Community spirit ... people who smile...

these were the two most commonly identified reasons for liking life in Sonning Common

These headline views were gained from the Design Day held in Sonning Common on Saturday 28 April. Despite a wet and cold day around 170 people visited the village hall and engaged in a variety of tasks in the morning; identifying likes and dislikes about the village; memory maps of where they live and the amenities close by; traffic concerns including parking; viewing the sites identified as possible building plots (poor weather prevented the surveys in situ) and developing a vision for the village in 2020. In the afternoon the consultants fed back the interim results to a large assembled audience.

The day was a very good start to raising awareness and engaging many residents in a dialogue about the future developments that will take place. A key outcome is a real sense that most (but not all) of the participants have come to terms with the demands for new housing developments and

the resulting increase in population. Even more importantly, people are beginning to believe (not yet proven) that through the Neighbourhood Planning process we can make a difference to the design, quality and location of new houses. This is what people think should happen!

33 villagers signed up for further activities, mostly for the site evaluations (SON 1-14). Many more said they would be happy to volunteer once it was clear what exactly they would be required to do ...

The surveys will be short, sharp and thought provoking to provide key information that will enhance local control and influence.

Betty worked as a receptionist at Sonning Common Health
Centre for many years. Her father was a member of the Scottish
Antarctic Expedition of 1902-04, led by William Spiers Bruce and
recently featured on a television documentary series.





Did you know

that the Thames Valley Gymnasium was once a school



In 1939, amidst a country preparing itself for war, thousands of schoolchildren were evacuated from the busy cities and found themselves whisked away to much greener pastures in quiet rural villages. Some London kids had never seen a cow before, let alone lived in the countryside. Many camps were thrown up around the country to act as boarding schools, with two erected around the village of Sonning Common, north-west of Reading. They were called Kennylands Camp School, and Bishopswood Camp School.

The Kennylands school was built by Essex County Council (hence Essex Way) and many evacuees came to the school during the war; some for only a term or two; some for longer. They all had to help in growing their own food and looking after the farm animals that provided eggs, milk etc. The girls and boys were taught and slept separately, coming together only for meals. There are lots of `old boys and girls` who regularly keep in contact via the internet, and have had reunions here. One of the stories mentioned walking into Reading and feeding the donkeys with their packed lunch on the way!

Kennylands school was closed in the 1980's due to the difficulty of insuring the wooden dormitory buildings. The remaining part of the school became Abbeycrest Care Home, whilst the playing fields were bought by Sibella Bonham-Carter and became the Millenium Green. There is a very interesting website – www.nuthatchcottage.com - which has lots of information and pictures from the school. It even has the wording from the school prospectus!

The main hall of the school was taken on by Mr and Mrs Field in 1985 who set up a gymnastics academy and called it the Dorian Centre. Unfortunately they hit financial difficulties in the nineties. Roger and Sue Newton had also started a gymnastics club at Hemdean school in Caversham as their daughter was a gymnast. They offered to take over in Sonning Common and renamed it Thames Valley Gymnastics Ltd.

The premises were in quite a bad state when they moved in, and it took them over 5 years and an investment of £380,000 to get it to the condition it is today. Lottery funding via the Foundation for Sporting Arts helped with the extension to the gymnasium, and with the new dance studio and foyer.

It reopened in 2000 with Sue as director of coaching. Roger and Sue's daughter also coaches along with her husband Kevin. Children and parents use the gym from a very early age at the twice weekly morning playgym sessions.

Classes properly start from the age of 3 to 5 and go up to 17+.

The Newtons have around 340 children and young adults signed up to the gym now, and have had successful county and regional athletes.

Gymnastics is probably thought of as a sport for the youngest, but the success of Beth Tweddle in the GB Team (now 27) has encouraged some to go on further in the sport. The gym

has encouraged students from schools and Duke of Edinburgh schemes to help there as part of their work experience, and the gymnasts themselves can go on to train as coaches.

Sue tells a lovely story "I saw a group of men and women hanging around outside the gym, near the trees, and went out to see what they were up to. It turned out that they were a reunion party from the old Kennylands school come to reminisce"! n

When I was eleven years old – in 1943 – I went to join the Beal School at Kennylands, Kidmore End, Oxfordshire. We had five dormitories, assembly hall, a dining hall and 20 acres of ground; also our own hospital and sewage disposal plant. Academic work was supplemented by pig-rearing and bee-keeping, together with gardening. We had an adventurous time in the woods and

field nearby, but also helped out with potato picking on a local farm.

Parents came down by special coach and usually left behind food of some sort or another. We had a good share-out system, and woe betide anyone who wasn't willing to join in. Food was important to boys of our age growing up during the war.

On Saturdays we were allowed

further afield, walking Sonning,
Mapledurham or Reading. The school
used to provide sandwiches. These
were very dry and almost inedible,
so a friendly donkey down the road
was happy to oblige us, and was well
fed, thanks to us. Reading was about
five miles away. We walked ourselves
an appetite, so we could enjoy a
meal of fish and chips at a Churchill
restaurant.

AN INTERVIEW WITH...

Penny Snowden

For someone who couldn't do a forward roll until she was in the sixth form at senior school, Penny Snowden has certainly come a long way in sport.

Anyone who knows Penny - the dynamic driving force behind the village's popular On Your Bike event - will find this very difficult to

However, Penny freely admits she is no sportswoman, even though her whole career has been devoted to sport.

Penny first became involved with sport at the age of 13 when she qualified as an umpire for her school's netball team (because she says she was, "so desperate to be one of the sporty set"). She later became games secretary at school and subsequently trained and qualified as a PE teacher.

However, Penny never worked as a PE teacher. Instead, at the age of 22, she joined the International Amateur Athletic Federation, the IAAF, and, for the next 10 years, travelled the world organising athletics at a global level.

She took athletes to the first Goodwill Games in Moscow in 1986 and journeyed many times behind the Iron Curtain, using sport to bridge the gap between the East and West during Cold War days.

Said Penny: "They were ground-breaking times. I remember using battery-operated typewriters and communicating by telex. Sending faxes seemed impossibly advanced.

"At the time countries like Spain, Portugal and Brazil were just beginning to feature on the world's stage and using their participation in international athletics as important milestones on the road to becoming developed nations.

The emergence of the African nations, with their world-beating athletes, was only just beginning."

Although Penny never competed as an athlete, she has had a longer and more fulfilling career in sport than many of her competitor colleagues.

She is very keen to get across the message to children that sport is not just about competing. "Sport is multi-faceted," she said. "Everyone has an important part to play, from the competitor, to the coach, to the referee, to the person who hands out the oranges at the end of an event".

"I have had more of a career in sport than any of my friends who competed and for that I am eternally grateful. Sport has given me so much and I want to share its benefits with other people."

To this end Penny has been the principal organiser of a 20-week sporting programme at Sonning Common Primary School in celebration of the Olympic Games.

Representatives from around 30 different Olympic and Paralympic disciplines have been invited to speak to the children during school assemblies. Former Olympic athlete Alan Pascoe launched the programme on a snowy morning back in January.

And a special Paralympic day is planned for 20 June when the whole school will get a chance to try a range of Paralympic sports, including boccia, sitting volleyball and goalball.

Penny's next big aim is to have an all-weather multi-sports games area installed at the primary school, where her daughter Phoebe is a pupil.

Around £50,000 is required to build the games area. Said Penny: "We still have some way to go to achieve this goal. It would be terrific if the pitch could be installed in 2012 as a legacy of the Games. If anyone knows how we could manage the funding to obtain the money to build the pitch now with a pledge to fund-raise for it afterwards, we would be delighted to hear from them."

"The better the facilities we give our children, the more chance we have that they will be fit and healthy and achieve their sporting potential. This has to be a goal for which we all strive."

I was brought up in Twyford in the 1950s and 60s, and I remember clearly how much of the village life – and therefore its identity – came from its shops.

Needless to say, most important to me were the two sweetshops – Sylvesters for gobstoppers, aniseeed balls, blackjacks and the like, Mrs Reed's for her sinfully wonderful treacle toffees. Next in the scheme of things was Seymour's – principally a saddler's but Mr Seymour was also secretary of the local angling club and dispensed

hooks and floats and handy advice.

There were others, all distinctive: Oxlade's, the general grocery store; the two butchers, Jennings and Franklins, in strong but genial competition; a greengrocers, a bread shop, even an antiques shop owned by the ever so slightly loopy Mr Gillett. Everyone used the local shops because everyone had always used them. No one thought about it; the shops were part of the landscape.

They are not there any more. Waitrose has driven out all the food shops and the retail centre of Twyford is bland, dominated by Indian restaurants and estate agents.

Contrast this with Sonning
Common. I am not sure people
appreciate how lucky we are
with out shops. It would be
invidious to go through them
– but how many villages in
southern England can you think
of that have both a first-class
butchers AND the best hardware
shop ever (plus bicycle repairs at
the back)?

We need to cherish and nourish our shops, and think about the



precious contribution they make to village life. There is a shop for virtually all everyday needs in Sonning Common – that isn't so where I used to live. If we don't support them, then one day we will look around and they will be gone, and we will look at one another and say: what happened to our village? By which time it will be too late.


Christian Community Action celebrates 20 years

20 years ago the vision of Nick Crowder was to provide practical help to those in need in Reading, so he started delivering donated furniture to the needy. The dream grew. There are now shops in Southcote, Whitley, Sonning Common and Oxford Road and a furniture outlet in Silver Street, CCA aims "to demonstrate God's love by meeting people's practical needs and restoring self-worth". This is achieved through supplying furniture, bedding and household items to the needy, providing work placements for those trying to get back into the world of work, and support centres which offer a listening ear or signposting to other agencies for specialist advice like debt counselling or benefits advice.

The profits from the CCA shop in Sonning Common support this work. The shop was officially opened in September 2003 and has been doing good trade ever since. It is staffed by 3 paid members of staff and 26 volunteers, 8 of whom have been helping since the shop opened. Joan Bawden, one of the original volunteers, says "it is hard work but I enjoy the friendly atmosphere of the shop". She proudly boasts that 95% of goods donated are recycled. Everything is sorted in the shop. Items not purchased within four weeks are sold on to specialist buyers (for boots, books or rags). Even electrical goods, which cannot be offered for sale in the shop, are sold on for refurbishment or spares.

The shop receives lots of good quality donations but will be happy to accept more and would welcome anyone who could find time to help.

Next on their target list is the pub's exterior which they plan to liven up by planting plenty of flowers and re-furbishing the children's play area, just in time for summer.



FISH (Friends in sickness and health)

How it all began...

I had been a Social Worker in Bury St Edmunds until we moved to Peppard Rectory in May 1976. During that time I had been involved in establishing two Volunteer Centres, designed on the 'FISH **Good Neighbour Schemes'**

It was not until my husband, the clergyman, Bob Butler-Smith, discovered how difficult it was for people to get to hospital, dentists or other appointments, that I remembered them, Could I generate enough support for one here?

There are two kinds of neighbourhood help

- n Volunteer Centre: this is a centrally based office with a co-ordinator holding a list of volunteers who are prepared to help in their community, who are then matched with people requiring help
- n Good Neighbour Scheme: this has 2/3 co-ordinators who work from home with a list of volunteers, once again matching the needs.

These schemes were originally given the Ancient Greek Christian symbol of Ichthys 'fish' I discussed my ideas with John Fryer, a Church warden at All Saints and after researching the possibility of funds and premises we were ready to form a steering committee. First the Chairman, I persuaded Dr Ann Barber into this position and she was very soon caught up in our enthusiasm! We then recruited the rest of the committee members.

We found difficulty in obtaining a fairly central office so we decided to start with the Good Neighbour Scheme format, Here we were very lucky in finding two individuals who were happy to join us as co-ordinators. Local Churches and the Health Centres community fund

provided our immediate finance.

Having gathered, a small pool of volunteers, information was delivered to every house in the designated areas.

As the need grew, we were fortunate enough to be offered the room in the Village Hall that still serves as the 'FISH' office to-day. Caroline Aldridge became our coordinator

Whilst we were busy establishing the Centre, I became the Director of Bracknell Council for Voluntary Service, which in turn gave me the opportunity to initiate and guide five more such organisations in Berkshire, all using the Sonning Common 'FISH' Centre as the prototype.

Although in the beginning it was sometimes difficult to find funds and willing hands, I am so very proud of the people of this area, past and present, who have worked hard to keep it going for all these years, and have built it up to become the exceptional organisation it is today.

SONNING COMMON

ganage

This is part one of the story of the two locations which now comprise Sonning Common Garage. Since the publication of Fred Richens's comprehensive book on the history of the village (The village that never was) the facilities available to the local motorist have changed and this seems a good moment to take stock before another hoard of memories disappears into the ether.

The original garage on the Peppard Road was started by Jack Callis during the First World War. Those were the days when petrol was sold out of cans. The charabanc trips, which Jack organised to the seaside and other places of interest, were a nice sideline after the war. Once he was stopped by the police for exceeding the speed limit of 12 mph. The passengers had a whip-round to pay the £5 fine.

In 1946 the garage was bought by Burgess & Haynes who added a showroom, lubricating bay and spraying shop.


Lawrence Harris remembers Mr Haynes being involved with the garage; he had lived in a bungalow adjacent to the garage which was demolished to make way for the new facilities. Mr Burgess himself lived opposite the school in Grove Road.

In 1961 this garage was bought by Michael Manning and not long afterwards he went into partnership with John Mullin. This lasted for about four years when John Mullin became sole owner of the garage and a Morris and MG dealer. Eventually another bungalow, owned by Mr Farrow, was demolished to give the garage still more space.

When John Mullin acquired Hill Crest Garage in about 1968 the pumps were moved and the garage became the showroom, selling Vauxhall cars. In 1984 this entire premises and a bungalow were demolished and the present building was erected.









The Sonning Common Garage near Sedgewell Road, from which petrol is now sold, was originally Swan & Sons Garage. In 1923 "old" Sidney Swan opened a cycle business in a wooden shed near the present site of the National Westminster Bank. The garage was set up by the road and the shed became the office where there was a desk and a typewriter. An old photograph shows clothes hanging in the window so Mrs Swan must have sold them from there at some point. However, Mrs Swan also sold drapery and millinery from the front room of her house next door, and eventually from a shop where the bank is now situated. Sidney Swan began to sell paraffin and petrol, and recharged accumulators which were used in valve wirelesses at that time; he also serviced cars and owned 2 cars for hire. There were three locked garages on Sedgewell Road: two were for the hire cars and one for a fire engine kept by the Auxiliary Fire Service during the war.

When they got married in 1955 John and Eileen Earle made use of the hire service on their wedding day. Trevor Swan (who was chauffeur at Wyfold Court before the war) first drove John to Kidmore End Church and then went back to pick up Eileen. Trevor refused to take payment saying it was a wedding present for the couple. John and Eileen ran the Hare and Hounds from the time of their marriage until about 1977, and they still live in Sedgewell Road.

Plans to rebuild the garage business were made in 1939 but the war put a stop to the development for the time being. After the war Sidney Swan and his sons built the house which was also used as Mrs Swan's drapery shop, and eventually became The National Westminster Bank. They also rebuilt the garage which now sold Austin cars in addition to petrol and servicing.

When they retired Mr and Mrs Swan lived in Caversham but missed Sonning Common and returned to Sedgewell Road where they built a bungalow, number 1, and a tennis court on the site of the three lock-up garages. This later became the car park for the bank.

John Mullin took over Swan's Garage in 1984/85. The business was run with John Mullin as Chairman, Phillip Mullin as Managing Director and servicing, and Paul Mullin responsible for the showroom.


Smith's Motor Garage

Today the Free Church stands opposite Sonning Common Garage showroom. However, this was originally the site of a cycle shop started by Edward Long in 1915 in a shed on the corner of Peppard and Grove Roads. Later he moved to the former Hare and Hounds (opposite the present one) in Sedgewell Road and repaired cycles in the living room. He moved

to Wychwood Close (off Wood Lane) where he worked from a small hut, later used by Heath & Watkins when they took over the business in 1938.

Meanwhile the original cycle shop on Peppard Road had become a tea room (though the photograph of it as Smith's Motor Garage); this was owned by Mr Raymond who made sweets for the tea shop in his home in Grove Road. Lawrence Harris recalls buying a large bag of sweet dust and chippings from Mr Raymond for half a penny or sometimes a full (old) penny. The photograph shows Sidney Gordon Smith who ran the garage with his brother Claud.

In the next magazine there will be more feedback from the future discussions.




