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
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Dear Pet Lovers & PAWrents,

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
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# NUTRITION FOR DIFFERENT LIFE STAGES

# HERE ARE SOME FEEDING TIPS FROM ONE OF GROOVY'S VETERINARIANS.

ver the years, it has become very clear that most animals need a high level of nutrition in order to stay healthy and veterinarians have evolved out of necessity to prescribe what is best for our patients. When we care for your pets, we see to it that proper nutrition is also in the philosophy and minds of every pet owner. Pet nutrition is certainly included in comprehensive health care and it is very important.

# WHY UNDERSTAND PET NUTRITION?

When we assess the health status of your pets we make sure that we ask the nutrition given as it influences your pet's health. It is what we call part of the vital assessment as nutrition has been incorporated as a standard of care by the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) and the World Small Animal Veterinary Association (WSAVA) since 2011. A vital assessment is any determination of the status of a patient that should be performed at every veterinary visit.

Most pet owners are internet-savvy and if veterinarians do not impart this expertise and education, you may look and read up on articles published on the internet and ask us why we never recommend this food; why we don't advise feeding a raw diet, etc. If we

weren't making the right nutritional recommendations during your vet visit, I think it will be akin to a foundation of a house of cards. When we do not convey the correct components we know are vital for your pet's health, it's going to fall apart somewhere down the road.

So, read on and here are my three valuable recommendations about your furkid's proper nutrition:

# HUGE CHANGES HAPPEN BY JUST CHANGING THE DIET

Think about the snacks that you have in your pantry. What are the things that you like to buy and eat? Are they high in sodium, high in fat? But guess what? Pets are no different from people. They will go for the yummy, less nutritious stuff too. Do we base our own entire diet on mutton satay and cracklings? No and we won't right?

For example, you have a dog that keeps getting a tummy ache. Your dog's regular kibble may be a bit too rich for her when she has an upset stomach. Changing the food to a bland diet like simple boiled shredded chicken with a bit of white rice, or some mashed pumpkin will do the trick. Offer small amounts at a time, rather than a full meal. If she appears eager for more, it's a good sign. If she still seems to be a bit picky, consider a no-salt chicken broth to entice her to eat a bit. Add water to whatever you offer, as dehydration is the real danger of your average run-ofthe-mill upset tummy.

# TRANSITIONING MATTERS TOO

No. This is not about gender. What I mean is transitioning to the right food at each life stage (typically at ages one, five for large breeds, and seven) helps meet the changes associ-

ated with aging. Transitioning means the right level of nutrients promotes good health, which impacts a pet's life expectancy and quality of life.

You can't feed the same bag of pet food forever. For puppies and kittens, switch to adult food at about 10-12 months, typically after the spay/neuter surgery.

# FEED PETS ACCORDING TO THEIR AGE

This is what we call life stage nutrition in which we feed animals food that are designed to meet their optimal nutritional needs at a specific age or physiologic state (e.g. adult, reproduction or growth).

# + PUPPY AND KITTEN STAGE FEEDING

For this age up to one year, it is very vital to give them precisely balanced nutrition to promote overall health and development. Provide them with the right balance of nutrients to address

high-energy requirements and proper

growth.

For puppies and kittens, vitamin E and DHA are important nutrients for building strong immunity and neurological function. Never try to supplement puppies with extra iron. It may damage the gastrointestinal tract or inhibit the uptake of other minerals. Instead, make sure that the bitch is fed correctly during pregnancy and lactation. For large breed puppies, nutrition with less calcium and fat reduces the chances for developing bone and joint abnormalities.

# At a glance, here are the things you need to remember when feeding at this early age:

Higher fat and calories, higher protein, more energy (fat), higher or controlled mineral levels, less calcium and energy (fat) for large breed puppies. For kittens, it is most essential to add taurine in the diet.

Never supplement the diet of a puppy with extra calcium! Feed a proper, high quality puppy diet instead. Feeding high quality food specifically designed



for growth can help ensure the normal, healthy development of a young puppy or kitten.

#### + ADULT STAGE FEEDING

When do you start calling your pets adults? The adult stage starts from one to seven years of age and senior stage is at over seven years. Depending on the breed, adult dogs are those that are fully-grown (typically older than twelve months of age) but below five (large breeds) to seven (smaller breeds) years of age. Cats generally reach adulthood between 10-12 months of age. Cats near seven years of age may be considered older or senior because of the increasing prevalence of agerelated disease and the onset of mild behavioral, physical and metabolic changes related to aging.

This is the stage in which important health concerns such as dental disease, obesity, renal insufficiency and cardiac disease arise in adult dogs and cats and they may benefit significantly from proper nutritional management

# At a glance, here are the things you need to remember when feeding at the adult age:

Less phosphorus, less protein, less sodium, less calcium, increased fiber especially in senior pets, less magnesium and added taurine in cats.

An excess of phosphorus appears to be of greater concern for adult cats fed with commercial foods. You have to remember that this kind of component in food may be of special concern to cats with lower urinary tract and renal disease as this excess may exacerbate the health condition of your pets.

#### + SENIOR STAGE FEEDING

Over seven years old is considered a senior pet. The likelihood of sickness



increases with age due to normal, agerelated, physiological changes. At this age, they can be afflicted with all sorts of diseases like cancer, kidney disease, heart disease. You name it. These are the three leading causes of non-accident deaths in pets.

Senior pets can get a lot of statements like this, "It's okay for your pet to be sick. Your pet is already old." Aging in itself is not a disease. Both in people and companion animals, nutrition may be one of the more important aspects of geriatric care because delay or elimination of the two or three leading causes of death would profoundly extend the life of your furkids.

When they are younger, we tend to give our pets all kinds of food and sometimes we have this desire to give them more. Remember that with younger animals, they can adapt easily

to fluctuations in nutrient intake, but older animals may not able to cope with excesses, borderline deficiencies or changes in nutrient intake and quality. Therefore, food for older dogs and cats should meet allowances more strictly and consistently.

It all boils down to prevention. A lot of what we as veterinarians give to pets is what I call reactive medicine: pets get sick, we figure out what's wrong and then we try to cure them. But I think nutrition gives us an opportunity to help prevent these problems, to keep pets healthier for a longer time. If PAWrents and veterinarians do not share the same sentiments, then we should at least look at your pet's health the right way. So schedule a visit and talk to your veterinarian about proper nutrition today. Practicing good nutrition now will benefit your pets later. 😃



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Treat your baby to a relaxing massage and develop a closer bond with your pet.

ou have probably realized that your dog loves to be petted or given a good amount of ear or belly rubs. As people, we enjoy a relaxing massage after a tiring day, just as much as our pets do. Although the technique is slightly different, the benefits that can be derived from human and dog massages are quite similar. Massages can be very beneficial for our dogs no matter what breed, age, and types of activity they engage in.

However, every PAWrent should remember to be gentle at all times and it would be good to do some research on pet massage. There are a number of websites that provide detailed instructions as well as videos on how to conduct proper pet massage. You can also enroll in a class or join a seminar to ensure that you are doing the right thing and would not inadvertently hurt your furry baby.

#### BENEFITS OF PET MASSAGE

- Pet massage can influence the mood of the dog. It is a relaxing way to reduce stress. Especially when your dog is stressed, your presence plus the massage can greatly help him in overcoming the stress.
- It improves the balance of fluid circulation in the body.
- Massages are also proven to help in the healing of muscle injuries and can help in relaxing tense muscles

on those dogs that usually enjoy a lot of physical activity. In older dogs that are suffering from arthritis, massages can also help in relieving the pain, relaxing the muscles, and enhancing blood circulation on the affected areas.

- Amassage is one way to strengthen the dog and owner relationship. When your dog starts to enjoy being massaged, he will associate the positive experience with you and love you more for being the one who gives him a massage.
- The movement of the hand during the massage helps distribute natural oils on the skin throughout the hair and so the practice can enhance the skin and coat's health.

Aside from the main benefits, massages also allow the PAWrent to check if there are any changes in the dog's body. When you make massage time a regular bonding experience for you and your furbaby, you will get to know your dog's body well and be in tune to any change or condition that he may be suffering from. So when there are sudden changes to your dog's sensitivity to touch, muscle tension, lumps or swelling on any part of your dog's body, you would notice and be alerted right away. This information will be especially useful when you need to contact your veterinarian to consult about any possible problems. &







Feeding your pet does not mean just giving her something palatable to eat. It may be edible but do you know what is good or bad for your pet? By Rio E. Ridad DVM

t only takes a second for one mistake to change everything. Do you remember the time that you had barbecue for dinner and Fido was begging for it? You gave only two slices of beef and then after that the dog started to gag and vomit on your kitchen floor. Fido looked worried and curled her body writhing in pain.

We've all heard scary tales of pet illness and even death over the issue of "people food" in pets' diets. The problem comes in when pet owners don't pay attention to certain key issues when feeding their pets off their own plates. You don't want to keep repeating the same mistakes. So, here are five ways to safely feed your pets at home:

# DO NOT BE TEMPTED TO FEED TOXIC INGREDIENTS

There are people food that we like to eat but we can't feed to pets such as grapes, raisins, macadamia nuts, avocados, chocolate, onions and garlic, as well as xylitol in bubble gum.





# **SKIN & COAT**

Give your pet a soft coat that invites family snuggles



# DIGESTIVE

Give him the carefree tail wagging that comes from feeling good



# EYES, TEETH & GUMS

Give him bigger smiles, brighter eyes & happier barks



## **ENERGY**

Contact: 08129910777 jbwie@yahoo.com Though onions and garlic can be made much safer by cooking them, it's best to stay away from all alliums (onion family plants). Alliums like onions and garlic contain thiosulfate which can damage red blood cells and cause anemia. Even milk can be toxic to pets as they may develop diarrhea if they drink a lot of it.

We have all heard of people indulging in liver and maybe even feeding it to their dogs every day. In small amounts, liver is fantastic, but avoid feeding too much of it to your furbaby. Liver contains a lot of Vitamin A, which can adversely affect your pup's muscles and bones.

Ingesting grapes, sultanas and raisins can be fatal to pets as it contains a toxin very dangerous to dogs and cats that can damage the kidneys and eventually cause kidney failure. Another fruit that cannot be given to pets is avocado as this contains persin which can cause vomiting and diarrhea.

Even when they beg and ask for your double dark chocolate ice cream, don't offer! Chocolate has caffeine and theobromine which can cause vomiting and is toxic to the heart. Dark and baking chocolate is also very dangerous even to a large dog.

Macadamia nuts are great in desserts but giving it to your pets especially dogs can cause damage to the nervous and digestive system as it has a toxin that can inhibit locomotory activities, resulting in weakness, panting, swollen limbs and tremors.

# 2 AVOID FEEDING PROCESSED NASTIES

People love to binge on processed food. As our daily lives become more hectic and stressful, we rely on

microwaved packaged food but just because we humans often choose to engage in terrible food habits doesn't mean our pets should, too. Potato chips, candy, french fries, gorengan and other processed foods are not good for anyone. Why subject your pets to the same nonsense-human hazards?

# REMEMBER TO PROVIDE FOOD TRANSITION

We all know what happens after we've hosted a big, backyard barbecue. The dog gets sick (and sometimes you do, too). Eating a spread of creamy potato salad, gooey iga bakar and butterslathered corn isn't a good idea if it's not what you're used to. That's why pets tend to get sick to their stomachs over the holidays. They're exposed to food that their digestive tracts aren't exactly accustomed to processing. It would happen to you too, if you ate the same meal, day after day, and then all of a sudden indulge in something else.

That's why slow, gradual acclimation to any new ingredient or any food is considered the right way to go about feeding pets anything different, be it home-cooked food or a commercial pet diet.

# 4 PET'S INDIVIDUAL NUTRITIONAL NEEDS

Just as some humans can't eat X, Y or Z food, some pets are uniquely sensitive to certain ingredients. Some pets have dietary restrictions based on their individual disease processes: food allergies, pancreatic insufficiency or inflammatory bowel disease, for example. I had a toy poodle patient whose symptoms included vomiting and a painful abdomen and I found out that the poor puppy suffers from delayed stomach gastric emptying. This means that every time he eats his regular puppy food he gets an upset

gut because the food stays longer in the stomach and this is toxic for his body. The puppy needs a highly digestible diet, given in small but frequent meals, to improve the motility of his gastrointestinal tract.

# 5 ALWAYS PROVIDE A BALANCE OF NUTRIENTS

This is the most common problem I see with long-term non-commercial pet feeders or when owners offer home-cooked meals. They ignore the need for pets to consume a diet that's considered nutritionally "balanced" for their species. Sure, we veterinarians may (and often do) argue about what that balance might be, but that's no excuse for a chicken and rice diet or a tofu and steamed brown rice diet. Pets can no more live on that, long-term, than we could.

Every time you feed your pets food and water, it is either you're feeding the disease or fighting it. Visit your veterinarian and talk about an individual proper nutrition plan for your furry love. Invest in your pet's nutrition today and take his diet to the next level. Keep your pet happy and fit by giving her yummy and healthy food!





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# Unique Pets

Dogs and cats are not the only suitable pets out there. Below are other cute options that make great pets. By Maria Zarah Gregorio Viado

re you one of those people who can't have a cat because you're allergic to cat hair? Or do you live in an apartment where dogs are not allowed? If you answered yes to any of these questions and yet you still really, really want a pet to love and care for, there are animals other than cats and dogs you can bring into your life.

# Guinea Pig

This rodent will steal your heart right from the get go. Gentle and adorably rotund, these little cuties are from South America and make quiet, huggable pets. True herbivores, they eat fresh grass and guinea pig pellets (available at Groovy stores). You can also supplement their diet with fresh vegetables such as carrots and broccoli leaves.

Guinea pigs fare best in small groups and can be kept in a cage or in a pen that has sufficiently tall walls so they won't be able to get out. Bedding made of paper should be used and replaced daily as these little furry balls tend to be messy. That's why instead of a water dish, maybe a water bottle hung over its cage would be a good alternative. Even though they don't require being taken for walks, it would be good to provide them with ample space in their cage or pen so they can walk or run around.

Though they don't require baths, brushing their coat and cutting their nails should be part of their grooming. A fine comb or finishing brush may be used, once or twice daily for longer-haired kinds and less frequently for those with shorter hair.

#### Gecko

Another fuss-free small pet option is the gecko. A good one to choose is the leopard gecko which tends to live up to 20 years! Normally yellow



and white with black spots, this lizard grows up to 8-10 inches. Compared to other geckos, the leopard geckos are ground-dwelling, have eyelids and no toe pads.

A 15-20 gallon tank lined with paper would be a suitable home for two to three geckos. These little critters are nocturnal so a red bulb or ceramic heating element would provide the sufficient temperature and they feed on insects such as crickets, waxworms and mealworms. Baby geckos should be fed daily while adult ones should be fed up to 10 crickets every other day. Water should be given in a shallow dish and changed frequently.

# Hedgehog

If you are on the lookout for a truly unique pet, then maybe a hedgehog is for you. Quiet and docile, hedgehogs can make great pets (particularly the African pygmy) but you may have to draw them out of their shell with regular interaction. Although they have pricks, hedgehogs are not aggressive in nature and may just stay balled up during the day as they are nocturnal animals.

Your hedgehog can call a glass aquarium home however, a wire mesh cage with a tray would be a more ideal option. These pets like to move around a bit so give them ample space to keep them happy. Use dust-free wood chips for bedding or recycled paper pellets. Add a small cardboard box or a decently-sized PVC pipe as a 'house' for your pet where it can hide in when it requires privacy. Another good addition would be an exercise wheel so your little critter can get some exercise. Provide it a diet of insects or dried cat food, as well as a water bottle on the side of the cage as these cute babies tend to turn water dishes over. Hedgehogs are happiest at normal room temperature and usually do their roaming at night so it is best to feed them in the evenings.

Hedgehogs need to have their nails clipped regularly and take frequent baths as they tend to get dirty. A toothbrush bath would be a good way to clean it or collect water in the sink and pour it over your little one. Don't forget to towel dry.

## Tropical Fish

Who doesn't love 'Finding Nemo'? Children and adults alike would enjoy hours of looking into an aquarium full of vibrantly colored fishies swimming about. But first things first. The best way to ensure that your new pets stay alive is to prepare in advance. Set up your tank with fresh water and add gravel, filter, plants, "cycling" fluid, as well as rocks. Do not put your fish in right away. Allow the water in the aquarium to sit and age for a week. This simple trick will help keep your fish alive and healthy.

While you are waiting for the water to age, you can do some research about what types of fish you would like for your aquarium. Perhaps you can visit your nearest pet shop and pick out the ones you find most attractive then go home and do more research online. If your aquarium is small, it would be best to choose those that don't grow that much.

Other equipment you would need include water conditioning fluid, a fish net, a siphon and hose as well as a new bucket that has never had soap in it. Fish are relatively easy to care for since you don't need to groom them individually or take them out for walks, however, you would need to invest time on regular aquarium maintenance. Feed your fish high quality tropical fish food in small packages, as these tend to go stale quickly, as well as bloodworms or tubifex worms.

If the pet you really want is not on this list, you can check out other options available at your local pet shop. Don't just buy on impulse, be sure to think things over and do your research. It would also be wise to first check your area for any exotic animal restrictions.

Getting a pet is not just an investment of time and money, it is also a commitment, so be sure you're ready and responsible enough to care for another living thing. Once you've made up your mind, it's time to embark on your new life with your pet and enjoy your little one to your heart's content. &

If you are looking for a small, compact dog, the beagle can make a fun, suitable pet. Known for its active temperament, beagles are hounds that are predisposed to following an interesting scent. This is why they are usually used as hunting companions when stalking or chasing rabbits and other animals.

A friendly and happy dog, the beagle is a very sociable animal that gets along with mostly anybody. A breed that usually retains its small size throughout life, it requires plenty of exercise and does better when not left alone for long periods of time.



# WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW



#### SIZE AND WEIGHT

Measuring 13 inches or 15 inches depending on variety, it usually weighs between 18 to 30 pounds. Beagles are known to be focused on food, so twice a day feeding of measured portions plus regular exercise will help prevent the dog from becoming obese.





# HAIR AND GROOMING

With a smooth, dense double coat resistant to rain, beagles should be brushed at least once a week with a medium-bristle brush or a hound glove. This regular practice will help loosen and remove dead hair, while also encouraging the growth of new hair.

Beagles shed and tend to have thicker coats in the winter. Despite this, they are a relatively clean breed that doesn't need frequent baths. However, due to its drop ears, a beagle will require its PAWrents to check its ears every two weeks for infections.



#### IDEAL ENVIRONMENT

As a hound, the beagle has the tendency to chase after anything that piques its interest. Therefore, if you reside in a house with a yard, you would need to put up a fence to make sure your dog doesn't stray or that other animals won't be able to enter. Beagles are not noisy by nature but they may howl or bay every now and then.

Generally, this type of dog doesn't have any problems with living in smaller spaces such as apartments, however, the PAWrent needs to invest time in ensuring that the dog gets to go out several times a day for exercise and fresh air.

# Help An Animal In Need

Nowadays, pet adoption is considered a viable option by animal lovers. This is because when you adopt an animal, you are consciously helping an animal in need. Animals in pet shelters are not there by choice, and when you provide one a home, you are saving its life.

# You Are Taking Home An Animal That Is Already Yearning To Be Loved

When you adopt an animal, you not only do a good deed but your helpful gesture may just be equally rewarded by an animal that is already eager to love and be loved. Many animals in shelters were pets once, therefore most of them have already developed an affinity for PAWrent figures; hence, they will find it much easier to adjust to you and your family compared to a newborn puppy or kitten that you purchased from a breeder.

# He/She May Already Be Housebroken

Because numerous dogs in animal shelters are former pets, many of them have already been potty trained or housebroken. Many shelters also provide basic obedience training to the animals in their care and this will be a big plus for you as a new PAWrent. Rest assured it will make your life so much easier.

# You Can Get Pointers From The Animal Shelter

Since shelters have cared for prospective pets for a certain period of time, they are already aware of the distinct personalities and quirks of each animal. This will be advantageous if you decide to take one home since you will be able to get pointers about the particular dog/cat you choose, plus you can ask questions on how to best care for your newfound baby.

#### Minimal Cash Out (If At All)

Buying a pet usually takes a considerable amount of investment. But choosing to adopt one minimizes the amount of money you would have to shell out. Animal shelters usually just charge a minimal fee for the adoption of animals to cover their operation



costs. This way, you do not just save an animal's life, you also make a contribution to the animal shelter as well as the people who help animals in need. By adopting, you can ensure that any abandoned or lost animal will have a safe and suitable place to stay in until they are found by new PAWrents.

# The Adoption Process Helps In Establishing Compatibility

Unlike purchasing a pet from a breeder, pet adoption requires you to go through a process wherein your suitability as a PAWrent and compatibility with your chosen adoptee will be evaluated. Maybe some people would consider this a bad thing, however, if you really think about it, this is an advantage. Due process will prepare you as a PAWrent and allow you to find out about the things you need to do to create a safe environment for your pet. Most animal shelters don't let prospective PAWrents take their new babies home right away. Several supervised visits will help you and your new baby to get to know one another slowly and find out if you are compatible with one another. It's just like going on several dates, with the prospect of a life-long commitment as the end goal.

If you are seriously considering pet adoption, then good for you! However, it cannot be stressed enough that caring for an animal takes a lot of responsibility and devotion, that's why before choosing an animal to love, you must ask yourself these questions: Are you ready? Do you have time to care for a pet and take him/her for regular walks? Are your living conditions suitable for a pet? Are you financially stable and ready to take on the costs of having a pet?

You also need to ask yourself if you're ready for the unpredictability of getting a pet from a shelter as some animals may have some unseen behavioral problems or medical conditions. Suffice to say, these are also considerations you will need to address if you buy a pet, so you must be prepared to take on the consequences. 

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

# PROTECT YOUR PET

Prevention is better than cure. Check out what vaccines should be given to your furbaby in the early stages of his/her life.

oung pets are vulnerable to many kinds of diseases as their immune systems have yet to develop. They do have maternal immunity that is acquired from their moms but this only lasts for a few weeks to a few months, at the most. This is why vaccination is important to be given during the first few months of their life.

Vaccination is an administration of specific antigens or parts of a disease agent to stimulate the body's immu-

nity towards that specific disease. Basically, vaccination works by introducing a weakened disease agent to the immune system so when the real disease actually tries to infect, the immune system recognizes it, attacks the disease agent, and protects the body right away.

According to the World Small Animal Veterinary Association here are the core vaccines that should be given to dogs and cats:

DOG	CAT	NOTE
Canine Parvovirus, Canine Distemper Virus, Canine Adenovirus	Feline Parvovirus, Feline Herpesvirus, Feline Calicivirus	Start at 6-8 weeks old, repeat every 2-4 weeks until 16 weeks old, and then annually.
Rabies	Rabies	Give after 12 weeks old and to be repeated annually or every 3 years depending on the law of the country.

Besides these core vaccines, there are non-core vaccines such as Parainfluenza virus, Bordetella bronchiseptica, Borrelia burgdorferi, Leptospira spp. and Coronavirus for dogs as well as Chlamydia, Feline Leukemia Virus and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus for cats. These are not required to be given and are sometimes not as easy to obtain compared to the core vaccines. The non-core diseases are also dependent upon environmental exposures and lifestyles. Dogs and cats that go out a lot are exposed to more diseases compared to those who only stay at home. Talk to your vet about the epidemiology of diseases in your area and whether it is necessary to give your dog or cat the non-core vaccines.

It is important to understand that complete vaccination only builds the protection of your furbabies up to a certain degree. Good nutrition, cleanliness, and lots of TLC are also important to keep them away from life-threatening diseases.

MAYBE YOUR FUR BABY IS JUST HAVING A BAD DAY OR COULD HIS SLUGGISHNESS MEAN SOMETHING ELSE? By Yosefin Lingga, DVM



ne morning when you wake up you notice that something is wrong with your dog. He is not as bright as usual, displays no excitement during his morning walk, and refuses his food. What is happening with your dog can be described as lethargy. Lethargy is a symptom of sleepiness or fatigue. Your pet may appear sluggish and tired even when not doing any exercise. Lethargy is a non-specific symptom of many diseases or conditions. It may have little effect on your pet but it also may represent a life threatening illness.

Here are some possible causes of lethargy in your pet:

- ☼ INFECTIOUS DISEASES. Parvovirus, distemper, leptospirosis, kennel cough, FIV, and FeLV are just a few of the infectious agents that can cause lethargy especially in young pets. These infections can cause serious health damage to the pet that contracts them.
- ☼ ANEMIA. This is a condition wherein normal red blood cell levels decrease. Since red blood cells work to deliver oxygen and nutrients to tissues and organs all over the body, the lack of them would cause a lot of problems. Anemia itself can be caused by a lot of factors, for example bleeding, worm infestation, blood parasites, kidney disease, and immune problems.





- ☼ LUNG PROBLEMS. The lungs is where the oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged. Blockage in the upper respiratory tract or the inability of the lung tissue to work properly will lead to low oxygen levels.
- ♦ HEART PROBLEMS. The heart is the pump which circulates blood throughout the body. Heart function insufficiency can lead to the lack of oxygen and nutrients in organs.
- HYPOGLYCEMIA. This means a low blood sugar level. Hypoglycemia can cause your pet to become very weak. The cause of this can be varied but in young pets, this usually occurs because of inadequate food intake.
- DRUGS OR MEDICATION. A lot of drugs or medication can cause lethargy. If your pet is taking a certain medication make sure that you are informed about any side effects that are possible with consumption.

Some other causes of lethargy are neuromuscular disease, poisoning, cancer, immune system problems, nutritional deficiency, gastrointestinal problems, urinary tract problems, electrolyte imbalance, hormonal imbalance, etc.

Be alarmed when this happens to your pet but do not scare yourself and panic right away. Mostly, the causes of lethargy are manageable. If your pet is lethargic for more than a day, it is best to bring him to the vet. Try to remember if there are any changes in your pet, his diet, and the environment lately. Be sure to mention to your vet if there are any other signs such as diarrhea, vomiting, breathing difficulty, limping or pain, etc. The vet will assess the history that you impart, conduct a physical examination, and probably do further diagnostic testing such as laboratory tests and x-ray or ultrasound as needed.

The veterinarian's treatment of the lethargy will be dependent on the cause and other symptoms that go with it. If it is not possible for you to visit the vet right away, you can try to confine your pet to let him rest and monitor his symptoms in case they get worse. It is better if you have a thermometer at home so you can check whether your pet has a fever. You do need to get him to emergency care in case of extreme lethargy accompanied by unusual symptoms such as fever, breathing difficulty, vomiting more than 2-3 times, trauma, poisoning and seizures, among others. Prevent this from happening by being an observant PAWrent and always be on the lookout for any signs or symptoms. &





### TUMMY IROUBLES IN PETS

WHAT ARE THE SIGNS OF IRRITABLE BOWEL SYNDROME? CHECK OUT THE DEFINITION, SYMPTOMS AND POSSIBLE TREATMENTS BELOW.

very dog (and human) has experienced having an upset tummy and needing to go number two on the double at least once in his lifetime. If this frequently happens to your pet, it is possible that he suffers from irritable bowel syndrome.

#### WHAT IS IT?

Defined as a chronic irritation in the lining of the bowels of dogs, irritable bowel syndrome is commonly associated with chronic inflammation and discomfort of an animal's bowels. Not usually linked to gastrointestinal disease, its causes are sometimes hard to ascertain however it could be due to diet intolerances, allergies, the ability

of the food to effectively pass through the gastrointestinal tract and mental distress.

#### WHAT ARE THE SIGNS?

The most common symptoms of irritable bowel syndrome is chronic or occasional diarrhea, as well as the recurrent movement of small amounts of feces and mucus. Constipation can also be a sign of this condition as well as abdominal pain, bloating, vomiting, and nausea. Dogs who suffer from this syndrome may experience some pain when their tummy is touched.

#### WHAT CAUSES IT

Though there are numerous causes

of irritable bowel syndrome some are more common than others including:

- Abnormal colonic myoelectrical activity and motility
- + Dietary fiber deficiency
- + Dietary intolerances
- + Stress, mental distress
- + Changes in neural or neurochemical regulation of colonic function

#### WHAT SHOULD I DO?

If you notice that your dog often suffers from diarrhea or frequently vomits, you can bring him to the veterinarian for a check-up. Provide the vet a thorough summary of your dog's health history, giving particular attention to when you first noticed the symptoms and what your dog has been eating recently. The vet may also ask you what recent activities you and your dog have engaged in. After the consultation, the veterinarian will most likely perform a thorough physical exam on your dog, bearing in mind the background history of symptoms and possible incidents that might have caused his condition. A physical exam will help the veterinarian rule out any other potential causes of large bowel diarrhea, including: whipworms, inflammation of the co-Ion (inflammatory colitis), clostridium perfringens (bacterial infection), fiberresponsive large bowel diarrhea, dietary indiscretion or intolerance, giardiasis, histoplasmosis (systemic fungal infection), pythiosis, colonic neoplasia (mass or tumor of the colon), and cecal inversion (abnormal turning of the intestine).

#### WHAT IS THE TREATMENT?

Treatment for the syndrome can usually be managed at home and does not require your dog to be hospitalized. The veterinarian will probably advice you to feed your dog a highly digestible diet, with plenty of fiber sources, in order to help restore and manage the normal bodily function of the digestive

tract. The veterinarian will also recommend the removal of any stressful elements in your dog's environment, as these can contribute to your dog's physical anxiety and condition.

#### HOW CAN THIS BE PREVENTED

Following your initial visit to the vet, you will probably be advised to monitor the frequency with which your dog defecates and the consistency of his stool. The vet will also ask you to look out for signs of possible constipation, abdominal discomfort or vomiting.

Once your dog recovers, it would be best to pay close attention to what your furry baby eats. Your vet can also enlighten you on what diet or types of food your dog should regularly ingest to avoid another spell of irritable bowel syndrome. This would normally include highly digestible food as well as lots of fiber, and a thorough consultation with your vet will allow both of you to work together to ensure that your dog gets a highly nutritious diet that is in accordance to your dog's breed, age, and activity levels.



STEP 1: You'll need a toy, a chair and a magazine you've wanted to read. Throw the toy for your pup, then sit down and read. Ignore your pup if he teases you with the toy to get you to chase him.


STEP 2: Do not respond in any way. Hold one hand up where your pup can reach it, palm up, so when he decides to give you the toy, your hand will be waiting to receive it. Until then, don't look at him. Just read the magazine.

If your pup teases you with the toy, it won't work because you simply won't notice. Keep-away is boring when played alone, so pretty soon your pup will try to lure you back by bringing the toy closer, trying to tempt you. Keep reading.

STEP 3: When your pup realises he wants to play this game more than you apparently do, and the only way he'll get to chase the toy is if he gives it to you, that's what he'll do. When you feel the toy touch your hand, look up from your magazine, smile warmly at your pup and cue him to give you the toy. If

he won't give it up right away, go back to reading. When he does give it to you, praise, give him a treat, then throw the toy for him to chase again.

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

Is your baby the 'alpha' dog or a 'subordinate'? Find out by being an observant PAWrent. By Lance Tan

ogs are social animals whose evolutionary history make them willing and able to live in groups. Group living enabled wolves to work together to obtain food, raise their young and defend their territory. It would be counterproductive for members of a group to fight with each other and risk injury. That would prevent them from working with the group. Therefore,

dogs have a social structure in which each dog is either dominant (leader) or subordinate in its relationship with each other and as pack members. This is a "dominance hierarchy".

The leader or "alpha" dog is the one that has first access to all the "critical" resources. These resources include food, resting places, mates, territory

and favored possessions. Assertion of dominance by the alpha is generally communicated through facial expressions, body postures and actions. Fighting is rare, since as soon as the subordinate submits or defers to the alpha animal and the alpha gets its way, he or she gives up the challenge.

You will need to identify the subordinate dog and ensure that you are not encouraging the subordinate dog to challenge the more dominant one. It is critical that you never come to the aid of the subordinate against the more dominant. If left alone, the dogs will often use posturing and threats to end encounters without injury. If one dog backs down, the problem may be resolved. However, when neither dog is willing to give up the dominant position (as in a young dog challenging an older dog in the home), fighting will usually occur.

To avoid conflict, be an observant PAWrent and follow your pets' existing hierarchy. This will result to an organized co-existence and a peaceful home life for you and your dogs. &



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
