

D14 Vintage Flat Track Racing

Several years ago the vintage flat track scene was flat lined, a handful of class alterations aimed at dividing a small group into smaller groups was nearly a deathblow and chased away many racers who suffered or benefited from the change.

When the looming threat of the removal or combination of all vintage classes came up the organizers, reps and current chairman had to make a bold call, making a 88 prior 401+ and a 90s to 401cc class (see AMA vintage rules for details). The move instantly improved the turnouts and increased competition tenfold.

Many new racers also began to show up and race along with other racers who had hung up their steel shoe, one of these racers was former class champion Brad Kniss who also began to race modern bikes as well.

Several younger racers began to participate in the class including Ethan Kitchen, Katie and Robby Knapp, Trevor Gatlin and Michele Bartz. Many of the older racers like Tom Sparks, welcomed the youth with open arms; something the class needs to continue its growth and propagation.

At the end of the day, the vintage class is currently one of D14's fastest growing and most exciting classes to watch! A race ready motorcycle can be obtained rather inexpensively too! For anyone looking to try flat track racing, the vintage class is no doubt a very fine place to start.

AMA'S STATEMENT REGARDING COVID-19

PICKERINGTON, Ohio — Due to the presence in the United States of COVID-19, an infectious strain of the coronavirus, and governors across the country issuing restrictions on large events and public gatherings, the American Motorcyclist Association strongly encourages AMA-

chartered organizers to comply with all restrictions imposed by federal, state and local authorities affecting all applicable AMA-sanctioned activity.

Back in September 2019, I was a prospective member of a club known for great tracks over the last few seasons. I knew a couple of the guys that are members and have participated in a couple of their Family Enduro events. Picker Valley was always fun, but at the time I had no idea who it was that put the races on, I just knew they had done a great job and I had a blast! 
Bridge and westward bound we went. The skys were a little gray that morning, but the temperatures were right and from what I remembered seeing last, there wasn't supposed to be any rain.





When we do eventually get back up and going it is crucial that we support our local facilities and encourage others to do so as well!



But I had told his son Ryan that if they ever decided to sell the RM I would like first refusal on it. I bought it back in 2019 and raced it 3 times. I think Ron and Kevin had their fun with me as it would suffer a few strange DNFs.

So now here we are in 2020 when the season gets going the RM will be my primary vintage race bike. The RL is my up north play bike. It is easier for me to go to the track because I keep Ron riding with me by having his number on my tank.

As far as these bikes being sold again, that will be my son's problem as I plan to keep them the rest of my life








