

#### Headteacher's Message

Welcome to this term's newsletter! We hope that you will enjoy reading the news of some of the activities and the achievements of our pupils in this characteristically busy first term of the academic year. As ever, this newsletter can only provide a (very!) distilled version and a snapshot of school life. More detail and a wider range of news can, of course, be found on our school website and via our social media accounts.

Our pupils have very good reasons to be proud of all that they have achieved over the past term, as you will see within these pages. They have of course done all of this against a backdrop of many changes to school life - our Year 11 pupils and Sixth Formers, for example, embarking on courses for which there have been numerous changes to the content, and our new Year 7 pupils joining us without having had the usual visits to the school throughout their Year 6 experience. Despite all of this, we are delighted to see that our pupils are truly thriving! Our Year 7s have forged new friendships and settled exceptionally well, joining lots of new clubs to supplement the already-busy school day. We currently have the largest choir that we have had in some years and our sports clubs are extremely well-attended, as is the daily after-school Learning Zone!

The term has, of course, had its challenges, not least for us as a closely-knit school community learning of the loss of two former teachers - Mr. Kevin Widlake, former Head of Technology, and Mr. Joe Blackburn, our former Headteacher and a serving Governor of the school. We begin this newsletter, therefore, with a tribute to them on page six and we continue to hold both them and their families in our prayers.

For information, and prior to the main content of the newsletter, term dates and parish details are included on pages four and five, as usual. Should we be informed of any changes to the planned return to school for all pupils on Wednesday 5th January, we will let all pupils and their families know at the earliest possible opportunity. Also detailed within this newsletter are some really exceptional sporting achievements. As mentioned above, these represent just a very small selection of the impressive successes of some very dedicated and determined young sportspeople. We commend them on these achievements and we have no doubt that they will continue to excel.

You will recall from previous newsletters that the last liturgical year was designated as the Year of St. Joseph, and we hope that you will enjoy reading, on page eight, about one of the many ways in which that has been significant for us here in Bishop Vaughan. It has also been a special year as it is the centenary year for the Legion of Mary, an association with groups all over the world that meet to pray together and to commit to acts of service and kindness to others. As detailed on page nine, we are very pleased to have been able to establish a group here at the school, this being, we believe, the only junior group in Wales, set up with the support of Canon Jason Jones, Mrs. Anne Lear and the Sisters of the Sacred Heart, whose convent is nearby in Morriston.

The focus on the Gospel values is, of course, evident in the pupils' work on behalf of so many charities, notably *Missio*, as detailed on page fifteen, with our work for this being supported by Canon Paul Watson, whom we are fortunate to have as one of our school Governors. This focus on our values also underpins our eco work, about which more you can read more on page fourteen, with our aim being to ensure that we truly take good care of 'Our Common Home.' Our Eco Team are excited to have been selected to represent Welsh schools in the Historic Royal Palaces project for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, and we look forward to sharing pictures of our 'Superbloom' garden and our forthcoming trip to London for this project.

As you can glean, therefore, it has truly been the busy term that I described at the beginning of this message! Consequently, we hope that our pupils and their families take the opportunity for a very well-earned rest over the Christmas holidays. ### In Memoriam

It is with the greatest sadness that we acknowledge here the loss of Mr. Joe Blackburn, former Headteacher, and a serving Governor of our school, who died on Friday 5th November at Ty Olwen.



All of our pupils were informed of the loss of Mr. Blackburn in a special assembly, and our choir attended his funeral to pay tribute to him outside his parish church of Our Lady Star of the Sea in Mumbles. With limitations on numbers due to Covid mitigation measures, and so many people wishing to attend, many were gathered in the parish hall and outside. In addition, his funeral Mass was streamed by the parish via their website. We continue to hold Mr. Blackburn and his family in our prayers.

With the many thousands of hours that Mr. Blackburn dedicated to shaping our school community, he leaves behind an incredible legacy in the form of the school itself, the lives and work of the many people he appointed and above all in the life chances and paths of the countless young people who, over the years, have been a part of our school.

We also learned, in early September, of the death of Mr. Kevin Widlake, former Head of Technology. Mr. Widlake is remembered fondly by colleagues and pupils, both past and present. He retired just over three years ago and it has been a testament to the work that he undertook here that we have heard from so many former pupils expressing their sadness at the news of his death.

We keep both of these members of our school community in our prayers and we pray too for their families, on this first Christmas after their loss.



## **Annual Carol Service**



Due to the continuing risks presented by large gatherings, and especially in light of recent news regarding the new Covid variant, the difficult decision was made to offer our annual service of Nine Lessons and Carols virtually.

Our pupils attended St. Joseph's Cathedral to record the service and this will be streamed on Thursday 16th December. We are most grateful to His Grace Archbishop George Stack for introducing this service and for offering the final blessing.

We hope that you will enjoy participating in this service, albeit virtually, as this has always been an integral part of our school year. Familiar favourite carols intersperse the readings, from the much-loved 'O Holy Night' with its soloist supported by a choir of eighty to items by the staff choir and by the orchestra.

This service will be accessible via the school website and links will be posted from all of the school's social media accounts. We look forward to 'gathering' with you at this time and hope to do so in person very soon.

## Year of St. Joseph

As our pupils are aware, the last liturgical year was dedicated as the Year of St. Joseph. In his Apostolic Letter '*Patris corde*' - "With a Father's Heart", Pope Francis describes St Joseph as a beloved, tender and loving father; and as a man who is **creatively courageous**. The Holy Father also describes St Joseph as: "the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence" and he states that he was "**an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble**." We know well also that Joseph was a **carpenter**, earning an honest living in order to provide for his family.


We have looked carefully at ways to draw together the strands of what we know about St. Joseph to create a garden at Bishop Vaughan that commemorates the Year of St. Joseph. Looking at the words that are above in bold, you can discern why we have chosen to make this garden:

- One which our pupils have designed, using their *creativity*.
- One which can be used by pupils seeking a quiet space: somewhere they can reflect; somewhere where our wellbeing ambassadors and prefects will be available, should any pupils want the support and friendship that they can offer
- One which has a *wooden structure* at its centre. This will be a large wooden gazebo with seating all around the inside.



The pupils in the newly-formed prayer group referenced on the next page have worked hard to craft the design for this garden and have considered further ways too of ensuring that the purpose of the garden is reflected in their design - as a place for both **commemorating St. Joseph** and for **promoting wellbeing**. The pupils have looked to the design of the existing Rosary Garden for inspiration, with it being structured in a cross layout and with its statue of Our Lady at the centre, as this reflects the holy rosary. It has flowers in each of the four beds in colours linked to the rosary mysteries: the glorious, luminous, sorrowful and joyful mysteries. There are benches for reflection and it has flowers around the statue of Our Lady that are appropriate: forget-me-nots (which are also known as *Eyes of Mary*, reminding us that Mary has her eyes upon us and salvation in her heart) and marigolds (originally known as *Mary's Gold*).

We look forward to sharing our pictures of the completed garden with you in the Spring.



## Legion of Mary

We are most grateful to Canon Jason Jones, Mrs. Anne Lear and the Sisters of the Sacred Heart for enabling us to establish a Junior Legion of Mary group here in the school.

This group meets weekly for prayer and to make a commitment to an act of charity for the week ahead, and this group has already been instrumental in many meaningful acts of kindness and support that have benefited others.

The group typically meets to pray the Rosary, to reflect on the week that has passed, to make a commitment for the week ahead and to listen to a talk offered by one of the leaders. Canon Jason has offered several talks, Mrs. Lear has led the Rosary and Sister Mini Thomas has also offered a talk. The pupils have enjoyed listening to these and focusing on the acts of charity each week.

On 7th December, the group participated in a beautiful Vigil Mass for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, which brought together several different Legion groups from neighbouring parishes. This was held in the Sacred Heart parish church. Pupils offered the readings and participated in the Mass, after which a reception was held in the Sacred Heart Centre, with refreshments provided by the Legion groups and entertainment offered by the pupils of the Junior Legion. This was a very special evening and the pupils extend their thanks to the members of the groups across Swansea and across Wales for supporting them both practically and spiritually in what is thought to be the only Junior Legion in Wales.

#### Examen

Throughout Advent, we set aside the last quarter of an hour of each Friday to engage in the Examen, a reflective and meditative prayer that encourages us to reflect on the week that has passed with gratitude, and to look to the week ahead with hope and commitment. We also carry out this practice during Lent each year, as these are both important times of preparation in the church year.

#### Advent Rewards

Each week throughout Advent, tutors nominate pupils from their tutorial group who have demonstrated the school's values through their actions. We focus on the Gospel values throughout all areas of our school life and endeavour to nurture character development. At Bishop Vaughan, we try to focus on becoming people who demonstrate the qualities shown here

## **Performing Arts**

Since September the Performing Arts Department has been thriving once again with all the usual extra-curricular activities running as normal after eighteen months of disruption due to the pandemic. We are thankful to the pupils who have been attending rehearsals once more and taking part with enthusiasm which has lifted spirits around the school.

Towards the end of November, the school choir had the privilege and honour of singing at the funeral of previous Headmaster, Mr. Joe Blackburn. The pupils sang 'The Lord Bless You and Keep You' most beautifully and were a credit to us as a school.

Over the past term, the various extra-curricular groups and instrumentalists have been working towards our 'A Night at the Oscars' event. However, due to the restrictions with regards to audiences it was decided to postpone this until next term at which point we can hopefully have a live audience. If restrictions are still in place this concert will be published virtually just before the Easter holidays.

This term many Year 7 classes have been taking part in whole class instrumental lessons in 'Toots' (a flute equivalent) and 'P-Buzz' (a brass equivalent). They have been developing really well in these sessions, and any pupils who have enjoyed this can take up the opportunity to have lessons in woodwind and brass. In the new year will be starting to audition and rehearse for our school production Matilda - The Musical Jr.'. We hope that we will be able to perform our school production in the main hall with an audience but specific details for this will be published in due course, in line with any guidance and restrictions nearer the time.



On Friday 10th of December, we attended the beautiful setting of St. Joseph's Cathedral to film our Annual Carol Service, which this year will be streamed in order to reduce the risks to those who would normally attend this event in person. It was lovely to be back singing in the Cathedral at this time of Advent and this takes us, of course, one step closer to 'normality', to times in which we can all attend this in person as we have for so many years. So many attendees over the

years have commented, upon leaving the Cathedral and stepping out into the cold December air, that they really feel that the closeness of Christmas once the Bishop Vaughan Carol Service has taken place. We could not be prouder of our students who read, sang and played in the service, and we hope that you will enjoy watching it. ## **Public Services**

#### **BTEC Public Services Level 2**

This term we have been looking at volunteering opportunities in the community public services.

We have been very fortunate to have a talk from Mr. Boucher -Hamon who is an experienced and highly skilled volunteer for the RNLI. Mr. Boucher explained his role and responsibilities and the many skills he has developed as a volunteer, saving lives at sea. He talked about the value of volunteering himself as a person in terms of improving his self-esteem, his confidence and pride in making an important contribution to his community. He also spoke in depth about the hours of training he has undertaken and the valuable personal qualities he has developed, whilst committing his time to the demands of this role.

We were also extremely grateful to South Wales Police who offered to visit the school to talk to us about volunteering opportunities in the Swansea area. PC David and PC Mathew are our local community police officers and they spent two hours with our class explaining the many volunteering roles available to young people in Swansea. The officers

echoed Mr. Boucher's thoughts on the importance of volunteering, explaining how this experience can increase a young person's job prospects, develop their skills and their confidence, whilst also enabling them to make lots of new friends. The officers also acknowledged the benefits of volunteers to the community in terms of improving community cohesion and creating a safer place to live.








## **Eco Schools**

#### Year 10 Strive Pupils



Chloe Jones represented Wales in the British School's Championships in the javelin. She won a silver medal with a throw of 42.5M.




Sebastian Dabrowski represented the Welsh u17 Football team in Portugal this month in the European qualifiers.

#### WLCOW Award

He has now begun studying Pharmacy at Swansea University. Ayoub is always willing and keen to participate fully in whatever he throws himself into and we have no doubt that he will thrive on his chosen degree course and on his career path.

#### **Science at Home**

Swansea University delivered 264 home experiment boxes for learners linked to the S4 partnership project. We gave each learner in Year 7 a box and any remaining boxes were offered to Year 10 pupils. They contained the necessary practical equipment to complete nine experiments at home, including making edible drinks pods (to reduce plastic use), home-made lava lamps and looking at Chemistry, Biology and Physics experiments that are tailored to the curriculum.

They also had access to the S4 digital platform where they could watch videos and follow online instructions from the via S4 portal.

#### **Botanical Gardens of Wales**



Year 7 learners have recently been to the British Birds of Prey Centre at the Botanic Gardens of Wales as part of the S4 partnership. They were able to see a wide range of owls, hawks and eagles up close and were able to be part of the show itself by interacting with the birds. The learners really enjoyed to the opportunity to see these birds and discuss the welfare and conservation of our native species of birds of prey as some of them are rare in the UK.



## **History and Politics Department News**

#### Proposed History trip to Normandy

The History department is in the early stages of planning a visit to Normandy in July 2022 to visit battlefields, museums and memorials linked to the Second World War. This visit will provide a valuable opportunity for students to develop their knowledge of the Second World War, as well as pay their respects to the fallen soldiers of this conflict. There will also be opportunities to participate in French culture and enjoy free time after a busy school year.

## Super-Curricular Enrichment at BVS

#### The Masterclass Programme

Bishop Vaughan's pioneering programme of masterclasses has returned for its seventh year. Lecturers from Swansea University have been delivering mini-lectures workshops to students in Years 9 to 13 on a wide variety of topics, including Commercial Law, Zoology, History and Criminology. These masterclasses provide a unique opportunity for students to discover the latest research in these fields and to develop their wider knowledge.



9A Visit to Swansea University

Students from 9A were able to visit Swansea University before the summer holidays to participate in a day to develop their knowledge of higher education. Students learned more about student life, enjoyed a campus tour and worked in groups to create study aids for university. It was a hugely enjoyable day for all. Unfortunately, changes in Swansea University's Covid rules on campus visits have prevented the remainder of Year 9 tutorials taking part in this activity but it is hoped that these activity days will be able to resume in 2022 for the rest of the year group.

## Super-Curricular Enrichment at BVS

#### Sixth Form Super-curricular Activities

Sixth Form students have participated in a number of super-curricular activities over the last few months. Students applying for Medicine have taken part in mock interviews to prepare them for their upcoming university interviews. Seven students have applied for Medicine and Dentistry this year and are awaiting their interview dates.

Sixteen students in the current Year 13 cohort completed the Step Up to Swansea Summer School. This took place over the summer and offered students masterclasses, university application support and academic skills development. The students are now able to receive a reduced grade offer from the university, as well as benefitting from stronger academic and personal skills. Bishop Vaughan Sixth Formers also completed Nuffield Research Placements this year. This competitive scheme offers research placements and work experience opportunities in universities and research laboratories. Students completed four week placements working alongside researchers and contributing to real projects.

#### Seren Foundation

Selected students in Years 8 and 9 have been invited to take part in the Seren Foundation. This is a Welsh Government scheme that provides additional academic challenges for students to fully stretch and challenge them. Invited students have been given details on how to access the online programme and take part in masterclasses and academic tasks.

Finally, a huge congratulations to Hollie Wright who graduated from Cambridge University this summer with a First Class degree in History. Hollie was a regular attendee of the Masterclass Programme and participated in many of the supercurricular activities available in school. She is now completing her Masters degree at Cambridge – we wish her continued success in her academic career!

### **University Students at BVS**

This academic year we are fortunate to have students from two universities join us at Bishop Vaughan in order to train as teachers. We have two mathematics students and a Biology student from Swansea University and students in History and Performing Arts joining us from UWTSD. We will be working in conjunction with the universities to provide bespoke intense provision for the students covering all aspects of the profession from behaviour management to introduction of the new curriculum. #### **UK Junior Mathematical Challenge**

Answer is E 35.

Let the number of children who play only football be f, the number of children who play only tennis be t and the number of children who play both sports be b. Since there are 42 children, f + t + b = 42. Also, since the number of children who play tennis is equal to the number of children who play only football, t + b = f. Therefore f + f = 42. So f = 21 and t + b = 21. Finally, twice as many play both tennis and football as play just tennis. Therefore b = 2t. Substituting for b, gives t + 2t = 21. Hence t = 7. Therefore the number of children who play football is 42 - t = 42 - 7 = 35



#### <u>Years 7-11</u>

Blazer:	With school logo (navy) - compulsory garment	
Jumper:	Fine knit jumper with school logo (navy) - non-compulsory	
Tie:	Years 7-11 official school tie	
Socks:	With trousers: dark coloured, or white	
	With skirts, standard grey or white	
Tights:	Should be flesh-coloured, medium grey or black, plain and seamless.	
	NB socks or tights <b>MUST</b> be worn.	
Blouse/Shirt:	Plain white shirt	
Skirt:	Grey knee-length skirt	
Trousers:	Grey trouser, <b>NOT</b> fashion or jeans. No denim, leather, flares, leggings, skinny style etc.	
Shoes:	Black formal school shoes (leather/artificial leather) with flat or low heels. Ankle boots may be worn in winter provided they conform to the above regulations (not with skirts). Trainers are not permitted. Felt/fabric or canvas shoes are not permitted. Heavy boots (military, Ugg etc.) are not permitted. No forms of logo.	
Outer Garments:	Pupils may wear standard length coats, anoraks or cagoules. However, all outer garments, of whatever type, must be plain, navy blue/black and single coloured. Pupils may not wear denim, hoodies, leather look jacket, no faux fur, tracksuit tops or cardigans.	
	No logos, writing, patterns or stripes of any description should be present. Hats e.g. beanies, baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances. Head bands must be plain and dark. There is no necessity for anorak hoods to be worn at school.

#### Attendance



Dear Parents and carers,

We want to take this opportunity to say thank you to those that have continued to ensure that their child has attended school regularly throughout this difficult period. We understand some parents may have ongoing concerns around safety, however, we are following Welsh Government and Public Health Guidance for the safety of all pupils, staff and the community.

The expectation was set by Welsh Government that from the 12th April 2021 all schools were open, and ALL children were expected to attend.

Regular school attendance is essential in order to support children in achieving their full educational potential and supporting their wellbeing. The Education Welfare Service and schools are concerned that not all children have attended and have missed the opportunity to meet up with their friends and fully engage in their education.

As a Service we need to inform you that Fixed Penalty Notices and court proceedings will be re-instated in the near future. Attendance during this period will be monitored and if children have a high number of unauthorised absences, as well as a pattern of irregular attendance, including missing days each week and poor punctuality: there is a possibility that fixed penalty notices and court procedures may be issued.

The Education Welfare Service and school staff will continue to support children and families through this difficult period. It is now more important than ever that you as parents and carers establish positive, consistent routines with your children. If you need any support, please do not hesitate to contact us.

Let us work together so that our children can make the most of their education and experiences at school.

### Attendance



The Education (School Day School Year) (Wales) Regulations 2006 states pupils are expected to attend school for 190 days a year. Moreover, there is a strong correlation between good attendance and high achievement as set out below:

95-100% attendance	Best chance of success	Your child is taking full advantage of every learning opportunity.
90-95% attendance	At least 2 weeks of learning missed	Satisfactory. Your child may have to spend time catching up with work.
85-90% attendance	At least 4 weeks of learning missed	Your child may be at risk of underachieving and may need extra support from you to catch up with work.
80-85% attendance	At least 5 ½ weeks of learning missed	Your child's poor attendance has a significant impact on learning.
Below 80% attendance	At least 7½ weeks of learning missed	Your child is missing out on a broad and balanced education. You are at risk of prosecution.

#### Absence requests from school during term time

We ask Parents/Carers that absences from school during term time should be kept to a minimum so that pupils are not missing vital lessons and examinations.

All absence requests within term time will be viewed as individual cases by the Headteacher.



Mobile phones are to be kept out of sight, either on the person or in the school bag. The school can take no responsibility for any loss or theft of mobile phones.




