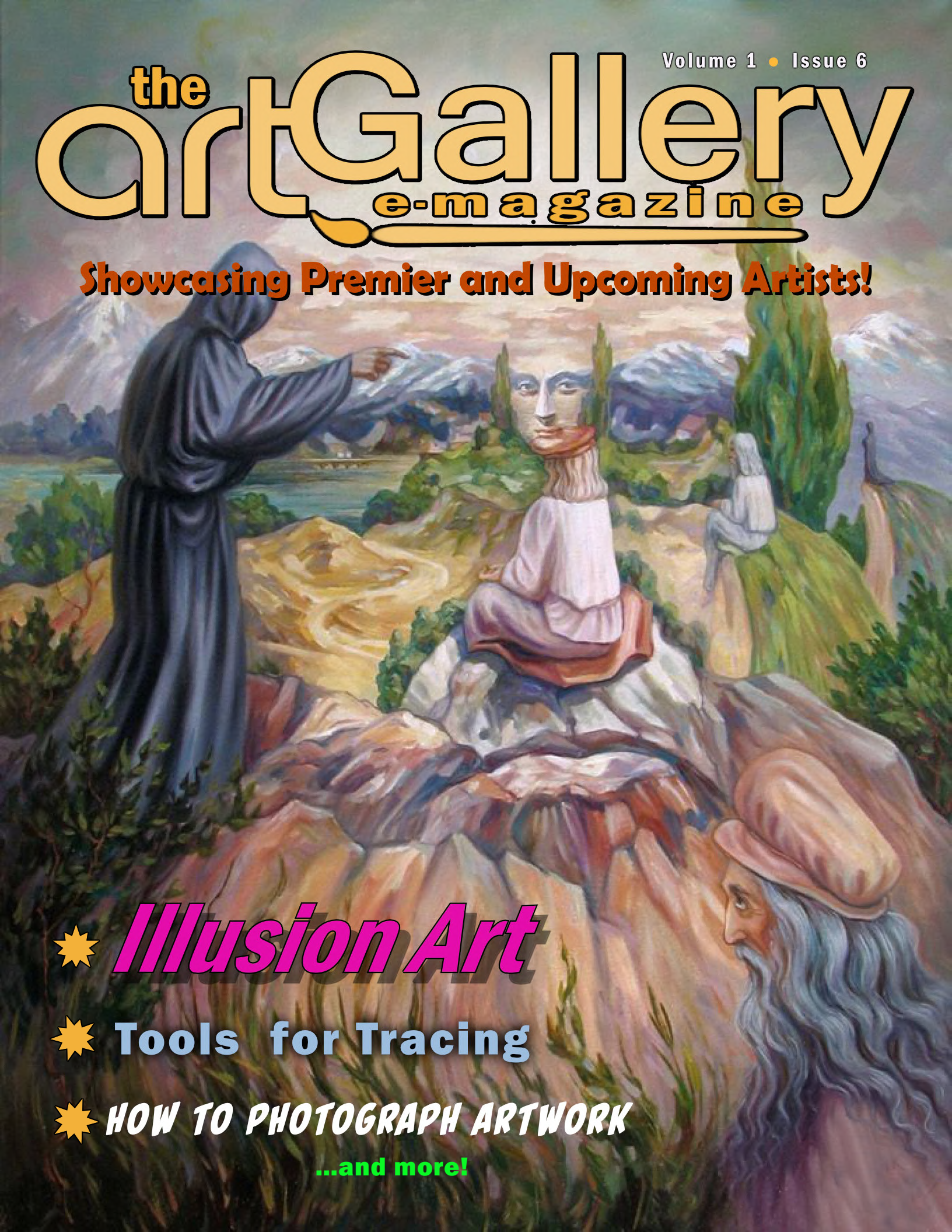

This is our sixth-month anniversary issue since we started it, back in May of this year. My brother and I started this not to make money but because we were both retired, but coming from an art background, I wanted to help the art community. Art galleries were hard to get into and rarely even profitable and though there are a few online galleries, the competition is tough. Having spent decades in the publishing business we decided to make a monthly digital magazine in a gallery format. We had several objectives: Make the subscription free to widen the availability and interest; make it accessible to good artists from around the world, limit the amount of artists each month, but maximize their artwork in a two-page spread and have great articles of interests for artists of all levels, genre and styles. We charged no entry fees for the first 5 issues, and in order to help with costs we started charging artists placement fees for less than \$10. When we first offered artists in for free we were accused of scamming and when we started asking for a small fee we were accused of scamming.

Nevertheless in the last 6 months we -)have grown in leaps and bounds. We have a solid subscription base of people that enjoy the magazine, and have had so many great artists who have shown genuine appreciation for helping promote them and their work. In the last six months, we have implemented great features to our e-magazine like making an interactive downloadable PDF for our subscribers, and more recently, a flipbook version for people to view each issue online. We finally finished setting up the website and store for the Art Gallery e-magazine to make information more readily available.

I believe we have created something unique and have not seen anything like it. Though it is a lot of work and is not very profitable yet, we are satisfied that we are helping expose artists to greater inspiration, and art lovers to walk the pages of our digital gallery and enjoy the fruit of artist's labor of love and passion. So a shout out and thank you to all who have contributed and shown their support these last six months and we look forward to the future endeavors.

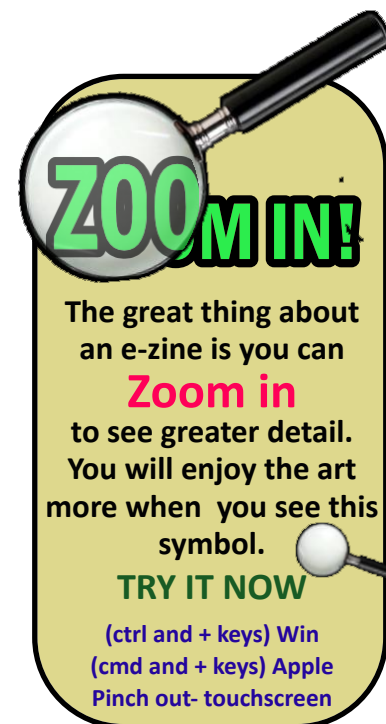
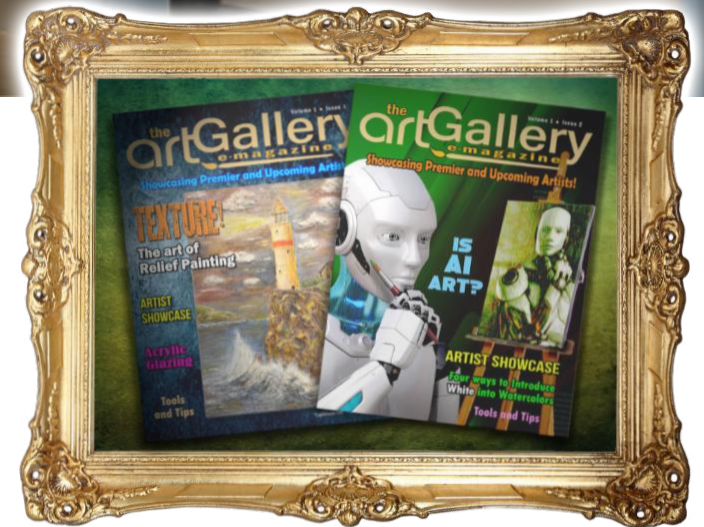
The Art Gallery e-magazine is an interactive publication.

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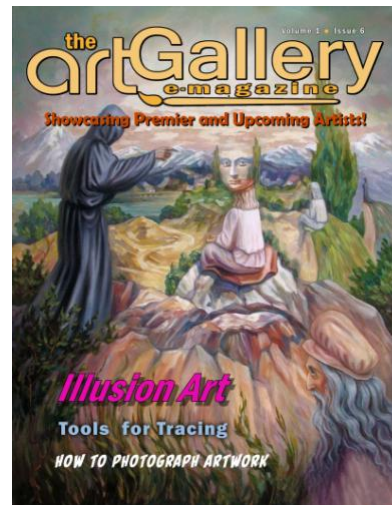


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About the Cover

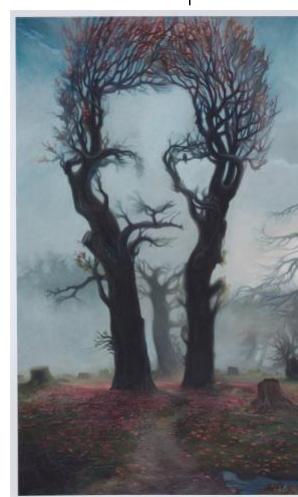

The Art of Illusion

If you go to my Pinterest site I have many boards on various art media. But the board with probably the most interesting images is called “*Illusion Art*”. I have always been fascinated with illusion art and the way painters draw something that you see close up and yet when you step back you see something else. Surrealistic artist **Salvador Dali** and even early art masters often occasionally used this technique and it has more recently become trendy with artists like **Oleg Shuplyak**, **Victor Moleve** and many others.



into so many other genres and often is approached differently by many artists.

Giuseppe Arcimboldo, an Italian renaissance painter, may have laid a foundation for it when he painted ordinary

Jesus, Einstein, Columbus and Leonardo da Vinci.

One of the most prolific illusion artists today is **Oleg Shuplyak**, a Ukrainian artist known for his optical illusions that feature hidden images within his paintings. He studied architecture but began creating oil paintings in his free time and inferred famous faces hidden inside them (See Cover – Leonardo da Vince). His unique approach branded him as one of the most accomplished and famous hidden illusion painters of our time. He has set the bar for many artists to emulate.

Hidden illusion art evokes a different level of creativity requiring not only masterly painting skills but a spatial imagination to render realism with symbolism. It stops the viewer in their tracks and provokes long looks and quiet contemplation. It is a painting that must both be seen at a distance and close up and amazes many with what they see and what they imagine. It is not surprising that many artist and art lovers are discovering this fascinating painting style for the beauty and uniqueness of both the art and the illusion! ■

objects such as fruits, flowers, vegetables, fish, and books to resemble people. Many of his contemporaries thought that he was either mad or given to the bizarre but his work became a inspirations to later artists.

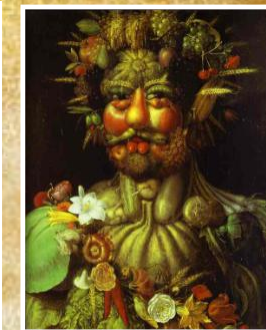
Other artists would reveal faces and figures in between the branches of trees. **Josean Figueroa** a self-taught oil painter from Puerto Rico did experimentation with hidden art using trees and landscape elements to conceal a hidden face in to whole painting. Over all, faces and skulls seem to be the prevailing theme with hidden illusion artists. Often Famous people are portrayed in these hidden paintings such as

Illusion art (sometimes called Hidden art) is unique because it often hides a picture of a face that is often concealed within the beautiful surroundings of nature. At times, the face of a person is so craftily hidden that finding it may prove difficult for some. Illusion art is different then Optical illusion art (often referred to as Opt Art) which uses geometric shapes and lines to create optical effects in order to trick the viewer's perception.

Hidden art however is a form of illusion that conceals other images such as faces and figures that are outlined by objects within the painting. Hidden art is very difficult to define because it crosses over

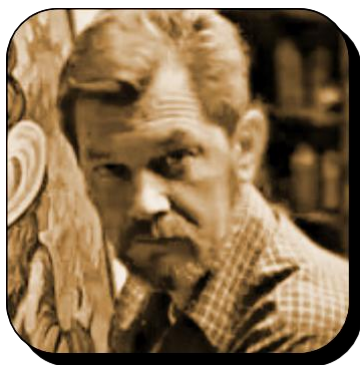

The Illusionary World of Oleg Shuplyak!



"Hidden Images" Art

Oleg Shuplyak (sometimes spelt - Shupliak) was born 23 September 1967 in Ternopil. He is a Ukrainian artist living in Berezhany. Though trained as an architect, his passion for painting has caused him to create fantastic optical illusions concealed within the beautiful surroundings of nature. There he hides a picture of a face in his art style he calls 'Hidden Images'.

Faces of the Famous

Oleg, uses his technical skills as a trained architect to paint surreal optical illusions that contain portraits of other artists, authors and historical figures. His Hidden Figures series includes work as early as 1992 through as recently as 2015. What at first appear to be classical paintings of figures in landscapes, they conceal a second image of a larger human face, easier to see when viewed from afar.

Mind-blowing homages.

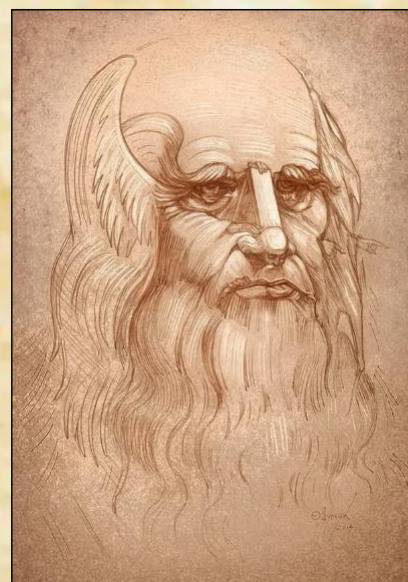
His optical illusions are mind-blowing homages to famous artists and he recreates them in the style of those artist. He has painted hidden images and figures in the style and characcature of men like Van Gogh, Dali, Da Vinci, Cezanne and Renoir – to name a few. He gave us mesmerizing optical illusions that play with our minds.

Two oil paintings in one.

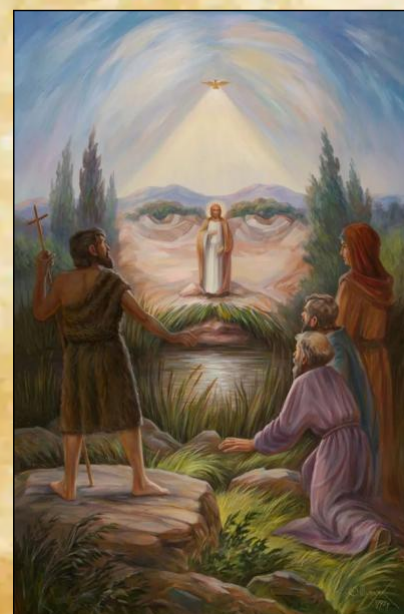
He as in effect given us two paintings in one. The close up shows detail and the furtherback reveals a hidden portrait. In some of his oil paintings, the second image is clearly visible. It is so visible that the first image gets lost. In the second image if one can not see it they may have to squint their eyes and move back before they can actually see it.

Inspiration for many.

Oleg Shuplyak has not only created a unique style of art but his work has inspired countless other artist to mimic and experiment into the realm of "Hidden art" Most oil painters paint beautiful landscapes and portraits but Shuplyak takes us beyond that into the realm of imagination and experimentation. Now art can reveal more of what lays at the surface, and draws us into the illusion!

Miree Bayliss was also featured in September's issue of The Art Gallery e-magazine.

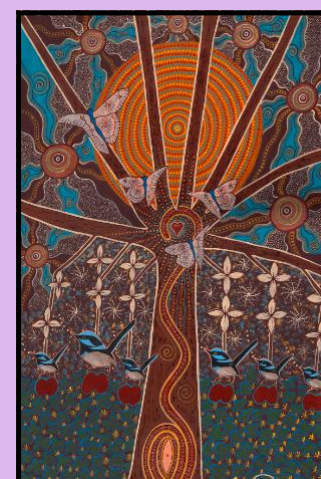

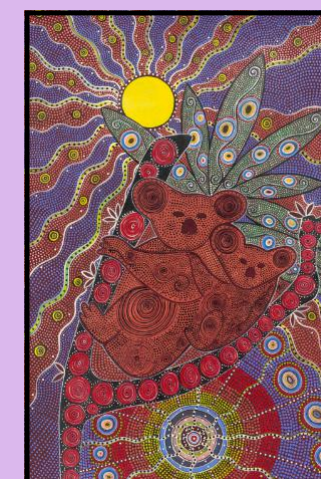

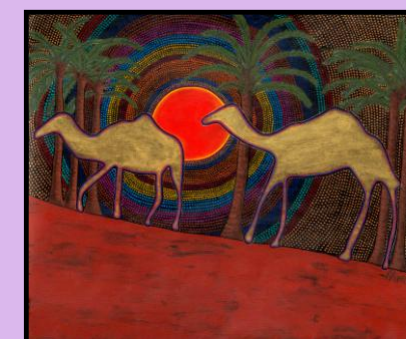

Born in Finland – the land of 180,000 lakes, old forests and harsh winters followed always by the most delicate springs – Anne grew up with a solemn love of nature and a tenderness for color. Like many of us drawn similarly to the love of artistic expression, the demands of life pull us away from pursuing art in earnest. Anne's life was much the same, but she was able to use those years to learn and develop a capacity for painting, making herself quite ready for the time when life opened up a space to become fully invested as an artist.

Her earliest works were mostly in watercolor but soon expanded to oils and pastels and over her 20 yr. career as an artist, has exhibited works in all of those media. Some of her accomplishments over those years include her own show in Rotterdam, acceptance of her work in local shows, numerous commissions both for individuals and commercial works including for magazine and book covers, work that she has done in private teaching in Europe and her own business where she has sold many original works and prints.

For much of her career, Anne's work has been representational exploring a full range of subject matter from portraiture, landscapes, florals, still life and figure and, as a colorist, always worked to employ color in a special way to convey her perspective on the world. During her years living in Europe she found herself spending a lot of time appreciating Van Gogh's juicy and colorful abstractions and became determined to find her way forward into a more indefinite and abstract representation in her work. For this she returned to watercolor but also introduced a mixed-media approach with ink and has been exploring this through botanical subject matter in works on paper. ■

From as far as I can remember, I've always loved drawing and being self taught, I used to make a lot of fan art portraits to improve my skills, finding tips here and there on art forums or through video tutorials. I started sharing my art online in 2003 and soon was offered by a friend to create my own website, a website that's still going on today. Since 2008, I've been selling my art as originals of drawings, personalized drawing commissions (via my website at aurelia-art.com) and prints as well as derivative products via 2 online stores.

Although portraits are my favorite subjects, especially black and white or colored pencil monochrome portraits, I also enjoy making drawings inspired by nature (flowers, still life and animal portraits) or everyday life.

Most of my work is done using either graphite or colored pencils on watercolor hot pressed paper. I also work with pastel pencils on Pastelmat Paper. Most artworks are done on 10x14 inches paper. ■



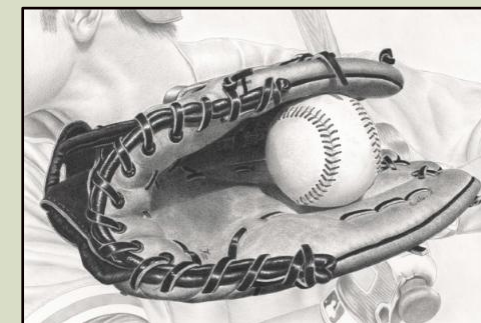

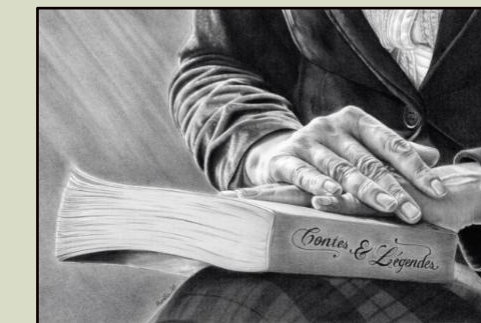

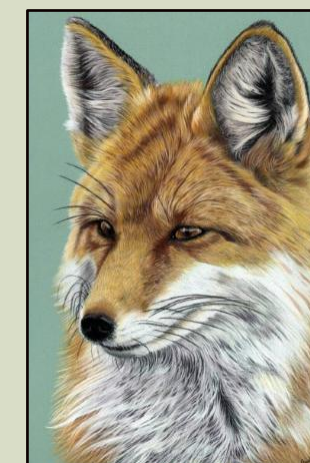

How to start your art collection

Have you always loved visiting art galleries but wondered how you would go about starting your own collection? If the thought of your own private contemporary art gallery always sounded out of reach, we have good news: the dream is far more achievable than you think, and you don't need to be a millionaire to accomplish it.

From works by major artists, to exciting new contemporary talents, here's how to start your very own art collection, today...

Look for limited edition prints

Rather than expensive original artworks, prints can be an easy and affordable option to grow your collection with works by artists you already admire. Plus, in exclusive print runs, they are also still collectible. Some of the world's most sought after artists often offer prints in limited runs, so keep tabs on updates from your favorites to snap them up when they become available - signing up to your favorite artists and galleries' free newsletters or gallery memberships are a great way to stay in the know. Aperture, for example, is a non-for-profit foundation which collaborates with major artists on small batches of prints, and even the Art Gallery of Ontario in Toronto offers limited edition art prints for sale.

Trust your taste

Trust your gut instinct when it comes to curating your art collection. Don't just purchase things you think might be valuable, but choose art that you personally enjoy (though of course, you can take a different approach to invest in art, if you're primarily looking for profit rather than pleasure). This

way, not only will the process of curating your art collection be incredibly fun, but the result will be a collection that is distinctly and uniquely you. No one else would curate the exact same gallery you would, and that's what makes your own collection so special.

Look for emerging artists

We know that buying your own art pieces can be pricey. But if you don't limit yourself to famous artists, you can acquire some unique, show stopping original artwork without breaking the bank. Look for new and emerging artists whose early work is affordable in order to have the chance to own an original piece, and one which not everyone will know already - and who knows? You may end up investing in an early piece by the next Jeff Wall or Agnes Martin.

Follow artists on social media

Not only does following your favorite artists on social media keep you up to date with their latest collections, exhibitions and any limited edition print collaborations you could add to your own collection, but it also lets you experiment with mixing their art styles before committing to buying them. In fact, having your favorite artists all in one place on your Instagram feed, a Twitter (X) list, or Pinterest board, can be a perfect (and totally free) first step in curating your own art collection - allowing you to see the different artists' work laid out together, and whether its cohesive, in your own digital gallery before buying the pieces. Plus, following artists you love online will help you discover other similar artists you might also want to add to your gallery. ■

How to Treat and Prevent Mold from getting on Canvas



If Black spots start appearing on your canvasses whether before or after it is painted it is usually due to mold. It certainly can occur after a flood but also can appear if it is stored in a dark, damp environment or where this is high humidity. Try these options:

- Clean the back first to avoid damaging the front. Use Lysol Spray or commercial Rubbing alcohol mixed with water.
- On the front, carefully use a damp cotton swab of 70% alcohol and water. Do not use vinegar as it is acidic and can damage the painting. Dry mold can be brushed loose and vacuumed of the surface.
- Glass should be cleaned with a mixture of 10% Bleach and distilled water.
- Dry in the sunlight for a few days or place flat in front of a sunny window.

PREVENTION

Try not to keep art stored in a damp basement. Keep artwork off the floor.

If you see mold appearing on an art piece and can't clean it immediately, isolate it from the other paintings to prevent spreading.

Your art work is valuable to you so it is important to preserve it so that you and others can enjoy it for years to come. ■

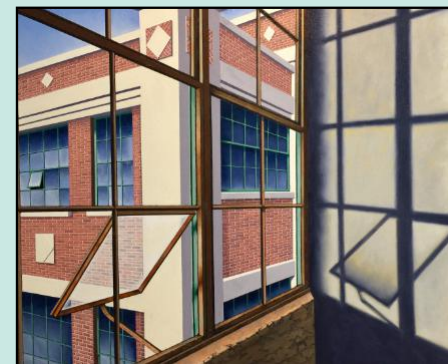
I received my Bachelor of Fine Arts in painting from the Art Institute of Chicago in 1964 and an MA in printmaking from San Francisco State University in 1974. ■

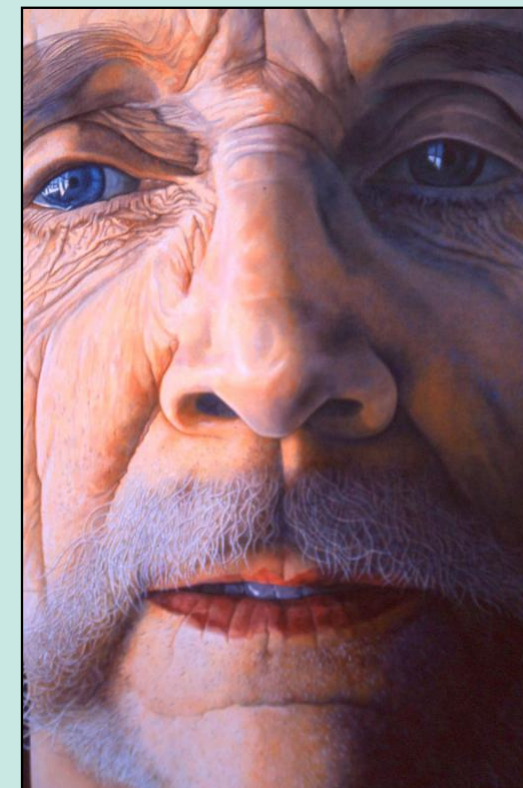

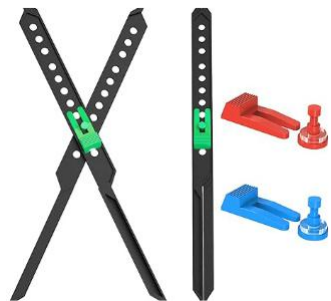
Today's Tracing Tools

GETTING THE PROPORTIONS RIGHT!

Although many artists feel that tracing is cheating, there are some cases where exact proportion is critical. Tracing is the best way to get exact proportion and it does not take away from one's skill as a painter. Have you ever seen a great painting but you notice that things are off? Maybe the head is too big for the body or the hand seems out of whack. Some artists are great with color and painting, but lack drawing skills and let's face it, even drawing what we have seen can be far from exact when it comes to proportion. Below are some devices that might help!

Mechanical Tools for Tracing

Proportional Dividers.- In the old days, artists would hold up their thumb when looking at what they were painting.



They did this for a reason. They would use their thumb or fingers as a measuring device to figure proportion. Sketchers used their pencils and some artist used the back of the Brush, today many people use a mechanical proportional divider to do the

same thing. But these dividers go a step further by making an X shape you can adjust the tool to different proportions like 1:1.25, 1:1.5, 1:1.75, 1:2, 1:3, etc.

Tracing Paper: Tracing paper is a thin, translucent paper that is placed over the original artwork or reference material. Artists can then use pencils, pens, or other drawing tools to trace the lines and details onto the tracing paper.

Graphite Transfer Paper: Graphite transfer paper is coated with graphite on one side. Artists can place this paper between the original artwork/reference and the drawing surface. When

pressure is applied while tracing over the lines, the graphite transfers onto the drawing surface. Do not use carbon paper because it is wax based and difficult to remove. Artist Graphite paper can easily be cleaned up with a kneaded eraser.

Pantograph: A pantograph is a very simple mechanical device that allows artists to replicate drawings at a different scale. By tracing the original artwork with one end of the



pantograph, the connected pen or pencil reproduces the image at a different size on the drawing surface. This device actually dates back to

60 AD through the Greek engineer Hero of Alexandria and yet is still used today!

Optical Tools for Tracing

Light Box - A light box is a flat, illuminated surface with a translucent top that allows artists to place their original artwork or reference material on top. When turned on, the light shines through the paper, making it easy to trace the lines or details onto a new sheet of paper placed on top.

Today's LED boxes are thin, light and bright enough to trace a photo onto canvass.

Projector: Artists can use projectors to project an image or reference material onto a canvas or paper. This allows for precise tracing and scaling of the image. There are digital

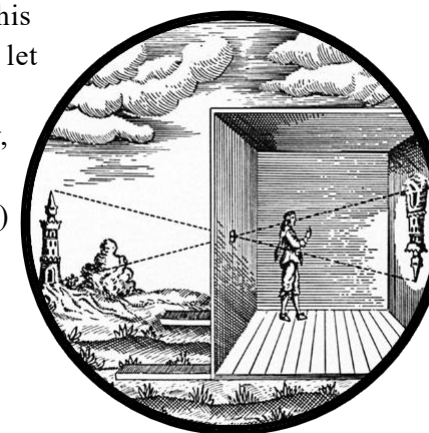
projectors and traditional slide projectors, both of which can be used for this purpose. Specialized art projectors are designed specifically for artists and offer features like adjustable brightness and the ability to zoom in or out to trace and project images accurately. Norman Rockwell who famously did covers for Life magazine used projectors to get the exact proportions of his subjects.

Camera Lucida: The camera lucida first patented in 1806, is an optical device that reflects the image of an object or scene onto a drawing surface using a prism or mirror. By looking through the camera lucida, artists can trace what they see. It is now believed that the old masters used this device to accurately paint their work in true proportion. This device is starting to come back in vogue with the *NeoLucida*.

Camera Obscura. Though not practical today, it is important to mention this device which probably led to the invention of photography. Basically, Whereas The term "camera lucida" (Latin) means "light room", the camera obscura means "dark room". A pinhole would let light into a box or room and



project an upside-down image on a wall. This could then be traced. Many great Dutch Masters used this device to make their paintings,

Computer Software: Artists can use graphic design software like Adobe Illustrator or Photoshop to trace digital images or manipulate existing artwork. These software programs offer various tracing tools and features.



Digital Drawing Tablets: Artists can use digital drawing tablets connected to a computer or a tablet device to trace and create digital artwork. These tablets often come with stylus pens that offer precise control and pressure sensitivity. The iPad and the Surface utilize drawing programs that use layers. A layer with a photograph can be traced onto another layer, then discarded or hidden and a proportionate digital painting can then be done.

Optical Drawing Boards: This is the newest method of using a phone or tablet to reflect or project an image on to a sheet to trace. These use software to reverse the image to be traced.



This is just a few of many choices of products out there. The choice of tracing device or tool depends on the artist's specific requirements, medium, and personal preferences. Some artists may prefer traditional methods, while others may opt for digital solutions. Many however, are a great solution to getting proportions right in your paintings. ■

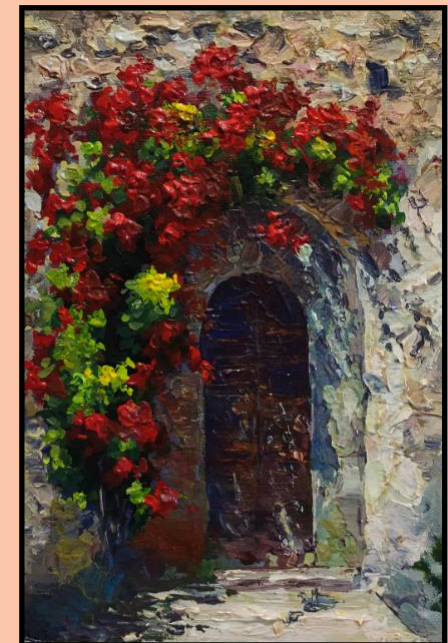

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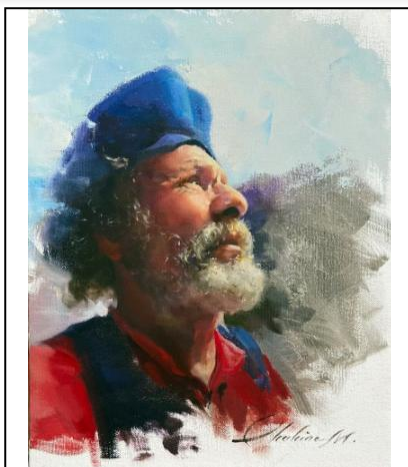

Shahin Mojtabai

If it were not for the offer of a bite of an apple by a homeless French painter on the banks of the Seine River in Paris, Topanga Canyon might not have its newest art studio. "I stopped and watched a couple of painters at work. One of the painters, I remember, had a long and almost scary face." Mojtabai said. *"Then, with a half-eaten apple in his hand he reached over and without saying a word, I felt him call for me to grab it. It was like voila, the seed of my love for critical realism was planted."*

Now Mojtabai would like to do the same for his students, although perhaps he won't be using an apple. Named for the Russian realist painter Ivan Shishkin, Shishkin studio will be a place where anyone can learn to paint the ordinary and observable world in a realistic and objective style, according to Mojtabai. He said talent is not a requirement.

"Talent doesn't play such a role," he said. "It's the skill of life (that's important). Life is about becoming more sensitive to our environment. Talent means that someone could already be more sensitive."

Mojtabai, 43, has 14 years experience under his belt as a painter and teacher, and is accepting new students of almost all ages, although anyone interested should be at least 10 years old.

"He is very expressive and he's very artistic . . . He teaches everything he knows and he keeps repeating so you get it. He explains perfectly and he can nicely make his point. And of course, he's a great painter. He's very honest and sometimes you might not like his honesty," she said with a laugh.

"I love teaching almost more than I love painting," Mojtabai said. For him, it's all about seeing the light go on in students' eyes when they get it. "What if you make that difference for a person that one time" It makes me feel like my existence matters." ■

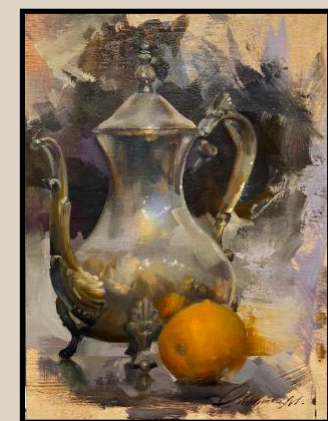

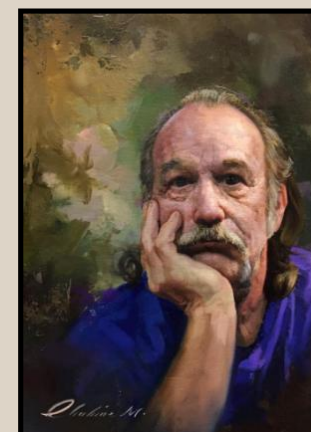

I was born in the capital of a small Baltic country in a family of artists 51 years ago. I've been drawing since I was a child, as long as I can remember. I was friends with a neighbor boy whose parents were also artists. That's why he and I grew up in a creative environment. Perhaps such an environment (poets, artists, musicians, artists) influenced my development.

I drew always and everywhere, and often automatically (unconsciously).

At the age of 17, after graduating from high school, I, as is typical of young people, was a terrible maximalist. It seemed to me that I already knew everything and knew how to do everything. My parents wanted me to continue my studies at the Art Academy. But I wasn't interested in painting (I draw all the time anyway), I wanted to travel and be a journalist. Grandiose ideas were spinning in my childish head about how I would travel around the world, interview almost lions and tigers...

I graduated from the university with a degree in philology and journalism, and then it turned out that the editorial offices do not send anyone on any trips to interesting places. Instead they wanted me to start a daily column "Lithuanian Sport". It was the collapse of my childhood hopes. I quit journalism and returned to painting.

My best friend (the boy next door) also had childishly ambitious - he wanted to become an architect and no less than Corbusier. But after receiving his diploma, he realized that there was little creativity and a lot of mathematics in his profession. Disappointed and also returned to painting.

We got married in 1992 and have been working together in the same workshop for 30 years. We have a daughter (27 years old), who is more talented than both of us, but she is not interested in painting. She became a successful surgeon.

A few years ago, I planned an individual exhibition in which I wanted to present a series of works united by one idea, one format and one price. Due to the pandemic, the exhibition was canceled. But I haven't given up on the idea of creating this series, so I'm working on it. I wanted to try to combine the painting direction of the "little Dutch" with modern realism. Combine "eternity and a moment" on one canvas: antique and expensive utensils, next to fresh flowers and fruits. I'm trying to show that in this world, in a certain period of time, there can be something that will stay with us forever and something that will disappear without a trace.

HOW TO PHOTOGRAPH ARTWORK

Photographing artwork, whether its paintings, drawings, sculptures, or any other form of art, requires careful attention to detail to capture the work accurately. You don't need to be a professional photographer, but whether its for placing your art photos on websites, social media, or for promo work, you want your photos to represent your art in the best way possible especially if its going to be used for prints of your art. Here's a step-by-step guide on how to photograph your artwork:

1. GATHER YOUR EQUIPMENT:

•**Camera:** Use a DSLR or mirrorless camera for better control over settings and image quality. However, a high-quality smartphone with a good camera can also work.

Tripod: A sturdy tripod is essential to keep your camera stable and prevent blur.

Lighting: Use diffused, natural light or studio lighting for even illumination. Avoid direct sunlight or harsh shadows.



lighting conditions. Use the camera's manual mode for full control over exposure settings.

4. FRAMING AND COMPOSITION:

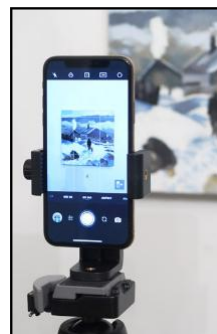
Ensure the artwork is centered and framed correctly in the viewfinder or on the camera's LCD screen. Use a level to ensure the camera is perfectly horizontal to avoid distortion. Use the rule of thirds or other compositional guidelines for a visually appealing image.

5. LIGHTING:

If using natural light, position the artwork near a large window but avoid direct sunlight. Overcast days provide soft, diffused light ideal for artwork. If using artificial lighting, use softboxes or diffusers to create even, shadow-free illumination. Consider using multiple light sources to reduce shadows and provide uniform lighting.

6. USING A PHONE CAMERA:

Today's iPhones and other cell phones take excellent photos. Remember to use the tripod or set it on a mount. Set the flash to automatic in on the artwork in case there is not enough natural light. Zoom in to just cover the painting. You can crop it later. Sometimes just the clicking can jostle the camera a bit so if you have a timer, set it for 3 seconds and let it do its thing.



7. TAKE MULTIPLE SHOTS:

Capture multiple shots with different exposures and angles to have options during post-processing.

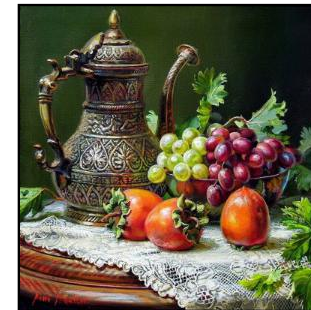
8. POST-PROCESSING:

Transfer the photos to your computer and use photo editing software like Adobe Photoshop or Lightroom to adjust exposure, color balance, and sharpness. Crop the image if needed to remove any unwanted elements or to focus on the artwork.

9. SAVE AND SHARE:

Save your edited images in a high-resolution format (e.g., TIFF or PNG) for archival purposes and a low-resolution format (e.g., JPEG) for sharing online or printing. Remember that photographing artwork can be a skill that takes time to develop.

Don't hesitate to experiment and make adjustments to achieve the best results, and consider seeking professional help if needed, especially for valuable or large-scale artworks.



2. PREPARE THE ARTWORK:

Position the artwork on a stable surface or easel at a comfortable working height. If the light is good you can hang it low on a wall at the height of your tripod. Ensure the artwork is clean and free from dust or smudges. If the artwork is behind glass, remove or reduce glare by adjusting the lighting and angle of your camera.

3. SET UP THE CAMERA:

Use a low ISO setting (typically ISO 100 or 200) to minimize noise. Choose the appropriate aperture (f-stop) for your desired depth of field. A smaller aperture (higher f-number) like f/8 or f/11 is often used to ensure the entire artwork is in focus. Set a custom white balance to match the
