entertaining lecturer on writers and artists from the mid18th to 19th centuries, Karen Fernald looks at Florence Nightingale's life through paintings, sketches and portraits from the Nightingale Museum at St. Thomas' Hospital, London.

People Power To Protect Pygmy Possums In MAYO

Federal Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie has secured \$20,000 to protect and boost the population of the endangered Western Pygmy Possum in Mayo. The funding is being provided through the Federal Government's Environment Restoration Fund thanks to the advocacy of the Centre Alliance MP and her colleagues Senators Stirling Griff and Rex Patrick.

The funding will enable Conservation Volunteers Australia to partner with the Adelaide and Mount Lofty Natural Resource Management Board to roll-out a community Citizen Science Project on the Fleurieu Peninsula.

The project will engage local community volunteers to learn about Western Pygmy Possum conservation and participate in practical monitoring and conservation.

"Pygmy possums are a threatened species within our region and play an important role within the ecosystem, serving as pollinators," Rebekha said.

"We don't know enough about this special species on the Fleurieu to

help them to thrive, with only 97 observations recorded on Australia's Living Atlas between 1920 and 2017.

"This grant will help Conservation Volunteers Australia provide refuges and nesting boxes for the possums as well as engaging the community to fill in the knowledge gap through Citizen Science Monitoring, and practical conservation.

"No matter where you live in Mayo, the environment is always a top concern that is raised with me, so I am excited by this opportunity to support community-led environment projects."

Conservation Volunteers Australia's Manager for South Australia and the Northern Territory, Darren Kennedy, said the funding boost was great news for volunteers and the Pygmy Possum.

"Western Pygmy Possums capture public attention, making them an excellent flagship species to promote biodiversity values, threats and conservation on the

Yankalilla Art

Another enjoyable day at our March session in the supper room. Karen Hammat was our guest artist and she introduced us to 'abstract landscape'. Using a photographic reference Karen presented her method in stages. The day was a combination of observation and practice.

The first stage and critical to the design is identifying the darks and lights of a landscape, using our own photograph as reference.

With a medium to large brush Karen quickly marked the dark areas of the picture, followed by several grades of grey and white to depict the main elements of the photograph. We learnt about the 'grey scale' which was crucial to learning this process. We gathered around to watch Karen create a colour palette, carefully mixing paint to match the colours in the original photograph. This was

done on a strip of white paper, painting a narrow strip for each and every shade in the picture. In Karen's photograph the colours included shades of blue for the water, pale green/yellow for a strip of beach, reddish hues for foliage and autumnal colours for leaves.

The original photograph was then put aside and a small painting was created using the lights and darks from the first painting, plus the colours she had carefully mixed.

We began work on our own landscape while Karen was still working on hers. We were encouraged to work quickly creating interesting shapes. The most difficult thing was mixing the right shades of colour to link areas of design together.

Karen came to advise and appraise our work, our group totally engrossed in what we were doing,

learning a new method and way of working, being adventurous with colour and shape.

A most enjoyable day was had by all who attended, some people feeling they had achieved greater success than with previous workshops thanks to Karen's inspiring demonstration.

Our next art day is on April 9th, when our guest will be Judith Sweetman working in oils or acrylics. A list of materials will be sent out to members. The workshop will focus on reflections and entitled 'The fascination of water'.

COVID-19 Testing Clinic Opens in Victor Harbor

19 March 2020

A COVID-19 testing clinic has opened at the South Coast District Hospital in Victor Harbor as the Marshall Government continues to roll out a clear and strong plan to tackle the spread of the coronavirus. Member for Finnis David Basham said the Government's plan to help prepare and protect South Australians encompassed everyone, including

regional communities where a series of clinics would open over the next few days.

"Our community will welcome this local clinic as part of the state-wide effort to contain and help stop the spread of the coronavirus and safeguard the health of all South Australians," Mr Basham said.

"The clinic is located at the health site at the South Coast District Hospital,

next to the Flinders University building on Bay Road; visitors are asked to park in the carpark off Bay Road. It will be open seven days a week from 9am-5pm (closed between 12pm and 1pm).

"COVID-19 clinics are specifically designed for people who have symptoms (especially fever or cough) and have recently returned from overseas or have had contact with a known COVID-19 case.

"I thank Minister for Health and Wellbeing Stephen Wade for responding swiftly to the needs of regional South Australians as part of the Government's plan. I'm also very grateful for the sensible advice offered by the South Coast's medical community.

"Our community is understandably very concerned as this global pandemic continues to develop. Our best response is to stay informed and up-to-date with trusted official sources, follow the expert advice on how to protect our health and that of others, heed the bans on gatherings and look after the members of our community who need us.

"Our community has not escaped shortages of basic necessities caused by panic-buying in response to the coronavirus. Hoarding is completely unnecessary and it's harming some of

the most vulnerable people in our community. It has to stop."

COVID-19 Testing Clinics for South Coast and KI

19 March 2020

Federal Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie has welcomed the State Government's decision to set up COVID-19 testing centres in more regional centres, including Victor Harbor and Kangaroo Island.

"I'm really pleased the Health Minister Stephen Wade has recognised our call for more clinics in our community," Rebekha said.

"When I heard that only Mount Barker Hospital had set up a walk-in clinic, I immediately wrote to the Minister because the same service needed to be provided to other regional areas.

"People who are sick shouldn't have to travel great distances to get tested. It puts everyone at unnecessary risk.

"If you live in Victor Harbor, it's a 70km drive to the clinic at the Mount Barker Hospital and a 75km drive to the nearest metropolitan testing site at Flinders Hospital and that is an unacceptable distance for South Coast residents to drive or use what limited public transport is available to them.

"Having the clinic at the South Coast District Hospital will ease pressure on the hospital's relatively small regional emergency department and relieve some of the concerns of our community at this anxious time.

"We understand a clinic will be set up at Kingscote in the coming days. Kangaroo Island had even less access to testing clinics on the mainland so that's welcome news."

\$40,000 for Rehabilitation of Aldinga Washpool

The Willunga Environment Centre has secured \$40,000 to support a long-term rehabilitation project for the Aldinga Washpool thanks to the advocacy of the Federal Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie.

The Federal funding will allow the Centre's Youth and Community in Conservation Action (YACCA) group to develop a plan for revegetation and rehabilitation of the nationally significant wetland through community engagement and education.

"No matter where I am in Mayo, the environment is always a top concern that is raised with me, so I am excited by this opportunity to support such a worthy community-led environment project," Rebekha said.

"The long-term future of the Aldinga Washpool is an issue of concern for the local community

because most of the site is owned by SA Water and is not a protected conservation area.

"I have written to the State Environment Minister David Speirs to request that he consider making the site a conservation area.

"In the meantime, this \$40,000 provided through the Environment Restoration Fund will provide an opportunity to engage young people and the wider community in the restoration and cultural awareness of the site and build the case for its long-term protection."

Willunga Environment Centre Manager Janine Anninos said members were delighted to receive funding of \$40,000 to develop the Wakondilla/Wangkondilla cultural connection to the Aldinga Washpool.

"This project aims to share information of the conservation and cultural heritage values of Aldinga Washpool with the wider community," Janine said.

"The project involves cross collaborative work with the local Aboriginal group, Kaurna Youth, and YACCA.

"The support from this grant allows us to engage our youth in cross-cultural experiences and is extremely positive.

"We look forward to this project being the beginning of similar experiences and involvement."

Fruit & Veg Swap

Community Plant Nursery

Just an update on our fabulous **Community Plant Nursery** (at the Council Depot) and some information about a number of **Field Trips and Planting Days** that might be of interest.

As a result of our partnership with the Yankalilla Council, the NRM Board and Conservation Volunteers Australia (funded by a grant from SA Health), we have about 15,000 local native plants growing at the Nursery and these will be ready to plant throughout the district in the coming months. They have been propagated and grown by a mix of local and CVA volunteers and we have expanded the number of days each month that the Nursery is now open. Our small group of volunteers continue to benefit from the expertise of the on-site CVA Conservation Officer and have learnt some new skills along the way.

We are in need of some additional local volunteers to help on the increased number of **Planting Days** at selected locations in the district, this year!

We have also planned a number of **Field Trips** where you can increase your knowledge and/or help maintain previous planting areas. These are all possible with the support and organisation from Conservation Volunteers Australia.

We are looking for some additional Volunteers to join our current crew and help make a difference to the natural environment within our district - if you have a few spare hours and can come along to help, just let us know and then turn up at the Nursery on the day!

This is all part of the "Greening The Fleurieu Coast" program and offers exciting and educational opportunities for anyone interested in our environment to come along and participate in every aspect of producing native plants for use in local revegetation projects (and then planting them). Along the way, we will visit some interesting places to help develop our Community Nursery into a key provider of plants for the local area.

Weed Of The Month Brought To You By Cape Jervis Coastal Community Group CALTROP

(*Tribulus terrestris*)

(Photo: C. Schultz; growth habit, stem and flower, burr. Fulham Gardens, now removed!)

This weed will be around over summer-autumn, so keep an eye out for it, especially after rain. Any seeds then germinate rapidly, with plants growing, flowering and setting burrs very quickly, within 3-5 weeks. It is a ground hugger, with long, wiry, spreading stems coming out from a centre point. These reddish-brown stems are hairy. Arranged on opposite sides to each other along the stems are the greyish-green, fern-like leaves. These are darker on the upper side than the lower. The lower sides of the leaves have a covering of fine,

silvery hairs. The flowers, which are about 1cm across, are bell-shaped, 5-petalled and yellow. These are followed by the fruit, woody burrs with hard, sharp spikes up to 6mm long. Consequently, it can be very painful if these burrs are stepped on! On ripening, the burr splits into 5 wedges, each with 4 spikes and up to 4 seeds. With up to 1000 fruit being produced per plant, that is up to 20,000 seeds per plant, viable for 5 years!! Caltrop is native to the Mediterranean region, and some parts of Africa and Asia. It is a **declared weed** under the Natural Resources Management Act, 2004. https://www.pir.sa.gov.au/_data/assets/pdf_file/0018/237330/PIRSA_Declared_Plants_SA.pdf

Among the Pigeons, why our cats belong indoors.

John L Read, 2019. Wakefield Press, Mile End SA

So, why keep cats indoors? During the last century, global domestic cat numbers rocketed past 200 million. Hundreds of thousands of diseased, injured, malnourished or simply unwanted cats are euthanised every year by despondent animal welfare workers. Misplaced sentimentality, sometimes promoted by cat food companies, has exacerbated this situation through promoting irresponsible feeding of strays. Ecologist and author John Read has travelled the world consulting cat experts and collating the most recent science. In *Among the Pigeons* he balances the allure of indoor cats with the animal welfare, human health and conservation issues they create when allowed to roam. But he also presents solutions, from breeding ideal indoor pet cats to development of humane tools to control feral cats. In striking parallel to the repercussions of human-induced climate change, warnings about the damage wrought by free-ranging cats have been largely denied or overlooked. But we ignore these issues at our peril. For our own mental health and the endangered wildlife worldwide, time is running out.

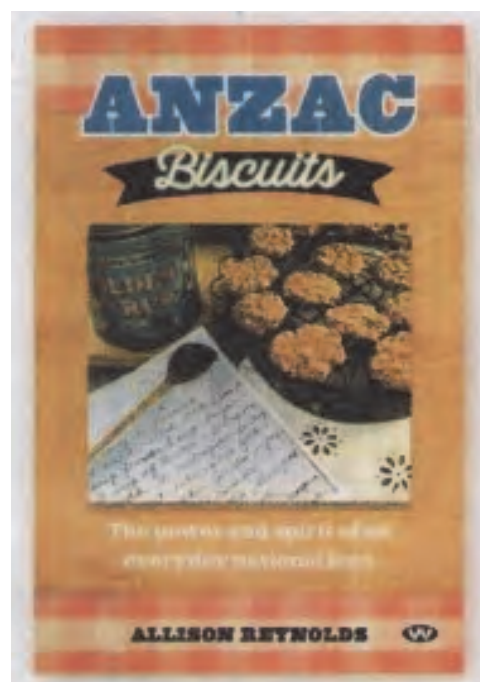

MAYO Non-Government Schools Unscathed By Funding Change

Independent and Catholic schools in Mayo will not be adversely affected by the Federal Government's new funding model for non-government schools based on parents' income, according to local MP Rebekha Sharkie.

The Federal Member for Mayo, who supported the **legislation** enacting the methodology, said she had received assurances from the Government that the vast majority of schools in the electorate would not be penalised financially, based on confidential modelling.

"Given my knowledge of the non-government schools in Mayo, I am confident that these changes, if approved by the Senate, will create positive funding outcomes for all 19 of our non-government schools," Rebekha said.

"Not all non-government schools are wealthy schools from leafy inner suburbs.

"A number of students in non-government schools in Mayo are on School Cards, a long-running South Australian initiative to support students from financially disadvantaged backgrounds.

"Many families, often one-income families, want their children to be taught in a faith-setting or with different learning styles that suit the specific needs of their children, for example, the Montessori, Waldorf or Steiner models."

The new funding methodology uses de-identified family taxation data to calculate the capacity of a non-government school community to contribute to the

cost of schooling.

The new approach has been recommended by the National Schools Resourcing Board, a key component of the Gonski education reforms of the last Parliament that was negotiated by Centre Alliance.

"Centre Alliance played a critical role in bringing in the major Gonski education reforms and a needs-based funding model for Australian schools," Rebekha said.

"I am the Education Spokesperson for Centre Alliance and we successfully advocated for more funding and more immediate funding for schools.

"We negotiated for Australian Schools to receive \$23.5 billion over the next 10 years, \$4.9 billion above the Government's original \$18.6 billion proposal.

"We negotiated for underfunded Australian schools to reach their new funding targets within six years rather than the Government's 10-year proposal.

"We also advocated for the National Schools Resourcing Board to improve the funding methodology, with benchmarks for State and Territory Governments so they pay their share of education funding.

"A key recommendation from the Board was that the socioeconomic status scores for non-government schools should be calculated on the capacity of school families to contribute to the cost of education rather than area-based calculations.

"The reason that this is important is that many families make enormous sacrifices to send their children to a non-government school and are not as wealthy as the average resident in the school's area. This can often be because the family lives outside the area.

"I know that this is particularly true in my electorate of Mayo, where families often live in outlying rural areas and townships and send their children to the larger towns where non-government schools are more often based."

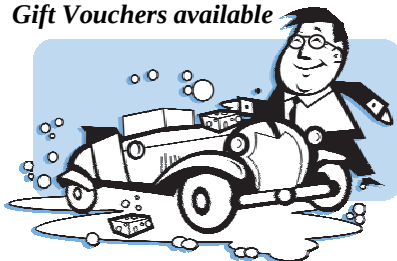

Yankalilla Ladies Probus Club Inc. February Meeting Demystifying the Defibrillator

Thirty three members enjoyed a very sociable and informative morning at our February meeting followed by lunch at Normanville Hotel for those who chose to attend. The club has some really interesting and informative speakers scheduled, and our speaker today was no exception.

Jon Jaensch is a volunteer Ambulance Officer based in Yankalilla. Jon explained that, while volunteer ambulance officers were withdrawn from Adelaide and major centres in the 1990's and replaced with paid workers, there are still 80 stations in South Australia staffed exclusively by volunteers. Yankalilla Station is staffed by a group of 23 volunteers and see on average, 900 cases a year through the station. No doubt many of our members recognised Jon on sight, having been assisted by him in the past!

Defibrillator units are appearing at many places within the community – there is one on the outside wall of the Council offices for example – and in the event of sudden cardiac failure, they can save lives. It can be a scary thing if you are the person who has to “do something!” in an emergency. Jon's advice is to take heart from the words “if you don't do anything the person in need has no help, if you do something, they have a chance”.

These units really are foolproof – think about it, they have to be,

knowing that anyone may be called on to use it, not just trained professionals. The units talk to you giving instructions on what to do, when. Most importantly, they will not give a shock unless they detect that the patient's heart has a “shockable rhythm”. I know that a fear expressed by many is that they might send a shock to a heart and do more damage than good. That is really not possible with these clever units so if – heaven forfend – you have to use one in an emergency, try to be calm, carry on and trust in the technology. It really is that good.

We have informative speakers, interesting visits and activities throughout the year and fun meetings followed by lunch (if you wish) eleven months of the year. Visitors are always welcome. March is a little different. Being our AGM there is no speaker, but there will be a trading table with lots of goods at great prices, and plenty of good company. We meet at 10am on the 4th Wednesday of every month (except December) at Yankalilla Community Church Hall.

'The Olives' – first house in the 'first' main street of Yankalilla

William Richard Sharrad (1815-1893) came to South Australia on the ship *Baboo* in 1848 after his first wife died; he left his young daughter Eliza in England in the care of her two aunts. William met Anne Carter on the ship and they married in Adelaide soon after arrival. An early landowner soon after settlement of the new colony, Sharrad acquired 100 acres of land south of Adelaide and began wheat farming. He started building his house on Salt Creek Road, believing it would be in the main street of the new town of Yankalilla. But the bureaucrats of Westminster thought it inappropriate to site a town on a salty creek, so they moved the location into the next valley to take advantage of the fresh waters of Bungala Creek. William Sharrad's house, 'The Olives', was the first house on the street. William, Anne and their family of six children lived in the old section of 'The Olives' – a 'mud and pug' construction using locally-collected rocks and river clays to build walls 450mm thick. Foundations were rudimentary and the whole construction sat on constantly moving Bay of Biscay soils. Thomas Bowyer, his wife Rebecca, and seven children, arrived in the colony from England aboard the *Norman* in 1855. A son, Henry, worked for William Sharrad, whose property adjoined the Bowyers at Salt Creek. Henry married Eliza Sharrad in the early 1860s and they moved to the present Bowyer property at Wattle Flat, where Henry began making bricks in a kiln dug into the bank of a creek near suitable clay, puddling the clay by treading it by foot. As demand increased, a horse-drawn puddling machine was installed. William Sharrad did well from his farming, which allowed him in 1859 to extend the original dwelling and construct the present imposing neo-Georgian front section of 'The

Olives' cottage. This section features two large rooms with 12-foot ceilings, with a cellar and storerooms below. Built of local freestone with sand stock brick porch corner piers, and window surrounds and chimneys, a feature of this house is the porch with round arches to the sides and front entrance door and a three-centred arch to the front. The steps and landing are of Willunga slate, the roof of corrugated iron and the windows with fine glazing bars. In the 1860s about 200 olive trees were planted as a windbreak. By 1871 William Sharrad had acquired 320 acres in the district. After William Sharrad died at Norwood on 14 February 1893, aged 78, and was buried the Yankalilla Christ Church Anglican Cemetery. The Olives had a succession of owners until it fell into disrepair around the time of the Second World War. Windows were smashed, doors removed and floors collapsed, and cows sheltered from the weather in the kitchen. By 1975 the building was in danger of collapse when it was discovered by architect Sir Eric von Schramek and his interior-designer wife, Edith. They developed a restoration plan that involved digging a deep trench around the building to divert water from its foundations and the construction of a huge beam in the cellar to minimise potential for movement. The von Schrameks nurtured the building until 2005 when the present owners Mark and Wendy Day purchased the 1.5 acre property, excised from its surrounding farmland in 1975, but surrounded by a well-established English-style garden enveloped by the olive trees that still produce fruit which is pressed into a unique and flavoursome oil. An example of an unusual design of an agricultural dwelling, the building's history and subsequent



restoration has bestowed on 'The Olives' a National Trust heritage status.

Advised by Heritage SA, Mark and Wendy embarked on further restoration, replacing the roof and repairing brick and stone work. Acrylic paints were removed to make way for heritage-approved lime wash – a mixture of slaked lime, water and skimmed milk which allows the stone and mortar to 'breathe'.

In 2007 the Days acquired an adjacent 2.5-acre paddock which returned the property to its original size of four acres. The garden has been enhanced, with additional trees chosen for their autumnal displays and numerous other features, including a lily pond draped in wisteria.

'The Olives' was part of the Open Gardens South Australia in December 2017.

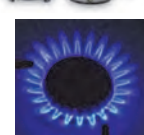
