Sonning Common Primary School pupils SATS Success!

The Year 6 School Assessment Test results have never been so good. The 2012 leavers achieved the following:

	Mathematics	Reading	Writing
Level 4	95%	100%	87.5%
Level 5	45%	60%	52.5%
Level 6	5%		2.5%

According to the Department for Education Level 4 is the expected level for a Year 6 pupil (Key stage 2 aged 10 to 11 years) and Level 5 to 6 is the target Level at year 9 (Key stage 3 aged 13 to 14). Pupils and their teachers have proved that the hard work through their final primary year has paid off as seen in the results.

Chris Hirst, Headteacher, was very pleased with the results and said: 'We wish them well as they move onto the next stage of their educational career. I am sure they will all achieve 'great things' and I am looking forward to hearing about their successes'.

More than half of the leavers have gone on to our local village secondary school at Chiltern Edge, while the others have joined Gillotts in Henley, Langtree in Woodcote, Highdown in Emmer Green, Reading Boys, Bluecoats, Crosfields, The Abbey and Queen Anne's.

Record GCSE results at Chiltern Edge School

Students and staff at Chiltern Edge School celebrated an excellent set of GCSE exam results with several school records being broken.

Highlights

There was a substantial improvement from 2011 on the key national benchmark measures with 66% of students achieving 5 x A*- C grades including English and Mathematics.

A record 79% of students achieved 5 x A*- C grades. The Mathematics department also achieved a 'best ever' with 73% of students gaining at least a C grade. 72% of all grades were at C or better.

The English Baccalaureate is a new measurement which was introduced as a performance measure in the 2010 tables. It is a measure which recognises where students have secured a C grade or better across a core of academic subjects – English, mathematics, history or geography, the sciences and a language. The results for this were also outstanding with 32% of students achieving at least a `C` grade in the five examinations.

The school again performed well above expectations for the top grades with 30% of grades at A*/A or Distinction,

well above national figures for a year group which closely resembles the ability profile of the national population. 35% of students achieved at least 5A*/A grades.

A small number of students sat BTEC courses in Sport and Science for the first time and the results were excellent with a 98% pass rate at C grade equivalent.

Headteacher Daniel Sadler said, 'These results are very pleasing and reflect the rapid improvement Chiltern Edge is making on many fronts. The changes we have made over the last three years are now having a significant impact on student achievement and progress`.

It's big...it's yellow...and it needs more drivers

The FISH Bus is a familiar sight in the village and surrounding locality. Together with the volunteer car drivers it provides a much needed transport service for those in the village, and wider community, who cannot drive or who are no longer comfortable with driving or who have slight mobility issues.

The FISH Bus makes regular weekly shopping trips to local centres and also offers a monthly programme of social outings to places of interest in the wider area. The majority of its passengers are senior residents but it is a community bus and available to anyone who requires such provision. However, it does not have wheelchair or disabled facilities so passengers are required to have independent mobility.

The bus is driven by a small team of volunteers who average about two or three trips a month at their convenience. The FISH charity is looking to recruit some new bus drivers following the retirement of two of its valued members. Could this be YOU??

The bus does look quite big but it is not difficult to drive and any new volunteers



would not be expected to carry passengers until they had enough practice to feel confident. However, all prospective drivers do need to have the D1 category for Minibuses on their driving licence (automatic if car test was passed before 1997).

Local (junior!) Super Hero

Jack Lambert (aged 8) lives in Reades Lane and attends Stoke Row Primary School. He wanted to raise some funds for his school towards replacing temporary buildings, and his family are keen walkers, so he decided he would like to try the Three Peaks Challenge. This is a very popular challenge of climbing the three highest mountains in Great Britain within 24 hours - Ben Nevis in the Scottish Highlands, Scafell Pike in the Lake District and Snowdon in Wales.

Jack`s parents had previously completed the challenge and had scaled two of the three mountains several times before. Jack himself first climbed Snowdon when he was just three-and-a-half.

They set off on their trip after school had finished at the end of July. Jack's dad Mark was climbing with him and mum Rachel was driving them between the mountains. Unfortunately the weather was sometimes very wet and extremely cold for the time of year, but they persevered.

Despite the weather and Jack suffering sickness, they managed to complete the challenge in a fantastic 22 hours and 12 minutes.

Jack's dad - "It was a lot harder this time because we climbed the mountains a lot more quickly. Jack's very competitive so he wanted to know what time his mum had done and wanted to beat her with

every peak. He did really, really well. At the end he was less tired than I was"

Mum Rachel - "They were already drenched before they had a chance to change into their wet weather gear so they stayed as they were and with the wind coming towards them as well it was very, very cold. I couldn't sleep at Ben Nevis because I was worried for them as every now and then there was a downpour. We were much luckier with the weather two years ago. We are really, really proud of him"

Jack - "I don't believe that I've done it it's just weird."

The pair raised more than £4,700, the school are aiming for £60,000 by April 2013 to help pay for the replacement of temporary buildings. More than a third of the total has been raised since the appeal was launched in April.

Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) marches on!

An amazing 105 village site, landscape and character surveys have been completed

The landscape evaluations and village character surveys are very important as they put the possible development sites SON 1 - 14 into context with the neighbouring countryside and residential areas. These will provide considerable data to decide whether they would, or would not be suitable sites for development.

The latest stage in our village consultation process was held on Saturday 15 September - Design Day 4. The drop in session provided the opportunity to give views about the regeneration of the village centre; to comment on the Vision for Sonning Common 2026 and to attend workshops for more detailed input to the site summaries. Again over 100 people attended.

Every home in the village has received a copy of Vision 2026 and been asked to complete and return the Housing Needs Survey. The response and involvement of the people of Sonning Common has been exceptional and commented by the consultants. Their comments are valued as they have worked with many towns and villages.

It's our village, so we are trying to make it our choice. Your views are being taken very seriously. THANKS to all of you who have been closely involved and to those of you who are unable to be actively involved, but continue to be supportive on a more ad hoc basis.

Each year a different group of very special young children are selected to come over from Belarus to stay here in England for a month, away from the radioactivity poisoning ever present in their homeland since the Chernobyl nuclear reactor disaster in mid 1984. Just one month of respite away from this environment much enhances their health and extends their life expectancy.

On Friday 3 August 10 children, 11 to 15 years, spent the day taking part in the various farm activities including wading in the nearby river Pang, pond dipping, feeding the animals, tractor trailer riding and insect identification.

Staff at Rushall Farm generously gave their time and facilities free, to enable these visiting young children to experience life on an English farm. They met, at close quarters, donkeys, cows, a bull, and lambs – something those from the larger communities in Belarus do not often get a chance to see. A happy hour was spent fishing with nets in the local river, which they cannot do back home as the water is too contaminated to play in.

- 1. Only fresh conkers may be used, as will be provided
- 2. Players take alternate hits at their opponent's conker.
- 3. The player whose conker is to be hit holds it with the string wrapped round one hand and suspends it at a height to suit his/her opponent. It must be kept still.
- 4. The striker holds his/her conker in one hand and the end of his/her string with the other, then swings the conker to hit the opponent's conker.

Sibella Bonnam Carter

In 2012, as the inhabitants of Sonning Common are involved in future plans for it's development, it seems an appropriate time to remember the wide ranging contribution this remarkable woman made to the village. The last time there were extensive building developments here was in the 1960's. In response to the lack of local consultation the Sonning Common Society was formed. Sibella was at first the secretary and then President.

Had she lived today, she may well have been involved, if not the leader, of the Neighbourhood Development Planning group??

Sibella's own words head up each section to reveal the story of her formative years and of her 'noble' connections.

"I can just remember her"

Soon after the birth of her younger brother David, Sibella's mother died.

Sibella was fond of telling others that she was just a year older than the century, the twentieth one. Her life crossed three centuries. Born in 1899 into a cultured

and privileged family, her father was a solicitor and home was in Bayswater near Paddington.

"I did not particularly shine at school ... but one of the teachers fired me with the enthusiasm to learn"

First at the local Kindergarten, run by the wife of the poet laureate John Masefield then onto Downe House in 1912 as a border, where she may have learned to become highly independent. Her father did not always remember to collect her for the holidays!! Her classmates included Elizabeth Bowen, the novelist, and Audrey Richards who became an anthropologist. Both were similarly exceptional women.

"I only saw, sad to say, a deaf blind old lady"

Sibella met Florence Nightingale who at the time did not make a great impression on the young Sibella but may well have influenced her decisions in later life?

"I searched the waste paper baskets at 10 Downing Street ... and it was a poor tea"

Her aunt was the daughter of Asquith, Prime Minister during WW1 and she was taken for tea at number 10 by her father. Sibella was left to her own devices and soon discovered the waste paper baskets in which were crumpled letters from famous people. She took them home, smoothed them out and kept the signatures in her autograph book.

"It was a course for girls who were going to stay at home ... it was a pity I did not get to University, but I was told I couldn't do that"

Sibella attended a one year course at Kings College for young ladies. She then supervised her father's house, checking the meals and servants, welcoming her father in the evening.

"We found ourselves in a new world without men"

Had she been born at a different time she would probably have married but almost a whole generation of young men died in WWI.

"I was bored stiff and longed to do something useful"

Eventually she persuaded her father to pay £60 so that she could train as a midwife at the General Lying –in hospital in London. During her midwifery career she delivered 85 babies and she compiled a set of beautifully drawn sketches of her patients.

"One of the highlights of my early

A refugee Belgian family lived with the Bonham Carters during WW1 and they became Sibella's good friends. She was appalled by the dreadful casualty rate and the bombings.



Her remarkable contribution to life in this village is so extensive it is almost impossible to find sufficient superlatives to describe it. Perhaps it is summed up by the following – in her own words.

"I have enjoyed a long life especially the last part as I have been able to do things"

In 1950, three years after her father died Sibella moved to Sonning Common to 1 Woodlands Road where she adapted the house and set up a nursery, licensed to take 5 babies. Christopher, she adopted, and many others were fostered by her.

One of her first actions in her adopted village was to advocate the improvement of the constantly flooding end of Woodlands Road. She formed a committee which, with contributions from residents, was successful in having the road repaired and subsequently adopted by the council in 1959.

"They could form their own cricket team"

Sibella set up a trust to pay for the pavilion at Bishopswood in memory of her father and his 10 brothers. She also supported the local football team and in 1959 bought their first football, became a member of the club and later its vice

President. She walked to support their away matches and even knitted their scarves!

"I phoned through with just 15 minutes to spare before the bidding closed. It was very exciting"

This may have been her finest hour, when she came through to top up the bid of Sonning Common Open Spaces Trust (SCOST) for the purchase of Kennylands field. Money had been raised by donations, £24,000 from the residents, but this amount could not have outbid the commercial developer without Sibella's £90,000 donation.

Her accomplishments and breadth of interests were extensive?

Sibella was a talented artist and learned lithography. She loved music; in her youth sang in a Bach choir conducted by Vaughan Williams; with the choir at Peppard church and the South Chiltern Choral Society. She enjoyed play reading with the Chiltern Players and was the President for some time. She made her own clothes, grew her own vegetables and bound the church hymn books by hand. As a member of the English Folk and Dance society she knew Cecil Sharp who was the founder.

At 60 she took up Judo, studied English Literature to A level at 70, and learned

Greek aged 90. Her IQ was measured to be 160 by MENSA when she was 93 becoming the oldest member at that time. She was still walking a mile around the village as a centenarian, although maybe not quite so quickly!

Aged 105 (2005 the year she died) she told a reporter "Life just keeps getting better"

Looking back over her long life she said 'I am not a person who has regrets. To spend time regretting is a sheer waste of time. I've made mistakes like other people, but what's the use of pouring over them, better to go and do something else. I call myself a happy person because I have achieved most of the things I wanted to do.'

This was the last remaining item of this kind in her folder following the sale of her work in the village, which generated considerable local interest. She had completed the work at the London School of Art when young, but how to sell it was not part of the course. At the age of 100 she was thrilled by

Miss Bonham Carter owned the house in which we live. She extended it, included many cupboards the children used for hide and seek, and in a bay window the curtains were drawn straight across "so they could put on plays." A nuclear shelter was built in the cellar for fear of an attack by the Soviet Union. She'd had such a miserable experience living through two wars in London and constant air raid warnings, she would not want to impose that experience on her charges. One former resident recalled that Miss BC, had told his parents that there would be room for him in the shelter but not for them! GEOFF ADAMS

Our memories of Sibella and the time she spent in South Chiltern Choral Society, the only female tenor. She began her time there as a first Alto then progressed to second Alto and then became the first and only lady tenor that the society has ever had. She left before she could progress to the Bass section! They remember a vigorous, outspoken lady with strong views. When it was suggested that the choir sing John Gardner's The Holly and the Ivy at one Christmas concert, Sibella was of the opinion that it was vastly inferior to the traditional version and made sure her thoughts were known to all at rehearsals.

So she gave (not sold, gave) a substantial part of her garden for car parking and an access way, so that the traffic and activity of a place of public assembly would come up to the side of her house, but, what mattered to her, was that Sonning Common would have its Village Hall. Those silver birches behind the Village Hall were hers.

Riverside Counselling Service – serving a need in the community

There is no doubt that there is a growing need for counselling services. A report published in June by Lord Layard and a distinguished panel of psychologists, doctors, NHS managers and economists pointed out that nearly half of all ill health in those under 65 is mental illness, but only a quarter of sufferers are receiving treatment. With six million people suffering from depression or crippling anxiety conditions and one in every three families having someone who is mentally ill, the scale of the problem is clear.

The report emphasises the success of psychological therapy: "a half of all patients with anxiety conditions will

recover, most permanently, after ten sessions of treatment on average".

The long-term benefits to the lives of patients, their families and society as a whole are incalculable.



Generally speaking you cannot choose your neighbours; you are either lucky or you are not. I was exceptionally lucky with Walter and Nora Dunn.

When I moved to Sonning
Common nearly twenty years
ago I did not know a soul in
the village. I bought a house
in Kidmore Lane with a flimsy
wire fence down one side of
the garden, and it was not long
before I was regularly chatting
over it to the elderly couple on
the other side as they tended to
their vegetables and fruit trees.

Nora was white-haired, Welsh, sharp in her mind and incisive in her judgements. Walter was immensely, inexhaustibly kindhearted, the nicest and most generous of men. I discovered that his driving passion in life was painting. He showed me some of his work. It was very abstract and difficult for me – a philistine in such matters – to understand.

One day I had a load of horse manure delivered for my fruit and veg. There was more than I needed so I took a few barrow loads around to Walter and Nora's. A little while later I came back from somewhere to find a painting had been left for me. It was of a pike, a favourite fish of mine. It is amazingly faithful, beautifully and skilfully done, and to my shame I thought Walter painted abstracts because he couldn't do real life.

In time I moved to the middle of the village, but we stayed very good friends. Walter got deafer and older and every now and then he would say that his painting days were over. But the urge was always too much for him and he always went back to his paints and his workroom.



He finished his last painting in May this year, and he died last Saturday at the age of 93. It was a privilege to have known him, and I still have my pike looking sideways at me from a wall in the kitchen to remind me of him every day.

AN INTERVIEW WITH...

Nikki Mitchell

A few lucky breaks coupled with talent, hard work and determination have led to one village resident enjoying a rewarding career as a BBC television journalist.

Nikki Mitchell, as she is known at work, jokes that journalism is her third career but she got there in the end!

She started off as a graphic illustrator of greetings cards, then worked in finance and administration for the BBC monitoring service at Caversham before finding her true vocation when BBC Oxford TV was launched about 13 years ago.

Before moving into TV, Nikki did a two-year stint with local BBC radio. She traces the beginnings of her journalistic career back to the days when she used to answer the phone and put callers through to BBC Radio Berkshire presenter Andrew Peach when he was on air.

One day a story came into the newsroom, claiming that fish were dying in local rivers due to polluted water running off the Newbury by-pass building site. With all the journalists already out on other stories, Nikki was faced with a decision: cover the story herself or lose it.

She chose to cover the story, whizzed over to the Newbury by-pass site, investigated the allegations, and, that evening, did a successful live interview for the drive-time show.

Nikki, who lives in Grove Road with her husband Stephen and sons Felix, seven and Dexter, five, said: "I had no degree, no journalistic training but plenty of drive and enthusiasm.

"I would always say to people who are looking for opportunities: bother people,

don't take no for an answer, work for nothing and continually generate new ideas. Always have something to offer people."

Nikki now works two days a week as a video journalist for BBC Oxford TV news, having since completed a series of BBC training courses and gained plenty of experience.

She researches, films, writes, edits and presents reports for the weekday regional news programme, which follows the main network news on BBC One. The programme's broadcast area reaches from the Cotswolds to the Chiltern Hills and from Milton Keynes to Swindon.

Most of Nikki's reports are only one-and-ahalf minutes long and condensing a series of interviews and pictures into a clear, informative and entertaining report can be quite a challenge. But it's one she enjoys.

She says: "I wake up in the morning and want to go to work. The days whizz by and there is no time to get bored. Every day is different and because my reports are usually transmitted the same day, I rarely take stress home with me.

"I get to meet and interview really interesting people - ordinary people with extraordinary tales to tell - celebrities, sports personalities and powerful politicians. I go to fascinating places the general public rarely sees and am often privileged to watch events unfold first hand.

"Juggling the demands of filming on location and presenting a report is tricky. I can be in wellies and waterproofs, filming on a muddy hill in the howling wind and rain in the morning, and then be expected to turn up in the studio, or on location, to present a live report, looking smart, groomed and relaxed.

"The job can be very emotional. I've had to film some terrible things, some awful car wrecks, for example, and I've had to interview people who've lost friends and family in terrible circumstances.



"But I am continually amazed by how welcoming people are, and how generous they are with their time, even in sometimes difficult circumstances."

This summer Nikki covered the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebrations at Henley Business School and the heroes' return to Henley following the Olympic Games. More locally she has investigated a controversy over the keeping of chickens at the allotments in Gallowstree Road.




