Our racing family put on a great show to a packed house of our race fans on Saturday nights short track race. In the PW and Multi Speed junior classes it was the #2 of Odin Music that took the top spot, he got out front and never looked back and was able to take 1st place finishes in those two classes again on the TT Scrambles track on Sunday. In the Senior 45+ class it was the long time rivalry of the #77 Lyle Barber and the #443 Brian Woodward, and it was Lyle Barber first to the checkered flag with Brian taking 2nd, but those finishes would reverse on Sunday's TT Scrambles race as Brian was able to edge out Lyle for the win. The 65cc class had Deegan Lickfeldt first to the checkered flag and he was also the winner in the 51cc chain class. The 401cc+ Vintage class it was Austin Harrington taking his first win on his first vintage class entry. In the 450B class it was Carson Green that made it to the checkered flag first and he repeated the win in the 0-400cc Vintage class. The 450A class and Open Single class saw Chase Saathoff take the win in both classes. 250cc class was all Skylar Sentell as he cruised to the win. Vets class saw Eric Haggert first to the finish line. 60+ Senior class it was Jack Mayer Jr. taking the checkered flag first. Wildcat class was won by #141 of Bryan Hoeldtke, and the Quad combo it was Jesse Powell taking the top prize. In the final race of the night the Motorcycle combo class, with a \$2200 purse paid back 6 places it was Billy Ross in front of Chase Saathoff at the finish line, and on the Sunday's TT race those roles would reverse as Chase held off Billy for the win.

On Sunday's TT Scrambles in the 250cc class it was Levi Montgomery taking the win, and in the 65cc Class the #14h Wyland Holland was the leader of the pack to the finish line. 450A class the winner was Chase Saathoff and the 450B class was once again Levi Montgomery taking his 2nd win of the day. In the 85cc Class Charles Jaques was on a rail and cruised to the win. 401cc+ Vintage the #56 Fletcher Vaughan was able to hold off the pack of big vintage riders to get the win. The Vet's class it was all Lyle Barber as he put his Yamaha in front for the win. 0-400cc Vintage was once again Carson Green for the win, a place he's been multiple times this year in that class. Open Twins saw the veteran Merlyn Wertz cruise his Triumph into victory lane. Open Single it was Chase Saathoff for the win and the Wildcat Class it was Shawn Coltson Jr keeping his machine in front at the finish line. 60+ Senior class was Jack Mayer Jr with another win.

Randy and Brian Woodward sported the #443 number plates for the weekend in remembrance of Dallas Nichols, friend and past club member of LTMC, and friend to many in D14, that recently passed away, his racing number was 443, he's always in our hearts and will never be forgotten.



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

The signup procedure was a little difficult for some as this was the first race with online registration and transponder scoring. In the end, it was a great weekend of racing with some awesome battles.

The Allpro Auto and Off-Road GP Series was on Saturday and started off with the Innovation class. Al Doneth was first to the stripe and led every lap. He put it in cruise control half way through and went on to a win. Nik Michael was on his rear fender at the start but lost a little ground early and had to settle for second. Brody Bahlau started slow on his 125 but kept charging forward eventually making it to third. Lance Shelton was running up near the front for the

first few laps but then a tip over cost him dearly. He had a heck of a time restarting his bike and came across back in seventh. Blake Argue had a solid ride going as he chased Lance early and then a short battle with Brody. He would end up in fourth with Tom Lee II rounding out the top five. The Schoolboy and 65/70+ classes were next with Jeffrey Sangster taking the holeshot in the first drop. He pulled a huge lead and went on to a big win. Then in the back his bike locked up and he came to a skidding stop. Alexis Argue then took over third as they towed Connor's bike back to the pits. James held strong to take second with Alexis in third as she held on to her championship points lead. John Korte took the holeshot on the second drop and rode consistent to another 70+ moto win. Gordy Baird led the way in the 65+ class as he battled with John and Ed Shively both in the 70 class. He went on to take yet another moto win with Jeff Doneth coming home in second. Ed stayed close to John early but finished about 30 seconds behind in second. Skip Krassa was chasing down Jeff

A lap later, Ross was out front and pulled a nice gap and went on to another win. Ray kept up the pace and held off Shaun Nestor as they rounded out the podium. Ron Miller was in the top five for the entire race and he moved into fourth after making the pass on William. William rode his YZ100 very well against all the big bore bikes to round out the top five. The Historic class was next with only seven racers this time out. Mike Mason was out front early but it was Michael Sutherland having the most fun. He was into the lead by the end of the first lap and was checking out. Mike then fell into the grasp of Blake Argue. Blake made the pass at the beginning of lap three and set his sights on the leader. He took off at least 25seconds of the lead and cut it down to about five seconds right at the finish. Michael took the win with Blake in second as Mike settled for third. Cory Sutherland was close off the start and settled into fourth and stayed there for the entire race. Ken Argue was off to a good pace at the start but a flat tire slowed his pace. He dropped back and had a little fun passing his daughter Alexis as she went on to finish fifth.
